BRADEN BUYS YATES CENTER NEWS

(Yates Center News) Stewart Braden has purchased the Yates Center News from Chris and Catherine Faimon. The Faimons will continue to own and operate the Coffey County Republican. Braden, who is Catherine Faimon's brother, moved to Burlington in April 2000 to work with his sister and brother-in-law at the Republican. For the past two years, Braden has also operated a home-based Web site business.

"It's refreshing to work with such an experienced staff in this welcoming county community," said Braden.

Braden and Catherine Faimon's parents, Randall and the late Rozanne Braden, were publishers of the News from 1995 to 1999. Prior to that, the family lived in Oberlin where they owned and operated community newspapers in northwest Kansas.

TOPEKA CAPITAL-JOURNAL REACHES SETTLEMENT WITH EDITOR

(Topeka Capital-Journal) A settlement has been reached in the wrongful discharge of a longtime Topeka Capital-Journal editor, who was forced to resign last June, then later filed a complaint with the federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission. Terms of the settlement are confidential.

The case involves former managing editor Anita Miller Fry, who left the newspaper June 22. She had worked at The Capital-Journal for 28 years. After her departure, Miller Fry, filed a complaint against The Capital-Journal and its Augusta, Ga.-based parent company, Morris Communications, alleging age discrimination, sexual discrimination, retaliation and violations of the Equal Pay Act.

Miller Fry was offered an opportunity by current Capital-Journal publisher Mark Nusbaum to rejoin the newspaper staff, but she chose not to return. She is now employed by Stormont-Vail HealthCare. Nusbaum became publisher in Topeka in September.

"Having Mark return to Topeka as the publisher of The Capital-Journal means that the newspaper will once again have some great community ties and involvement," Miller Fry said. "I wish him the best in creating a new team to lead the paper to greatness."

Miller Fry was forced to resign by former Capital-Journal executives after the newspaper ran an article written by a freelance reporter that was edited by Miller and other editors at the paper. The story included information fabricated by the source of the story that later came to light after an investigation by the newspaper that Miller helped conduct.
