TEACHING WITH THE GREATEST CANADIAN

Whether you teach math, social science, language arts or all three, THE GREATEST CANADIAN can be integrated into various subjects. In addition to the worksheets, here are just a few ideas to get you thinking about how you can bring **The Greatest Canadian** into your classroom:

Geography – Where do the Greatest Canadians come from? What role did their hometown, province or territory play in their lives? How might their regional origins have affected their upbringing? What impact did they have on various parts of Canada? The world?

History/Social Studies - When were they born? During what time period did they live their lives? What events shaped them? What impact did they have on Canadian, local and world history?

Language Arts – What did they write? How can we express our thoughts and ideas or feelings about greatness in a Canadian context? Consider having your students use role-play, poetry, narrative, essays, media reports to discuss and debate various themes including leadership, heroism, Canadian values and greatness.

ESL - Some teachers have already found that the debate is a wonderful tool to stimulate discussion among the newest of Canadians. What a superb vehicle to help new Canadians find out more about their new country, its history, geography and values! Consider what fresh perspective Canada's newest citizens bring to this discussion. Ask them to compare and contrast great people from their birth country with Great Canadians.

Science/Math - Many of the Great Canadians may have interests and experience in this field. This would be an excellent opportunity to show how Canadian discoveries in math and science contribute to our country and the world.

Physical Education – Some of the Greatest Canadians may be athletes. All of them offer practical insight into themes of leadership, perseverance and challenge that are central in this subject area. The study of their sports and careers is a close fit with physical education programming.

Art - Are some candidates for the title of Greatest Canadian artists? If not, why might artists not be represented? Do they have other professions but also express themselves through paintings, photography or sculpture? Consider having students study Great Canadian art or create their own masterpieces.

Special Education – The contest nature of the series will be appealing to students of varying abilities. What is essential here is that all students can declare their personal views and join in the debate.

Second Language Studies - Teaching materials and much of the series website are available in French at www.cbc.ca/grandscanadiens/enseignants. While the series will be presented in English only, the discussion and analysis can take place in any language. Students and teachers might role-play some of the nominees and have the rest of the class pose questions or make statements.



WHAT DOES IT MEAN TO BE A GREAT CANADIAN? OPENING QUESTIONS FOR DISCUSSION

- The Oxford Canadian Dictionary defines great (in reference to persons) as "remarkable in ability, character, achievement, etc." Is this definition specific enough to help identify a Greatest Canadian? What do your students identify as the characteristics of greatness?
- Can a great Canadian be measured by the same standards as a great American or great Briton?
 Is greatness harder for Canadians? Consider the following statement from author Charles Taylor:
 "More than most peoples, Canadians are prejudiced in favour of the ordinary: it is a function of our history, our climate and our geography. In a harsh land, we still honour all those pioneering virtues which impose restraint and engender mediocrity."
- Is a legacy a critical component of greatness? Do we need the perspective of history to assess the ultimate greatness of an individual? Can we fairly compare the impact of a living Canadian to that of an historical figure?








GREAT CANADIAN REPORTING

After completing some brief research, and perhaps reviewing some Great Canadians profiles available on www.cbc.ca/greatest, write a short news story (consider even a TV or radio script!) about an event in their lives. You may wish to complete this exercise with a peer or a small group. When you have written and reviewed your work, perform it for your class and/or family. Perhaps even record it and create your own classroom broadcast!

GREAT CANADIAN DEBATE

On November 29, 2004, Canadians will have decided who they feel should claim the title of The Greatest Canadian. Whoever is chosen, it is unlikely that the choice will be unanimous. Canadians may well be discussing the results for some time after this exciting event. Organize a debate in your class. Prepare brief arguments for or against the person selected as The Greatest Canadian. After developing your arguments, divide into two sides to discuss and debate the final winner. Remember that, in the end, the debate about what makes someone great may be more important that the actual voting results.

OTHER GREAT ACTIVITIES AND RESOURCES

Poster or Web Page Challenge J/I/S

Students could create posters or web pages promoting their favourite Great Canadian or perhaps simply highlighting the Top Ten. Posters could be mounted in a display in the LRC or other public display area.

Editorials/Letters to the Editor/Columnists I/S

Encourage students to write opinion columns, editorials or letters-to-the-editor in support of their Greatest Canadian. Or have them write responses to the selection of the Top Ten Greatest Canadians. Have the results sent to local papers or published in school publications.

Speech Writer I/S

Invite students to prepare speeches that advocate one person as the Greatest Canadian. They may draw their suggestions from the Top 10, the Top 50 or others listed on www.cbc.ca/greatest.

Web Ouest J/I/S

Use our website (www.cbc.ca/greatest) or CBC's Digital Archives (www.cbc.ca/archives) as a launch pad for internet- based research on great Canadians. Other sites include: Dictionary of Canadian Biography (www.biographi.ca); and Memorable Canadians (www.nlc-bnc.ca/8/2).

Greatest Canadian Book Display J/I/S

Showcase books by or about Great Canadians in your library. Have students offer a brief book talk about their favourites. Or start a Greatest Canadian Book Club and post recommended readings in your class.

Greatest Canadian Party J/I/S

Organize a Greatest Canadian party. Students can dress up as Great Canadians. They could make short declarations or be asked to find out about as many other Great Canadians as possible. Consider suitable Canadian food, music, and decorations.
