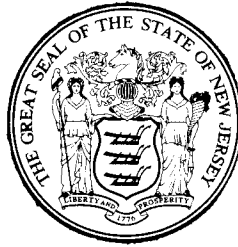

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LETTER OF TRANSMITTAL

To the Honorable Members of the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

Senate Concurrent Resolution 47 of 1970 established the Joint Legislative Committee on County and Municipal Government and directed it to study the effects of the 1970 Federal census on the counties and municipalities of New Jersey and to report its findings, conclusions, and recommendations to the Legislature.

In order to carry out its mandate, the Committee requested the Division of Legislative Information and Research to prepare a research memorandum, which memorandum was submitted by the Division to the Legislature on April 1, 1971, in the form of a preliminary draft. This memorandum subsequently served as the basis for the passage of legislation primarily amending certain statutes to prevent unwanted changes from occurring because of population increases.

This Final Report reflects all legislative activity to date stemming from the findings of the study as represented in the memorandum of April 1, 1971. In order to record a history of this activity, this Report contains essentially the same narrative as was contained in the memorandum. However, where the Legislature has taken action, this Report so indicates in italics.

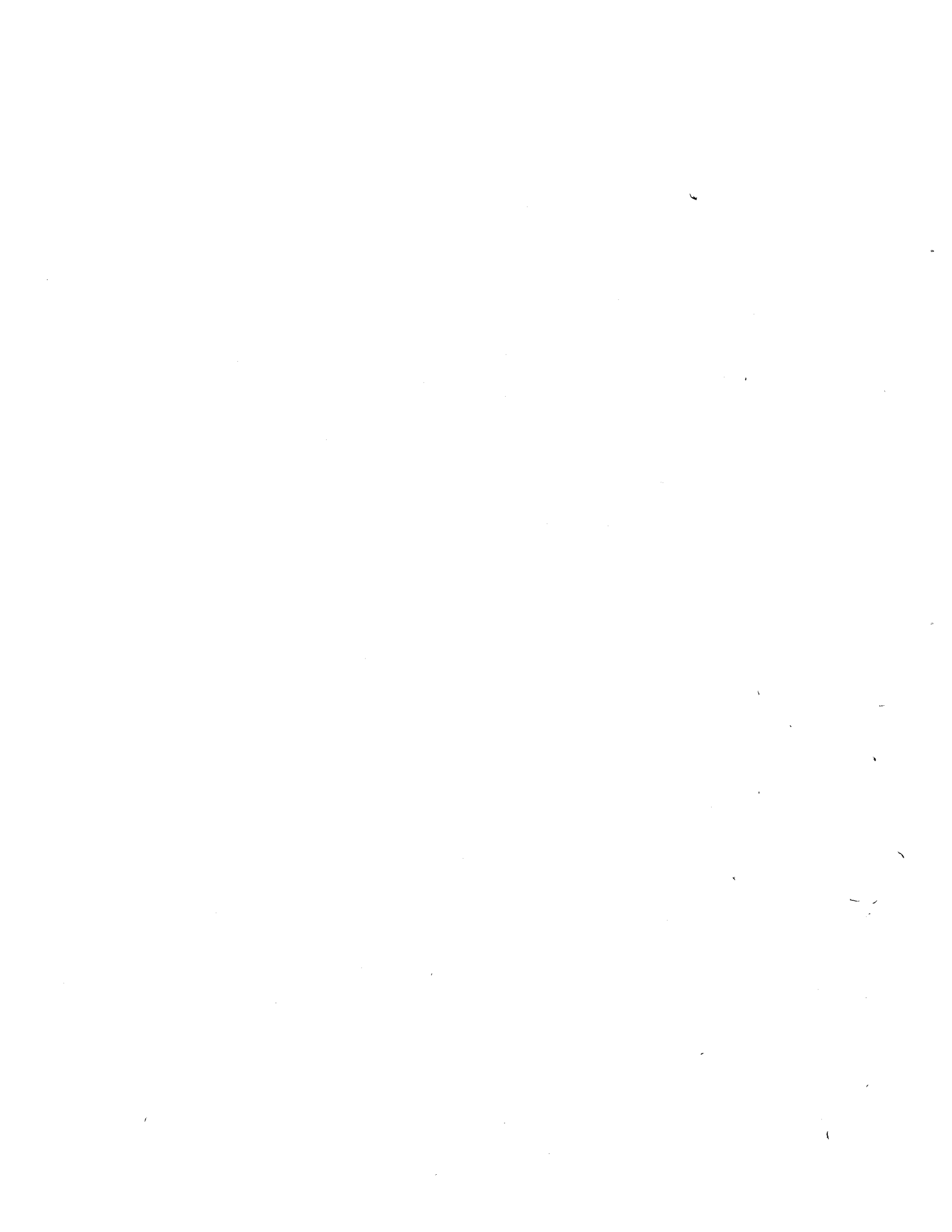
Of the utmost importance to persons interested in the statutes affecting municipalities are the three tables appended to this report. Table A lists every municipality by population in descending order from the most populous to the least. This provides easy identification of municipalities affected by statutes geared solely to population ranges or levels. Table B lists municipalities by descending population according to the five types of municipalities: city, town, village, borough, and township. It also indicates the form of government under which each municipality operates. Table C lists municipalities according to county. By using one or more of these three tables, each municipality can be cross-referenced according to population, type of municipality, form of government, and the county in which it is situated.

Taken in its entirety, this final report is based on a search of the New Jersey statutes. The intent was to identify those counties and municipalities which experienced changes as a result of population increases or decreases between 1960 and 1970.

It is important to point out that no effort is made to determine the degree to which the counties and municipalities took advantage of existing legislation prior to the promulgation of the 1970 Federal census. Rather, the primary concern of this report is

with what the various political subdivisions were authorized to do prior to the 1970 census promulgation and, more important, what they now are authorized to do. Because a county or municipality was or is authorized certain salaries, positions, or services, it may not follow that it has taken advantage of such authorization. It is observed, however, that in certain cases legislation is mandatory and therefore binding on the counties and municipalities which fall within its provisions as a result of population changes.

It should be noted that, pursuant to Chapter 14 of the Laws of 1971, the Federal census of 1970 was to become effective on May 1, 1971, (except for regional school board membership purposes) or on the date of the filing of the bulletin provided for in R.S. 52:4-1, whichever date was later. (The bulletin was filed February 22, 1971). Where changes occurred as a result of population changes, they therefore became effective on May 1, 1971. Where a county or city changed its classification, the results stemming therefrom took effect on July 1, 1971 (R.S. 40:17-3).



SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION No. 47

STATE OF NEW JERSEY

INTRODUCED MARCH 12, 1970

A CONCURRENT RESOLUTION requesting and directing the Senate and General Assembly Committees on County and Municipal Government to study the effects of the 1970 Federal decennial census on the counties and municipalities.

1 WHEREAS, The Federal census to be taken on April 1, 1970, will,
2 pursuant to R. S. 52:4-1, become effective in New Jersey upon
3 the Governor filing with the Secretary of State the bulletin issued
4 by the Director of the Bureau of the Census;

5 WHEREAS, The issuance of said bulletin is expected in late 1970 or
6 early 1971;

7 WHEREAS, The classification of the counties and cities of this State
8 and the applicability of various laws to the counties and mu-
9 nicipalities of this State are dependent upon their population as
10 enumerated in the latest Federal decennial census; and

11 WHEREAS, It is essential that the Legislature be informed of the
12 effects of the 1970 Federal census as soon as practicable so that
13 it may propose such changes, if any, in the laws of this State
14 as it deems necessary or desirable; now, therefore,

1 BE IT RESOLVED *by the Senate of the State of New Jersey (the*
2 *General Assembly concurring):*

1 1. The members of the Senate and General Assembly Com-
2 mittees on County and Municipal Government are constituted a
3 joint legislative committee to study the effects of the 1970 Federal
4 decennial census on the counties and municipalities of this State
5 and to report its findings, conclusions and recommendations to the
6 Legislature as soon as practicable after the taking of said census,
7 including in its report any legislative bills which it may desire to
8 recommend for adoption by the Legislature.

1 2. The committee shall be entitled to call to its assistance and
2 avail itself of the services and assistance of such officials and em-
3 ployees of the State and its political subdivisions and their de-
4 partments, boards, bureaus, commissions and agencies as it may
5 require and as may be available to it for said purpose and may
6 expend such funds as may be appropriated or otherwise made avail-
7 able to it for the purposes of its study.

1 3. The committee may meet and hold hearings at such places as
2 it shall designate during the recesses of the Legislature.

AN ACT concerning the Federal census of 1970 and supplementing

1 BE IT ENACTED *by the Senate and General Assembly of the State*
2 *of New Jersey:*

1 1. Except for the apportionment and election of the members of
2 boards of education of regional districts pursuant to P. L. 1970, c.
3 365 (C. 18A:13-9.1 et seq.), the Federal census of 1970 shall become
4 effective May 1, 1971, or on the date of the filing of the bulletin
5 provided for in R. S. 52:4-1, whichever date is later.

1 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

PART ONE

COUNTY GOVERNMENT

I. INTRODUCTION

Changes in salaries, positions, and authorized services with respect to county government are determined by county population and/or county classification. Where changes occur as a result of population changes, they are effectuated immediately after promulgation of the census. When a county changes its classification, the results stemming therefrom take effect on July first following the taking or promulgation of the census. R.S. 40:17-3. Counties are classified pursuant to R.S. 40:17-2 (see table on preceding page).

II. COUNTIES CHANGING CLASSIFICATION

According to the 1970 census, Sussex County with a population of 77,528, was the only county which changed classification, moving from fourth to third class county status. As a result, there no longer are fourth class counties in New Jersey. Since it appears extremely unlikely that any third class county will ever return to fourth class status, the Legislature might, for the purpose of clarity, consider repealing those statutes relating to fourth class counties.

In addition to the fact that Sussex County became a third class county, changes were also brought about with respect to other counties as a result of population shifts. Generally speaking, Bergen County was most apparent in this regard because its population exceeds the 800,000 level. The Counties of Camden, Morris, Burlington and Mercer also experienced numerous changes.

As explained in further detail below, important legislation has been enacted since 1960 which has revised or removed population and classification as a consideration with respect to certain county offices.

Prior to the enactment of the State Medical Examiner Act (C. 52:17B-78 et seq.) in 1967, first and second class counties

were authorized to create the Office of County Medical Examiner. County classification, however, is no longer a consideration. Except where counties combine to do so on a cooperative basis, all counties are required to have their own county medical examiners. Furthermore, the offices of county coroner and county physician have been abolished.

III. BOARDS OF CHOSEN FREEHOLDERS

Pursuant to the provisions of Chapter 62 of the Laws of 1966, large boards of chosen freeholders have been abolished and the counties of New Jersey are now governed only by small boards. R.S. 40:20-35.1 et seq.

Since Middlesex County had gone beyond the population range of 265,000 to 500,000, it had been required to increase its number of freeholders by two, for a total of nine. R.S. 40:20-20. To prevent this, however, Chapter 107 of the Laws of 1971 was enacted which froze the number of members in counties having a population between 550,000 and 600,000 (Middlesex) or between 310,000 and 375,000 (Burlington).

In the same manner, Morris and Burlington Counties moved into the 265,000 to 500,000 range and, therefore, were required to have their board membership increase from five to seven. R.S. 40:20-20. But as indicated above, Burlington elected not to have its board membership increased.

Ocean County gained two additional freeholders for a total of five, because its population now exceeds 200,000. R.S. 40:20-20.

Insofar as salaries are concerned, Sussex County has gone beyond the 75,000 population range and, therefore, had an increase in the salary range for freeholders from \$5,000-\$7,500 to \$6,000-\$9,000 and its freeholder-director from \$5,000-\$8,000 to \$6,000-\$9,500.

The manner in which the number of freeholders are authorized for each county is arbitrary in certain respects. Whereas Ocean County had a population in 1970 almost four times that of Cape May, both are required to have five freeholders. On the other hand, the Counties of Warren, Hunterdon, and Sussex have populations not much greater than Cape May, yet are required to have only three freeholders.

It is suggested that the Legislature may wish to consider revision of the relevant provisions of the statutes, with a view, perhaps, of authorizing the number of freeholders on a more consistent population basis.

IV. OFFICE OF COUNTY PROSECUTOR

A. Prosecutor and Assistants

Chapter 6 of the Laws of 1970 made substantial changes with respect to the county prosecutors. It requires the fulltime performance of their duties by prosecutors appointed after January 20, 1970 in first class counties and counties of the second and fifth classes having a population in excess of 265,000 under the 1960 federal census. While the 1970 census had no bearing, it is nevertheless pointed out that Chapter 6 of the Laws of 1970 affected Essex, Bergen, Hudson, Middlesex, Union, Passaic, Camden, Mercer, and Monmouth Counties.

Furthermore, Chapter 6 removed the foregoing counties from prior statutory restrictions with respect to salaries. Prosecutors of said counties now receive salaries equal to that of fulltime county court judges (\$37,000). First assistant prosecutors and assistant prosecutors receive 30% to 80% of the prosecutor's salary (\$11,00-\$29,000). Chapter 108, Laws of 1970.

With respect to other counties, the following changes occurred as a result of the 1970 census. N.J.S. 2A:158-10, 15, 16.

Morris and Burlington Counties moved into the 265,000 to 600,000 population range and the prosecutors' salaries, therefore, increased from \$11,000-\$18,000 to \$15,000-\$22,000. First assistant and other assistant prosecutors receive 60% to 90% and 50% to 80% of the prosecutor's salary, respectively, (\$9,000-\$19,800 and \$7,500-\$17,600). Both Counties may additionally increase their number of assistant prosecutors from two to five.

The Prosecutor of Sussex County also had an increase in salary range from \$7,500-\$14,000 to \$8,500-\$15,000, and the salary of his first assistant increased from \$4,500-\$13,050 to \$5,100-\$13,950. This is because Sussex entered the 75,000 to 100,000 population category.

Ocean County entered the 150,000 plus category for counties bordering on the Atlantic Ocean and, thus, is entitled to two assistant prosecutors, while it formerly had none.

Additional assistant prosecutors may be appointed by the prosecutor where there appears to be a reasonable necessity therefor, if approved by the assignment judge and board of freeholders of the county. N.J.S. 2A:158-15.

N.J.S. 2A:158-18.1 authorizes the position of legal assistance to the county prosecutor in first class counties with less than 800,000 inhabitants. Bergen County no longer comes under this provision.

Pursuant to R.S. 11:4-4, in counties over 300,000 in population there shall be no more than 12 unclassified agents, investigators, or special officers in the prosecutor's office. Morris, Burlington, and Mercer Counties are now under this provision. In counties between 160,000 and 300,000 population there shall be no more than six such unclassified positions. This now includes Somerset, Gloucester, and Ocean Counties. All other counties are entitled to two.

B. County Detectives and Investigators

Chapter 260 of the Laws of 1970 amended N.J.S. 2A:157-4 to increase from 12 to 24 the number of county detectives authorized in second class counties having a population in excess of 400,000. This now includes Camden County in addition to Middlesex, Union, and Passaic Counties which heretofore exceeded the required population level. Furthermore, because it no longer falls within the 425,000-450,000 population range, Middlesex County may assign two additional county detectives as lieutenants of county detectives, for a total of four, and two county detectives may be designated sergeants of county detectives.

Sussex County, as a third class county with a population over 75,000, is entitled to an increase of from two to nine county detectives. One detective can be appointed captain of county detectives at a minimum of \$7,000 annually and one lieutenant of county detectives at a minimum salary of \$6,000. N.J.S. 2A:157-5.

Chapter 259 of the Laws of 1970 amended N.J.S. 2A:157-12 to increase from 15 to 25 the number of investigators authorized in second class counties over 400,000 in population. These include Middlesex, Union, Passaic, and Camden Counties. As a third class county, Sussex is entitled to two investigators for an increase of one. Prior to the 1970 census neither Atlantic nor Ocean Counties fell within a population category to be authorized county investigators. Since the population of Ocean County now exceeds 175,000, Ocean is entitled to 12 investigators at minimum salaries of \$5,500. N.J.S. 2A:157-13, 15.

V. SURROGATE, COUNTY CLERK, SHERIFF, AND REGISTER OF DEEDS AND MORTGAGES

The salaries of surrogates, county clerks, sheriffs, and register of deeds and mortgages are controlled by R.S. 40:38-6.14 and are identical within each county. All such salaries were increased pursuant to Chapter 144 of the Laws of 1970.

Both Camden and Monmouth Counties now exceed the 400,000 population level and the salaries, therefore, increased additionally in range from \$10,000-\$15,000 to \$12,000-\$21,000. Similarly, Ocean County has more than 200,000 inhabitants and the salary range increased from \$7,500-\$12,000 to \$10,000-\$18,000.

The salary range in all counties with less than 200,000 inhabitants is \$5,000-\$15,000.

Pursuant to R.S. 40:39-2, however, only counties over 250,000 may elect by referendum to have registers of deeds and mortgages. Heretofore, the Counties of Camden, Essex, Hudson, Passaic, and Union have exercised this option. Due to the 1970 census, Burlington joined the Counties of Bergen, Middlesex, Morris, Mercer, and Monmouth which are allowed to have registers, but have not elected to do so.

Morris County is a second class county now in the population range of 325,000-400,000, and the salaries, therefore, of employees of the county clerk assigned as court clerks for the

service of the county courts are a minimum of \$3,000 with annual increments of \$100 up to \$3,500. R.S. 40:38-29.

VI. COURT SYSTEM

A. County, County District, and Juvenile and Domestic Relations Courts

Prior to the enactment of Chapter 105 of the Laws of 1970, an array of salary provisions applied to county court, county district court, and juvenile and domestic relations court judges. Chapter 105 of the Laws of 1970, however, eliminated population and/or classification as salary determinants and established uniformity with respect to these judicial salaries.

The decennial census notwithstanding, county court judges now receive \$37,000 annually, while county district court and juvenile and domestic relations court judges receive \$34,000. Furthermore, regardless of statutory provision, the forementioned judges serve on a fulltime basis. The only exception is the district court judge of Warren County who serves on a part-time basis and whose salary is \$9,000.

Those sections of the statutes, however, which authorize the number of judges in each county are in disarray and in need of thorough revision. It is extremely difficult to determine with absolute certainty the number of judges authorized in certain instances, and in some cases where positions are authorized they have not been filled.

In any event, according to the 1970 census, Camden County is entitled to two more county court judges for a total of six. Somerset and Gloucester Counties increased from three to four and two to four, respectively. Ocean County, which now has six, is only entitled to four, and Cape May County was authorized an increase from one to two. N.J.S. 2A:3-13, 13.1, 13.6.

With respect to the number of county district court judges, Passaic was authorized four, but now is authorized to have only two. Morris' authorization decreased from three to two, but no positions have been filled. Sussex is still authorized to have one, but also has none. N.J.S. 2A:6-3, 3.8, 3.11, 3.12. N.J.S. 2A:6-14.15.

Where juvenile and domestic relations judges are concerned, the only change was in Gloucester County, which was authorized one

judge, but because its population range exceeds 100,000 to 140,000, it no longer is entitled to such a judge. N.J.S. 2A:4-4.8.

B. Court Attendants and Constables

The salary provisions of the law regarding court attendants and constables are equally confusing and in need of revision. Furthermore, the terms "constable" and "court attendant" are often used interchangeably.

It is clear that the salaries of court attendants attending the law division of the superior court, the county court, and the criminal district court in counties between 175,000 and 600,000. according to the 1940 census are controlled by N.J.S. 2A:11-36. But for counties which had less than 175,000 population according to the 1940 census and now have more, it is difficult to determine which provisions apply.

Aside from the statutes which deal with first class counties, counties between 100,000 and 140,000 population (there are none), and those mentioned above, the remaining statutes deal in an overlapping fashion with counties ranging from 150,000 to 300,000 inhabitants. N.J.S. 2A:11-40, 41, 42, 43.

Since Morris, Mercer and Burlington Counties exceed the 300,000 population level, it appears there no longer are salary provisions pertaining to their constables and court attendants. Although no salary provision applied to Somerset County according to the 1960 census, it has joined Gloucester County in the 150,000 to 200,000 range and, therefore, the salaries in these counties shall, upon resolution of the freeholders, be \$1,200 for the first year, with \$100 annual increments up to \$1,800. N.J.S. 2A:11-42. But since Ocean County now exceeds 200,000 in population, it no longer falls under N.J.S. 2A:11-42, but rather, it would appear, under N.J.S. 2A:11-40, N.J.S. 2A:11-41, or N.J.S. 2A:11-43 which specify salaries of \$1,092, \$900-\$1,200 and \$720, respectively.

Because Bergen County is now a first class county over 800,000 in population, constables' salaries are to be set by the board of freeholders, N.J.S. 2A:11-33. Previously, a range of \$4,500-\$6,000 was prescribed. N.J.S. 2A:11-34. Chapter 190 of the

Laws of 1970 amended N.J.S. 2A:11-34 and also mandated that the freeholders set such salaries in first class counties under 700,000 in population. This affects Hudson County.

Under N.J.S. 2A:11-36, the sheriff in counties with a population between 300,000 and 600,000 has the authority to appoint, with the consent of the freeholders, two permanent court attendants as supervisors of court attendants. This now includes Morris, Burlington, and Mercer Counties.

Counties under 150,000 in population are entitled to 10 constables to attend sessions of the Superior Court. Counties over 150,000 are entitled to at least 15 constables, with one additional constable authorized for every additional 20,000 in population. N.J.S. 2A:11-46. The changes which have occurred are as follows:

C. Grand Jury

Burlington County is now authorized to have a second grand jury because its population exceeds 250,000. N.J.S. 2A:71-6. For the same population factor, the maximum salary of its clerk to the grand jury shall be \$5,500. N.J.S. 2A:73-6.

Since Sussex has become a third class county, the judge of the superior court may designate one or more regularly employed stenographers to act as an assistant to the clerk of the grand jury. N.J.S. 2A:73-7.

The annual compensation of a jury commissioner in third class counties over 190,000 population is \$900. Such compensation increased from \$500 to \$900 in Somerset County. N.J.S. 2A:68-7.

D. Interpreters

Bergen County is no longer covered by N.J.S. 2A:11-28 and N.J.S. 2A:11-29 which are concerned with the appointment and compensation of court interpreters of certain foreign languages in first class counties under 800,000 population. For the same population reason, there is no longer a maximum salary prescribed for interpreters of the Greek language in Bergen County. N.J.S.2A:11-30.

In Mercer, Burlington and Morris Counties, however, the maximum salary for interpreters of the Greek language is set at \$1,800. N.J.S.2A:11-30.

E. Sergeant-At-Arms and Criers

Gloucester, Ocean, and Somerset Counties exceed 150,000 in population, thus, the judge of the county court may appoint a sergeant-at-arms at an annual salary of \$960. N.J.S. 2A:11-27.

Bergen County is no longer covered by N.J.S. 2A:11-23, which authorizes the county court judge in first class counties under 800,000 in population to appoint a sergeant-at-arms, and N.J.S. 2A:11-21 which authorizes the assignment judge of first class counties under 800,000 in population to appoint a sergeant-at-arms and crier of the law division of the superior court in the county.

For the same population reason, Bergen County is no longer covered by N.J.S. 2A:11-24, which authorizes county court judges to appoint a crier for the county court. Additionally, the board of chosen freeholders, instead of the county court judge of Bergen, is now authorized to make appointments to the board of trustees of the county youth house.

VII. EDUCATION

Since Morris, Burlington and Mercer Counties exceed the 300,000 population level, their boards of freeholders are empowered

to lend financial support to accredited nonprofit junior colleges within the counties. R.S. 40:23-8.2A.

Camden and Passaic Counties exceed the population range of 375,000 to 425,000 and, therefore, no longer fall within the provisions of N.J.S. 18A:54-29.3 which specifies an apportionment formula for raising funds for the county vocational school district.

In third and fifth class counties having populations in excess of 160,000 the four appointive members of the county vocational school board must be appointed by the director of the board of freeholders. N.J.S. 18A:54-16. Somerset, Gloucester and Ocean Counties have come into this category.

VIII. INSTITUTIONS

Because its population exceeds 800,000, Bergen is the County most affected with respect to statutes regarding institutions. The following now apply to Bergen County.

R.S. 44:5-17 authorizes the board of freeholders to make appropriations for the support of resident indigent patients in hospitals having 50 or more beds of which 20 are open to the public at all times. A maximum of \$5,000 is set for each such hospital. R.S. 44:5-18.

R.S. 44:7-36 authorizes the board of freeholders to contribute to the maintenance of needy persons over the age of 65 in a municipal welfare home, if the county has no welfare home.

R.S. 9:13-7 permits the board of freeholders to expend up to \$100,000 annually to help support crippled children and children afflicted with cerebral palsy, provided the county has no county home or hospital for such children.

If the county has a hospital for communicable diseases, R.S. 30:9-44.3 authorizes the board of freeholders to use all or part of the hospital for any public use whatsoever or to transfer the title, or any right therein, to any county board, body or commission of the county for public use.

Bergen County no longer comes within the provisions of R.S. 44:5-16 which authorizes counties with less than 800,000

inhabitants to make appropriations for a charitable hospital or hospitals which treat poor or indigent residents of the county.

Certain other counties were also affected as a result of population changes. Since their populations exceed 400,000, both Camden and Monmouth Counties may erect and maintain a county hospital or hospitals for sick, disabled, or aged persons, for the mentally ill, and for persons suffering from communicable diseases, including tuberculosis. R.S. 30:9-12.1.

Morris, Burlington, and Mercer Counties, because they exceed 300,000 in population, may appropriate a maximum of \$1,000,000 to maintain patients in charitable hospitals. R.S. 44:5-11.

Gloucester County is no longer within the 130,000 to 140,000 population range, thus, does not come under R.S. 40:23-8.12 which authorizes the County freeholders to appropriate a maximum of \$12,000 to help support occupational centers for mentally and physically retarded and disabled persons.

Now that Sussex is a third class county it no longer falls within the scope of R.S. 44:5-19 which authorizes the board of freeholders to expend up to \$10,000 to support charity patients, provided the county has no hospital of its own for such patients.

IX. BOARDS OF ELECTION AND ELECTION LAW

The salary range for members of the boards of election in Somerset and Gloucester Counties increased to \$2,700-\$3,400 since these Counties have entered the 150,000-200,000 population category, while the range in Ocean County increased to \$3,600-\$4,500 because the population exceeds 200,000.

In Cumberland County the range increased from \$1,000-\$2,400 to \$2,000-\$2,800 because Cumberland's population is between 115,000 and 150,000. Since their populations are between 55,000 and 115,000, the range in Hunterdon, Sussex, and Cape May increased to \$1,800-\$2,400. R.S. 19:45-7.

R.S. 19:52-2.1 provides that in counties having a population over 400,000, wherein voting machines are used, the county board of elections shall furnish a sufficient number of voting authorities for use in each election district at any election. Camden and Monmouth may enter this category.

Pursuant to R.S. 19:4-5, election districts in counties having less than 60,000 inhabitants may contain 700 voters, while all other counties must have 600 voters per district (not including eligible voters in homes or institutions). Hunterdon and Salem Counties must now have 600 voters per district.

Due to its increase in population in excess of 800,000, the following election law provisions now affect Bergen County.

R.S. 19:6-17. The board of elections may appoint six additional office employees in the office of clerk to the board, an increase of two.

R.S. 19:31-2. The commissioner of registration has the power to appoint on a permanent, or temporary basis, such number of persons he deems necessary to carry out the provisions of Title 19. They shall be in the classified service if they serve more than six months in any one year.

R.S. 19:32-2. When the Superintendent of Elections appoints a chief deputy, chief clerk, or secretary, or other personnel authorized under R.S. 19:4-6, they shall be in the classified service if they serve a term of six months or more in any one year.

The Counties of Morris, Burlington, Mercer, Somerset, and Gloucester are now controlled by the following provisions, and the Counties of Passaic, Camden, and Monmouth are no longer controlled thereby.

R.S. 19:23-22.1. Each municipal clerk shall, on or before the sixth day following the last day for filing petitions for a primary election, certify to the county clerk the names and addresses of candidates for nomination for public and party office, together with their political party, the slogan and designation, and the order in which their names were drawn in accordance with the provisions of Title 19.

R.S. 19:23-22.4. The county clerk shall provide a sufficient number of official primary ballots and sample ballots of each political party.

R.S. 19:23-22.5. The county shall assume the cost of printing official primary and election sample ballots and be reimbursed proportionately by the municipalities.

X. BOARDS OF TAXATION

The salaries of members of the county boards of taxation are governed by R.S. 54:3-6. Because the population of Middlesex County exceeds 500,000, the salaries have increased from \$6,250 to \$8,125. In Morris, Burlington, and Mercer Counties there was an increase from \$5,625 to \$6,250, since these counties have between 275,000 and 500,000 inhabitants. Ocean County is now between 200,000 and 275,000 in population, thus the salary has increased from \$5,000 to \$5,625. Gloucester and Somerset Counties are between 150,000 and 200,000 in population and the salary, therefore, has increased from \$4,375 to \$5,000. The population of Sussex County is between 95,000 and 150,000, and the salary, therefore, has increased from \$3,750 to \$4,375. Finally, Cape May County exceeds 50,000 and the salary is now \$5,000, up from \$3,750.

Pursuant to R.S. 54:3-30, the board of freeholders of Middlesex County may now provide permanent offices for that county's board of taxation.

Bergen County's status as a first class county with more than 800,000 inhabitants brings it within the purview of R.S. 54:4-5 which deals with the remittance of taxes to taxing districts in certain cases.

For the purposes of investigations and reassessments, the commissioner of taxation may disburse a sum not to exceed \$5,000 in Sussex County, an increase of \$2,000 since Sussex is now a third class county. R.S. 54:1-29.

XI. COUNTY EMPLOYEES

Once again, because the population of Bergen County exceeds 800,000 a number of statutes may now apply with respect to certain county employees. Included are the following.

R.S. 43:10-18.26 pertains to the retirement for age and service of certain court attendants in the sheriff's office and certain employees of the county prison and penitentiary. R.S. 43:9A-1 et seq. covers retirement and disability retirement for clerks or deputy clerks of a county district court or their widows.

R.S. 30:8-13.2 prescribes that the salaries of certain penal officers be fixed by the board of freeholders. R.S. 30:8-15.1 authorizes the granting of tenure to wardens of a county penitentiary or jail who has been reappointed after serving a full three year term.

With regard to other counties, Burlington is a second class county in the population range specified in R.S. 40:11-14 wherein it is provided that the civil service commission shall set salaries for officers, clerks, and employees in the classified service.

If Mercer County has a county road supervisor who has served for at least six years in such capacity prior to January 1, 1951, he may be granted tenure. R.S. 27:14-24.1.

Under R.S. 30:8-24.1a and R.S. 30:8-24.1b, the salaries of jailkeepers in Middlesex County may be increased by resolution of the board of freeholders and shall not be less, and may be more, than salaries paid to court attendants attending the county court.

XII. LEGISLATION REGARDING CERTAIN SERVICES

As a result of population changes, certain counties now fall within categories which authorize them to implement legislation dealing essentially with certain services.

Under R.S. 40:36-4, in any county over 350,000 in population the board of freeholders may establish a county water supply commission. Monmouth and Morris Counties meet the required population level.

Pursuant to R.S. 40:37a-90, only those county improvement authorities in second class counties with a population between 265,000 and 350,000 and fifth class counties between 150,000 and 300,000 inhabitants shall exercise the powers of a common carrier. This now includes Burlington and Ocean Counties.

In any county of more than 150,000 inhabitants the board of freeholders may establish a county sewer survey commission to consider the advisability of multi-municipal sewage disposal systems. Gloucester, Somerset, and Ocean Counties meet the necessary population standard. R.S. 58:13-1.

For the same population reason, the boards of freeholders of Gloucester, Somerset, and Ocean Counties may, under R.S. 40:37-19, elect a five-member county park commission.

In counties over 500,000 in population, when the provisions of R.S. 40:37-96 to R.S. 40:37-174 are or shall be operative (county parks act), the board of freeholders, at the request of the board of park commissioners, may borrow money for park purposes by issuing bonds to a sum not exceeding \$500,000 over or above that authorized by law. Middlesex County is in this category. R.S. 40:37-130.1.

The provisions of R.S. 40:37-195 to R.S. 40:37-247 (county parks act) shall apply to counties between 175,000 and 200,000 inhabitants, if approved by the voters. If such be the case, the board of freeholders shall appoint a seven-member county park commission. R.S. 40:37-196. Atlantic and Somerset Counties are in this population range.

XIII. MISCELLANEOUS

If Sussex County has a detention school or detention house, since it is a third class county, the board of freeholders may appoint a superintendent therefor. R.S. 9:10-4.

For the same reason, if Sussex is not operating under Civil Service law and decides to do so, the petition presented to the clerk of the governing body, must be signed by at least 500 voters instead of 250 for fourth class counties. R.S. 11:20-2.

In counties of the second class having a population between 325,000 and 400,000, county judges make appointments to the county mosquito extermination commission. Camden County no longer falls within the purview of this provision, but Burlington and Morris Counties do. R.S. 26:9-13.2.

As a third class county, Sussex may now construct curbing along highways and other roads subject to the jurisdiction of the

board of freeholders, and the board may enter into agreements with municipalities to share the cost of construction and maintenance. R.S. 27:16-22.

If the board of freeholders in first class counties over 800,000 in population acquires any road, highway, or parkway from the county park commission, the board has authority to restrict its use to passenger vehicles and to make regulations necessary and proper therefor. R.S. 27:16-31.1. Bergen County is in this category.

R.S. 40:19A-1 specifies what county offices may not be located outside of the county seat in third class counties. This now covers Sussex County.

Because Passaic and Camden Counties are now second class counties with populations between 425,000 and 500,000, their boards of freeholders may create the office of county comptroller. R.S. 40:21-19.1.

As a third class county, Sussex no longer is included under R.S. 40:21-32 which deals with the designation of morgues by county court judges.

Any superintendent of child welfare who has been connected for at least 15 years with the department in a county of 350,000 to 600,000 inhabitants is entitled to tenure. Morris and Monmouth Counties have entered this category. R.S. 40:21-47.1.

Since Camden and Monmouth Counties have in excess of 400,000 inhabitants, they no longer are required to pay any municipal fee to secure a building permit for the erection or alteration of any county building. R.S. 40:23-6.20.

Middlesex County, because its population is in excess of 500,000, may contract with municipalities to provide said municipalities with services or facilities. R.S. 40:23-6.26.

Bergen County, since it has more than 800,000 inhabitants, may establish and maintain centers for the rehabilitation of youthful offenders. R.S. 40:23-6.30.

As a third class county, if Sussex owns and operates a stone quarry, it must provide crushed stone to municipalities upon request for maintenance of municipal park roads and highways. R.S. 40:23-28.

Because of its classification change, Sussex also may issue bonds to acquire land for airport purposes. R.S. 40:28-4.

Camden and Monmouth Counties now exceed, and Ocean County is now within, the population range which, pursuant to R.S. 40:29-7, permits the expenditure of funds for controlling the flow of water in all brooks and streams located in the County.

Stewards of almshouses in third class counties are appointed by the board of freeholders. This includes Sussex County. R.S. 44:2-9.

Also because of the classification change, any nonprofit, private water company in Sussex County organized pursuant to Title 15 of the Revised Statutes may charge an unincorporated community a membership fee not to exceed \$500. R.S. 48:19-13.1.

MUNICIPAL GOVERNMENT

I. INTRODUCTION

The following analysis of the effect of the 1970 Federal census on municipalities is treated in two sections. The first section deals with an extremely complex and often ambiguous array of salary provisions. The second part covers other areas of municipal law which affect certain municipalities generally and because of type of municipality and/or form of government.

An attempt has been made to make the effect of the census as clear as possible by directing attention primarily to those municipalities which experience a statutory impact as a result of population changes. That is, if a municipality of a particular population, type, or form of government is not affected by the census in reference to a particular statute, such municipality will not appear in the narrative of this report.

Appended to Part Two of the report are three reference tables. The first lists every municipality by population in descending order from the most populous to the least. This provides easy identification of municipalities which are affected by statutes geared solely to population ranges or levels. The second table lists every municipality by descending population according to the five types of municipalities: city, town, village, borough, and township. Additionally, the table indicates the form of government under which each municipality is operating. The third lists municipalities by county. By using all three tables, each municipality can be cross referenced according to population, type of municipality, and form of government.

II. SALARIES OF MAYOR AND GOVERNING BODY

A. Municipalities Generally

On June 9, 1971 the Governor signed Senate Bill No. 641 (Chapter 200 of the Laws of 1971), a provision of which (N.J.S. 40A: 9-165) mandates that a governing body of a municipality shall fix

and determine the salaries of the mayor and members of the governing body. This provision is general law and, therefore, is not controlling where other statutes set forth procedures for compensating the mayor and members of the governing body of certain municipalities. Chapter 200 of the Laws of 1971 also repeals R.S. 40:46-23 and R.S. 40:46-26 which, likewise, were general law, except that specific salaries were fixed for municipalities in second class counties with less than 230,000 inhabitants and fifth class counties with a population over 80,000. Additionally, Senate Bill No. 2218 (Chapter 202 of the Laws of 1971) which was signed into law on June 9, 1971 repeals R.S. 40:87-60 which was a complicated procedure for fixing the salaries of mayors and councilmen in boroughs. Under R.S. 40:46-26 and prior to the passage of Senate Bill No. 641, if the population of a municipality exceeded 20,000, the mayor's salary was fixed by ordinance of the governing body. As a result of the 1970 census, the following were added to this list:

To the general rule, however, there were and still are exceptions. Many of these exceptions were not affected by the 1970 census and, therefore, are not mentioned herein.

B. Exceptions Affected by the Census

1. Municipalities in Second Class Counties with a population less than 230,000--Burlington County leaves this category.

R.S. 40:46-26 (now repealed) provided, in part, that in municipalities in second class counties with less than 230,000 inhabitants where the legal voters had not fixed the salary of the mayor and governing body, the governing body could have done so by ordinance, but such salaries could not exceed \$1,000 per year in municipalities having a population less than 12,000 or \$2,500 per year in municipalities having a population more than 12,000.

As a result of the 1970 census, the population of Burlington County exceeds 230,000, and, therefore, the salaries of mayors and the governing body in municipalities of Burlington County heretofore governed by R.S. 40:46-26 are now controlled by other statutory provisions.

In townships in Burlington County with less than 9,000 inhabitants the salaries of committeemen continue to be governed by township law. R.S. 40:146-14. These include:

In townships in Burlington County with populations between 9,000 and 14,000 each committeeman receives \$1,000 per year or the township committee may, by ordinance, fix salaries in excess of \$1,000, but not in excess of \$4,000. R.S. 40:146-15. These include:

In townships in Burlington County with populations over 14,000 the township committee may fix the salaries of the members of the township committee, but such salaries shall not exceed \$4,500. R.S. 40:146-16. These include:

Medford Lakes Borough in Burlington County is governed by the 1923 municipal manager form of government law, thus members of the council have a salary range of \$150 to \$750. R.S. 40:81-2.

As a result of the 1970 census, however, the salaries in all other boroughs in Burlington County are now set by R.S. 40:88-3.1 which governs boroughs in second class counties with a population over 265,000. The maximum allowable annual salaries in each borough are as follows:

Since the population of Burlington City has gone under 12,000, it no longer is a second class city, but general law still applies with respect to salaries. Beverly City salaries are likewise governed by general law.

Bordentown City is operating under the 1911 Commission form of government and there are no changes with respect to salaries under R.S. 40:72-21.

2. Boroughs--(Other than in Burlington City)

Unless boroughs are governed by certain forms of government acts which set salaries for mayors and governing bodies, the

principal controlling statutes are borough law, R.S. 40:87-60 (repealed), or R.S. 40:88-3.1.

R.S. 40:87-60 specified maximum salaries for boroughs in counties of the first class having less than 800,000 inhabitants, boroughs in second class counties having less than 265,000 inhabitants (there are none) and boroughs in third class counties. Salaries in boroughs in fourth (there are none), fifth, and sixth class counties had to be fixed by ordinance as in the case of other salaries. Boroughs in fifth class counties were included under R.S. 40:87-60 pursuant to chapter 173 of the Laws of 1970.

Even prior to the passage of chapter 202 of the Laws of 1971, because Bergen County's population exceeds 800,000, boroughs in Bergen were no longer covered by R.S. 40:87-60. It would appear that, except for Lodi Borough which is governed by the 1923 Council Manager form, the salaries in all other boroughs of Bergen had become governed by general law.

As a result of chapter 173 of the Laws of 1970, salaries in boroughs in Atlantic, Monmouth, and Ocean Counties had to be fixed by ordinance as in the case of other salaries, if they had not already been set. These boroughs included:

On the other hand, because Sussex changed from a fourth to a third class county, salaries in boroughs in Sussex County which had been fixed by ordinance prior to the 1970 census, as in the case of other salaries, could after the 1970 census, be fixed by ordinance at an annual salary or at a rate not in excess of \$15.00 per diem for the mayor and \$10.00 per diem for each councilman, but, in either case not to exceed \$1,500 per year for the mayor and \$1,000 per year for each councilman. Now there are no longer minimum or maximums as a result of the repeal of R.S. 40:87-60 and the passage of N.J.S. 40A:9-165. These boroughs thus included:

Like Burlington County, Morris County is also a second class county with a population over 265,000 and, therefore, its boroughs are no longer within the provisions of R.S. 40:87-60 permitting borough salaries to be fixed by ordinance at an annual salary or a per diem rate not over \$15.00 for the mayor and \$10.00 for each councilman, but, in either case, not to exceed \$1,500 per year for the mayor and \$1,000 per year for each councilman. Rather, the boroughs of Morris County are controlled by the schedule set forth in R.S. 40:88-3.1. These boroughs and the maximum allowable salaries are:

3. Commission Form of Government

While there are exceptions which are affected by the census, the maximum allowable salaries of the mayor and commissioners under the commission form of government are set forth principally in R.S. 40:72-21 according to population categories. Changes resulting from population increases are as follows:

a. Boroughs Between 1,050 and 1,350 Population

R.S. 40:72-24.13 provides that in boroughs governed by the commission form of government and having populations between 1,050 and 1,350 the board of commissioners may fix by ordinance the annual salary of the mayor at \$3,500 and commission members at \$3,000.

Under the 1960 census, Avalon Borough (Cape May) had a population of 695 and was governed by R.S. 40:72-21 with the maximum annual salaries set at \$750 for the mayor and \$500 for the commissioners. Its population is now 1,283, thus it would appear that under R.S. 40:72-24.10 the mayor's maximum permissible salary is increased to \$3,500 and the salaries of commissioners to \$3,000.

On the other hand, Beach Haven Borough (Ocean), which was under R.S. 40:72-24.10 with a population of 1,041, now has a population of 1,488 and apparently falls under the provisions of R.S. 40:72-21. If this be the case, the maximum salary for the mayor is decreased from \$3,500 to \$1,000 and for the commissioners from \$3,000 to \$750.

R.S. 40:72-25 addresses itself to the above situation, but does not appear definitive. On the one hand, it states that a population change shall, upon promulgation of the census, require a municipality to pay a greater or lesser salary, as the case may be. On the other hand, in the same sentence, it states that the board of commissioners may pass ordinances increasing or decreasing the annual salaries of the mayor and commissioners to conform to the newly promulgated census.

b. Fourth Class Cities Governed by the Commission Form

Under R.S. 40:72-24.1 as amended by Chapter 21 of the Laws of 1971, the maximum salaries for the mayor and commissioners is \$6,000 and \$5,000, respectively, in fourth class cities between 2,500 and 7,500 population. These now include Wildwood City (Cape May) and Brigantine City (Atlantic). The same amendment sets the maximum at \$8,000 and \$7,000 for the mayor and commissioners, respectively, in fourth class cities between 7,500 and 10,000 population. Margate City (Atlantic), Ventnor City (Atlantic), and Ocean City (Cape May) now exceed the 10,000 population level and, apparently the salaries in these three cities are now governed by the fourth class commission form city schedule in R.S. 40:72-22. If this be the case, the maximum allowable salaries in Margate, Ventnor, and Ocean Cities decrease to \$2,500 for the mayor and \$2,000 for the commissioners. Note, however, that R.S. 40:72-24.1 allows for increases according to the schedule in R.S. 40:72-21 (commission form generally) or the schedule in R.S. 40:72-22 (fourth-class commission form), but does not mention decreases. Even though the decrease in salaries in Margate, Ventnor, and Ocean Cities (notwithstanding population increases) would be less under R.S. 40:72-21 (salaries of \$3,500 for the mayor and \$3,000 for commissioners), it is assumed that R.S. 40:72-22 (fourth class cities) is the controlling statute.

Atlantic City (Atlantic) experiences a similar, but more drastic change. Under R.S. 40:72-24.1a, in fourth class cities over 50,000 population and governed by the commission form the maximum allowable salary is \$15,000 for the mayor and \$12,500 for the commissioners. Since the population of Atlantic City is now under 50,000, it would appear that the salaries are governed by R.S. 40:72-22. If this be the case, the mayor's salary would decrease to \$4,800 and the commissioners' salaries to \$3,500.

c. Municipalities Between 500 and 1,000 Population (except fourth class commission form cities).

R.S. 40:72-24.2 specifies maximum allowable salaries of \$2,000 and \$1,750 for the mayor and commissioners, respectively, in commission form municipalities between 500 and 1,000 population, except fourth class cities. According to the 1960 census, Allenhurst Boro. (Monmouth) was under this provision. But it now has a population

of 1,012, thus it would appear that R.S. 40:72-21 (see above) controls. If this be the case, the maximum allowable salary for the mayor is \$1,000 and for the commissioners, \$750. Like R.S. 40:72-24.1 cited above with reference to Margate, Ventnor, and Ocean Cities, R.S. 40:72-24.2 allows for increases pursuant to R.S. 40:72-21, but makes no mention of effecting decreases.

4. Township Committee (Other than in Burlington County)

a. Townships between 9,000 and 14,000 Population

R.S. 40:146-15 provides that committeemen in townships with populations between 9,000 and 14,000 shall receive annual salaries of \$1,000 or the township committee may by ordinance fix annual salaries over \$1,000, but less than \$4,000. The following townships enter this category:

c. Comment

In the introduction to this part, it was stated that the vast array of statutes dealing with municipal salaries are extremely complex and often ambiguous. After reviewing the foregoing,

one would have to agree that such observation is an understatement. In Burlington County alone, most of the municipalities are affected merely because the County population now exceeds 230,000.

It must be stressed here that the law discussed above represents only a part of the total number of statutes dealing with municipal salaries. Those statutes which were not the concern of this report because the 1970 census did not apply thereto are likewise replete with complexities, ambiguities, and irrelevancies insofar as the determination of rational salary levels are concerned. As has been pointed out in previous decennial census studies of this kind, unless the Legislature acts to insure simplicity and uniformity of municipal salaries on a population basis, efforts like this study will be repeated every decade with confusion compounded by further confusion.

II. MUNICIPAL LAW OTHER THAN SALARY PROVISIONS

A. Townships

1. Size of Committees in Townships over 4,500 Population

R.S. 40:146-2 provides that in townships with more than 4,500 inhabitants, except townships in sixth class counties, the township committee shall consist of five members, who shall hold office for three years except that the two additional members shall be elected at the next annual election, one for two years and one for three years. The following townships are included:

It is possible that certain of the above townships over 4,500 population may have already increased their committee membership from three to five under R.S. 40:146-3 which authorizes townships under 4,500 to do so.

2. Division into Wards--Townships over 7,000

Pursuant to R.S. 40:144-1 a township of more than 7,000 inhabitants and not divided into wards may be divided into not less than three wards. The following townships may do so, if they have not already done so:

Under R.S. 40:144-11, in townships over 7,000 which have divided into wards, the township committee shall consist of two members elected from each ward and one elected at large who shall be chairman of the township committee. In townships with more than 10,000 inhabitants, the at-large committeeman shall be known as township mayor. This now includes the townships enumerated in 2b above in addition to the following which have gone from between 7,000 to 10,000 population to over 10,000 population:

3. Township Offices and Employees

In addition to elective offices set forth for all townships in R.S. 40:145-2, this statute requires the election of road supervisors in townships with populations over 4,500, unless the position has been or is abolished by ordinance (term set at three years. R.S. 40:145-10). The townships which may be affected are listed above in II, A, 1.

R.S. 40:145-13 fixes at four years the terms of township attorney, building inspector, and treasurer in townships with over 24,000 inhabitants, except townships governed by the municipal manager form of government. The following townships enter this category:

R.S. 40:145-32 authorizes the governing body in townships having a population over 24,000 to create by ordinance the office of deputy clerk and fix the term and compensation, and to prescribe the duties. Townships listed immediately above enter this category.

R.S. 40:149-3.1 permits townships with less than 6,000 inhabitants to appoint as a member of the police force any person having at least five years aggregate service with one or more police forces within the State, notwithstanding he has not been a township resident for two years preceding his appointment, if he is otherwise qualified and has been a resident of the county wherein the township is located for an aggregate of at least five years. He must, however, become a township resident within two years. Because of the large number of townships which no longer are under 6,000 in

population, refer to Table B.

In townships over 2,000 in population the governing body shall fix by ordinance the salary of the tax assessor. R.S. 40:145-8. Because of the large number, refer to Table B for townships which are no longer under 2,000 in population. Mannington Township (Salem) has dropped under 2,000 in population.

4. Fire Districts

In any township (with a township committee) over 25,000 in population with fire districts established pursuant to R.S. 40:151-1 et seq. the district commissioner may by resolution borrow an amount of money prescribed in R.S. 40:151-26 to cover current expenses and repairs to fire apparatus and fire houses within the district. If they have acted pursuant to R.S. 40:151-1 et seq., the following townships are included:

5. Boards of Health

R.S. 26:3-10 specifies the composition of local boards of health and terms of the members in townships having a population over 20,000. Refer to Table B for townships exceeding the 20,000 population level.

B. Certain Commission Form Municipalities

1. Additional Commissioners in Municipalities over 10,000

R.S. 40:114-3 mandates two additional commissioners in municipalities with more than 10,000 inhabitants. One shall be designated by the legal voters as mayor and the other as member at large. They shall be elected for two year terms at the next annual election, except the first at large member shall serve a one year term. Municipalities which may be affected are:

Ocean City (Cape May)
Margate City (Atlantic)
Ventnor City (Atlantic)

The above three municipalities are no longer under R.S. 40:75-24.1 which prescribes the filling of vacancies in the office of commissioner in municipalities under 10,000 population.

C. Boroughs over 10,000 Population

Pursuant to R.S. 40:87-2, a borough having more than 10,000 inhabitants may, by ordinance adopted by vote of at least two-thirds of the borough council, divide into wards and elect councilmen therefrom. Boroughs which may be affected include:

The above listed boroughs may no longer be governed by R.S. 40:87-15 which allows the elected tax collector to serve as clerk and permits (chapter 301 of the Laws of 1970) the appointment of a building inspector in boroughs with less than 10,000 inhabitants.

D. Towns over 15,000 Population

Under R.S. 40:132-13, as a town over 15,000 in population, Dover Town (Morris) may appoint a superintendent of streets to serve a term of one year.

E. Municipalities Generally (With Certain Exceptions)

1. Appointment of Police and Firemen

a. Municipalities under 30,000 Population

Under R.S. 40:47-3.1, in any municipality, other than one under civil service, having a population of less than 30,000 inhabitants, a person may be appointed as a policeman or fireman, notwithstanding he has not been a resident of the municipality for two years preceding his appointment, provided at the time of the appointment he resides in the county in which the municipality is located for two years prior to his appointment and agrees to become a resident of the municipality within three years. R.S. 40:47-3.2 permits police or firemen to reside outside the municipality (under 30,000 population) for one three-year period provided he resides in the county as above. Unless they are under civil service, municipalities which may be excluded because they now exceed 30,000 in population are:

b. Municipalities under 5,000 Population and Municipalities between 5,000 and 5,500 Population.

R.S. 40:47-20.8 and R.S. 40:47-20.14 both allow the appointment of policemen who have not been municipality residents for two preceding years prior to appointment in municipalities under 5,000 in population and between 5,000 and 5,500 in population, respectively. R.S. 40:47-20.8, in addition, requires that he be a resident of the county, while R.S. 40:47-20.14 requires that he be a resident of the municipality at the time of appointment or agree to do so within one year. Exclusive of townships under 6,000 population covered by R.S. 40:149-3.1 cited above, refer to Table A for the large number of municipalities which now exceed 5,000 or 5,500 in population.

c. Fourth Class Cities between 9,000 and 16,000 Population.

In a fourth class city within the population range of 9,000-16,000, any person may be appointed a policeman, notwithstanding he has not been a city resident for two years preceding his appointment, provided he resides within a radius of five miles from police headquarters. R.S. 40:47-20.13. The following fourth class cities are now in this population range:

2. Leasing of Land to P.A.L. or P.B.A.

The governing body of a municipality of more than 30,000 inhabitants in a first class county over 800,000 in population may lease real estate to any Police Athletic League or Police Benevolent

Association to be used to promote the health, safety, morals and general welfare of the community, without costs or at nominal rental. R.S. 40:60-51.12. The following municipalities now fit this category:

Bergenfield Boro (Bergen)
Garfield City (Bergen)

F. Certain Cities

1. Appointment of Assessors--Cities between 15,000 and 35,000

R.S. 40:171-84 provides that in a city with a population between 15,000 and 35,000 inhabitants the mayor may appoint three at-large assessors for three year terms to be compensated at not less than \$500 or more than \$1,000 annually. R.S. 40:171-88 provides that the governing body of cities in this population range may also make such appointments, but the salary range is set at \$700-\$1,000. Hackensack City (Bergen) now exceeds 35,000 in population, while Orange City (Essex) has dropped under 35,000 in population.

2. Filling of Vacancies by Mayor--Cities between 40,000 and 75,000.

In cities between 40,000 and 75,000 inhabitants, where the common council, city council, or board of aldermen is unable, by reason of tie vote, to fill elective or appointive vacancies, the mayor shall have the duty to do so. R.S. 40:171-23. Vineland City (Cumberland) and Linden City (Union) are now in this population range.

3. Leasing of Land to P.A.L.

R.S. 40:60-51.11 permits the governing body of cities within the population range of 110,000-115,000 to lease at a nominal rent real estate to any police athletic league to promote the health, safety, morals and general welfare of the community. Trenton City (Mercer) has dropped below 110,000 in population.

4. Certain Officials in Cities between 55,000 and 125,000

R.S. 40:174-95 concerns itself with the appointment by the governing body of a lengthy list of city officers, unless elective, in cities between 55,000 and 125,000 in population.

Atlantic City (Atlantic) is now below this population range.

5. Board of Police Commissioners in Cities between 50,000 and 130,000.

R.S. 40:175-95 requires that a board of police commissioners be appointed in cities with a population between 50,000 and 130,000. Atlantic City (Atlantic) is also below this population range.

6. Salary of Police Chief--Cities between 30,000 and 50,000.

R.S. 40:174-92 sets a minimum salary of \$4,000 for police chiefs in cities in the population range of 30,000-50,000. Long Branch City (Monmouth) and Garfield City (Bergen) now exceed 30,000 in population while Atlantic City (Atlantic) has dropped under 50,000.

G. Certain Second Class Cities

1. Membership by Wards--Cities under 15,000

In second class cities having a population less than 15,000, the common council, board of aldermen or other governing body shall consist of three members from each ward and shall be elected at the time and in the manner and for the time as now provided for the election of such officers in such cities. R.S. 40:171-144. Gloucester City (Camden) and Pleasantville City (Atlantic) have dropped below the 15,000 population level.

2. Water Rates--Cities over 110,000

R.S. 40:62-85.1 provides that if any second class city with over 110,000 inhabitants has its own water works or water supply and supplies consumers in other municipalities, the rates charged shall be subject to the jurisdiction, regulation and control of the board of public utility commissioners as are the rates of other public utilities. Elizabeth City (Union) now exceeds 110,000 in population and Trenton City (Mercer) has gone under 110,000.

3. Term of Tax Collectors--Cities under 15,000

Tax collectors elected in second class cities under 15,000 in population shall serve three year terms. Pleasantville City (Atlantic) and Gloucester City (Camden) are now below 15,000 in population.

4. Appointment of Assessors--Cities under 35,000

The mayor in second class cities under 35,000 in population is empowered to appoint, with the advice and consent of the governing body, a board of assessors to consist of one assessor in and for each city ward. R.S. 40:171-179. Hackensack City (Bergen) has dropped under 35,000 in population, while Orange City (Essex) now exceeds 35,000.

5. Board of Police Commissioners--Cities under 35,000

R.S. 40:174-181 requires the creation of a board of police commissioners, with exclusive jurisdiction over the police department, in second class cities under 25,000 in population. See Hackensack City and Orange City.

6. Advertising for Bids--Cities under 20,000

Chapter 193 of the Laws of 1970 amends section 94 of chapter 99 of the Laws of 1907 to increase from under \$1,000 to under \$2,500 the amounts which a second class city under 20,000 in population can contract for work, supplies, or materials without advertising for bids. Burlington City (Burlington) is no longer a second class city and Millville City (Cumberland) now exceeds 20,000 in population.

H. Miscellaneous

1. Wages Paid on Public Work

Pursuant to the definition of "public body" in R.S. 34:11-56.26, municipalities with less than 25,000 inhabitants are not subject to the provisions of the Prevailing Wage Act.

Engelwood City (Bergen) has dropped under the 25,000 population level. Municipalities which now exceed 25,000 in population are:

2. Superintendent of Weights and Measures--Municipalities over 60,000.

R.S. 51:1-43 mandates that in municipalities having a population of sixty thousand or more the governing body shall provide for the office and appointment of a municipal superintendent of weights and measures. Edison Township (Middlesex) and Cherry Hill (Camden) exceed the 60,000 population level.

3. Librarians in Municipalities over 10,000

R.S. 45:8A-3 requires that in any municipality with more than 10,000 inhabitants, any officer or body (except a board of education) having control of a library supported in whole or part by public funds which serves any municipality or group of municipalities shall require that persons employed in any professional office or position in the library shall hold a professional librarians certificate. There are many municipalities which now exceed this population level and may now be covered by this provision. Because of the number, refer to Tables A and B.

4. Primary Elections--Municipalities over 14,000

The Primary Elections Act requires, in R.S. 19:23-8, that nominating petitions be signed by at least 50 voters of the appropriate political party in municipalities with populations in excess of 14,000. In all other municipalities the required number is 25. Pleasantville City (Atlantic) is under 14,000 in population. Refer to Table A for the large number of municipalities over 14,000 in population.

1. Alcoholic Beverage Control Boards

R.S. 40:69A-43 authorizes municipalities with populations in excess of 15,000 to establish boards of alcoholic beverage control which shall exercise the powers conferred upon municipal boards of alcoholic beverage control under Title 33 of the Revised Statutes. Refer to Table A for those municipalities which now exceed 15,000 in population.

J. Burlington City (Burlington)

Because Burlington City's population has decreased from 12,687 to 11,991, Burlington City changes from a second to a third class city, the only city to change classification as a result of the 1970 census. There are hundreds of statutes concerned with second and third class cities which would require interpretation insofar as their possible effect on Burlington City. Space does not permit an enumeration here. The Joint Committee, however, has on file the relevant statutes which will be made available to the appropriate authorities upon request.
