#### Football in Kyrgyzstan

Football is the most popular sport in Kyrgyzstan, a country that gained independence in 1991. The national association takes part in all FIFA and AFC competitions at senior and youth level. While funds are limited, costs for travel and accommodation for international matches are prohibitively high. It is therefore extremely difficult for the national teams to gain experience, apart from in official competitions.

#### The first Goal Project

A project approved by the Goal Bureau on 13 February 2001, the artificial turf pitch in Bishkek was officially opened in September 2004 during a ceremony attended by the FIFA President and the chairman of the Goal Bureau. The pitch is the first of its kind in the whole country and gives a huge boost to the association, which will be able to use it to compensate for the lack of suitable facilities around the country. While this new pitch is a welcome addition for Kyrgyzstan's national teams, it is also a boon for youth development work, as the most talented footballers in each age category can use the surface for get-togethers. Funds provided by the FIFA Financial Assistance Programme have financed the construction of new headquarters for the association in Bishkek. The modern IT and communications infrastructure simplify the association's day-to-day administrative work. They will also be used to coordinate and supervise projects that are to be introduced around the country, such as youth leagues at different age levels, activities in women's football etc.



#### The second Goal Project

The association's first *Goal* project, involving an artificial turf pitch in Bishkek, was inaugurated in September 2004 and has since been in regular use. On 22 September 2004, the *Goal* Bureau approved a second *Goal* project, this time to renovate a technical centre in Bishkek, lay a natural turf pitch and upgrade the centre's existing artificial turf surface. These new and improved facilities will boost development at all levels. On 4 February 2008, the *Goal* Bureau approved an additional amount for the conclusion of the project.





## Women's football

When, in 1995, today's FIFA President said "The future of football is feminine", it was more than mere lip service. It reflected a strong belief in the huge potential that women's football has to develop. Ever since, FIFA has given targeted support for the efforts of associations who offer women the same opportunities to develop as male players. Launched in 1998, FIFA's Financial Assistance Programme (FAP) introduced a requirement in 2004 for the associations and confederations to invest at least 4% of their FAP funding into women's football. This threshold was increased to 10% in 2005. On top of this commitment, FIFA also promotes the women's game in more general ways by directly financing women's matches and organising competitions and symposiums. Thanks to its development programmes, FIFA is also playing an active role in the training of administrators, coaches, referees and sports doctors.
