HHS Secretary Tommy Thompson Announces Role for Women Legislators for Homeland Security & Bio-Terrorism

Secretary of Health and Human Services, Tommy Thompson, surprised attendees with an appearance at lunch on Saturday, November 23. He spoke to legislators about the new security concern for the U.S.: bio-tenrorism.

W ith the nation still on high alert, Secretary Thompson told women legislators that they have a strong role to play in Homeland Security, and that there is a need for women to take the lead in protecting the country. He discussed the funding that is available from the Department of Health and Human Services for individual states to contact this new threat of bio-tenrorism.

"Secretary Thompson really encouraged all women leaders to step up and use our role as community leaders to educate our constituents about the new threats we are facing and the ways in which we can prevent terrorism and/or be ready to respond if it occurs," said newly-installed NOWL President, Rep. Gail Buckner (CA).

The members of the Committee on Crime, Justice, Terrorism and Substance Abuse, composed of approximately 100 legislators, students, members and observers, joined Canadian and Mexican Federal and State Government Officials in an international congressional session highlighting the NFWL/DEA Shoulder to-Shoulder Joint Initiative. This session focused on the two days members spent in Mexico and the model legislation that was

drafted by the Committee, the legislators focused on club drugs, now called predatory drugs and successful rehabilitation programs. Team leaders expressed renewed enthusiasm in the program's mission.

Legislators representing every state in the Union took part in a pre-conference event in Mexico, where they toured the Ensenada Second Chance Facility.
