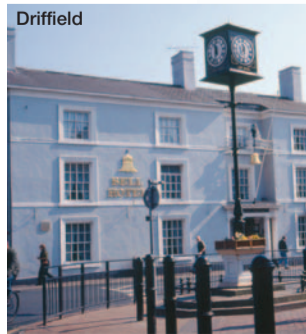

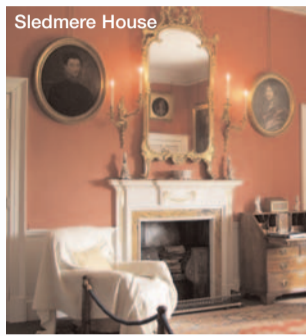

The National Cycle Network
Miles of signposted cycle

connecting towns and villages
throughout the UK. Some
routes pass through the East
Riding, shown in blue on the
map: -
NCN Route 1 - Humber Bridge
to Bridlington.
NCN Route 66 - Beverley to
Stamford Bridge (Part of the
North Sea Cycle Route,
Europe's longest signed bicycle
path, routing through seven
countries).
NCN Route 65 - Hornsea to
Selby.

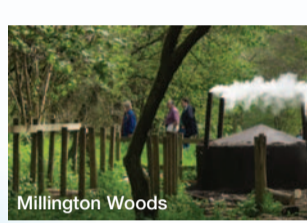
The National Byways

To enjoy the Yorkshire Wolds
Way you don't have to walk the
entire 79 miles; there are a
series of short circular walks
making use of some of the best
parts of the route without the
blisters! These include South
Cave Circular, Garrowby
Circular, Huggate Circular,
Londesborough Circuit and
Welton Walk, to name a few.

For the more energetic, there
are longer distance walks
including the Chalkland Way
and Minster Way, which pass
through the Wolds. To find out

Allerthorpe is a small pine
woodland planted on part of
the remnant northern heathland
which was widespread around
the city of York. Almost all the
surrounding heathland has
been lost to intensive agriculture.
The forest, which retains many
heathland elements, is now
being managed to protect,
enhance and restore these.

Ancient ash woodland home to

in the East Riding.

CHURCHES

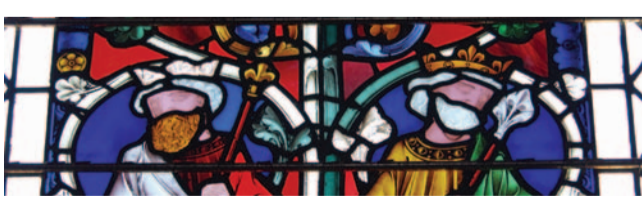
The Wolds churches hold treasures
of international importance,
from jewel-like stained glass by
world-class studios, soaring
spires enlivening the landscape,
to exploring connections with
thousands of years of human
endeavour. The following gives
a sample of the fascinating
churches you can visit.



St Andrew's, Boynton
From the outside a modest little
church but step inside to
discover an interior of great
lightness and beauty. Its most
photographed treasure is the
famous turkey lectern, which
was given to the parish in
memory of Major Fred
Strickland (d.1934) an engineer
who played a significant part
in the development of the
motor car engine. It was
however his ancestor William
Strickland 'The Navigator'
(d.1598) who as a young man
had sailed to America in
search of gold but had returned
with the first turkeys ever seen
in England.

St Michael and All Angels,
Garton-on-the-Wolds
The Domesday Book records
the presence of a church at
Garton as early as 1086 but it
was not until 1872 when a
most remarkable programme
of embellishment began.
Exquisite and elaborate wall
paintings, wall tiles and
stained glass depict scenes
from the Old and New
Testaments in most dramatic
displays that bombard the
senses. Trace the story
yourself from the creation of
the world to the last
judgement!

All Saints, Londesborough
This unassuming Norman
Church has links with some
of the richest and influential
families from the C15
onwards, each of which left
their mark. Of particular note
is Richard (d.1753), 3rd Earl
of Burlington, who helped
bring neo classical fashion to
the North. There are no grand
memorials to his family, just
brass plates originally on the
coffins buried in the crypt
below, which can be seen
in the side chapel.



The Sykes Churches Trail
leads you to some of the
most charming churches set
in the rolling landscape of
the Wolds. The trail offers
a circular route to eleven
churches, which were built
or restored by Sir Tatton
Sykes I and II of Sledmere.
Their patronage brought
together leading architects
and craftsmen of the day.
