


### Renaissance Art National Gallery of Art

This book of postcards presents thirty marvels of the Renaissance from the extraordinary collection of the National Gallery of Art, Washington. The master painters whose luminous works are reproduced here represent different periods (from the fifteenth to the sixteenth centuries) and different schools (Venetian, Florentine, Milanese, Central Italian, Netherlandish, and German). What their portraits, domestic scenes, interpretations of Greek myths, and devotional works have in common is a mastery of color, composition, and psychological depth--elements that, combined, form the definition of a masterpiece.

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### Small French Paintings National Gallery of Art

Intimate in subject and scale, the images in this book of postcards represent the skilled accomplishments of Monet, Degas, Pissarro, Morisot, Renoir, Seurat, and other major impressionists. A small Manet still life is notable for the assured freedom of its brushwork, Vuillard painted his own paint box, Toulouse-Lautrec captured the likeness of his patient dog sitting in a sunsplashed garden, and Bonnard rendered a picnic table under a shady tree (front cover). The paintings reproduced here are drawn primarily from the bequest of Ailsa Mellon Bruce to the National Gallery of Art, supplemented by works given by her brother, Paul Mellon, and other generous donors. Modest in size but exceptional in their beauty and subtlety, these paintings afford a glimpse into the brilliant innovation and powerful immediacy of impressionism.

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#### **Winslow Homer**

The paintings of Winslow Homer (1836–1910) are among the most widely recognized and best-loved images in the history of American art. Ranging from the sunny slopes of the Adirondacks to the rocky coast of Maine (with a side trip to Cuba), Homer's bold and naturalistic depictions of the land, the sea, and men and women engaged in the activities of everyday life have come to be seen as a reflection of the American pioneering spirit. Thirty of Homer's finest pieces from the American paintings collection of the National Gallery of Art fill this book of postcards.

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




