



## DARFUR

### Situation Analysis

The signature of the Darfur Peace Agreement (DPA) in May 2006 provided the framework for the cessation of armed conflict in Darfur and, by extension, improved security and protection for both IDP and host communities. Unfortunately, the DPA has suffered from lack of widespread support, aggravated by the failure of all parties involved in the conflict to assent to its provisions. As such implementation has been delayed and, contrary to hopes, episodes of armed conflict have increased.

Insecurity continues to be central to the challenges of Darfur. Arms proliferate and impunity abounds, while capacity to enforce legal mechanism is weak. The limited mandate of the African Union Mission in Sudan (AMIS), and the constraints under which it operates, have restricted its protective capacity, and resulted in a general loss of confidence among IDPs and other vulnerable populations. The presence of the *janjaweed* and other militia throughout the region remains an issue, as does the prevalence of unexploded ordinance. General lawlessness is common among all groups, and camps have reported increases in incidences of banditry and personal violence; violence against children and heightened levels of sexual and gender-based violence directed at women. These issues are of particular concern. Furthermore, regional tensions, most notably those associated with the effective closure of the Chad-Sudan border, have exacerbated insecurity.

The protracted conflict and insecurity throughout the region has adversely affected the social and cultural norms of its communities and has resulted in significant displacement, increased dependence on international assistance, and strain upon government structures. Such social fragmentation is further illustrated by the deterioration of traditional mechanisms for conflict resolution and the introduction of new cleavages along ethnic and political lines.

The climate of violence continues to cause hardship and suffering for the civilian populations given its affect on markets and agricultural production. The economy has suffered devastation due to the conflict as traditional trading relationships and routes have been destroyed, and agricultural production virtually ground to a halt. Further impoverishment is made probable as a result of the nearly universal destruction or attrition of livelihood options coupled with the erosion of coping mechanisms.

Increased migration over the past few years has heightened tensions over natural resources. Water, firewood and land for grazing remain flashpoints for localised conflicts and fuel existing tensions.

The region has been host to increasing numbers of IDPs, primarily due to fighting between various factions involved in the conflict, while large areas of the region remain inaccessible to humanitarian actors due to insecurity. Furthermore, the past year has seen the prospects for safe, voluntary and dignified return shrink considerably as security has deteriorated. As such, the situation across Darfur is unlikely to be conducive to large-scale returns unless the political situation stabilises and the root causes of the conflict are addressed. However, small-scale voluntary returns are expected to continue in pockets of relative security and, as in 2006, agencies will continue to strengthen information systems to verify the voluntariness of returns, and to increase IDP profiles in an effort to better identify potential areas of return.

Humanitarian operations have suffered greatly during 2006. Access and security have been the greatest hurdles as factionalism within rebel groups increased, complicating access negotiations. In a number of areas, the targeting of humanitarian actors and programmes has led to their complete withdrawal resulting in the curtailment of many activities, including health, food distributions and water and sanitation, further endangering the health and wellbeing of an already highly vulnerable population.

### ***The Planning Assumptions for 2007***

Darfur will continue to represent a complex emergency situation in 2007, with a population of 3.5 million heavily reliant upon the provision of humanitarian assistance. Insecurity will continue to represent a significant challenge, reflecting an unstable and tense environment. Protracted fighting and tribal/ethnic tensions will likely result in further displacement and adversely affect the forthcoming harvest. Thus, livelihoods and local coping mechanisms will be further compromised, while levels of environmental stress rise. These external forces are likely to further foment insecurity within camp settings.

Finally, without the continued support of donor funding for Darfur, it is feared that critical shortfalls may be experienced in the implementation of an effective and efficient humanitarian response.

### ***The Strategic Priorities for 2007***

The three main strategic priorities for 2007 will focus on continued support for IDPs, maintenance of lifesaving humanitarian assistance, and improving security.

### ***The Humanitarian Strategy for 2007***

The humanitarian strategy for Darfur in 2007 takes as its foundation the timely provision of adequate and appropriate protection and targeted humanitarian assistance to all in need. The UN and Partners will continue to build constructive partnerships with the GNU, and other relevant parties. The protection of civilians will be a focus of these partnerships, as will unimpeded access to all populations in need of humanitarian assistance.

### ***The Recovery and Development Strategy for 2007***

In support of the DPA, the Darfur Joint Assessment Mission (DJAM) was established by the international community in an effort to address the most urgent needs of the population while providing early peace dividends to those members of the community who elect to return.

The DJAM that commenced in July 2006 focused on identifying early recovery and longer-term development and reconstruction needs. The UN, coordinating the early recovery needs assessment, fielded the Track I assessment team of 49 experts comprised of Sudanese nationals and expatriates, as well as representatives from donor agencies, academia, civil society, GNU, SLM and UN Agencies. Teams were organised into six clusters, covering basic social services, conflict-affected communities, rule of law, capacity building of local institutions, returns, and peace and security. Cross-cutting issues such as gender, protection, environment, HIV/AIDS and conflict resolution and reconciliation were also addressed. The Track I draft cluster reports are anticipated by mid-November 2006.

The role of coordinating the assessment of long-term reconstruction and development requirements, identified as Track II, is led by the World Bank. The Track II mission to Darfur has already commenced and discussions with stakeholders and government undertaken. The continuing conflict in Darfur and escalating security concerns have inhibited the DJAM's progress and conclusion of the Track II mission is likely to be delayed. While it has been proposed that certain areas within Darfur warrant increased focus on longer-term development, much of the region remains in need of humanitarian assistance.

### **The Sector Reviews for 2007**

A brief summary of the aims of each sector within the 2007 UN and Partners Work Plan for Sudan is offered below, with specific emphasis placed on the Darfur region. Detailed information may be obtained in the **Sector Plans for 2007** section of the document, and are presented in matrix form at the end of this analysis.

#### ***Basic Infrastructure and Settlement Development***

The current political and social situation in Darfur proves challenging for longer term infrastructural or settlement development. Continued protracted large-scale population displacements and the volatility in security prove further complications for progress towards development planning. As such, it is anticipated that the aims of this sector will remain towards humanitarian programming during 2007, while ever cognisant of the immediate and future needs of the Darfurians. Emphasis will be placed on the provision of emergency shelter, while investigating the use of alternative resources to address such issues such as deforestation and sustainability.

#### ***Common Services and Coordination***

Rising levels of insecurity throughout 2006 adversely affected access by the UN and Partners to significant segments of the population. Assessment, monitoring and evaluation, and even the provision of basic services were curtailed as field activities were scaled back due to increased threat and targeting of humanitarian operations.

Key priorities in 2007 will centre on efforts to address the insecurity and resulting needs gaps. Increased communication and coordination both among agencies and with other stakeholders throughout the region will be paramount, both to strengthen the mechanisms through which humanitarian services are provided, as well as securing safe access for aid workers. As part of this effort, information collection and dissemination among relevant actors will be streamlined, as well as an inter-agency coordination mechanism, and dialogues between state government and local authorities. To further facilitate the safety and security of humanitarian operations, priority will be afforded to the maintenance of an independent, reliable and enhanced security communications system. Increased camp coordination will be pursued through agreements with international NGOs, as well as training and capacity building for representatives of the Humanitarian Affairs Commission.

#### ***Cross-sector Support to Return***

The past year has seen the prospects for safe, voluntary and dignified return of the regions' IDP and refugee population decrease considerably. As heightened insecurity and political instability continues, it appears unlikely that the environment within 2007 will prove conducive to large-scale returns. Select small-scale voluntary returns may occur in pockets of relative security.

Similar to 2006, the UN and Partners will afford priority status to the strengthening of information systems so as to verify the voluntary nature of returns, and enhanced profiling of IDPs so as to better predict potential areas of high returns. Emphasis will be placed on broadening the scope of returns monitoring so as to reflect the highly fluid nature of population movements. Further, advocacy will be directed towards the prevention of involuntary return and forced relocation.

The success of operations lies in ensuring the sustainability of voluntary returns. Strategies to this end will include the provision of reintegration assistance in areas of return so as to reduce the risk of further displacement, and the provision of assistance to localities likely to be the recipient of significant returnee populations.

### ***Education***

In 2006, the sector concentrated on the provision of basic education throughout Darfur to IDP, host, rural and nomadic communities. Approximately 134,000 additional children were enrolled. Activities included classroom construction/rehabilitation, support to volunteer teacher training programmes, provision of educational materials, food for education, and strengthening Parent-Teacher Associations to manage day-to-day school operations.

These efforts will continue in 2007, targeting 51,550 IDP and returnee children in IDP camps and host communities for primary education that constitutes a 10% increase of enrolment from last year, which stood at 516,472 pupils; increasing the enrolment rate of nomadic children to 9,481; rehabilitating 2,000 classrooms and constructing 150 new classrooms; providing education materials and food for education for 350,000 children; and the training 600 Ministry of Education trainers and 2,500 volunteers on child-centred teaching approaches, peace education and HIV/AIDS life skills. Emphasis will be placed on capacity building for education planning, school administration, and community participation at state and locality level. Additionally, programmes will target 42,000 under-six children, providing early childhood education while both children and adults currently outside the educational system will be targeted for basic education services.

Further, in an effort to increase coordination, strengthen advocacy efforts, and promote more efficient utilisation of resources, bi-weekly Educational Coordination Forums will be convened involving UN Agencies and Partners.

### ***Food Security and Livelihoods***

The majority of the displaced populace within Darfur are entirely dependant upon direct food aid for sustenance. This situation is expected to worsen in 2007 as agricultural harvests suffer from the protracted conflict and heightened insecurity, and coping mechanisms are exhausted.

In 2006, humanitarian activities within the sector were focused on the provision of immediate needs. A monthly average of 2.5 million people in Darfur received direct food aid, as well as agricultural and veterinary support services. According to preliminary findings from the 2006 Darfur Emergency Food Security and Nutrition Assessment (EFSNA), 70% of the conflict-affected population is food insecure, and unable to meet its food requirements without external assistance. The massive flow of humanitarian assistance to Darfur in 2006 has only managed to contain the food security situation from deteriorating further. With the Global Acute Malnutrition at 13.1 %, only slightly below the 15% GAM emergency threshold, the situation remains precarious and without continued assistance could contribute to increased malnutrition and excess mortality.

Should the current political and socio-economic situation persist, the vulnerability of the population to food insecurity is expected to remain high. It is also envisaged that the slow implementation of the DPA will continue to restrict free circulation, both of goods and people. Given that the security situation persists, preparations will also have to be made to minimise the risk of a further deterioration in food security. Thus in 2007, the sector intends to maintain its level of humanitarian assistance; both in terms of direct food provision and emergency agricultural support. Emphasis will be placed on honing the accuracy of the targeting of beneficiaries.

Due to insecurity, harvest yields are expected to be low, necessitating immediate agricultural intervention, aimed at those host communities and IDPs with access to agricultural land. Rural livelihoods will be supported via the provision of immediate agricultural inputs, and seasonal food support, particularly during the peak of the hunger season when 'seed protection rations' may be required. Support in the maintenance of the remaining livestock will be provided in the form of vaccination campaigns, provision of fodder and supplementary feed; and the provision of veterinary drugs and equipment.

### **Health and Nutrition**

The presence of large concentrations of IDPs in Darfur creates health and nutritional problems both within the IDP and host communities. Given the current security situation, the existence of static enclaves of IDPs is expected to persist and may increase during 2007. As such the modalities of health service delivery need to be adjusted to meet the evolving needs of the situation; and a higher degree of cross-border coordination will be required to address the problems inherent in the mobility of the population along the Sudan/Chad border. At the same time, heightened insecurity and diminished funding is undermining the sector's ability to deliver adequate health assistance.

In general terms, the high demand for health services, coupled with the steep drop in available resources and funding, has resulted in a growing gap between the beneficiary expectations and the level of service provision. This gap is expected to widen in 2007, due to the limitations of access, and the general erosion of coping mechanisms.

Based on the data derived from a number of field assessments carried out in 2006, the sector's plans are directed towards ensuring that existing coverage is maintained, minimum living standards ensured; and that all emerging gaps are addressed in a timely manner. Plans also incorporate the need to build the capacity of the local community, so as to enable them to maintain a basic level of care, even in the absence of international staff. Emphasis will be placed on the provision of preventative measures such as, basic immunisation packages for under-five children, the integration of the existing reproductive health services into the primary health care system; the provision of essential drugs to primary health care infrastructures; and the maintenance of, and expansion of emergency warning and response systems (EWARS). Timely intervention and control will also be exercised in the incidence of the outbreak of epidemics.

Darfur remains one of the regions of Sudan with high maternal mortality rates and poor access to emergency obstetric care, which sometimes results in fistula and other causes of maternal morbidity. Restrictions to travel as a result of insecurity put women at further risk. As a result, operational agencies in partnership with the State Ministry of Health and NGOs are strengthening reproductive health services. This includes establishing antenatal care units in IDP camps and providing emergency supplies and training to health facilities in conflict affected areas. Reproductive health kits have been distributed. These include emergency supplies to ensure clean delivery for pregnant women as well as post-rape treatment. Some of these kits also include drugs, surgical instruments, consumable supplies and laboratory testing kits that are vital for increasing capacity of hospitals to manage safe blood transfusions and obstetric complications.

A similar situation exists with regard to nutrition, where high levels of Global Acute Malnutrition (GAM) exist: the GAM rate was recorded at 13.1% for greater Darfur; while the Severe Acute Malnutrition (SAM) rate is estimated to stand at 2.0% (EFSNA, 2006). GAM rates do, however, differ from one state to another as well as within states as evidenced by the fact that the situation prevailing in West and South Darfur is substantially better than that which prevails in North Darfur.

The strategy for 2007, therefore, will focus on the continued provision of humanitarian assistance, with increasing emphasis placed on the investigation of the underlying causes of malnutrition. Specific activities will include: the treatment of acute malnutrition in vulnerable

groups (under-five children, pregnant and lactating women, and the elderly); the provision of nutritional surveillance and appropriate response mechanisms; the prevention of micronutrient deficiency; the integration of maternal and child nutritional activities into the health system; and the general continuance of capacity building with the Ministry of Health.

### ***Non-food Items and Emergency Shelter***

Escalating population displacement, coupled with a worsening security situation is expected to impact upon the coping mechanisms of both the IDPs and the other vulnerable members of the community in Darfur. Thus the distribution of NFIs and emergency shelter materials will be critical to the maintenance of basic living conditions, health and morale.

Current plans include the provision of assistance to 250,000 households; the strengthening of assessment, monitoring and evaluation capacity; the standardisation of distribution modalities; the maintenance of common logistics services; and the provision for emergency response stocks.

The sector also aims to broaden the network of participating NGOs and partners and foster or strengthen increasing numbers of local partnerships. Finally the sector aims to improve the quality of assistance through a greater programmatic engagement between the partners to standardise the level of service delivery.

### ***Protection and Human Rights***

The civilian population of Darfur continues to experience massive violation of their human rights, mostly by armed aggressors, but the situation is further compounded by the apparent inability of the State to provide adequate protection for its civilians. Key protection challenges include the continued attacks upon, and occupation of, rural villages, which inevitably result in death, injury and displacement; widespread sexual and gender based violence (SGBV); the continued presence of armed groups in the IDP camps; and the increasing militarization and politicisation of vulnerable displaced populations. Despite important policy gains made in 2005 and the establishment of state committees and advisors to the Wali/Governor on SGBV, obstacles continue to hinder reporting of SGBV cases and prosecution of perpetrators. Security incidents in and around the IDP camps in Darfur are, and will continue to be, of serious concern, while trauma and adverse psychosocial effects mount. Efforts have been made to provide recreational and sports activities to improve the psychosocial well-being of over 150,000 children. Recruitment and re-recruitment of children by the armed forces and/or other groups continues, as does the exposure of the region's children to increasing levels of sexual and gender-based violence.

There has been a marked deterioration in the degree of humanitarian access, which is characterised by an increase in physical attacks on humanitarian staff, hijackings, lootings and attempted ambushes of vehicles carrying supplies. Given that this trend may be expected to continue in 2007, the ability of the humanitarian actors to protect Darfur's population will be increasingly hampered.

### ***Water and Sanitation***

The region's IDPs and host communities continue to suffer from inadequate access to water and environmental sanitation, particularly in non-government and inaccessible areas, despite the best efforts of the UN and Partners who have, over the past two years, made considerable advances in the provision of basic services. It is estimated that 66.7%, 76.8% and 76.3% of IDPs and host communities in North, West and South Darfur States respectively have access to safe water services, while the access to safe sanitation facilities is 60.9%, 59.2% and 60.5% respectively. Planning for the delivery of increased services is, however, complicated by the unpredictability of the security situation, and the resultant sudden

movement of IDPs, which can cause emergency situations that rapidly deplete resources; human and financial.

During 2006, rising levels of regional insecurity severely hampered the sector's efforts to reach its targets, whilst the programmes were also adversely affected by the withdrawal and/or scaling down of NGO operations, thus placing the sector under further pressure.

In 2007, the key focus of Sector partners will be on maintaining current levels of services in existing IDP locations with the assistance of local communities, as well as extending services to new IDP populations. Rural communities will also be given attention by rehabilitating existing facilities and providing services to encourage returns and assist un-served populations.

IDPs will be encouraged and motivated to take direct responsibility, where technically possible, for all water and sanitation facilities including site selection, construction, maintenance, operation and monitoring. Local capacity building will be focused on facilitating a quick, effective and smooth transfer of responsibility of the Water and Sanitation systems' management to communities. Hygiene promotion targeting behaviour change will be another major focus for 2007, with special emphasis placed on messages related to hand washing, safe water handling and environmental sanitation.

Another sector challenge in 2007 will be the sustainable management of water resources, particularly around large camps where water levels may be affected by the increased demand for water. Finding adequate space to construct new latrines or upgrade the present level of technology to maintain existing latrines through de-sludging (removing pit contents) will remain another challenge. The current Water and Sanitation Sector partners can not adequately cover the different state requirements and thus, additional partners are necessary.
