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ADA's 2005 Congressional Voting Record

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109th Congress, First Session

2005 and the first session of the 109th Congress provided us with a fresh round of division and futility. The reactionary Republican leadership insisted on pushing forward with its ideological favorites with little or no regard for the well being of the citizenry at-large.

Another year has passed without an increase in the federal minimum wage so that the battle must again be waged in 2006. Various budget resolutions became battlegrounds where anti-government zealots continued to take aim at vital social programs while simultaneously padding the pockets of their upper income colleagues. Some programs up for slashing included student aid, Medicare, Medicaid, food stamps, and more.

Another key vote in this session was passage of

the Central American Free Trade Agreement (CAFTA) which was one of several controversial votes that the House Republican leadership left open for voting well past the customary cut-off time in order to twist arms and makes deals to secure narrow victories.

Other key votes included abortion, special treatment for Wal-Mart, federal outsourcing, hate crimes, the Endangered Species Act, Social Security, judicial nominations, defense appropriations, and drilling in ANWR.

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HEALTH CARE FOR SOME
HOW REPUBLICANS INTEND TO CUT THE HEART OUT OF
AMERICA'S HEALTH CARE SYSTEM

America's health care system, already on life support after a decade of Republican neglect, faces cardiac arrest if a new prescription by the President is administered to America's middle class.

The President and Republicans say they have found the cure to America's health care crisis, and it's called a Health Savings Account, or HSA. A fundamental premise of this social re-engineering is that Americans would shop for health care bargains, as if they were shopping for pans. In many newspapers, Wednesday is grocery coupon day. Under the President's plan, Thursday might become medical coupon day.

HSA follows the same tortured logic as the President's proposals to privatize Social Security, Medicare and pension programs. Simply, HSA is another attempt to cut the social safety net underneath the American middle class and use it as gift wrap for another tax holiday for the wealthy. HSA is GIA -- Go It Alone.

Republicans say their plan will allow people to set money aside tax-free to use for their health care expenses, if they purchase a high-deductible insurance policy. It sounds too good to be true -- and it is. Here's what they don't say.

Of the 46 million Americans without any health insurance, many don't earn enough to derive much benefit from a tax free plan. As for America's middle class, HSAs are a false promise. Who but the wealthiest could afford to save enough money to pay the expenses resulting from a serious medical illness or injury before a high deductible policy even kicked in?

Would saving fifty bucks a month protect you financially from the cost of your deductible for a heart transplant, hip replacement or even a broken arm?

Do you forgo car insurance and set aside a hundred bucks a month in case you're in an accident? The idea is so far-fetched that it's illegal across the U.S.

A bedrock principle of this nation is to pool our resources and share the risk, because it benefits us all. That's why we collectively support police, fire, national defense and a host of other essential services. The alternative would turn back the clock to the early 20th century, when people were wiped out by one moment of misfortune.

Is HSA any different? No.

HSAs would accelerate a trend that has seen the percentage of employers offering health insurance drop 15% during the Bush Administration. A HSA would be an incentive for employers to transfer more of the burden to the individual. The outcome is inevitable, even for forward thinking, employee focused, responsible corporate citizens. How long can they last when the competition abandons providing health insurance?

More than 160 million Americans rely on their employers for health insurance today. How many workers will have employer-sponsored health insurance five years from now if the President gets his way? The answer can be seen by looking at what Republican policies have done for defined benefit pensions. By the millions, workers are being forced to go it alone -- promises broken, contracts broken, lives broken -- as more companies cancel or deny pension programs. That's the model for the HSA.

In the end, HSAs are about reward, not health care. They are a great tax shelter for the rich, and will produce higher profits for the health care industry. For the rest of us, HSAs are lost revenue for the government, and missed opportunity for the nation.

America's health care crisis isn't going to be solved until we create a national program, covering everyone, and sharing the risks as one nation.

Everyone knows what can happen when you take the wrong medicine. A HSA is the wrong prescription for America's health care crisis: at best, it will be ineffective; more than likely, it will make matters dangerously worse.

House of Representatives Vote Descriptions

1. **H Con Res 95. Fiscal Year (FY) 2006 Budget Resolution/ Congressional Black Caucus Substitute** Watt (D-NC) substitute amendment to increase fiscal 2006 spending by \$36.3 billion, including \$23.9 billion for education and job training and \$7.8 billion for homeland security and veterans' programs. It also would rescind tax cuts for those making more than \$200,000 in gross income, close several tax loopholes and reduce funding for the ballistic missile defense program. It would reduce the deficit by \$4 billion. Rejected 134-292. March 17, 2005. **A yes vote is a +.**
2. **H Con Res 95. FY 2006 Budget Resolution Adoption** of the conference report setting broad spending and revenue targets for five years. It would limit discretionary spending to \$843 billion in fiscal 2006, cut taxes by \$70 billion, and cut mandatory programs by \$34.7 billion, including a \$10 billion cut in Medicaid. Adopted 214-211 and sent to the Senate. April 28, 2005. **A no vote is a +.**

3. HR 1815. FY 2006 Defense Authorization/Abortion at Military Facilities Davis (D-CA) amendment allowing overseas military facilities to provide privately-funded abortions for women in the military or who are military dependents. Rejected 194-233. May 25, 2005. **Ayes vote is a +.**

4. HR 1815. FY 2006 Defense Authorization/U.S. Withdrawal From Iraq Woolsey (D-CA) amendment expressing the sense of Congress that the President should develop a plan for withdrawing U.S. military forces from Iraq and submit it to the appropriate Congressional committees. Rejected 128-300. May 25, 2005. **A yes vote is a +.**

5. HR 3010. FY 2006 Labor-HHS-Education Appropriations/Wal-Mart Labor Agreement DeLauro (D-CT) amendment that would prohibit use of funds in the bill to carry out a settlement agreement between the Labor Department and Wal-Mart, which would allow Wal-Mart 15 days' advance notice of any investigation or audit of possible child labor violations. Rejected 165-234. June 24, 2005. **A yes vote is a +.**

6. H.R. 3058. FY 2006 Transportation-Treasury-HUD Appropriation/AMTRAK Corrine Brown (D-FL) amendment to fund most long-distance Amtrak routes. Amtrak employs 20,000 workers, and the cuts included in the underlying bill would have devastated long-distance passenger service and threatened to shut down Amtrak. Adopted 269-152. June 29, 2005. **Ayes vote is a +.**

Voting Record Notes:

(1) This voting record is offered only as a guide in judging the legislative performance of Members of Congress, and has several inherent limitations. It is no measure of a legislator's work in committee. It does not reflect the failure of Congress to deal with major issues, or the individual's degree of responsibility. These judgments cannot be expressed in percentages.

(2) Liberal Quotient (LQ) is the rating of a Member of Congress as determined by the percentage of votes cast in support of liberal policies, measured against the number of votes counted (20). For example, Senator Tom Harkin (D-IA) voted with the liberal position in all 20 selected votes, so his LQ is 100%.

(3) The votes selected cover a full spectrum of domestic, foreign, economic, military, environmental and social issues. We try to select votes which display sharp liberal/conservative contrasts. We often chose procedural votes: amendments, motions to table, or votes on rules for debate. These votes can reveal true attitudes obscured in the final votes.

16. S 1932. Budget Reconciliation/**Medicaid FMAP.** Bingaman (D-NM)

amendment to prevent the Medicaid federal medical assistance percentage (FMAP) from falling below 0.1 for Delaware and Michigan, 0.3 for Kentucky and 0.5 for any other state in fiscal 2006. It also would extend prescription drug rebates to Medicaid recipients enrolled in HMOs or PPOs. Adopted 54-45. November 3, 2005. A yes vote is a +.

17. S 1042. Fiscal 2006 Defense Authorization/Iraq Withdrawal. Levin

(D-MI) amendment stating that U.S. military forces should not stay in Iraq "indefinitely," and requiring the President to report to Congress within 30 days with a timetable for withdrawal and a campaign plan, including dates, for a phased redeployment of U.S. troops from Iraq. Rejected 40-58. November 15, 2005. A yes vote is a +.

18. HR 3199. Patriot Act Reauthorization.

Motion to invoke cloture to limit debate, requiring votes of 3/5 of the Senate, on the conference report to reauthorize the Patriot Act. It made permanent 14 of the 16 provisions set to expire, extended for four years access to business and other records, and extended "roving" wiretaps. Failing to get 60 votes, cloture was rejected 52-47. December 16, 2005. A no vote is a +.

19. S 1932. Budget Reconciliation –**Programs for the Poor.** Gregg (R-NH)

motion agreeing to House version of the bill cutting by \$39.7 billion over five years Medicaid, home health care, child support enforcement, SSI for disabled individuals, foster care, and aid to grandparent caregivers. The bill also added harsher Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) work requirements without adequate childcare and other funds for the states. Medicaid recipients are required to pay higher co-payments and premiums for prescription drugs and medical care. Motion adopted with Vice President Cheney voting "yea" to break the 50-50 tie vote. December 21, 2005. A no vote is a +.

20. HR 2863. Fiscal 2006 Defense Appropriations –ANWR. Motion to invoke cloture, limiting debate, on the Defense Appropriations conference report appropriating \$453.5 billion for defense spending, including \$50 billion for operations in Iraq and Afghanistan. Senator Stevens (R-AK) added an amendment to this "must pass" bill permitting oil drilling in Alaska's Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR). However, he promised to drop the ANWR provision if cloture failed. (The bill also contained a provision granting drug companies immunity from liability.) Failing to get the required 60 votes, cloture was rejected 56-44. December 21, 2005. A no vote is a +.

It is obvious, rhetoric from the White House and Wall Street notwithstanding, that the current economic recovery has bypassed most Americans. New IRS statistics show that all but the highest 1% of Americans by income lost ground to inflation in recent years. That trend has continued, as good jobs leave our communities and are replaced by lower wage "Wal-Mart economy" jobs, often without health care or retirement benefits. The price of gasoline and heating oil are skyrocketing, yet wages for most workers are stagnant at best. The global "race to the bottom" disadvantages workers at every turn and our government's policies only encourage it.

The difficulties facing working class Americans are clear, yet many who suffer most from the current economy are voting for federal and state candidates who promote the very economic policies that undermine working families.

A steady chorus from the media, employers, and the political right-wing tells working Americans that it can't be different. That we should get used to working more hours at lower wages and that we have no choice but to conform to the "inevitable" globalization.

Of course, it can be different. The **ADA Education Fund** believes that when working people are organized to support real alternatives, demand that candidates support these alternatives too, and persuade their neighbors that we have a clear choice, real change will occur.

Our **WORKING FAMILIES WIN** project has hired full time, professional organizers in key communities in Iowa, Wisconsin, Minnesota, Florida, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and North Carolina to implement a three year program to focus attention on the failure of the economy and build support among working class Americans for a new direction in the nation's policies and politics. We have plans to expand this project into additional states and communities as funding allows.

In each community, our organizers will use house meetings to engage people in conversations about how things can be different for themselves and their families. We're building grassroots coalitions of leaders and activists from labor, the faith community, environmentalists, family farmers, students, retirees, immigrants, and others committed to real change in their communities, and nationwide.

In each community, project participants will press candidates for Congress, U.S. Senate, Governor, and state legislature to take clear and strong positions on behalf of working people including support for increasing the minimum wage, opposition to new trade deals like NAFTA and CAFTA, stronger rights for workers to join unions, protection of retirement benefits, and quality health care for all.

Project participants will also be engaged with local issues such as responsible contractor ordinances, Wal-Mart campaigns, or state minimum wage initiatives that create "teachable moments" for people to see how their collective action can create real change that benefits themselves and their communities. Short-term victories will sustain and build the corps of volunteers engaged with the project.

By recruiting and training volunteers and leaders in every project community, we will increase the capacity of working people in these communities to shape the public debate locally and nationally-- focusing more attention on pocketbook issues through the media, at the workplace, and in "living room" conversations where neighbors talk to neighbors about their stories, and collective power to make a difference.


We are committed to a collaborative approach by working to supplement -- not subtract from -- the efforts of organized labor and a variety of other groups at the national and local levels who are already engaged in organizing for social and economic change such as Working America, Citizen Action, ACORN, and others.

In many ways, we are replicating what unions have learned about talking to their own members: the conversation must continue all year around, the conversation must focus on the economic issues that most directly affect workers, and the best messengers are those who are as close to the workers themselves as possible.

WORKING FAMILIES WIN is unique in that we are focused not only on working class folk who are not union members; we are also working in communities that are often overlooked in the nation's political debate. By building worker power in Reading PA, Fayetteville NC, Waterloo IA, St. Cloud MN, Zanesville OH, and many more communities, we can make a difference not just in these places but nationwide. John Kenneth Galbraith, 1908-2006

“Peace requires people that really believe in it—and who have not staked their reputations on conflicting premises...above all let us see negotiations and peace not as propaganda ploys but as something we want and must have.”

-- John Kenneth Galbraith, from his acceptance speech to be ADA chairman in 1967

Word of the death of John Kenneth Galbraith reached us just as this newsletter was going to press. Presidential advisor, former ambassador, professor, economist John Kenneth Galbraith was to us Ken Galbraith ADA founder, former president, devoted member, author of innumerable letters on behalf of ADA and, above all, friend. To say he will be sorely missed is an understatement of the highest order.

When liberal activists gathered in January 1947 at the Willard Hotel to form Americans for Democratic Action, they found amongst them a giant of a man – both in stature and in intellect. Since then, Professor Galbraith has been our guiding light both philosophically and as a pragmatic politician. As ADA president, he led ADA during the war in Vietnam as we became the first national organization to go on record in opposition to that fatally flawed war. His participation in ADA continued as an ADA national board member, national convention speaker and author of the pithy Galbraithian letters some of which were private and many of which attracted members to this organization which he held so dear. Just a very few weeks ago, as he lay bedridden, he met with an ADA board member to discuss ways in which he could help the Campaign for ADA mentioned elsewhere in this newsletter. He was nothing short of astonishing and his loss to us and to the world at large is enormous.

His legacy will continue here through the many he inspired, through his sons who are also members – especially Jamie who serves on our national board – and through the Galbraith Fellows who will continue to work in the public service in his memory.
