

### **GAPALA & DHARPALOCO DANCE FOR PRESIDENT BUSH**

On Thursday 6 September, Gapala Yunupingu (Year 7) and Dharpaloco Yunupingu (Year 5) performed a traditional dance for APEC dignitaries, including President George Bush, at the Australian Maritime Museum. The foreign leaders had gathered at the Museum to view the *Saltwater* exhibition, a collection of bark paintings of Sea Country by Yolnu people.

The paintings represent work by artists from Yirrkala in Arnhem Land which explores the sea, the creatures who live in the sea and the relationship between the Yolnu people and their world.

Sisters, Gapala and Dharpaloco, are Yolnu and their dance recreated elements of one of the paintings which represents a Crocodile's nest. Both students were asked to dance at this special event by their grandmother who was also part of the traditional dance.

Gapala, who was born in Arnhem Land and moved to Sydney when she was three years old, enjoys sport, particularly traditional dancing, basketball, netball, athletics and swimming. Swimming, says Gapala, is connected to her totem – the crocodile:

'Aboriginal people have totems – one animal that they can't eat that represents them. Mine is the crocodile. My Dad's Mum's Dad's totem was a crocodile and we follow it on through our family. The crocodile means that I'm a strong swimmer and I'm fast,' said Gapala.

### EFFORT RATING ASSEMBLIES Years 10 and 11

Final effort ratings for the year will be made available to students over the coming weeks and following this, the names of those girls eligible for an effort rating certificate will become apparent. At this time an invitation will be forwarded to parents inviting them to attend the relevant effort rating assembly to be held on Friday 16 November 2007. A short morning tea will be held at the conclusion of each assembly.

The aim of the effort rating scheme is to reward students who are making maximum effort and motivate students who are making little or no effort. The scheme does not consider the academic ability of each student. We can't hope for more than every student giving her maximum effort in her studies and we firmly believe that if each student does this, our results will improve.

In Year 10, to receive an effort rating certificate, students need to achieve a '1' rating in any subject, three or four times during the period from Term 4, Year 9 to Term 3, Year 10 (with students needing to achieve a '1' in Term 3, Year 10 to be eligible).

In Year 11, students who receive a '1' rating in any subject, two or three times in the first three terms, including Term 3, will receive an effort rating certificate at this special assembly.

If your daughter is successful in achieving an effort rating certificate this year, I hope you will be able to accompany her to the effort rating assembly on Friday 16 November 2007.

### **RACI CHEMISTRY QUIZ**



Year 11 and 12 students who received High Distinctions in the RACI National Chemistry Quiz

Our Year 11 and 12 Chemistry students competed in the Royal Australian Chemical Institute's (RACI) National Chemistry Quiz in July this year. There were 35 926 entries in the Year 11 section and 20 608 entries in the Year 12 section, from Australia and overseas.

The RACI states that the aims of the quiz are clearly related to 'Science for Everybody', which is a national aim for science education. This quiz provided students with the opportunity to participate in an external competition which stimulates and challenges them beyond the curriculum.

The top 10% of students in each state are awarded a High Distinction, the next 15% in the state received a Distinction and the next 15% a Credit. Congratulations to everyone who participated. There were some outstanding results, listed below:

Help us to trust in you always.



### DRUG EDUCATION A PRIORITY



Year 8 students learning about standard drink sizes and the impact of alcohol on the female body

A significant issue for teenagers today is alcohol abuse. It has received much coverage in the press recently and has been a high priority in this year's Pastoral Care programme at PLC Sydney. Following presentations to Year 11 and staff by Mr Paul Dillon from the National Drug and Alcohol Centre, Year 11 students trained by Paul worked with Year 9 students during several Pastoral Care sessions to understand more about alcohol: legal issues, standard drink measurements and personal safety. Year 9 appreciated the peer learning, finding Year 11 students 'more relatable', 'more casual but still informative' and the experience 'not as awkward as a class situation'.

Research has shown that when correct information about alcohol is given to students prior to experimentation, it is effective in building resilience. Hence, Ms Gitte Stokback from the Breakfree Foundation gave a presentation to Year 8. This presentation covered the physical, social and emotional health concerns associated with alcohol consumption, as well as the legal issues associated with underage drinking. Students were able to see the size of standard drinks and understand the impact alcohol has on the female body. Year 8 found the 'hands on stuff' very informative and the real stories 'very good'.

One of the favourite and fun exhibitions on The Adelaide Perry Gallery's calendar, *Kidzart@plc*, was opened on Tuesday 11 September 2007 by Professor Ian Howard, Dean of the College of Fine Arts UNSW. Professor Howard spoke of the three *Hs* that all artists utilise in the making of art. The *head* for imagination and development of conceptual ideas, the *hand* for dexterity and skill needed to manipulate material practice and the *heart* that impassioned the artist and fires their desire to make art.

He was very impressed by the skilful manipulation of materials that our PLC Sydney students employ in their art making, while still retaining their natural expressive qualities, imagery and the integration of cultural and historical studies.

Many Year 6 students hosted the exhibition and Junior School Captain Juna Xu represented the students by thanking Professor Howard for his attendance and Mrs Annie Welch for her drive and enthusiasm.

### TALENTED JUNIOR SCHOOL CRICKETERS

Congratulations to the following students for being selected for the 2007 and/or 2008 NSWCIS Primary Girls' Cricket team: Anais Alonso (Year 4), Pooja Halasagi (Year 5), Emma Duncan (Year 5) and Samantha Coulson (Year 6). These students will compete at the NSW Championships and will be coached by Ms Jane Wilson from the PDHPE Faculty.

#### AUSTRALIAN MATHEMATICS COMPETITION

The 2007 Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC) attracted entries from approximately 420 000 students from 3687 schools worldwide, making it the largest competition of its kind in the world. This year, 561 PLC Sydney students from Years 6 to 12 entered. This is a very large number of candidates compared to the vast majority of schools who only enter a small percentage of their most capable students.

The AMC is a wonderful mathematical problem solving experience. The questions always generate a great deal of interest and discussion among the students and their teachers, who continue to grapple with the more difficult problems long after the event.

Our girls have once again shown themselves to be very capable mathematical problem solvers. The total number of awards was very close to our highest ever and is clear evidence of the spirit and determination of our students and teachers.

Andrea Xiao of Year 9 was awarded the Rosemary Moffat Shield for the most outstanding performance by a PLC Sydney student, as she was placed in the top 50 Year 9 students in NSW and received a prize. In addition, eight High Distinctions (top 2% in their Year in NSW), 74 Distinctions (top 15%, but not in top 2%) and 192 Credits (top 50%, but not in the top 15%) were awarded to PLC Sydney students.

### PREMIER'S READING CHALLENGE

The Premier's Reading Challenge is over for another year. This is the fourth year that the Junior School has participated. Students who completed the Kindergarten to Year 2 challenge had to read or experience 30 books from a set list, five of which were allowed to be personal choice books. Students who completed the challenge for Years 3 to 9 had to read 20 books from a set list, five of which were allowed to be personal choice books.

This has been our best year yet, with a total of 306 students in the Junior School completing the challenge. Seventy-four of these students were from Evandale. Every student in six out of the ten Upper Primary classes completed the challenge this year, compared with two classes last year. Many students will now be eligible for a Gold Award, as this will be the fourth year they have completed the Premier's Reading Challenge.

### FROM THE ARCHIVES Marking the Rite of Passage

Completing secondary school is a major event in life. It is a rite of passage that we mark with activities both serious and light-hearted: a chocolate morning tea, a graduation dinner, a luncheon at the Principal's house, a muck-up assembly, a formal final assembly, the HSC exams and perhaps a schoolies trip interstate or overseas. But in years gone by, different activities marked the end of high school...

Mary Mortlock (née Harker), student 1933 to 1940, recalls, 'It was a set thing that every year when the Leaving Certificate exam was over she [Miss Eldershaw, Senior Mistress] would take Form 6A away for a weekend... In 1940 we went to Austinmer, to a cottage owned by a cousin of my mother's.

'In my Leaving year we all took a double-decker bus from the city to a cottage at Paradise Beach, at Pittwater, where one of the girl's parents had a cottage,' remembers Winsome Menzies (née Wood), who left in 1947. Mrs Dixon, the French Mistress and Mrs Davies, an English teacher, were their chaperones. The girls stayed about three days and enjoyed swimming and using the two boats to row to nearby Clareville to buy ice creams from the general store.

Helen Humphreys (née Neal) remembers there was a muck-up day in 1968. By 1989 this tradition took the form of a muck-up assembly in College Hall where the Year 12 students borrowed teachers' clothing and presented a mock assembly. Lisa Jenns (née Bartle) said that 'The School Captain took the role of Dr McKeith, who was Principal in 1989, while Mrs Moffatt, the Deputy Principal, was played by the Vice Captain. This had been a tradition for a number of years.' Lisa also recalls that some students went to Queensland, which was starting to become a popular destination – what we now refer to as schoolies.

The activities associated with completing high school vary from school to school, family to family and girl to girl. But they are once only events, so embrace them with enthusiasm, revel in the time together with school friends and enjoy them in the spirit they are intended!

### YEAR 11 SUPPORTS BIRLA CHILDREN'S VILLAGE

During 2007, Year 11 students have undertaken a very successful fundraising campaign for Birla Children's Village in Hanoi, Vietnam.

Recently the students held a 24 hour rowathon in Thompson Hall and raised over \$2000.00. Two rowing machines were kept going for 24 hours. The under 19 machine successfully surpassed the record set by Roseville in rowing for 337 065 metres at an average split of 2 minutes and 7.1 seconds. The second machine was used for sponsorship and undertook a more scenic but still challenging pace.

Year 11 has also been very busy organising a fashion show for Friday 19 October in the Audrey Keown Theatre. The show will feature some fantastic clothing and entertainment and funds raised will be contributed towards the maintenance of the children's accommodation. An order form for tickets is enclosed in this newsletter. Good seats are still available and the support of the PLC Sydney community would be greatly appreciated.

Tutor groups have also held some very original and profitable lunch time stalls and the Birla committee has held two very successful homebake stalls where caramel slice and chocolate brownies gathered lengthy queues.

Funds raised have been used to purchase school uniforms, stationery, books and clothing items for the 110 children at Birla Children's Village. This week we received some fantastic photographs from the director of Birla, Dr Diep, who is very grateful and proud of the relationship with PLC Sydney.
