#### EDITOR'S NOTE

Tt's time we put the skier/snow-boarder feud to bed, once and for Lall. I grew up on a pair of skis, then switched to snowboarding about 10 years ago. But I still ski occasionally, so technically, I transcend both skier and snowboarder typecasts and should be qualified enough to finally bring peace to the mountains. I've been studying the conflict for the last couple of ski seasons - and I know I'm going to catch hell for this - but sadly, the conflict is more or less one-sided. It's not unlike the San Jose/San Francisco squabble. Some San Joseans have this chip on their shoulder and boast how we're the 10th or 11th largest city in the nation. San Franciscans couldn't care less.

Let's look at the particulars: Skiers call snowboarders "knuckle-draggers," among other things. Snowboarders call skiers, "skiers." I think that's where the animosity begins. I'm not sure what a knuckle-dragger is, but doesn't sound like a compliment. It sends a message of superiority and it does nothing for our personal relations. If snowboarders wanted to, they could call skiers "fruitcups" for wearing tight, colorful unitards while parading around on the snow sport's equivalent to rollerblades. But they don't. Snowboarders are generally too busy enjoying the mountain to get into that sort of exchange. So, step one: Skiers, stop the name-calling.

Incredibly, there are still resorts in this country that don't allow snow-boarding. Deer Valley in Utah is one of them. It's probably one of the most beautiful mountain resorts in the world, too. They only issue a limited number of lift tickets, so lift lines are rare, and they have "ski valets" who will carry your gear to and from your car. But their no-snowboarding policy, for me, is *sportsist*. I skied there last winter, and when I walked into the lodge wearing snowboarding boots, people looked at me like I was tracking in dog poop.


Why no snowboarding?

"It's something we evaluate every year," says Erin Grady, communications manager at Deer Valley. "We leave it up to our guests to vote on it, and it's overwhelmingly the same each year." It's convenient that those voting on the no-snowboarding policy are all skiers. So, step two: Share the mountains. Snowboarders share the terrain parks. It's only fair.

But this is all really beating around the bush. These issues exist, don't get me wrong, but they're more symptoms of a larger disorder. The issue was best summarized by a skier I interviewed on this subject: "We were here first." Which is true, if you don't count the wild and bearded frontiersmen who fashioned toboggans out of hollowed-out buffalo. If the tobogganers had as big a problem with the skiers invading their mountain as skiers do with snowboarders, the early ski pioneers would have been tossed off the mountain, literally. So, step three: Show more acceptance of snowboarders before they go all frontiersman on you.

I was going to make some ridiculous propositions to the winter sports community, but I think all we need is time. To help us get there, we offer you our Sixth Annual Ski & Snowboarding Guide — rich with resort profiles, travel tips, Tahoe spa information, and so much more. Additionally, we devoted our Style & Shopping section entirely to ski and snowboarding gear, compliments of Mel Cotton's, who, on November 10, 11, and 12 is having a huge sale. Many of the resorts will be there probably offering some pretty good deals on lift tickets, etc. The sale goes through November 19. So step four: Gear up and put in some time on the slopes, it's for a good cause.

Lawsy.





# 8-Bit Heroes

A local filmmaker produces one strangely compelling work of art.

hen an artist spends three years working in his basement, he's either going to emerge with a work of genius or an entrance slip to the loony bin. Fortunately for San Jose filmmaker M Dot Strange, the verdict seems to be "work of genius." Strange recently debuted the trailer for his stop motion/3D animated film We Are The Strange, and fans of CG and Japanese anime have snapped to attention.

We Are The Strange stars the voice of San Jose graffiti artist David Choe. His character (Rain) must save Blue, a sad-eyed anime girl, and Emmm, a doll-headed boy who just wants some ice cream, from the monsters that haunt StopMo City. The Sculpeyand-wire figures (Rain and Emmm) were filmed in stop motion with a Canon DSLr camera. The 3D animation (Blue) was done with Cinema 4d and Adobe After Effects, while the editing was done with Final Cut Pro. The mix of production styles creates a jumbled, chaotic, Tim Burton-esque atmosphere that really does resemble "the inside of a retro Japanese videogame," as Strange says. But the apparent chaos masks some

very stringent artistic techniques pioneered by stop-motion master Ray Harryhausen. Strange planned the film frame-by-frame on storyboards, and has meticulously rendered a first print in time for submission to the Sundance Film Festival. "You may think I'm a super crazy guy who does what I want, but no," says the eccentric filmmaker. "I do it the way you're supposed to do it."

Strange hopes to have the 88-minute film ready for distribution by early 2007. No doubt, film festivals will snap it up - its unique look and production story recall 2004's Sky Captain and the World of Tomorrow, a self-made film that garnered tons of media attention. But fame is not why Strange made his film; in an interview, Strange describes his urge to counter the slickness of mainstream films. "Mainstream films look all fancy and have shiny actors in them, but they lack a soul," he says. "There's no heart." We Are The Strange definitely has a heart - a heroic, ninjainspired, indie one.





# **Billions and Billions** of Fans

SETI opens the Carl Sagan Center.

s there life beyond Earth? If you were a fan of the popular 1980s PBS series Cosmos, hosted by Carl Sagan, the answer is probably yes: The show and Sagan's accompanying book continue to bring life to some pretty obscure astronomical science. Sagan's support of listening for interstellar signals with large radio telescopes brought respectability to a previously shadowy field.

Sagan also campaigned endlessly for the Search for Extraterrestrial Intelligence (SETI) program based in Mountain View. Now, SETI will return the favor

by naming its new research facilities the Carl Sagan Center for the Study of Life in the Universe.

Sagan, who died in 1996, would no doubt be excited by the two high-tech laboratories, public gallery exhibition area, and 500-seat auditorium that will comprise his eponymous center - all to be built on seven acres of land in the planned NASA Research Park at Moffett Field neighboring the space agency's Ames Research Center. And the project won't cost "billions and billions"; a mere \$40 million will bring it to life within the next three years.

The center will house 50 researchers studying how organisms evolve in extreme environments - an area

> of research known as "astrobiology." Sagan was a pioneer of the science; his experiments on amino acids, which he proved could be produced from basic chemicals by radiation, propelled

scientists to consider the possibilities of extraterrestrial life.

"Understanding the origin, evolution, and distribution of life in the universe is one of the most important endeavors of the science community and all humanity," said SETI Institute trustee and Nobel Prize-winning scientist Baruch Blumberg. IW

#### TW: What did you make up for him?

HJ: I can't remember now. I make up stories for him every second or third night. Sometimes he likes me to read, and sometimes he just likes the lights off and we make up stories. I can't remember what they are.

#### TW: Is he really creative?

HJ: Very. That's his thing. He has a great imagination. All the kids at school have to say what they want to be when they grow up, draw a picture, and Oscar was like, "I want to be a pharaoh." I was like, "Excellent, we need one of those in the family." Apparently they have this instant pass to the afterlife. This is great.



#### TW: How did they feel about X-Men, or is that too violent for them?

HJ: I've shown about 20 minutes of X-Men to Oscar, but I figure it's still a little weird for him to see his dad slicing people in half. Well, he'd probably like it. It'd probably give him license to go crazy, go to town at school, so I have a feeling I better not do it.

#### TW: It's only been six years, but how has your Hollywood journey been?

HJ: Well, the great thing about doing Wolverine first, in terms of my life as an actor, is [that] for about a year after that film came out, no one recognized me. Even fans, I'd walk down the street and they'd go, "You kind of look like, but you're not him." At one point, I even got out my driver's license to show them who I was, because they were having an argument. And to settle the argument, I said, "Actually, I am the guy." So, it was this great kind of thing, because the movie really opened up my career for me, gave me great opportunities that I had never had before. So it was something I'll always be forever grateful for.

#### TW: Are you a little shy on the inside?

HJ: I'm not shy, no. It took me a while, probably, since hosting the Tony Awards or doing the shows on Broadway, particularly the last show on Broadway. I've done a lot of theatre, but I had to interact with the audience a lot. And doing that eight times a week, and all the variables that come up when you're genuinely going off script for 400 times, gives you a great sense of calm, I suppose, and confidence in doing that. But I think it's fair to say I've always been fairly at home on the stage. I don't remember why, but I remember when I was six, there was a group singing, and I was the one who got brought out to sing the lead part. I don't think I was a great singer or anything like that. It was just if there was a speech to be made, or when I was at school, I became school captain. I wasn't particularly a goody two-shoes, but I was always somehow the guy that everyone would get up to make a speech, or get up on stage. I don't know. I remember thinking, "I don't know why I've been chosen to do this." But there you go. IW

## **SKIING WITH KIDS**

Kids and black diamond slopes don't mix. So, what should powder-loving, lawabiding parents do with their offspring? The answer: Day Care. # TO CHAIN OR NOT TO CHAIN

There's an ongoing dispute about whether you should put chains on car tires. The debate typically begins when one person - usually a snowboarder who doesn't own a car - tries to convince someone else to drive them up to Tahoe when the snow report says something to the effect of "dumping." No one likes to put chains on their car, and you actually shouldn't, according to Mike Young, shop foreman at Smythe European (4201 Stevens Creek Blvd., 408-735-7012). Some cars, especially those with low-profile tires, shouldn't be chained. "Most of your higher-end cars will have a section in their owner's manuals specifically regarding whether you should put chains on the tires," says Young. "They vary from model to model, so if you have any question, you should check." So there you have it.

## **SNOWBOARDING** A to Z

It wasn't very many years ago that snowboarding was an alternative alpine sport, relegated to teenagers and adrenaline junkies. These days, snowboards dominate many ski slopes and snowboarding is practiced by downhillers of all age groups - but the lingo used in the sport still has a teenage slang feel, leaving many older boarders feeling a little left out. We're here to help: Digest the list below and soon you'll be able to speak with your fellow snowboarders in their native tongue.

**Alley-oop:** Any half-pipe maneuver where one rotates 180 degrees (or more) in the uphill

Boning out: Straightening the legs during any aerial maneuver for extra style points

**Corn snow:** Thawed snow that has refrozen Duck foot: Any stance angle that leaves the toes pointing outward

Eurocarving: A style of riding where the boarder makes large and hard-cutting turns

Fakie: Riding backwards

Goofy foot: Riding with the right foot forward

**Hucker:** Someone who throws himself or herself wildly through the air but does not land on the feet

**Indy:** Grabbing the toe edge of the board between the feet using the back hand

**Jib:** Sliding on the rails or other platforms with your snowboard

Kicker: Any jump ramp designed more for air, rather than distance

Lip: The top edge of the half-pipe

McTwist: An inverted aerial flip with a 540degree twist. Don't try this.

Nose: The front edge of the snowboard

Off-piste: Snowboarding zones outside the designated areas of a resort or trail

Pipe dragon: The machine that grooms the half-pipe, not the guy who brought the weed

Quarterpipe: A half-pipe with one wall

Rolling down the windows: When a boarder is off balance and wildly rotates their arms to regain control

Screamer: An extremely steep hill

**Tranny:** The curved portion of a half-pipe between the flat bottom and the vertical wall

Ugly: Pink UGG boots

Vultures: Small crowds that gather at dangerous course sections to watch crashes

Wall: Any bank at or above 90 degrees

X-Games: Wow, you really don't know any snowboarding terms, do you?

Y: Slang short for wipeout

**Zonk:** Hitting the wall. Ouch!

Other impressive stats include a top elevation of 11,053 feet, 150 named trails, 28 lifts (nine express quads, two gondolas), 300 days of sunshine per year and 400 inches of annual snowfall. It's friggin' heaven on earth. The only downside is that it's not in our backyard and isn't the easiest commute. If you're driving, plan on at least eight hours from San Jose and don't – DO NOT – attempt the Sonora Pass, because it's rarely open. That said, Mammoth's amenities are legendary and worth the trip.







# Roughing It

Four incredible international destinations to quench your thirst for adventure.

fter a boulder fell on his arm, crushed it, and immobilized him during a 2003 canyoneering trip, Aron Ralston cut off his own arm with a multi-tool (like a Swiss-Army knife), and – in possibly the most surprising twist to his story – lived. You may remember this. For six days, he tried and failed to budge the rock, fought starvation and dehydration, and eventually came to the indescribably difficult (not to mention complex and painful) decision that he would snap his radius and ulna bones, and then cut through the soft tissue around the break. Which is exactly what he did. But that wasn't the end of his ordeal: Finally free of the boulder, he then applied a tourniquet, administered first aid, and rappelled to the bottom of Blue John Canyon. Then he hiked eight miles to meet rescuers.

Our recommendation to you: Don't do that.

Instead, take our advice, and consider these four adventure getaways. They range from the absurdly expensive yet majestic, to the preposterously crowded yet friendly. And you don't have to amputate an arm to get there!

# 1. Antarctica

The basics: Huge, icy, and technically uninhabited by humans, Antarctica was undiscovered until the 19th century (when it was visited by Russian explorers Mikhail Lazarev and Fabian Gottlieb von Bellingshausen). Today, the world's southernmost land mass is a popular cruise destination, and home to scientific expeditions and some of Earth's most breathtaking natural views. Despite being absurdly cold (the lowest temperature ever recorded was –128.6 F in 1983) and very expensive to visit, Antarctica is a must see for any adventurous person with deep pockets. It's easily the most exquisitely barren, untouched place on Earth.

Random factoid: In 1959, 12 countries, including the United States and the United Kingdom, signed the Antarctic Treaty to keep Antarctica as close to pure as possible by prohibiting military activities and mineral mining, while supporting scientific research. Not a bad idea, considering this is the largest stretch of uncultivated land on Earth.

How to get there now: For around \$10,000, iExplore.com offers an all-inclusive, 15-day luxury trip embarking in November, December, and January from Miami, Fla., and then Santiago, Chile.

# 2. Space

The basics: Be patient. Virtues for hardcore travelers include 1) the willingness to act on impulse, and, conversely, 2) enthusiasm for extensive fore planning. Generally speaking, "space travel" occurs when someone goes more than 60 miles above the Earth's surface (which is known as the Karman line). Right now, if you're willing to part with about \$20 million, you can do this, no problem (just like Anousheh Ansari, the Iranian businesswoman who entered space last month with the Russian Air Force, and spent 11 days there). But if you can wait three years or so, you can travel into the cosmos with Richard Branson's Virgin Galactic airlines (VGA) for a mere \$200,000. Total proposed time of weightlessness through VGA: seven minutes.

Random factoid: VGA made a deal with the New Mexico state government to construct Spaceport America for \$225 million. The proposed launching pad for VGA is in Upham, N. M., about 200 miles from Roswell (supposed home of sneaky, inconsiderate space aliens).

How to get there now: If you're chomping at the bit for weightlessness, check out the Zero Gravity Corporation, which offers "parabolic flights" during which you can feel weightless for 30-45 seconds.

# 3. Bangkok

The basics: Don't knock Bangkok. Yes, it's one of the most popular tourist destinations in the world. And yes, it's the most populous city in Thailand (and 21st worldwide, situated between Hong Kong and Lahore, Pakistan). But its popularity is easily justified: It's one of the most interesting, culturally diverse places on Earth, and, despite the crowds, it's still a fantastic place to get incredible wares - silver, gold, trinkets, silk very inexpensively. And because their democratically elected prime minister was ousted last month (with little incident) by a military coup, history is being made as we speak. Overall, Bangkok is dirty and crowded, and traffic is ridiculous, but you're likely to run into friendly, accepting locals eager to inexpensively cater to your interests, no matter how simple, lavish or strange they may be.

Random factoids: Because almost everyone speaks English in Bangkok, it's not difficult to navigate if you don't know Thai. Westerners are called *farangs* (pronounced "fa-langs") by locals. ("Farang" simply means "Westerner" or "white Westerner," regardless of nationality – American, Dutch, and British are all the same. Black Westerners are called "farang dam," which just means

"black Westerner.") "Farang" is not a negative racial epithet, but farangs tend to look like giant walking dollar signs to native Thai entrepreneurs, so you'll probably pay double for merchandise and services (which is still usually half of what you'd pay in the States).

How to get there now: Bangkok is accessible. Virtually any local travel agency can get you there by plane, normally with a layover in Taipei, Hong Kong or Tokyo.

# 4. Peruvian Amazon

(for a mind-expanding ayahuasca trip)


The basics: "All at once, I willed myself to rise," says Kira Salak in National Geographic Adventure, describing the effects of ayahuasca. "I sailed up through the tunnel of fire, higher and higher until I broke through to a white light. All darkness immediately vanished. My body felt light, at peace. I floated among a beautiful spread of colors and patterns. Slowly my ayahuasca vision faded. I returned to my body, to where













I lay in the hut, insects calling from the jungle." Shamans and psychedelic believers believe ingesting ayahuasca involves a psychological, life-altering movement beyond consciousness into richly emotional, often horrifying, introspective new quadrants of your own uncharted reality. Others believe it just gets you really, really messed up. Regardless, if you're willing to experiment with mind-altering substances in the Amazonian rain forest, you might consider an ayahuasca tour. And you'd do this, of course, at your own risk.

# Delightful De Anza

Your friendly neighborhood flea market is filled with funky finds.

here's nothing like spending a beautiful Saturday morning at the flea market when looking for decorator finds on the cheap. From an antique printer's tray to a handcrafted wire and crystal wreath, the De Anza Flea Market offers a great mix of old and new. We were thrilled with the abundance of affordable beads and jewelry, but what really struck us were the bargains in plants, decorating accents, garden accessories, and authentic fruit crate labels. Here are a few pointers when exploring the De Anza flea market:



# Green Thumbs Up

While many flea markets have plants, De Anza has one of the broadest selections of high-quality, low-cost foliage we've seen. On our visit, the choices included plumeria, Passion flower, bougainvillea, and angel's trumpet, all over four feet tall. We found an eight-foot tall Magnolia for only \$30. We couldn't resist the eyecatching garden statuary items, like a terra cotta wall fountain, a Buddha head, and a life-size iron bicycle. To bring a little greenery indoors, we were especially impressed with the variety of orchids - a steal at less than \$10 each. You can even get your own bonsai, featuring a delightful bridge and a miniature fisherman, for just \$22.

can't buy at the mall. For the kitchen, De Anza has terrific vintage items like chrome sugar, flour, and tea canisters from the 1960s, and milk-glass hobnail pitchers. For the dining room, there's enough mismatched china to set a table for a song. For the living room, architectural pieces such as two-foot tall finials for only \$24 each would be perfect flanking a fireplace. And large, trendy area rugs are a bargain at less than \$200.

Although we didn't see much in the way of large furniture at De Anza, we did run across some nice velvet Parsons chairs and several Chinese-style chests of drawers. And there were decorator touches galore. We especially liked the antique apothecary bottles for a bathroom windowsill and stacks of galvanized-wire egg baskets that would be just right for rolled-up towels. Largescale, funky finds, like a 36-inch wall clock, an ancient cash register, and a real wagon wheel, would make great conversation pieces, and are just the sort of thing that can only be found at the flea market.



Suitable for Framing

The find of the day was a huge selection of vintage fruit crate labels. These colorful graphics were used from the mid-1880s to the 1950s to identify wooden produce crates. They are generally around 10 inch by 14 inch – perfect for framing. And at less than \$5 each, they are a real deal. We'd love to see a framed grouping based on themes such as cowboys, birds, or airplanes, all of which were commonly used in designs. Don't miss the funny ones like "Up and Atom Carrots" and "No-Needa-Sugar Grapefruits."

# Know Before You Go

The De Anza Flea Market takes place on the first Saturday of every month in the northeast parking lots of De Anza College (at the corner of Stevens Creek Boulevard and Stelling Road). Vendors are ready to sell by 8am. Plan on visiting in the morning – vendors tend to start packing up to leave at 1:30 pm.

# HOME WORK

There is a \$5 parking garage adjacent to the flea market, making it easy to transport larger purchases to your car (like that massive cherub fountain!). There is no fee to get into the flea market itself. Very civilized indeed!





# **Hot Plate**

The local restaurant scene is changing. Make your reservations now.

t's autumn, and that seems to signal the winds of change in the restaurant world. A heaping plateful of renovations, openings, and menu changes is about to be served to the South Bay. There's a lot to keep track of, so hold on to your chef's hat.

First up, Michael Mina's Arcadia in the San Jose Marriott has ratcheted up the bliss level of its formerly comfort-food-focused menu. The new menu emphasizes American steakhouse fare such as dry-aged New York strip steak, Colorado lamb t-bones, Berkshire pork chops, and a Kobe burger. Thankfully, the famed duck-fat french fries remain unchanged.

Another famous local institution re-opened its doors on October 18: Restaurant O in Campbell. Downsized two years ago to a catering business due to circumstances in the personal life of chef/owner Justin Perez, the critically acclaimed French-influenced restaurant has returned bigger and better with a menu that changes monthly, and with twice the seating capacity. The fall menu features such unique pairings as elk chop with a savory blueberry chocolate reduction. And, yes, they still do catering.

Four-star La Folie proprietor Roland Passot's Santana Row venture, **Tanglewood**, has been snaring fans since its opening two months ago. Chef Quentin Topping's menu offers up regional-food-inspired delights such as cedar plank-roasted diver scallops with a "deconstructed" clam chowder as a sauce; or buttermilk fried quail with jicama, carrot, and cabbage slaw. The setting matches the menu's California bent, with tile floors, a 17-foot-long redwood communal table, and patio seating.

In Los Gatos, it was a Greek wedding as **Dio Deka** opened for dinner on October 23. The restaurant, run by former Evvia staff members, reflects the hotel's Mediterranean ambience with tea-colored walls, a fireplace, and an outdoor courtyard. The menu promises classic Hellenic delights such as roasted lamb, alongside updated California cuisine.

A name like iTapas may evoke visions of glossy small plates with click wheels, but owner Hung Le seems to have plugged into fusion cuisine with his brand new venture. Le, the mind behind the upscale Vietnamese Three Seasons restaurants, looks to the other side of the globe with dishes such as duck tacos with mango salsa, or lobster rolls with avocado and wasabi mayonnaise, and a raw bar. The full name of the bistro-esque eatery is iTapas & Wine Bar, and along with wine, they serve a full bar.

The Japanese comfort dish yakitori makes an upscale ascent with the opening of the sleek Sumika in Los Altos. The yakitori at Sumika is made from organic free-range chicken from a local farm, and it's grilled over traditional binchotan, a high-quality, virtually smokeless Japanese white charcoal.

Further up the coast, everyone's favorite teppanyaki chain, Benihana, is giving an "extreme makeover" to its Burlingame outpost. The new design will emphasize the restaurant's voyeuristic pleasures, with a raised waiting area overlooking the dining room and a banded window that peeks into the lounge. The dining room will be retooled to feature a translucent backdrop where the chefs prepare food. The restaurant plans to reopen after the new year.

And finally, in a rare twist of from-South-Bay-to-thecity, Amber India will be opening a restaurant next to the Four Seasons Hotel in San Francisco next May (13 Yerba Buena Lane). The three-level dining area will feature Amber's much-loved menu with some urbanized contemporary twists. And here we thought Amber was our little South Bay secret. Oh, well, to everything there is a season.

ndiamo's owner Marco Rondon likens his restaurant to Italian trattorias and Mexican taquerias. "They're the hole-in-the-wall places that sell real Italian and Mexican food," says the former dishwasher who worked his way up in the restaurant business. The Cuccina Italiana menu showcases a wide range of popular pastas, from seafood, vegetarian to poultry. A must-try is the much-loved Friday Special, Ciopinno — a sumptuous combination of prawns, clams, whitefish, crabmeat, baby clams, and mussels sautéed with tomatoes and green onions and topped off with marinara sauce. The Cocina Latina menu, on the other hand, features



an array of Mexican and Latin dishes, from tacos, enchiladas to steaks. The chile verde, chunks of lean pork mixed with a special green sauce, is an all-time favorite, while the Caribbean Steak, tender tips grilled and served with Spanish white rice, black beans, and sweet plantains, is equally popular. For dessert, grab a latte and slice of tiramisu from the café's espresso bar.

The types of cuisine offered may differ greatly, but Rondon is positive that customers enjoy Andiamo's fresh flavors and home-cooked goodness, as well as the friendly servers and restaurant's warmth and comfort. Accommodating chefs are also happy to customize dishes to diners' taste. "You are home," Rondon says, "so whatever [you want], you can have."

#### EVANESCENCE THE OPEN DOOR ★★★☆☆

RELEASE DATE: OCT. 3, 2006 RECORD LABEL: WIND-UP RECORDS

With their sophomore effort, Evanescence returns with 13 new songs that are great to hear when you're depressed, angry or just in a bad mood. This is what you might call a "Monday Record," or for times when you just want to throw something. The heavy guitar chords and powerful, yet sweet and resonant voice of lead singer Amy Lee somehow sound best when cranked. The radio favorite "Call When You're Sober" (about Lee's ex-boyfriend) and power ballad "Good Enough" are two standout tracks. However, The Open Door doesn't vary much from the formula of their debut record, Fallen (which brought us hits like "Bring Me To Life" and "My Immortal"), and after awhile, the songs all start to sound



the same. Perhaps we have to wait for their next release to see if there is any more complexity and depth to this obviously talented group. But chances are, if you liked the first CD, you'll like this one. Its No. 1 Billboard Album chart debut seems to suggests that sticking to a formula works... for now.

#### MAT KEARNEY NOTHING LEFT TO LOSE ★★★☆☆

RELEASE DATE: APRIL 18, 2006 RECORD LABEL: SONY

Do we really need another granola, monotone singer/songwriter constantly on the radio? Apparently so. Meet newcomer Mat Kearney, a 20something singer/songwriter with a genre-bending style. On his major label debut Nothing Left To Lose, Kearney gives a taste of several music flavors; it's like getting five different types of ice-cream blended and served in a swirl cone. He fuses pop, folk, alternative, hip-hop, and spoken word into 13 mid-tempo songs that are surprisingly listenable, despite the seemingly conflicting styles. Much of the album is autobiographical — about learning from the past and feeling confident about the future. The title cut is a sing-along, made-for-radio single, retelling the journey that brought him from Oregon to California, then to Nashville. More



adventurous are tracks "Undeniable" and "Girl America," in which Kearney adds spoken word, along with hiphop rhythms and stick-in-your-head choruses. Overall, this album is a refreshing change from the humdrum mellow singer/songwriters of today. Call it folk-pop with a groove.







Borat (Cohen) continues to visit the most suggestible backwards places in the country, acting like a foolish, naïve Kazak to make them admit their prejudices or get them frustrated. The film is strung together with a loose plot about Borat's obsession with Pamela Anderson, using some staged interludes to keep things moving. Even the fake parts are so in character, it works. And the Borat-on-the-street bits hold up to the strongest pieces of satire Cohen has ever performed on Da Ali G Show.

CATCH A FIRE ★★★☆ DIRECTED BY: PHILLIP NOYCE STARRING: DEREK LUKE, TIM ROBBINS, BONNIE HENNA

Derek Luke has finally realized that playing jocks won't win him an Oscar, so he's back to making "important" movies. In *Catch a Fire*, he plays Patrick Chamusso, an African man interrogated for suspicion of terrorism by Nic Vos (Robbins). It's such a horrible ordeal that he decides to become an actual terrorist. These are certainly significant themes with moral ambiguity, and the actors do topnotch jobs with flawless accents. But in the end, it just feels like the idea was, "Hotel Rwanda was a hit, so what other African atrocities can we exploit for more Oscar buzz?" It should still be told, but with more heart.

#### COME EARLY MORNING **★★☆☆**

DIRECTED BY: JOEY LAUREN ADAMS

STARRING: ASHLEY JUDD, JEFFREY DONOVAN, LAURA PREPON

This is the classic story of a small-town floozy who sleeps around so much she doesn't handle a genuine relationship so well. Her name is Lucy, but people call her Loose, and she doesn't get it. They probably don't either. It's a good acting vehicle for Judd to be depressed with no selfesteem, yet still lively and sexy, so you see why men are drawn to her. The slow pace of mundane small town activities makes the film feel distant for big city folks. The awesome supporting cast elevates their bit parts to fill in a believable community. Still, it's for fans of small-town rural relationship dramas only.

#### DEATH OF A PRESIDENT \*\*\*\*

DIRECTED BY: GABRIEL RANGE STARRING: HEND AYOUB, BRIAN BOLAND, BECKY ANN BAKER

If one is looking for a biting controversy about a presidential assassination, Death of a President will disappoint. It's really a dry, fake documentary about a fictional assassination of George W. Bush. The actors mimic ordinary people, but that only makes them nauseating to listen to. Even real documentaries cut around the stumbling "uhs" and "ums." It is an interesting concept that feels real with all the technical detail, but ultimately pointless because it's so boring. If they wanted to challenge ideas and politics, they should have made it engrossing, not procedural, and make the gunshot bloodier.



ast food corporations love to hate Eric Schlosser. The author of Fast Food Nation has followed the industry from feedlot to kill floor, hiring line to fry line. What he uncovered inspired a lot of people to permanently pass over Ronald McDonald at family outings – and Ronald's godparents were not amused.

Fast Food Nation's investigative material seemed ripe for a documentary, but Schlosser says he never really found the right team to work with. Instead, he ended up co-writing a script with Richard Linklater, director of films as diverse as The School of Rock and Waking Life. The resulting film weaves together the paths of illegal Mexican immigrants, cattle ranchers in Colorado, high school fast food workers, and marketers for a fast food chain called "Mickey's" in a story

that touches on just about every social theme flavoring American politics today.

I'd like to say Schlosser and I sat down over a hamburger for our chat, but, well, you know. Instead, I spoke with Schlosser, who was on a tour to publicize the new film, over the phone.

The Wave: When was the last time you ate a hamburger? Eric Schlosser: [Laughs] My diet is not pure. I eat all kinds of stuff, but I really try to stay away from the industrial food, the heavily processed food like chicken nuggets. I don't go to any of those big fast food chains, because I just don't want to give them any of my money.

# TW: Did you ever, while working on the book Fast Food Nation, envision it becoming a film?

ES: No. Not at all. Once the book was out in 2001, I met with a number of documentary filmmakers. I very much wanted it to be a documentary, and spent an enormous amount of time trying to set that up, but I didn't feel comfortable with any of the options being presented to me. This was before Michael Moore's *Bowling for Columbine* was such a big success, and I just didn't trust the people – even though some of them were very nice people – to be able to make a film for one of the networks that wouldn't be a sell-out.

# TW: How did you end up working with Richard Linklater, and what was the process of converting a piece of journalism into a fictionalized movie?

ES: The idea was brought to me by Jeremy Thomas, an incredible British producer - really, one of the last independent producers. He had been given the book by Malcolm McLaren who created the Sex Pistols. So this was an interesting group of people, but it wasn't until I met Rick Linklater on a book tour in Texas and talked to him about the idea [that] it became clear that the story could be told rooted in the lives of people. Rick and I had both read a novel that we loved called Winesburg, Ohio, which is the portrait of a town through the central characters. There's no central narrative, there's no protagonist, but it gives a very strong sense of place and of time - that we eventually found a way to do it. But I didn't sign over the rights to my book for quite a while after that; I really wanted to be sure that this was something Rick wanted to do, and that he would be totally empowered to make the movie he wanted to make, and that the money of the film would be raised outside the Hollywood system.

# TW: The film's climactic moment is when one of the illegal immigrants ends up working on the kill floor of the meat packing plant. Those scenes are pretty gruesome. How did you get permission to film in a place like that? I would imagine most American companies wouldn't be too welcoming.

ES: Well, fortunately, that wasn't part of my job description. I do know that the plant was in Mexico, and from what I was told, they were upset about how Mexican workers were being exploited in the United States, so they agreed to the movie. I eat meat, and I think anyone who eats meat should confront the reality of what they're doing. For almost all of human history it wasn't a mystery – if you ate meat, you were either there when it was killed, or hunted. It's only very, very recently that this is something kept out of view. I've been going around to schools for this children's book I wrote [Chew On This: Everything You Don't Want to Know About Fast Food], and it's amazing just how little kids know about where their food comes from.

TW: In the movie, Bruce Willis plays a "straight shooter" type who calls out Americans for being soft, being afraid of everything. This is a problem liberals confront all the time. How do you go about criticizing "the system" without looking nebbish? ES: Well, that's what I try to do in my own work. I try to just have a very calm, matter-of-fact writing style, and very heavily documented. Some of the things Bruce Willis says in the film, personally I agree with. People are incredibly fearful. I think that when we look at risk, we're often wrong about it. People shouldn't be afraid of Al-Qaeda; people should be afraid of getting in their car. I'm not saying Al-Qaeda is harmless, but I am saying since 9/11 - and I was in New York, I went down to the World Trade Center after the attack - since 9/11, over 200,000 people have died in their cars, but we're not afraid to get in our cars and drive. So hopefully the film is complex, and doesn't beat you over the head, but presents different points.



# **Dancing** Queen

Giselle keeps Ballet San Jose's Karen Gabay on her toes.

uring the Cleveland street musical that makes up the opening credits of The Drew Carey Show, one of the show's regulars takes hold of a petite woman in front of the ATM and tosses her out-of-frame in a balletic leap. The woman is Ballet San Jose (BSJ)'s Karen Gabay, and that was her primary entry in the pop-culture sweepstakes - until recently, when she appeared as a tango dancer in the movie *Rent*.

"The Rent shoot was an all-nighter," she says, "beginning at 4pm for makeup and hair, and going until six the next morning. Dancing full-out with feeling in skimpy dresses and high-heeled shoes was interesting in the cold hours of the night, but, all in all, a great experience."

Though her focus is definitely ballet, Gabay says she enjoys having the chance to flex her other muscles.

"I like to act, sing, and do those 'other' performing jobs," she says. "I love theatre, and actually got into a Broadway touring company a few years back, but had to choose between the ballet's schedule or a tour of six months."

Gabay's next assignment is the title role of Giselle - BSI artistic director Dennis Nahat's choreography of the 1841 romantic classic, with music by Adolphe Adam. The production is presented this year as one in a series of BSJ's most popular shows. Gabay first performed a full-length Giselle in 1993 with the company's previous incarnation, the Cleveland-San Jose Ballet.

Based on a dramatization by Theophile Gautier and Saint-Georges, Giselle's plot is remarkably

complex. Its fantastical second act centers on the "Wilis," figures of Slavic legend described in the poems of Heinrich Heine. Engaged maidens who died before their weddings, the Wilis were too restless to sleep peacefully in their graves, and wandered the highways at night, luring young men to dance with them - until the unlucky fellows die from exhaustion.

So what does a dancer do to convey such an intricate storyline?

"The story is the ballet," says Gabay. "Otherwise, it would all just be a bunch of steps. My greatest desire when dancing these dramatic roles is to have the audience feel the emotion that Giselle goes through, [and] yet be suspended by the fluidity and beauty of the art form. The movements enhance the role, but it is still the dancer's job to express the story through the movement and music. That is the greatest challenge, yet when it all works, it is the greatest satisfaction and compliment. As silly as it sounds, that is the joy that dancing brings to me." TW

# Schools vs. Tag


