SENATE RACE: MENENDEZ HAS SMALL EARLY LEAD OVER KEAN, JR. WHILE 12% CONFUSE KEAN WITH HIS FATHER

STATE BUDGET: CORZINE HAS LONG WAY TO GO TO SELL TAX INCREASES

U.S. Sen. Robert Menendez leads State Sen. Tom Kean, Jr. 40 % to 35 % among registered voters in the race for the U.S. Senate, according to a Rutgers-Eagleton Poll conducted March 26-30 among 800 adults, including 676 registered voters.

The poll also found:

- 88 % of residents said the state's budget problems are "very serious" or "somewhat serious." But only 32 % said Corzine's budget proposal has the right mix of tax increases and spending cuts, while 38 % said the plan focuses too much on tax increases.
- 43 % of adults approve of the job Corzine is doing as governor, while 34 % disapprove.

■ 30 % of adults and 31 % of registered voters approve of the job George W. Bush is doing as president, the lowest job approval rating for Bush in New Jersey since he took office in January 2001.

Menendez holds a solid lead over Kean among Democratic voters, 68 % to 18 %. Kean leads Menendez by a similar margin among Republican voters. The candidates split the independent vote evenly, with 36 percent for Menedez and 34 percent for Kean. The candidates also run evenly among women, while Menedez holds a 43 % to 34 % lead over Kean among men.

There was a good deal of uncertainty about the two candidates for Senate. Twenty percent of voters said they were undecided about whom to support in the race. About one-third of voters said they could not venture a favorable or unfavorable opinion of either candidate and more than 20 percent of voters said they had not heard of either candidate.

"It is very early in the campaign and the candidates are not well known. The horse-race numbers don't mean much at this point; more telling is what the voters know and don't know about the candidates," said Dr. Murray Edelman, director of the Rutgers-Eagleton Poll.

This poll asked voters 10 questions about the backgrounds of the Senate candidates: whether each had served in the U.S. Senate, the U.S. House of Representatives, and the New Jersey Legislature, or as governor of New Jersey or a member of the 9/11 Commission. Some of the patterns of responses suggest voters may be confusing Kean with his father, who served as governor of New Jersey from 1982 to 1990 and chaired the 9/11 Commission.

Twelve percent of voters said that Kean is or has been governor of New Jersey, while 3 % said the same of Menendez. Eleven percent said Kean was a member of the 9/11 Commission, while 6 % said the same of Menendez. Among the 125 voters who think Kean had

served as governor or as a member of the 9/11 Commission, Kean leads Menendez 43 % to 33 %. Menendez leads Kean 42 % to 33 % among the remaining 551 voters in the sample.

Overall, roughly half of the sample answered three or fewer of the knowledge questions correctly, and half answered four or more correctly. Those who were more knowledgeable about politics showed a very different pattern of responses than those who were less knowledgeable.

Menendez's lead of 36 % to 34 % among independent voters grows to 42 % to 38 % among the more knowledgeable independent voters. Voters give Kean a three-point edge, 31 % to 28 %, over Menendez in terms of being the candidate who would make the best decisions to protect New Jersey against a terrorist attack. However, the more knowledgeable voters give the advantage to Menendez by a margin of 39 % to 33 %.

"This poll suggests Kean gains from the voters' lack of information and could be in trouble as voters become more familiar with the candidates," Edelman said. "But it is very early in the campaign and the race is still very fluid. Voters will be making their choices on many other factors besides the candidates' past experience in office."

The poll also found that voters associate Menendez more closely with Corzine than Kean with President Bush. Half of voters associated Menendez "very closely" or "somewhat closely" with Corzine, while 43 % said the same of Kean and Bush. In each case 29 % said they didn't know or refused to answer the question.

The large percentage of voters who said they didn't know or wouldn't answer the question suggests that each campaign's attempts to link its opponent to unpopular policies of Corzine or Bush can still alter the dynamics in the race, Edelman said.

The Kean campaign already has tried to link Menendez to Corzine's state budget proposal. Poll data show that the strategy has the potential to resonate with voters in New Jersey.

Kean leads Menendez 40 % to 33 % among voters who say Corzine's proposed budget is unfair to people like them. Menendez leads Kean 50 % to 32 % among voters who say the budget is fair to people like them. While partisanship influences the figures, with Republicans more likely than Democrats to say the budget proposal is unfair, independent voters also are more likely than Democrats to say Corzine's budget is unfair to people like them.

"Bush and Corzine are not running for Senate, but their fates can have a big impact on the race. At the moment, it appears the Corzine budget could have the biggest drag on Menendez," Edelman said.

The data show that Corzine still has far to go in generating public support for his budget proposal. Only 30 % of adults in the sample said Corzine has convinced them that his proposed tax increases are necessary to balance the state budget. Thirty-eight percent of adults said the budget is focused too much on raising taxes, while 32 % said the proposal is the right mix between tax increases and spending cuts. Adults said they prefer spending cuts to tax increases to balance the budget by a margin of 57 % to 27 %.

"Tax increases are rarely popular, so the governor has a difficult job ahead and the data confirm that he has a long way to go," Edelman said.

While Corzine's attempts to build support have not swayed a majority of voters, data show opinion varies by level of knowledge about the budget. Forty-two percent of those who said they have heard or read a lot about the budget proposal say the proposal is fair to people like them, compared to 35 % of those who said they have heard or read some and 28 % of those who said they have heard or read very little.

However, perceptions that the budget is unfair also rise with knowledge. Fifty-five percent of those who have heard or read a lot about the budget proposal say it is unfair to them,

compared to 53 % of those who have heard or read some, and 46 % of those who said they have heard or read very little.


While Corzine still has more work to do to convince the public of the need for tax increases, residents do not hold him directly responsible for the state's current massive budget deficit. Forty-seven percent placed the blame on former governors, and 26 % blamed the New Jersey Legislature, with only 5 % blaming Corzine.

BACKGROUND MEMO - RELEASE (EP 158-1) April 4, 2006

The latest Rutgers-Eagleton Poll was conducted from March 26 to 30 with a scientifically selected random sample of 800 New Jersey adults. This sample yielded 676 adult residents registered to vote in New Jersey. Most of the figures in this release are based on the statewide sample of all adults.

All surveys are subject to sampling error, which is the expected probable difference between interviewing everyone in a population versus a scientific sampling drawn from that population. The sampling error for 800 adults is \pm 3.5 percent, at a 95 percent confidence interval. Thus if 50 percent of New Jersey adults were found to have a favorable opinion of a senatorial candidate, one would be 95 percent sure that the true figure would be between 47.5 and 53.5 percent (50 ± 3.5) had all New Jersey adults been interviewed, rather than just a sample. The sampling error for 676 registered voters is \pm 3.8 percent. Sampling error increases as the sample size decreases, so statements based on various population subgroups are subject to more error than are statements based on the total sample. The following chart shows the relationship between sample size and sampling error.

Sampling error does not take into account other sources of variation inherent in public opinion studies, such as non-response, question wording or context effects. The verbatim wording of all questions referred to in this release are as follows:

Please tell me if you have a favorable or unfavorable opinion of the following people. If you haven't heard of them or don't have an opinion of them, just tell me and we'll move on.
