The Oilers, playing a postseason game at home for the first time in 17 years, advanced to the divisional playoffs by shutting out the Broncos over the last three quarters. Denver marched 80 yards for a touchdown and a 7-3 lead on its first possession, but Earl Campbell's three yard scoring run gave Houston a 10-7 halftime margin. Campbell and Oilers quarterback Dan Pastorini both missed second-half action with groin injuries but Rob Carpenter and second year quarterback Gifford Nielsen played well in relief during their initial NFL playoff competition. Linebacker Gregg Bingham's 15-yard interception return set up Toni Fritsch's second field goal – a 20-yarder – with 4:18 remaining to give Houston a 13-7 edge. The Oilers' defense, which recorded six sacks overall, held the Broncos on the final two series with Curley Culp's third-down sack and Vernon Perry's fourth-down pass deflection the key plays.

Ron Jaworski completed 12 of 23 passes for 204 yards and three touchdowns, including two in a second half comeback, to give the Eagles their most important victory of the season. Trailing 17-10 in the third quarter, the Eagles marched 69 yards in six plays, capped by a 29-yard scoring strike from Jaworski to Harold Carmichael. With the Bears threatening, Bobby Howard intercepted Mike Phipps' pass in the end zone to set up the Eagles' clinching score. After Howard's interception, Jaworski took the Eagles 80 yards in six plays, with the game-winner coming on a 63-yard swing pass to Billy Campfield.

AFC DIVISIONAL PLAYOFF Houston 17, San Diego 14 Saturday, December 29, 1979 At San Diego Stadium, attendance 51,192.

The Oilers advanced to their second straight AFC championship game on the strength of an opportunistic defense and a near-flawless performance by the offensive unit. First year strong safety Vernon Perry set up 10 of the Oilers' 17 points with a postseason game record of four interceptions and a 57-yard blocked field goal return. Second year quarterback Gifford Nielsen and third year running back Rob Carpenter started for regulars Dan Pastorini and Earl Campbell, who were sidelined with groin injuries. The Oilers intercepted AFC passing leader Dan Fouts five times, including one by J. C. Wilson that led to the game-winning touchdown. Nielsen, making his first NFL postseason start, completed a 47-yard scoring pass to Mike Renfro with 12:55 elapsed in the third period to provide the winning margin. The loss eliminated the AFC West champion Chargers, who were making their first postseason appearance since 1965.

The Buccaneers, making their first-ever playoff appearance, advanced to the NFC championship game on the strength of Ricky Bell's running and a stingy defense that limited the Eagles to 227 yards. Bell scored two touchdowns in the first half as Tampa Bay built a 17-7 lead. His four-yard run capped a game-opening, 18-play drive that consumed nine minutes and 34 seconds. A one-yard run by Bell in the second quarter gave the Buccaneers a 17-0 lead. Philadelphia rallied to trim the deficit to 17-10 in the third quarter but fell behind 24-10 with 7:08 left in the game when Tampa Bay quarterback Doug Williams threw a nine-yard scoring pass to Jimmie Giles. Williams finished the day with seven completions in 15 attempts for 132 yards. Bell gained 142 yards on a divisional playoff record 38 carries. The Buccaneers' defense, led by defensive end Lee Roy Selmon, limited Wilbert Montgomery, the NFL's fourth-leading rusher, to 35 yards on 13 carries. Philadelphia gained only 43 yards in the first half.

The Steelers scored on their first three possessions with drives of 62, 62, and 56 yards. Terry Bradshaw completed a personal postseason high of 21 passes for 230 yards and touchdowns to John Stallworth (17 yards) and Lynn Swann

(20). Pittsburgh's "Steel Curtain," which led the AFC in total defense during the regular season, held Miami to 25 rushing yards. Franco Harris, the NFL's all-time postseason rushing leader, carried 21 times for 83 yards and a touchdown. After Miami narrowed the Pittsburgh lead to 20-7 in the third quarter, Pittsburgh drove 69 yards on 12 plays to increase the margin to 27-7 with 8:58 elapsed in the third period. The victory marked the Steelers' fifteenth straight at home and their twenty-third win in their last 24 games at Three Rivers Stadium. The Steelers moved to their sixth AFC championship game since 1972 in quest of their fourth Super Bowl appearance in the last six years.

With 4:32 left in the game, Los Angeles marched to the Dallas 32 before losing the ball on downs. The Rams' defense held the Cowboys on the ensuing possession, forcing a punt with 2:16 left. The winning touchdown came on the first play following the punt. Ferragamo completed 9 of 21 passes for 210 yards. Waddy had three receptions for 97 yards. Tyler was the game's leading rusher with 82 yards on 19 carries.

AFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME
Pittsburgh 27, Houston 13
Sunday, January 6, 1980
At Three Rivers Stadium, attendance 50,475.

The Steelers advanced to their fourth Super Bowl appearance since 1974 by eliminating the Oilers 27-13 in the AFC title game. It was the second consecutive year that Pittsburgh had defeated Houston at Three Rivers Stadium in the AFC finale. The Steelers were stunned early when Houston strong safety Vernon Perry intercepted his fifth pass in two playoff games and returned it for a 75-yard touchdown (a championship game record) with just 2:30 elapsed in the contest. Pittsburgh fell behind 10-3 in the second quarter, but quarterback Terry Bradshaw capped drives of 67 and 49 yards with touchdown passes to Bennie Cunningham (16 yards) and John Stallworth (20 yards), respectively. The Oilers narrowed the margin to 17-13 three seconds into the final quarter on Toni Fritsch's 23-yard field goal, but the Steelers scored 10 points in the final 10 minutes to ensure their second straight Super Bowl berth. Pittsburgh's Franco Harris rushed for 85 yards on 21 carries to increase his NFL postseason record to 1,442 yards. Bradshaw's touchdown passes brought his postseason total to 26, the most in NFL

history.

NFC CHAMPIONSHIP GAME Los Angeles 9, Tampa Bay 0 Sunday, January 8, 1980 At Tampa Stadium, attendance 72,033.

The Los Angeles Rams became the first NFC Western Division representative in the Super Bowl by shutting out Tampa Bay 9-0 behind a stingy defense that allowed the Buccaneers only 177 total yards. Frank Corral's field goals of 19, 21, and 23 yards accounted for the Rams' scoring in the first game in the history of the NFC championship (and before 1970, the NFL championship game) in which no touchdowns were scored. The Rams' 68-yard, 13-play drive produced Corral's first field goal with 14:58 remaining in the second period. Los Angeles increased its lead on Corral's 21-yarder with 47 seconds to play in the first half. His final field goal of 23 yards came with 8:09 left in the game. Cullen Bryant's 106 yards on 18 carries and Wendell Tyler's 86 yards on 28 rushes paced the Rams' 217-yard ground attack. Quarterback Vince Ferragamo completed 12 of 23 passes for 163 yards. In the first quarter, Los Angeles' defense held the Buccaneers to 13 yards. Tampa Bay did not get a first down until 7:55 remained in the second period.

SUPER BOWL XIV Pittsburgh 31, Los Angeles 19 Sunday, January 20, 1980 At Rose Bowl, Pasadena, CA, attendance 103,985

There was a nice moment of heroism and self-sacrifice when an old warrior, Rams defensive end Jack Youngblood, announced his intention to play in his team's first Super Bowl, despite a fractured leg.

There was a rush of "what if?" euphoria as the Rams took a 19-17 lead into the fourth quarter.

And there was cold reality: Pittsburgh, a team with as much patience as talent, struck quickly and surely for two touchdowns in the fourth quarter, and it was over. In the first month of 1980, the Steelers officially shut the door on their decade. This Super Bowl victory, their fourth, meant they had won nearly a third of the Vince Lombardi trophies to that point.

The signature image of Super Bowl XIV is of Steelers wide receiver John Stallworth at the L.A. 32, having outraced Rams safety Dave Elmendorf and cornerback Rod Perry, looking back over his head for a lofty Terry Bradshaw pass, catching it in stride, and continuing into the end zone for a 73-yard touchdown.

The Steelers had taken the lead and then surrendered it in the third quarter. Bradshaw hit wide receiver Lynn Swann over the middle for a 47-yard score. The Rams came back with a surprise -- a 24-yard halfback pass from Lawrence McCutcheon to Ron Smith that made it 19-17 before Bradshaw-to-Stallworth put Pittsburgh ahead for good.

The Rams intercepted Bradshaw three times, but it was the Steelers' lone interception -- by linebacker Jack Lambert -- that punctuated the ending. With the score 24-19 and Los Angeles driving, Lambert intercepted a pass from Rams quarterback Vince Ferragamo at the Steelers' 14. Another Rams drive broke under the weight of the Steelers' defense.

For the second year in a row, Bradshaw was named the game's Most Valuable Player for the resiliency that produced 309 passing yards and two touchdowns and a completion rate of 14-for-21.
