leefully the children ran around, swiftly moving from jumping castle to jungle gym and trampoline. These children look like any other kids except that for them outings like this are few and far between.

The Mail & Guardian invited 63 children from Dorah's Ark to the Spur in Randpark Ridge where the kids ate, played and had their faces painted.

Started by Dorah Mazibuko, Dorah's Ark supports communities from informal settlements in Roodeport.

"The moment we met Dorah, we fell in love with her, and when we heard

"The whole year is frustrating for them, maybe at school they get shouted at for [not paying] school fees, for them to go out once in a while it says there are other people who care for us," says Mbali Mazibuko, Dorah's granddaughter.

"We were very happy," says Dorah who plays the role of grandmother, mother and counsellor. Many of the children are orphans, from single-parent homes or childheaded homes. A number of the



children who come to her are also HIV-positive Mazibuko says.

When asked what motivates Mazibuko, she responds: "When they come back and say thank you, and to know that I can help".


Earlier in the year, the *M&G* organised a Colgate dental hygienist to visit the children and teach them about oral hygiene with posters, banners and colouring books. The children also got toothbrushes and toothpaste.

The *M&G* will continue to host special educational days for the kids on various topics in 2007.

Plans for next year include growing Dorah's Ark into a self-sustainable organisation. To achieve this, the *M&G* will provide training in knitting, woodwork and growing vegetables, and in developing business skills.

The *M&G* team felt blessed by the time spent playing with the kids and were delighted at their enjoyment.
