BOMB DAMAGE TO BRITISH NAVAL VESSELS

INTRODUCTORY NOTES

This is the fourth and final summary of war damage to British naval vessels. The preceding summaries have dealt with gunfire, mine and torpedo damage. Supplemental summaries will be issued later as information becomes available and opportunity offers.

This summary is complete from the British entry into the war up to September 2, 1941.

The destroyer section is divided, for convenience, into three groups: Major damage, minor damage and losses. The demarcation between major and minor damage is indistinct and there are a number of borderline cases. Material damages rather than impairment of fighting efficiency has been the criterion used.

The bomb sizes given in the tables are estimated sizes, quoted from British reports. In most cases the basis for these estimates is not stated.

Abbreviations: D.A. ----- delayed-action (applied to bomb fuses)
Inst. fuse ---- instantaneous, or direct-action fuse.
A.P. ----- armor-piercing
