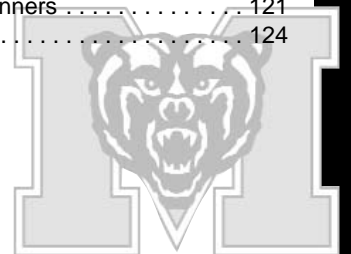

Something Old - Something New

Mercer looks to use a blend of veterans and newcomers to make a run in 2004-05

What a difference a year makes.

Last year, Mercer returned one of the most experienced teams in the Atlantic Sun Conference and was picked third in the league.

Now as the Bears prepare for the 2004-05 campaign, they return three starters from last year's team, but lose two key cogs to the 2003 A-Sun Championship team in Scott Emerson and Delmar Wilson.

And those aren't the kind of guys you replace overnight.

"We felt four years ago that we would be good for three years," Slonaker said. "I felt that this year would be a rebuilding year because we would be losing so many good players. I felt that once we got good, we would stay good. This year is going to be a transition year as we have a new look and a new face for the program."

But this team got some unexpected good news late in February when the NCAA granted Wesley Duke a sixth-year of eligibility.

"That is a big bonus for us this year," Slonaker said. "He's got a lot of experience and is going to be the leader for this team."

With Duke coming back and the return of long-range bomber James Odoms, the Bears return two of the top four scorers from last year.

On top of that, sophomore scoring sensation Jacob Skogen is slated to start on the opposite wing of Odoms.

Will Emerson looks to break out of the shadows of his older brother as he is poised to get the starting nod to be Duke's partner in the post.

But the biggest question mark is the point guard position as Mercer signed two players in the offseason to help solidify the position.

"I feel good about our starting lineup," Slonaker said. "We have two seniors, two juniors and one sophomore which gives us a nice balance. We're lacking some experience off the bench and these guys are going to play critical roles in our rotation."

In what looks to be a wide-open race in the A-Sun, if Mercer can answer all of their questions correctly, the Bears could be in the hunt again in March.

POINT GUARD

Last year, the point guard position was an Achilles heel for the Bears. Mercer used a lot of different

players at this position with four players earning starts at the position.

During the offseason, Slonaker and his coaching staff went out looking for a point guard and went to the junior college ranks, adding transfer Damitrius Coleman.

"Last year we had four players run the point and we never had consistent play which was very frustrating," Slonaker said. "We lost a couple of close games and turned the ball over 20 or more times. We wanted to upgrade this position and wanted a proven point guard and we feel like we accomplished that."

Coleman comes to Mercer after leading St. Petersburg College to back-to-back 20-plus win seasons. A solid point guard, he averaged 15 points and eight assists per game last year and will be the starter at the point as the Bears enter the season.

"Damitirus knows how to play the point," Slonaker said. "He took his high school team to the final four and he played with great junior college players and led St. Petersburg College to two 20-win seasons."

Pushing Coleman for playing time will be senior Tyler McCurry. McCurry will be coming off the bench, a familiar role for him two years ago when he was highly effective on the 2003 championship team.

"Tyler's role is similar to the role he had two years ago," Slonaker said. "He was very efficient last year coming off the bench and we feel like he will be able to do that this year. He knows the offense and is extremely competitive and wants to go out with a bang and will be able to push Damitrius each day."

Michael Slonaker, Coach Slonaker's son, will also battle for some playing time at the point guard with junior Andrew Brown and freshman signee Emmanuel Hollaway also seeing time at the point as well as the wings.

Mercer has made its living in the post the past three years. With the ammunition the Bears have at the two wing positions, Mercer has become a perimeter team.

"Over the last three to four years, we have been a power team," Slonaker said. "Now we've got two big wings that are 6-foot-5. James Odoms is one of the top 3-point shooters in the country and when you put Jacob Skogen on the other wing, it is going to extend the defense."

Last year James Odoms came to Mercer and took the A-Sun by storm, finishing the year by averaging double

figures in points and finished second in the country in 3-point field goal percentage.

Joining the senior Odoms at the other wing position is sophomore Jacob Skogen. Skogen came on strong at the end of last season, scoring 20 points or more twice in the last 10 games.

"J.O. (Odoms) is a stop-and-pop kind of shooter," Slonaker said. "And Jacob is able to manufacture his own shot. He has gotten bigger and stronger and will make a huge leap from his freshman year to his sophomore year. Not too many schools are starting two wings at 6-5 and the combination of these two playing off each other is going to be fun to watch."

With the two starting spots taken, the Bears have unprecedented depth at the two positions with Andrew Brown, Emmanuel Hollaway, Shaddean Aaron, Ross Alacqua, Micalvin Hammonds and Justin Reeves all pushing for playing time off the bench.

Brown had his coming out party at Georgia State in January of last season, scoring eight points in the second half which moved him into the starting lineup. He would go on to take advantage of his opportunity, scoring double figures six times the rest of the year.

"Andrew played a lot last year at the point, but he has a scorer's mentality," Slonaker said. "This year he will move into more of a scoring role. With his experience last year in conference play, he knows how hard it is to play every night and he should have a big impact on this team."

The Bears big-wing depth continues with Aaron. Standing at 6-foot-5, Aaron will see time at both wings and gained valuable experience practicing with the team last spring.

"Shaddean is another slasher-type player," Slonaker said. "He is big and athletic and can get in there to do the dirty work on the boards."

Hollaway comes to Mercer after a stellar high school career. Another player with a strong scoring mentality, Hollaway will push for playing time at both positions.

"Emmanuel is a good scorer," Slonaker said. "He shoots it well from outside and brings a different element to the team as he can play both wing positions as well as run the point."

Also jumping in the battle for playing time is the long-range bomber Alacqua. He sat out last season as a redshirt and gained valuable experience working and getting better each day in practice.

"Ross is a good shooter," Slonaker said. "I feel like

he is one of the top shooters in the country. He brings a lot to the team because he can help spread the defense and can make a team pay if he is left open."

Also battling for playing time will be sophomore Micalvin Hammonds and freshman walk-on Justin Reeves.

POST

Mercer's depth and experience in the post was decimated by graduation, losing Scott Emerson and Bobby Hansen. The Bears avoided losing a third when Wesley Duke was granted a sixth year.

"With Wesley Duke, you have a sixth-year kid who is the most athletic player in the conference," Slonaker said. "He is a good defender, arguably the best in the league, and worked hard during the offseason on his jump shot and is going to have to pick up his rebounding. With all of our losses in the post, he may show more offensively this year."

With the loss of those two key players, several players are expected to step up. Will Emerson is set to join Duke in the starting front court when the season begins.

"The two players that will be making the biggest jump this year are Jacob Skogen and Will Emerson," Slonaker said. "This is Will's year to step out of the shadows. At 6-10, he has long arms and can alter shots as well as step out and shoot the three. He has worked hard in the offseason on playing with his back to the basket. He's very versatile and with his height, he gives us a lot of options."

The only other returnee in the post is fifth-year senior Andrew Walker. Walker has the ability to post up as well as the range to hit from the outside.

"We need Andrew to be good at what he can do," Slonaker said. "In the first third of the season, he will have a chance to play. What he does with that time will determine the rest of the season. He is the best passer and shooter among our big men. He has to work on his rebounding and not turning the ball over. If he can do that and knock down shots, he can contribute heavily to this team."

Joining the Bears are two freshman that will be asked to contribute from day one in Brian Pfohl, a native of Atlanta, and Sam Dolan from St. Johnsville, N.Y. Both players are mature physically and both spent the summer together at Mercer getting ready for their first season.

"When people talk about our program, they talk

about our tough inside guys," Slonaker said. "We feel blessed to get these two guys that fit our mold. Brian is a really good low post player. He's got great hands and good post moves. He is deceptively athletic and has as good of feet as we've ever had.

"Sam comes out of one of the premier prep schools in the country and he's played for one of the best coaches in the country in Jerry Quinn. He is well-coached and is a strong defender and rebounder. Both of these guys should make an impact on this team immediately."

CONFERENCE

The A-Sun is coming off a banner season after sending three teams to the postseason. Now, the A-Sun takes a new look as all of the top four teams from last year have to replace key personnel from last year.

"The top four teams last year all lost some key players. Georgia State feels like they have a good recruiting class. Troy signed two junior college All-Americans and UCF has its backcourt returning, but has a new front line. Jacksonville has reloaded and Florida Atlantic has quality players surrounding Mike Bell."

With all of the stars of the past season gone, the league race has no clear-cut favorite.

"This is going to be a wide-open race," Slonaker said. "The league as a whole has lost a lot of good players over the past two years. Stetson has the most personnel back and you have to look at them as one of the early favorites.

With the key losses to each team, the race for the top will be tightly contested between all 11 teams.

"Over the last couple of years, our top four to five teams in the league have been really good and our bottom teams haven't been as good," Slonaker said. "I think we'll see a more balanced league than the last few years. This year's race is going to be wide-open and exciting for all the fans in the league."

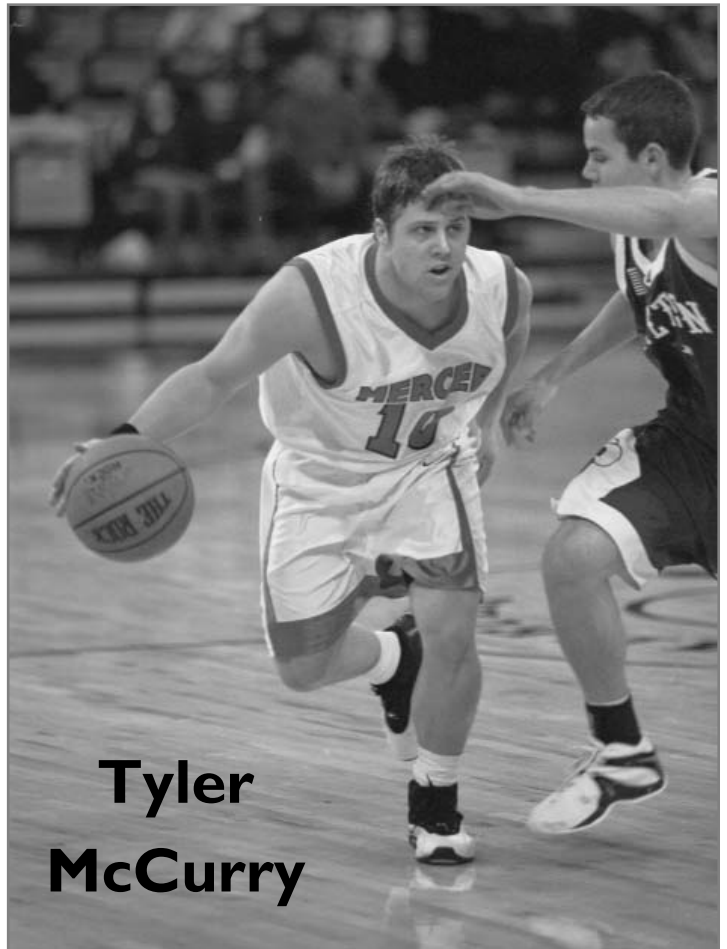
SCHEDULE

When mid-major schools work on their schedules, it is hard to get home games and even tougher to have more home games than road games.

With a 26-3 record at home over the past two seasons, the Bears will be playing 14 games at home this season and have a schedule that is similar to the one two years ago when Mercer claimed a share of the A-Sun title.

The schedule is highlighted by road games at Maryland and Ohio State as well as a home-and-home with in-state rival Savannah State and visit by Georgia Southern to the University Center.

"We have great fan support and are very fortunate to play 14 games at home," Slonaker said. "This schedule is very similar to the one two years ago. We play one of the

Bears Experience Runs Deep

Two years ago, Mercer won its first Atlantic Sun Conference regular season title. Three of the four seniors on the 2004-05 squad were members of that team.

Wesley Duke and Tyler McCurry were key components off the bench of that team and are looking to go out on top as seniors in 2004-05.

Duke enters his sixth year in the Mercer program and is closing in on 1,000 points for his career. He needs just 191 points to become the 30th member of the 1,000-point club at Mercer.

McCurry gives the Bears valuable experience at the point guard position. During his sophomore year, McCurry came off the bench and gave Mercer some valuable depth at the point. Last year, McCurry led the team in assists with 55. He needs 48 assists this season to tie Aleem Muhammad for 10th on the all-time list.

Walker was redshirted during the 2002-03 season, but gained valuable experience by practicing with the team each day.

The lone senior not to play on the championship team is James Odoms. A junior college transfer, Odoms lit up scoreboards around the A-Sun with his strong 3-point shooting. Odoms finished second in the country in 3-point field goal percentage, hitting 48.8 percent of his attempts.

"Our seniors are going to be the leaders of this team," said Mercer head coach Mark Slonaker. "With a young team like this one, they are going to look to the seniors for guidance on and off the court."

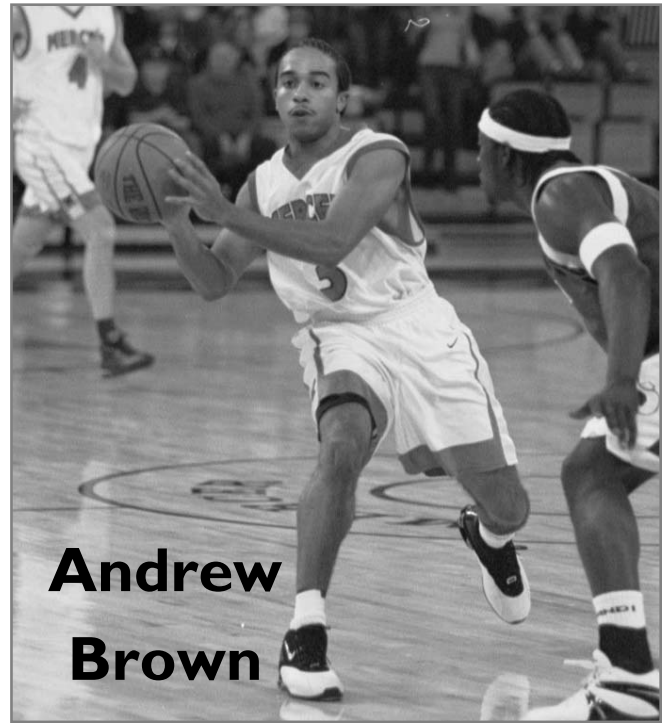
Noting the Bears for 2004-05

- Mercer is four wins away from the 1,000th win in school history. The Bears enter the season with a 996-962 record in 95 years of basketball.
- The Bears are looking to avoid back-to-back losing seasons for the first time since the 1999-2000/2000-01 campaigns.
- Head coach Mark Slonaker is just 21 wins away from his 100th at Mercer. He has a 79-122 record in charge of the Bears and is currently fourth on the school's all-time wins list. He needs 24 to tie James Cowan for third.
- This year marks the final year of the 20-game conference schedule as Troy and UCF move to other conferences with East Tennessee State joining the league next season.
- Mercer has been dominant at home over the past two seasons, despite changing venues. The Bears were 4-1 last season in the new University Center and never had a crowd less than 1,800.
- Wesley Duke needs 191 points to become the 30th member of the 1,000-point club.
- James Odoms needs 19 3-pointers to crack the school's top 10 career list in that category. He would have to hit a school-record 99 3-pointers to tie the career record of 158 set by Reggie Titus.
- Last year the Bears faced one of the toughest schedules in the country as they faced five teams that advanced to the NCAA Tournament, with two of those teams (Xavier and Alabama) advancing to the "Elite Eight."
- The last time the Bears had a losing season, they posted the biggest single-season turnaround in NCAA history, going from 6-23 to 23-6 and won the A-Sun Championship.

best programs in the country in Maryland. Ohio State is in transition, but they are going to be a good test for this team. We also renew our rivalry with Savannah State as well as hosting Georgia Southern."

With seven non-conference games, the Bears will play a grueling 20-game schedule in the A-Sun.

"Your league schedule is always going to be grueling," Slonaker said. "Especially when you play 20 games and you have to play two in December. That makes it tough for everyone with non-veteran teams to open conference play so early. All in all, I like our schedule. We don't have any long road trips and we close

the year with seven of the last 11 at home, which allows us to make a run at home late in the year."

OUTLOOK

With the loss of two key starters, Mercer's coaching staff is going to have its hands full all season. Despite those losses, the Bears still have several players with experience who have been waiting in the wings and now have the opportunity to excel. If the Bears can get some consistent play at the point and the newcomers mesh with the veterans, Mercer has a chance at parlaying a rebuilding season into a run for the roses.

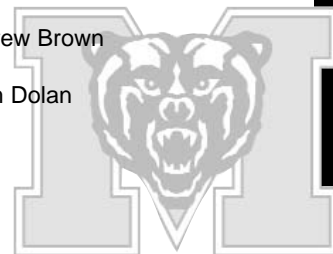

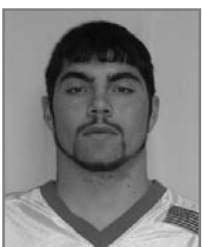

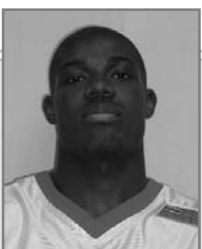

Head Coach - Eighth Season

How do you turn around a basketball program, rich in tradition, but one that had fallen to the depths of Division I basketball?

Ask Mark Slonaker. In his seven seasons at Mercer, Slonaker has resurrected the men's basketball program from the dead and has brought the Bears back to prominence in the Atlantic Sun Conference.

When he came to Mercer in 1997, it was a homecoming of sorts for the former University of Georgia standout. He was coming to Mercer to rebuild a program that was on life support.

And what he inherited was not pretty. The Bears were coming off of a 3-23 season in which they won just one game in conference play and finished last in the country in RPI.

Not only did Slonaker revive a program that many had considered dead, he took it new heights, culminating in the Bears first-ever A-Sun regular season championship in 2003. On top of that, he has graduated 86 percent of his players that have exhausted their eligibility.

All of this coming from a former wing-man from Rahway, N.J., that had a great knack for scoring and getting his teammates involved as well as making them better.

After earning All-America honors in high school, Slonaker left New Jersey for a scholarship at the University of Georgia in 1976.

Four years later, Slonaker had earned four varsity letters with Bulldogs and had led the team in assists as a sophomore. After being named team captain his senior year, he would finish his career with 211 assists, which still ranks in the top 20 in Georgia's history.

With his playing days behind him, Slonaker jumped right into coaching, serving as a student assistant coach at Georgia for the 1979-80 campaign.

Having a year of coaching experience under his belt, the young college graduate set out on his first rebuilding project as he took over at the Lovett School in Atlanta. There he turned a perennial doormat into a successful program.

Following his two-year stint at Lovett, Slonaker rejoined the college ranks by taking an assistant coach position at Georgia State, where he would remain for the next six seasons, including a stint as interim head coach during the 1984-85 season.

During his time at Georgia State, Slonaker was a key member of the staff that helped set the then-school record for most wins in a season. He was also responsible for signing the school's first all-conference performer as well as the school's all-time leading rebounder.

It was during the 1984-85 season that he took over as interim head coach three games into the season and oversaw a rocky transition with a young team as the

Panthers won just one the rest of the year, dropping seven games by 10 points or less.

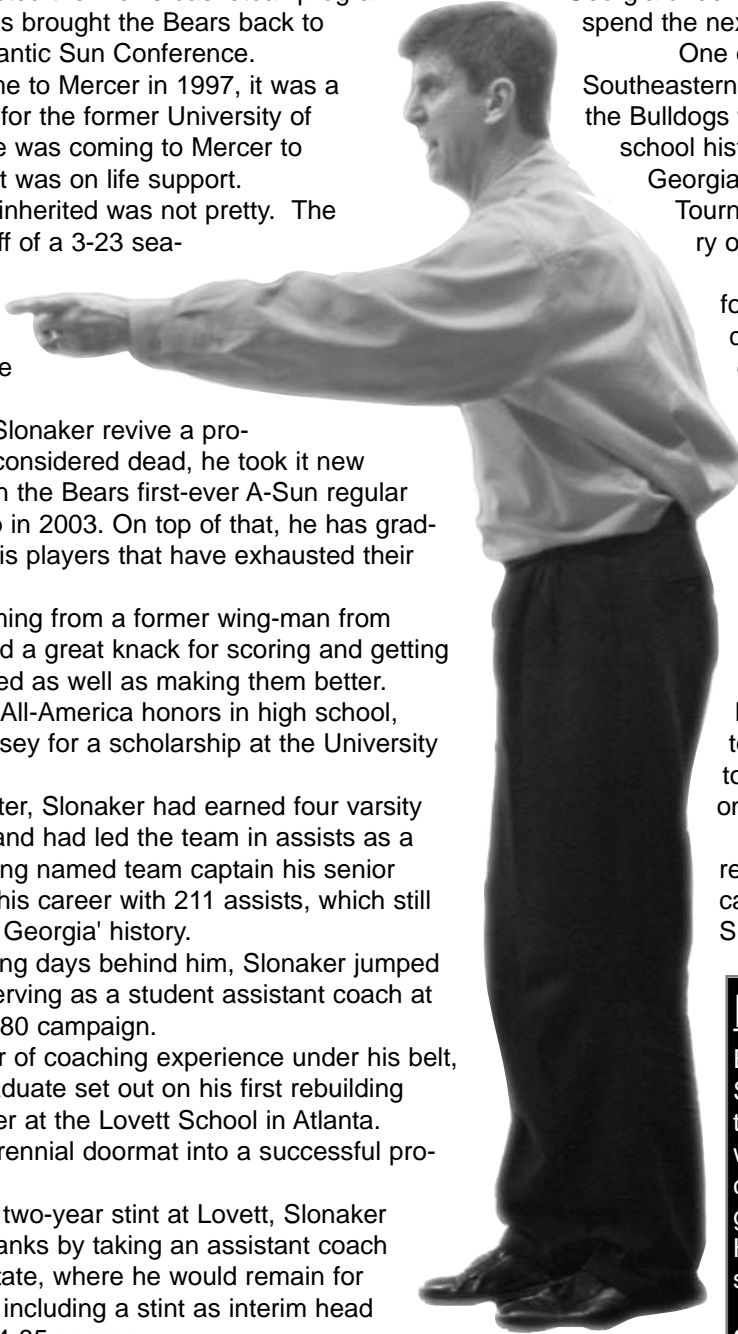
With his first taste of college coaching, Slonaker returned to his alma mater in 1989 as an assistant coach at Georgia under Hugh Durham, a place where he would spend the next six seasons.

One of the top assistant coaches in the Southeastern Conference, Slonaker helped guide the Bulldogs to their only SEC Championship in school history. It was also during this time that Georgia advanced to back-to-back NCAA Tournaments for the first time in school history on top of two NIT appearances.

In 1992, Slonaker was responsible for one of the highest ranked recruiting classes and coached six players who eventually played in the NBA, led by Dominique Wilkins. Other standouts coached by Slonaker include Alec Kessler, Litterial Green, Charles Claxton, Shandon Anderson and Carlos Strong.

Having six years of experience as a top assistant in the SEC, Slonaker moved on to his next challenge as the head coach at perennial power Pensacola Junior College in 1995. In his first season, he guided Pensacola to a 20-12 record and a spot in the state tournament. The next year, he improved on that with a 21-9 record.

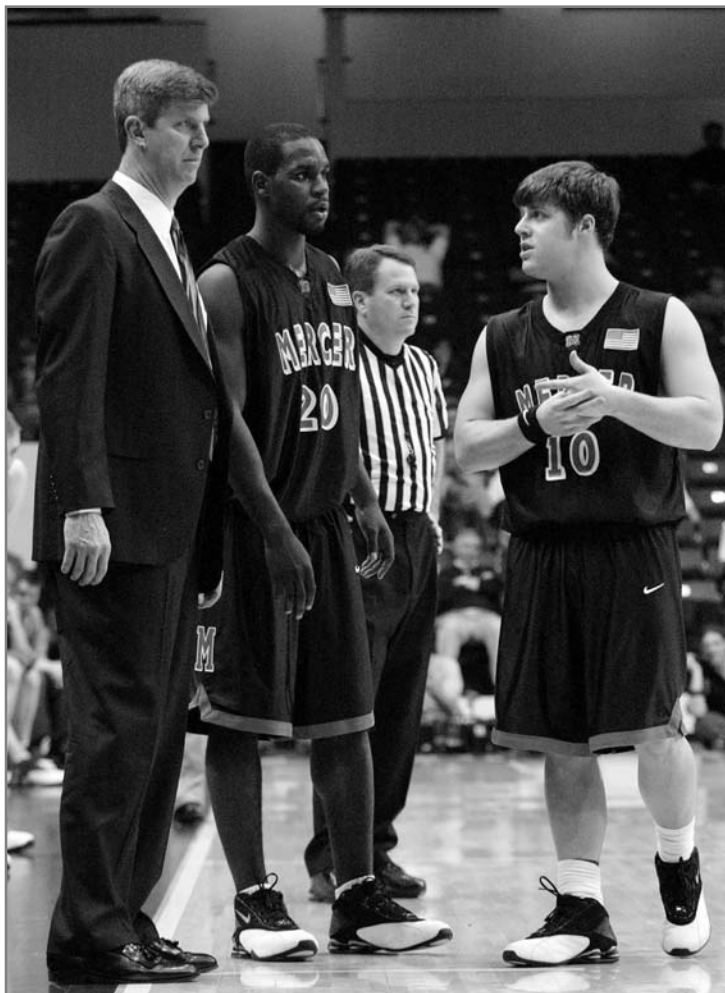
But Slonaker was longing for a return to Georgia and the opportunity came along as he took over at Mercer. Slonaker was taking over a program that

Turning It Around

After going 6-23 during the 2001-02 campaign, Mark Slonaker and his staff oversaw the biggest single-season turnaround in NCAA history. The 2002-03 season saw Mercer go 23-6 and win its first Atlantic Sun Conference regular season championship. The 17-game improvement was the best in Division I history, breaking the old record of 16.5. Here's the top five single-season turnarounds in NCAA history:

had been fallen from its lofty perch as a perennial contender of the A-Sun title.

It started with his first team that featured eight underclassmen and two junior college transfers. That young Bears team finished the 1997-98 season with a 5-21 record, losing nine games by 10 points or less. This team started to show some signs of the program turning around by going 5-8 at home.

The reclamation project was getting on track as the Bears improved on Slonaker's first season by going 8-18 and 5-11 in conference play the next season. The youth movement that was instituted in his first season continued as the Bears had six underclassmen on the roster that saw a significant amount of playing time.

Once again, the Bears were in a lot of games, losing seven by 10 points or less, but played better away from home, picking up three wins, including an 81-75 win at Troy State.

Slonaker's rebuilding project was gaining momentum and really picked up steam in his third season, as the Bears finished with a 12-21 record and a 7-11 finish in the A-Sun.

To go along with the four-game improvement, the Bears made a Cinderella run through the A-Sun Tournament, knocking off Jacksonville in the opening round and then upsetting No.1 seed Troy State in the quarterfinals.

This was also the coming-out party for freshman Scott Emerson. Tabbed as the future of Mercer basketball, Emerson earned second-team all-conference honors as a freshman.

With three years under his belt, Slonaker had Mercer poised to continue its resurgence.

And in the 2000-01 opener, the Bears showed that Slonaker had been working wonders in Macon, knocking off SEC foe Auburn, 92-88. The Bears would go on to finish the year with a 13-15 record but held a 10-8 record in conference play, their first winning conference mark since 1992-93, snapping a streak of seven straight sub-.500 seasons.

On top of breaking that streak, Slonaker had two players earn all-conference honors. Emerson was named to the first team with Rodney Kirtz earning second-team honors.

With an experienced group returning that had tasted success the previous year, Slonaker had Mercer gunning for a title run in 2001-02. Instead of being a run for the roses, it turned into a battle for survival.

The injury bug hit the Bears early in the season, taking away three of the Bears top players and forcing Slonaker to throw a very young and untested team to the wolves.

The result was a 6-23 season, but a team that showed flashes of brilliance and a promise of great things to come by winning three of their last six. Aleem Muhammed stepped up down the stretch, leading Mercer in scoring at 17.2 points per game. For the third straight year, the Bears placed a player on the all-conference team with Muhammed earning second-team honors.

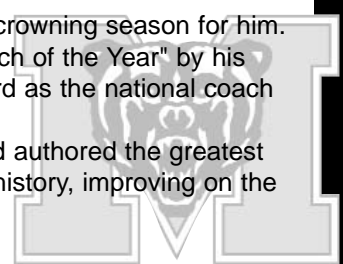
With a young group that had to learn on the job before getting Emerson and Wesley Duke back from injuries, Mercer once again was again predicted to make a run for the title in 2002-03.

This time, the Bears didn't disappoint. Mercer jumped out of the gates by winning seven of their first 10 and never looked back. In the process, the Bears set a school record for most wins in a season with 23, including a 12-game winning streak that sent Mercer into the Collegeinsider.com Mid-Major Top 25 for the first time.

The Bears were once again rewarded for their hard work, winning their first-ever A-Sun regular season championship with a 14-2 conference record. Emerson earned first-team all-conference honors with Muhammed being named to the second team.

For Slonaker, it was also a crowning season for him. He was honored as the A-Sun "Coach of the Year" by his peers and won the Jim Phelan Award as the national coach of the year.

On top of that, Slonaker had authored the greatest single-season turnaround in NCAA history, improving on the previous season by 17 games.

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With Emerson and Duke returning for the 2003-04 season, the Bears were set to make a run at repeating as conference champs and making another run at the "Big Dance."

Once again, the injury bug hit the Bears hard. Mercer didn't play with its complete roster until Jan. 30. Mercer had eight players miss a total of 38 games, including Emerson missing 12 games after being named the pre-season "Player of the Year" by the A-Sun.

The bright side of the season came on Jan. 27 when Slonaker sent his team on the floor of the Bears' new home court - the University Center.

His team responded to its new home by winning three of its four games in its new home, including a win over in-state rival Georgia State.

Mercer battled through the season, finishing with a 12-18 mark and a 9-11 record in conference play.

Cleveland Jackson

Assistant Coach - Fourth Season

It's not often that you get the call to come back to your roots.

After being recruited by Mark Slonaker to come to the University of Georgia, Cleveland Jackson starred for two years with the Bulldogs.

Following graduation, a professional career and a successful high school coaching stint at Campbell Hall High School in California, Jackson got the call from Slonaker four years ago to come back to Georgia and help build something special.

It was an offer that Jackson couldn't pass up.

Now entering his fourth season as an assistant coach on Slonaker's staff, Jackson is responsible for scouting, on the floor coaching, recruiting as well as conditioning.

What does Jackson bring to Mercer? A tremendous work ethic on top of a vast knowledge of the game.

Jackson's journey to Macon began in high school as a star at St. Monica Catholic High School in Los Angeles, Calif.

A three-year starter, Jackson led the team to an average of 25 wins per season. During his junior year, he averaged 17 points per game as the team's leading scorer and hit 51 percent from the floor and 76 percent of his free throws.

How does he follow that up? By averaging 16.5 points and 7.7 rebounds as a senior to earn all-league and all-region honors as well as being named MVP of the

El Camino Conference.

With his high school career behind him, Jackson moved to the next level at Butler Community College in Kansas.

During his freshman year, he came out firing, averaging 11 points and seven rebounds per game.

With a year under his belt, Jackson came out of his shell as a sophomore. He finished the season averaging 25.9 points and 8.8 rebounds while leading his team to the national tournament.

It was also during that campaign that he scored 49 points in a game, setting the school for most points in a game that still stands today.

And with those numbers came the accolades and the attention. He was named "Junior College Player of the Year" by the Basketball Times and was a consensus first-team All-America pick by the National Junior College Athletics Association, Basketball Times and Basketball Weekly.

He also was honored by having his jersey retired by the school.

With all of the success he had, Jackson was hungry for more as he came to Georgia. A force at 6-foot-5, he finished his career by averaging 9.3 points and 2.9 rebounds per game.

He became familiar with Mercer early in his career at Georgia, scoring 19 points and pulling down 10 rebounds while dishing out six assists in his first appearance as a Bulldog.

During his career, Jackson led the Bulldogs to the postseason both seasons as Georgia advanced to the NIT in 1993 and 1994.

With his college career behind him, Jackson played professionally in South America before entering the coaching ranks.

He spent four seasons as the head coach at Campbell Hall High School before joining the staff at Mercer.

Since joining the staff, Jackson has been a vital part of the Bears' success. In his four seasons, the Bears claimed their first-ever Atlantic Sun regular season championship as well as seen their talent

Upon graduation, Luther came to Macon, taking the head basketball coach position at Windsor Academy for one season before joining Mark Slonaker's staff.

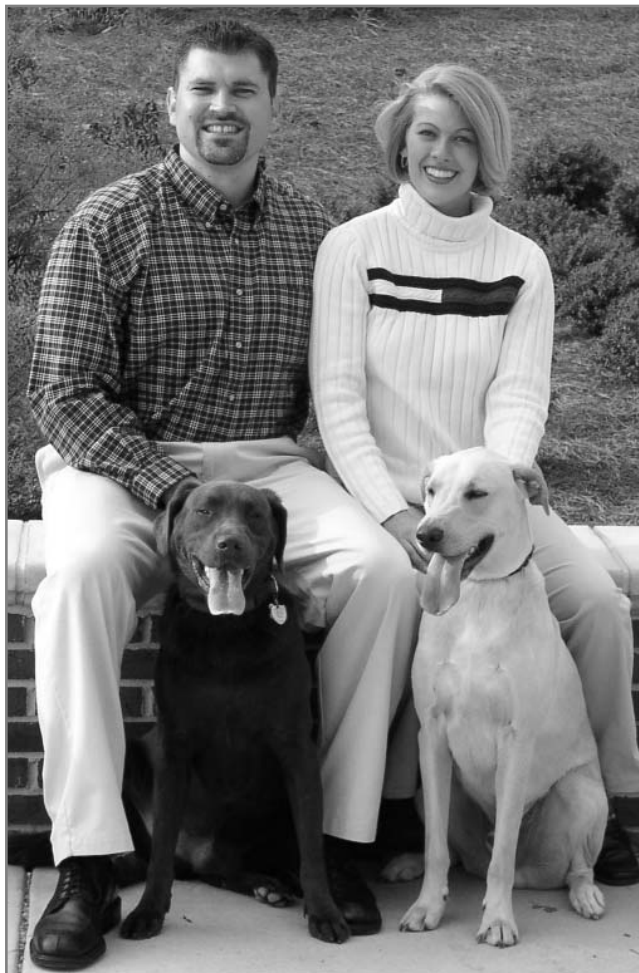
Since joining the staff at Mercer, Luther has played a key role in the recruitment of student-athletes as well as helping lead the Bears to their
