Dr. Mohammed,

I am writing with a question concerning the Internet Journal of Toxicology.

You apparently published four articles by Alexander Tse-Yan Lee in Volume 2, No. 1 of the Internet Journal of Toxicology. All of the articles concerned supposed food tampering in China, such as artificial eggs or soy sauce made from human hair. The articles seem a bit suspicious, like possible hoaxes.

I noticed that the articles have since been deleted from the website for the Internet Journal of Toxicology. (They are still available from the archived website at Archive.org.) Could you please explain why these articles were deleted? For example, did you uncover evidence that these articles from Mr. Lee were unreliable?

I am curious, because people online are continuing to refer to these articles as "evidence" of food tampering in China. If there is a specific reason why you deleted these articles, it would be helpful to explain that to the public so that people know that the articles are possibly unreliable.
