The 2007 Season Outlook

Shortened Spring

Frank Beamer and the Tech coaching staff, in conjunction with Director of Athletics Jim Weaver, made the decision to cancel the final week of spring practice following the on-campus events of April 16, thus shortening the off-season schedule by four practices. Although it could have been beneficial from a football standpoint to see how some of the inexperienced players responded to a full crowd at the spring game, all parties involved felt it was the right decision to make.

"I am pleased with the progress of the team as a whole," head coach Frank Beamer said. "We could've used those last four practices, but I think we got better, and the practices we did have were very good. I hope the guys work a little bit harder in the summer, because we need to be in great shape come August so we can get right back to work and make up for the time we lost during the spring."

Beamer said the group most affected by the absence of the spring game was probably the special teams unit, as that is what he typically uses as the final test for his kickers and punters.

"The only thing we lack is the experience of getting it done in front of people when it counts," he said. "However, I'm very confident that we'll be OK because our guys have kicked an awful lot in practice."

A Revamped Offensive Line

Another group that would have benefited from the spring game was the offensive line, which has undergone an almost complete makeover since the bowl game. However, unlike last season when the Hokies had to replace three full-time starters up front, the 2007 bunch features three returning starters — albeit with two in new positions — and two others who saw plenty of game action.

Bryan Stinespring said. "I think some of the moves we made will benefit us, and a lot of guys had good springs, but we need them to continue that in the fall so we can ease some of our depth concerns."

The lone returnee at his position will be freshman All-America selection Sergio Render, who improved constantly in his role as the right guard. Duane Brown will move from right tackle to left tackle to protect Sean Glennon's blind side, and Ryan Shuman will assume the center duties after serving at left guard a year ago. The coaches are confident with all three of those players, but the questions arise with the two spots left vacant by the moves of Brown and Shuman.

The ideal candidate at left guard is Nick Marshman, who essentially backed up the entire line last season and got off to a good start in the spring. Arguably the most publicized move of the off-season, though, was former tight end and newly bulked-up Ed Wang's emergence as the right tackle. He had begun working there toward the tail end of 2006,

but impressed many with his off-season progression.

Position Changes

In addition to the moves along the offensive line, a pair of defensive players were shuffled around who could easily get regular playing time at their new ots.

Meanwhile, redshirt sophomore Cam Martin makes the switch from free safety to whip linebacker, where his pass coverage ability combines with his intelligence to give him a great shot at making an impact this season.

"Cam may be one of the smartest football players that I've ever coached," Cavanaugh said.

Fifth-year senior Corey Gordon currently owns the No. 1 spot vacated by Brenden Hill, but Martin should see action early in the season.

Other changes include Demetrius Taylor's transition from linebacker to defensive end, and Beau Warren switching from tight end to center.

Dominating Defense

The Hokies led the nation in total defense for the second consecutive year in 2006, and also ranked first in both pass

defense and scoring defense.
Unlike last season when they had
to replace six starters, defensive
coordinator Bud Foster's crew only
loses three this time around and
had the chance to create some
depth in the off-season, which
left him with just one concern
— getting complacent.

"After leading the nation in defense for two straight years, I thought the guys might start to feel good about themselves — and they should — but we've got a lot left to accomplish," Foster said. "I feel good about their attitude, though, and I'm glad to say they were able to stay hungry."

Leading the pack will be Tech's top two tacklers from a year ago, All-ACC linebackers Vince Hall and Xavier Adibi. Foster thinks they might be the best tandem Tech has ever seen, but he expects even more out of them this season.

"Vince and Xavier have both worked really hard to become complete linebackers, but I've challenged both of them not only to become leaders of the defense, but leaders of the football team."

Newcomers

Although eight returning starters on each side of the ball means that Virginia Tech will be in good hands this season, it also means that there will be some talent to replace when 21 seniors depart at year's end. That is why the Tech coaching staff worked hard to compile one of its finest recruiting classes in recent memory.

"Not only do I think that this is a very talented incoming class, I think it's potentially one of the best classes we've ever signed," Beamer said.

None of the incoming freshmen will be rushed along, however, a sentiment expressed by many of the assistant coaches.

"I'm excited about the class we've put together," Foster said. "I think we've got some good football players coming in, and we need to have them grow and develop because we're going to lose some great seniors after this year.

Some of them might take a year or two to develop from a physical standpoint, but I like the qualities, characteristics and abilities that they have."

The Players

Left Tackle

DUANE BROWN (R-Sr.) - Is changing positions after starting for two years at right tackle ... Football is important to him, and he leads by example and practices very hard ... Coaches are excited about him leading the group, being the most valuable guy on the line and having a great season.

RICHARD GRAHAM (R-So.) -

Coaches feel good about him backing up Brown ... Has shown a lot of fight and gets after it ... Will also be in a battle for playing time at right tackle.

NICK MARSHMAN (R-Jr.) -

SERGIO RENDER (So.) - A Freshman All-American who missed most of the spring after recovering from knee surgery ... Made it back for a few drills, and should be back healthy and better than last year come fall ... Coaches are very confident with him ... Has a great future and could be special.

BRANDON HOLLAND

(So.) - Repped with the first team in the spring during Render's absence ... Coaches think he's athletic enough, and he will also compete for the backup job at left guard.

Right Tackle

ED WANG (R-So.) - Began last season at tight end, but the move to tackle was in the works toward the end of the season ... Actually took as many snaps at tackle as he did at tight end leading up to the bowl game ... The move showed to be beneficial in the spring, and he had a great offseason in the weight room.





It's an enthusiastic group, they're hungry, and I feel good about how they practiced this spring. I think we'll be a more physical offensive line than we were a year ago. We've also got some strong freshmen coming in that are more physically ready to go than is typically the case."

JUSTIN HARPER (Sr.) – A tall, rangy guy who has shown flashes but needs to be more consistent on every play ... Has a world of talent and the potential to be one of the better receivers around ... Needs to get better at blocking, making plays and being a physical presence ... Really stepped up his play in the spring and made some eye-opening catches.

JOSH MORGAN (Sr.) – A big, strong and athletic player who wants to be great ... Can do a lot of good things and was very productive last fall ... If he masters the little things and does more after the catch, he can

- Battle to watch: Although the fifth and sixth spots are up for grabs, Coach Sherman said the real competition goes on every day between the four seniors Justin Harper, Josh Hyman, Josh Morgan and Eddie Royal. They push each other constantly, and any combination of the two can be paired out on the field. Sherman said he's never had this kind of depth before.
- Spring standout: Justin Harper was said to have had his most productive spring since he arrived at Tech after continuously showing signs of his potential. The key will be whether he can build on it and utilize his athletic ability.

ZACH LUCKETT (R-Fr.) -

Coaches considered playing him last year, but he needs to get better at the mental part of the game ... Has all the physical tools and is similar to Morgan in stature ... Will be counted to show up in the fall in the best shape of his life and contribute as the fifth or sixth receiver.

PRINCE PARKER (R-Fr.) – Very tall and athletic, and has shown some flashes ... Needs to improve his strength and foot speed, but has shown the willingness to become a good player ... His height (6-6) could get him on the field in jump-ball situations, as he resembles former Georgia Tech WR Calvin Johnson in that manner.

Flanker

EDDIE ROYAL (Sr.) – His productivity and consistency made the coaches proud last year, in addition to his performance on special teams ... Has the ability to run reverses, and has become a better route runner ... Can be an explosive player if he keeps improving.

JOSH HYMAN (R-Sr.) -

Productivity dropped last year due to some nagging injuries, but started the spring well by pushing Royal at the flanker spot ... A physical player who can make the tough catch ... Has been in big games and made big plays, but needs to take advantage of opportunities ... Can also play split end.

BRANDON DILLARD (R-

So.) – Shows a lot of potential and can really run ... Needs to catch a lot of footballs in the off-season, concentrate more, and get stronger ... Showed flashes in the spring and could see time in a backup role.

GREG BOONE (R-So.) – Had a complete learning experience after playing QB and FS in high school ... Is good in the runblocking game, but dropped a lot

ANDRE SMITH (R-Fr.) – Coaches are counting on him and are really excited about his potential ... They thought he was the most effective tight end in practices and drills, but was too far behind with the mental aspect ... Brings a lot to the table blocking-wise, but needs to become a viable passing option.

Coach Sherman on the Wide Receivers

"I think we made some strides and improved within the offense. The four seniors have all been in the big games, made big plays and done a lot of good things, but I think the key with them is consistency and getting better at the little things. We were starting to click offensively toward the end of the spring on our timing with Sean Glennon, and we showed that we were on the same page. We've got the talent, but we've got to be able to make plays when we're called upon. We need to contribute, be physical and play with great effort."

Coach Stinespring on the Tight Ends

"I like where we finished up at tight end. I tried to illustrate to them that last year, we played as terrific backup tight ends. Even though they were starters by definition, they didn't necessarily perform as starters. They need to understand now that they are returning starters, and they need to progress in order to fit the bill that we want from our tight ends here at Virginia Tech. I think they responded very well to that."

- Key returnee: Tailback Branden Ore His 2006 totals of 17 touchdowns and 1,137 yards rank fourth and sixth, respectively, in the Tech record books, and he became the first-ever Hokie to register a pair of 200-yard performances. He accomplished the feat in back-to-back games, and was the only player in the nation last year to do so.
- Battle to watch: Second TB Billy Hite would like to give Ore more of a rest during games this season, and wants to settle on a No. 2 between Kenny Lewis, Jr., Jahre Cheeseman and Elan Lewis who can fill in for 15-20 plays.
- Spring standout: Sean Glennon was said to have had a different air about him in the spring. The game has slowed down for him, and he stepped in and had complete control and command of the offense.

KENNY LEWIS, JR. (So.) – Has gotten better every time he's been on the field ... Made outstanding progress last year after being away from the game as a baseball player ... Coach Hite said he's never coached a kid who has worked as hard as him.

Hurt his foot in a jayvee game and had surgery not long after moving from CB last year ... Had an eye-opening spring and made great progress ... A special talent who could help out in the fall after getting more reps.

BILLY GORHAM (Sr.) – A walk-on who has done well on special teams, but nagging injuries have kept him from playing more.



Quarterback SEAN GLENNON (R-Jr.) –

Coaches thought he did a good job running the offense and managing the game last fall ... They like his competitiveness, determination, work ethic and consistency ... Needs to work on ball-carrying and delivering the ball more quickly when he's on the move ... Had a great spring, and demonstrated leadership, confidence and a complete control of the game.

Coach Hite on the Running Backs

"I feel so much better coming out of this spring than I did last year at this time. I feel very comfortable with both the fullbacks and the tailbacks, and I'm looking forward to all of them having a great year for us. More specifically, I've always played two tailbacks and I like doing that. Last year, I played Branden Ore a lot more than I wanted to, but I think we're at a point right now where the other guys are closing the gap a little bit, and I think that's important to us because now I am more comfortable inserting someone else in there to give Branden a breather. In addition, I have 3-4 good fullbacks who are all pretty even with each other. The depth that we have at these positions this coming season, as compared to last year, is remarkable."



Coach O'Cain on the Quarterbacks

"I was really pleased with the spring, and I felt that our top three guys all improved from the fall. Not only are my players improved, but so am I. I feel more comfortable coaching them. Last spring, I had just come in and I was learning a new system. In some ways, they knew the system better than I did. Now we are all comfortable with each other, and Sean Glennon in particular exuded confidence, which in turn has made the entire team more confident in him."

IKE WHITAKER (R-So.) -

Missed the bowl game after leaving the team to undergo rehab for alcohol abuse last December ... Coaches think he's doing what he needs to do and has changed for the better ... A tremendous athlete who can make things happen, but needs to learn the offense better and be more consistent ... Has a better knowledge of how the system works after spring, where he was very productive in scrimmage situations.

CORY HOLT (R-Jr.) -

Coaches like his temperament and the way he competes, and is much improved with his consistency throwing the football following the spring ... Understands the offense, but didn't get a chance to display it in limited action.

Defensive End CHRIS ELLIS (R-Sr.) – Did not participate in spring practice following off-season shoulder surgery, but is anxious to get back on the field and is working hard ... Is the most experienced player coming back ... A highly motivated guy who will be leaned on for leadership and playmaking ability ... Should be an impact player in the ACC.

ORION MARTIN (R-Jr.) – His playing experience gives him an advantage in the starting end spot vacated by Noland Burchette ... Has playmaking ability and plays extremely hard ... A player who is trusted and looks very solid on film ... Repped in Ellis' spot during the spring and continues to prove himself.

NEKOS BROWN (So.) – Plays extremely hard and had a fantastic

spring.



KORY ROBERTSON (R-Sr.) – Has the capability to be a starter, but needs to consistently step up and beat somebody out instead of being content as a backup ... A gifted athlete with great explosiveness, footwork, quickness and power ... Excites coaches because he keeps taking steps and improving, and has the ability to be a nationally known guy if he plays up to his potential.

JOHN GRAVES (R-Fr.) –
Proved in the spring that
he's athletic enough to be
a backup defensive end, but
is in the mix at defensive
tackle ... Has the ability
to play at both positions,
and likely will ... Can be a
force inside, but needs to
get to the point where he
is instinctive and turning it
loose.

CORDARROW THOMPSON (R-So.) – Had a pretty good spring and will battle with Graves as the fourth tackle ... Saw regular action last season, playing in every game and recording 14 tackles and two sacks.

Coach Wiles on the Defensive Line

"Anytime you've got experience coming back, that's a positive. I think we've got a really competitive situation going on. We've got plenty of guys who can develop into big-time football players, and we're going to play eight or nine defensive linemen. I'm very excited about the steps we made during the spring, and how hungry we are. Everybody's ready to play on Saturdays, but it's during the winter, spring and summer that the work goes into being competitive at this level. If we can stay healthy, we've got a chance to be really good up front."



CODY GRIMM (R-So.) – Played whip on the scout team and was among the ACC leaders in special teams tackles ... Intrigues the coaches and they want to see what he can do with a lot of reps ... Has a good football IQ to go with good quickness and speed.

STEVEN FRIDAY (R-Fr.) – Was moved from defensive end because he was too light ... It will be a new experience for him as he has always played down as a rusher ... Has great strength and moved around well for a defensive end ... Will be a good whip, but has a lot to learn.

Coach Foster on the Linebackers

"All in all, I thought we made good improvement. Obviously, I feel good about the return of Vince Hall and Xavier Adibi, but the biggest focus for us was to create a little bit of depth at that position, and I think we did that. I really feel good about Brett Warren and Purnell Sturdivant, and I think they give us quality depth that we can win with. We needed to get them up to par where they could keep us competing at a high level should they be called upon, and I think we closed the gap in that regard."

Coach Foster on the Defense

"As an overall defense, I was pleased with our effort. We've got eight starters coming back who have been really good football players for us, but we really targeted creating some depth. If we start off the fall where we left off in the spring, we're going to be in good hands. We would've liked to have gotten that last week of practice in to see how the young guys would respond to 40,000 people in the stands at the spring game, but I feel confident about them and I think we'll be in good shape when it's all said and done."

- **Key losses:** Rovers Aaron Rouse and Cary Wade
- Key returnee: Cornerback Brandon Flowers He is the latest in a recent line of All-America defensive backs (Anthony Midget, Ronyell Whitaker, DeAngelo Hall, Jimmy Williams), but is the first to return following the honor since Whitaker in 2001, and the first ever to do so with two remaining years of eligibility.
- Battle to watch: If Roland Minor stays focused in the classroom, he is a supertalented guy who will contend with Stephan Virgil for the third cornerback spot.
- Spring standout: Macho Harris was the most consistent guy from the first practice to the last practice, and he really made an effort to get better from a mental and technique standpoint. Kam Chancellor was also a pleasant surprise in his first workouts as a rover.

RASHAD CARMICHAEL (R-Fr.) – Redshirted last year and is still learning the position ... Performed very well on the scout team, and is doing a good job in the strength and conditioning program ... Has shown a lot of leadership qualities, and has great speed.

Coach Gray on the Defensive Backs

"I thought the spring went well for the first group — Brandon Flowers, Macho Harris and D.J. Parker — the guys who had lots of experience after last season. 


