I Have Met God and He Lives in Brooklyn

Or how the arch-skeptic,

dark lord of Disinformation becomes convinced,

and tries to convince you the reader,

"Yes, hello?"

"Richard? Howard Bloom."

"Hi, Howard, how are you?"

"Well, not so good. Not too good at all. [Pauses.] Richard, as you are a curator of the extreme, I have a very extreme situation that I would like to propose to involve you in. Does this seem like the kind of thing that you would want to hear about right now? Do you have anything planned for this evening? I have a weird idea and you're the first person I thought of calling."

I'd been corresponding with Howard Bloom, legendary music business publicist and author of the mind-blowing book, *The Lucifer Principle*, for about five weeks now, since we both were interviewed for Alex Burns' upcoming book, *Mind Kampf*. Alex, knowing that my own violently rejected religious upbringing in West Virginia closely resembled his similar boyhood in Australia, brought me into an email discussion he was having with Bloom that ranged from why Christians try to censor other social groups to how much we all admired Jello Biafra to Satanic cults Alex had either joined or at least obsessively researched. It was a lot of fun.

But I'd not yet met Bloom in person, so I wasn't prepared for the crazed energy that came leaping out of the phone line, practically grabbing me by the throat. (As I type this I wonder what *could've* possibly prepared me for the human tornado that is Howard Bloom, and I must confess, I'm drawing a complete blank.) It was an eccentric (and amusing) performance to be sure, but since I hadn't the vaguest notion of what his scene consist€d of and he sounded like he'd just snorted a *few fucking pounds* of crystal meth, I mumbled a few syllables of positive encouragement and committed to nothing. I wasn't exactly in the mood for an Abel Ferarra kind of night, if you know what I mean, but since I'd been calling the guy a genius to all my friends and anyone who'd listen for a month now, I thought I'd at least listen to what he had to say.

And then it occurred to me: Didn't Howard Bloom develop such a bad case of Chronic Fatigue Syndrome in the late 1980s that he had to suddenly retire from running his top rock and roll PR company? Wasn't the über-publicist of the rock era unable to move his jaw for longer than ten minutes without completely wearing himself out? But this is a force of nature on the line. Hadn't he been *horizontal* for the better part of the last decade? Robin Williams himself would sit down and shut up if forced to share the same *country* with this guy!

"Howard, you sound like you're on coke. A lot of it."

"That's what people used to always say to me when I was in the music industry. But I am a bit manic tonight, yes. Well, two weeks ago (January 14) I tried to commit suicide when the divorce proceedings with my wife, Linda, became too much for me. I ate 80 Valium, fourteen Chlorpromazine, and gave myself an intramuscular injection of five cc's of Lidocaine Hydrochloride, which according to my copy of the *Physician's Desk Reference* was an unequivocally fatal dose. I actually was so close to dead that the Grim Reaper had digested my soul and was burping up the remains.

"For two and a half days I lay in bed like a corpse, the blood pooling in my body and breaking out through the skin, almost like stigmata. When I woke up I'd lost the use of three limbs and 40 percent of my circulatory system. I've been experiencing the highest spiritual and intellectual highs and the lowest of the lows in roughly fifteen-minute cycles ever since. As a scientist, it's an incredible thing to witness, but being the person experiencing it, it really sucks. So I tried to kill myself. Yes, you could say I'm a little on edge, that's for sure.

"Anyway what I want to propose is this: You come out here to Brooklyn and baby-sit me. You keep me company and keep me distracted from thoughts of killing myself, and I, for my part, will keep you entertained and be witty and funny and be a genius and, well, uh, that's the job if you choose to accept it. Let me entertain you, in other words. I guarantee it'll be pretty interesting. I really need human contact now. I could die and I'm afraid. I don't want to die. Not tonight. Not for a long time. But I need help. I need a baby-sitter to keep me from killing myself. Does this sound like anything you'd be interested in participating in?"

It's difficult here to get across how utterly persuasive and yet how deeply desperate Bloom sounded that night. His rap was equal parts

startling and controversial new theories of evolutionary psychology. Armed with vivid examples combined with meticulous documentation from several scientific disciplines, Lucifer (and Bloom's embryonic science of paleopsychology) takes its cue from Thomas Hobbes' Leviathan, theorizing that evolution has organized mankind (and every other life form) into "super organisms" (think ant colonies and cell cultures and capitalism and devotion to a cause or religion and you'll be in the Bloomian ballpark) that compete with each other in an eternal biological conflict closely resembling something akin to St. Paul's conception of "original sin." War, death, hatred, violence, and even racism are necessary underpinnings of the genetic plan-integral components of creation and of life itself. The Lucifer Principle asks why "our finest qualities often lead us to the actions we most abhor-murder, torture, genocide, and war' and answers it with the cold and clammy facts: Evil, according to Bloom, is an evolutionary imperative. In other words, we're genetically hardwired for it.

Far from being an apologist for hate crimes and ethnic cleansing. Bloom wants us to understand hatred, racism, and genocide, to understand our evolutionary development—ourselves, who we are *down to the microbial level*—so we can outwit the script that an apparently insane programmer, God himself, wrote into our genetic code.

Yup. Whatever Bloom has in store for me tonight, I doubt that I'll be bored.

The "D" train to Bloom's Park Slope neighborhood leaves me off at Flatbush Avenue, but the normally bustling open-air hip-hop culture shopping mall is utterly deserted. A healthy fog blanketing the area makes things very much like a Sherlock Holmes story. Brooklyn has transformed itself into Victorian London. It was a nice dramatic touch. As I walked the nearly fifteen blocks to his home.

I tried to imagine what Bloom's apartment would look like. He'd spoken about his medical condition and the women who "watched" him, and I was

sheer force of personality, deft (even unfair) cajoling, and flat-out emotional blackmail, skills no doubt honed during his tenure as the top publicist in the music industry. It was a preposterous position to be put in. Resistance wasn't only futile, it wasn't even an option.


I laughed. "Well, Howard, what you propose is indeed extremely extreme, so, yeah, why not? I'm game. When do you want me to come over?"

"Eleven. I need you to keep me company in the worst hours which are from 4:00 to 6:00 AM."

Howard Bloom's 1995 sleeper masterpiece, The Lucifer Principle (Atlantic Monthly Press), is now in its eighth printing, and he's putting the final touches on a new book, *Global Brain*, that furthers his imagining, I suppose, a Stephen Hawking sort of figure in a somewhat ambulatory setting.

But when I got there, Bloom himself answered the door. Wait a minute. Hadn't he been paralyzed since the suicide attempt two weeks ago? In fact wasn't he crippled just three hours ago when we spoke on the telephone?

"A lot of weird things are going on right now inside me. I'm walking around in a body that is a bunch of barely-connected parts. I'm getting feeling in my legs that hasn't been there for two weeks—I'd given up thinking I'd ever walk again—and I just walked 5.6 miles around this apartment." He glanced at a pedometer hooked on the belt of his jeans. "Yeah, 5.6 miles. Do you mind walking around with me so I can get the blood flowing?"



DAZED + CONFUSED EVEN BETTER THAN THE REAL THING

WHAT MAKES STARS? HOW DO REAL PEOPLE BECOME TWO-DIMENSIONAL MYTHS? AND WHY DO WE WANT TO BELIEVE IN THEM? Howard Bloom, Former PR to Michael Jackson, Kiss, Alice Cooper, Prince and Bob Marley Knows a thing or two About the Art of Propaganda. Only instead of spinning Lies Into Truth, Bloom Believes that what we really want Is reality made into a Myth.

The mass mind is full of falsehoods. Hypnotically-suggested half-truths and outright fictions implanted by the mass media shape our fantasies, fears and desires. But for the fake to exist requires a consensus. A belief that it represents truth. Reality, therefore, is a shared hallucination. And nowhere is this process more acutely played out than in the entertainment industry.

Manufacturing illusion and master-minding perceptual tricks is something Howard Bloom knows all about. From '76 to '86, he ran his own bi-coastal public relations and artist consultancy firm, The Howard Bloom Organisation. Among his clients were some of the biggest names on the planet: Michael Jackson, Prince, Bob Marley, KISS, AC/DC, Billy Idol, Bette Midler, Billy Joel and Alice Cooper.

Bloom, who trained as a scientist, claims his first forays into this world were intended as anthropological studies into the workings of the collective mind. He was looking for the passions that drive society, and he found them in the rock/n'roll arena. "The mass media, to me, is where the wild things are," says Bloom. "It's where the rituals of the Gods inside of us, the passions inside of us, that I really wanted to crack, are manifested in modern society."

Bloom retired from his career in PR in '86 after he was diagnosed as suffering from a particularly debilitating form of Chronic Fatigue Syndrome from which he still suffers today. Bloom believed that the kind of passions he saw aroused by rock'n'roll (and the effect that they had on society) had a historical precedent. Virtually confined to his apartment, he began to research and develop ideas pertaining to the neo-Darwinian principle of evolution through group selection (a field all-but-dismissed by prevailing scientific thought in favour of individual survival). Flexing his marketing skills, he created his own school of thought, paleopsychology, the study of behaviour through history. He has written two books, *The Lucifer Principle* and *Global Brain*, that present his meticulously-researched theories in a style as persuasive as his PR spin.

To create Gods for the baying crowd out of beings made of flesh and blood requires an astounding amount of fakery. So much so that a vast industry is dedicated to this one aim. But what makes us perceive someone as a "star" is nothing more than a simple perceptual trick of the mind. The visceral thrill we get at seeing a famous person in the flesh is the result of a powerful shock to the system. The ubiquitous nature of celebrity as image within the mass media has conditioned our minds to seeing people in two dimensions. The constant feed of new information about the celebrity instills in us an intimate sense of familiarity. This process has evolved to the extent that mediated reality, the realm of the fake, has become truth in our minds. And so, when confronted with the actual, undeniable truth of their physical presence up close, we react violently against our conditioning with awe, amazement, shock and surprise. Witness the hysterical reaction of teeny-boppers when they catch sight of their idols in public at star-studded premieres, in-store signings and concerts. Pubescent yearning is given release with unbridled orgasmic excitement. Screaming, shaking, fainting and moaning. In some cases, inducing an ecstatic trance not unlike that found in tribal religions.

As a former PR to the stars, Howard Bloom scooped the inside track on the mechanisms used to heighten reality of the star persona for maximum emotional effect on the public. But, as he is at pains to point out, he took the opposite route from that which you'd expect. Instead of projecting manufactured myth through a carefully-controlled reality, Bloom specialised in projecting reality as myth. "I discovered that the most real thing on an emotional level is the thing that would seem most false," Bloom contends, "and what would seem most real is in reality the thing that's most false." In other words, he found out that the truth, no matter how fantastic, was far more persuasive than fiction. But the fiction is far easier to fabricate and much harder to refute.

On April 13, 1844, the daily New York Sun ran an exclusive on its front pages. It told the story of a group of eight English adventurers who had attempted to cross the English Channel in a hot-air balloon. Three days later they landed in Charleston, South Carolina, having inadvertently made the first trans-Atlantic crossing. The article was furnished with exclusive extracts from the balloonists' diaries and an array of technical information concerning the crossing. Sales of the Sun sky-rocketed, prompting its competitors to run their own stories about the astounding adventure, and obtaining exclusive interviews with the men involved. There was one problem. The original story was a fake written by one Edgar Allen Poe. This innocent (but profitable) prank set a precedent. But, as Bloom would find out on several occasions during his tenure as a PR, press hoaxes also came in more insidious forms.



"Blooms debut. The Lucifer Principle (1997) sought the biological basis for human evil. Now Bloom is after even bigger game. While cyber-thinkers claim the Internet is bringing us toward some sort of worldwide mind, Bloom believes we've had one all along. Drawing on information theory, debates within evolutionary' biology, and research psychology (among other disciplines), Bloom understands the development of life on Earth as a series of achievements in collective information processing. He stands up for 'group selection' (a minority view among evolutionists) and traces among organisms—and competition between cooperation groups throughout history of evolution. the 'Creative webs' of early microorganisms teamed up to go after food sources: modern colonies of E. coli bacteria seem to program themselves for useful, nonrandom mutations. Octopi "teach" one another to avoid aversive stimuli. Ancient Sparta killed its weakest infants; Athens educated them. Each of these is a social learning system. And each such system relies on several functions. "Conformity enforcers" keep most group members doing the same things; "diversity generators" seek out new things; "resource shifters" help the system alter itself to favor new things that work. In Bloom's model, bowling leagues, bacteria, bees, Belgium and brains all behave in similar ways. Lots of real science and some history-much of it fascinating, some of it quite amply footnoted...arguments. obscure—go into Blooms ambitious, ...Bloom's concept of collective information processing may startle **skeptical readers with its explanatory' power**." *Publishers Weekly*

IF HOWARD BLOOM were a Catholic, he'd be on the road to hell. First there's his take on God: "If there is a God, his creatures have revealed him as the ultimate sadist." Then, there is Bloom's hubris in formulating the "Lucifer Principle," the basis of a compelling new book by the same name. Blending aspects of psychology, biology, and sociology, Bloom argues that evil is an unavoidable, undeniable part of all life and that since the dawn of civilization, it has had a stranglehold on us humans. Or rather, on us animals. Bloom sees our instinct for war, our need to form pecking orders in government and on the job, and even in our families, as springing from the most primitive, and often uncontrollable, portion of our brains. There are no wholly innocent beasts: Chimp mothers have been known to devour their neighbors' young, and throughout history men (and women, Bloom adds) have plundered and punished, marred and murdered their fellow man. Contemptible behavior has headed the bill from the Emperor Constantine to Oliver Cromwell to the Ayatollah Khomeini, all of whom killed in the name of religion.

Bloom doesn't completely give in to our dark side, nor does he leave his reader feeling powerless. Instead, he dissects the monster. Understanding our biological destiny (i.e. our need to dominate) is fundamental to changing our

behavior and culture, he claims, and that's the first step to making a better, more peaceful world. But until that first step is taken, the human race will continue to indulge its satanic appetites. A lifelong student of science, Bloom has always sought to understand the nature of thingsconcocting a jar of cold cream from raw ingredients at 11, building a computer at thirteen, and, at 15, working on a cancer study In a biochemistry lab. Even while writing poetry and editing Circus magazine, he kept abreast of

genetic breakthroughs in the world of science. For 17 years, up until 1988. Bloom worked as a veritable publicity machine for a pantheon of rock gods, from Michael Jackson to Billy Idol. Surprisingly, his experience in the music biz proved to be a crucible for original thought. "Everything from the wolf-pack behavior of music business executives to the lemming-like conduct of hypocritical journalists helped shape my insights," he explains. Bloom observes that rock creates an atmosphere of primal sensations, albeit devoid of Beelzebub. 'The real magic of



rock happens at a concert, where, if the performers are successful, individuals...merge in a pulse of common emotion," he notes. "This consolidation mirrors the force that creates much of both human good and evil." Illness forced Bloom to leave the music world in 1988-one year earlier than he had planned. having always intended to get back into science-and now keeps him confined to his room most days. "Once a year or so, a window of several months arrives in which I can walk outdoors once a day," he explains. While his body may be limited in its reach, his mind is grasping more than ever before. The Lucifer Principle (Grove/Atlantic) is just the first in a series of science-based books he plans to wrile, all in an effort to move toward a better understanding of the duality of human nature.
