Summary

VPN stands for Virtual Private Network and is explained at <http://aset.psu.edu/vpn/resources.html>

Write a Paper with Help

Library locations offer word processing software, CD-RW drives, scanners, and ports for USB devices to format and utilize the resources offered by the Libraries’ databases, collection finding aids, subject pages, and more. Trained staff in the Gateway Commons, located in Pattee Library, first floor, across from the Lending Services desk, offer help to get you started discovering and using online library resources, hardware, and software.

Save and Store with PASS

The Penn State Access Account Storage Space (PASS) is a convenient way to save information from Libraries databases and resources. Anyone with an Access Account has been allocated personal space on this system.

From Libraries’ terminals, use “Save As” and select the path that includes your UserID and the word “pass.” To retrieve files from your PASS space, go to <http://portal.psu.edu>. How to Use The CAT, the online catalog

Search this database for books, databases, newspapers, journals, magazines, videos, DVDs, software, government documents, microforms, children’s materials, and much more available in the Libraries’ collection. The entry will indicate if the item you want is available or checked out. To locate an item, write down the:

- **library name and floor location** shown in The CAT record
- **call number** (e.g., PS3619.E26 L68 2002)
- Or click the “**I Want It**” button to get a book delivered to a more convenient library location or from library locations not at your campus. (Many books arrive in 2 days or less.)

Other Features in The CAT:

- **Activate My Favorites** allows library users to list favorite subjects or authors and receive monthly e-mail notification when related new materials are added to the collection.
- **Course Reserves** permits searches of reserved materials by instructor, course number, and course name.
- **Materials Not at Penn State** provides a link to options for borrowing materials from other institutions and organizations.
- **My Library Account** permits online renewal of materials and provides a list of borrowed library materials, outstanding fees, and more.
- **I Want It** button requests checked out materials or material from other Penn State campuses.

The library annexes are off-site shelving facilities where lesser-used library materials are stored to relieve congestion in the subject libraries at University Park. They also provide a controlled environment to help preserve fragile materials. Collections held at off-site shelving locations are not arranged in order for browsing and are accessible only to staff.

When The CAT indicates that books are shelved in the annex, use the "I Want It" feature in The CAT to request them. (Journal articles or non-circulating items may be requested via your Interlibrary Loan ILLiad account. An electronic copy will be delivered to your ILLiad account whenever possible.)

In general, materials will be delivered to a University Park location within two working days.

- ▶ **Collections:** any materials placed on reserve by University faculty, including textbooks, supplemental readings, research materials, and other study aids

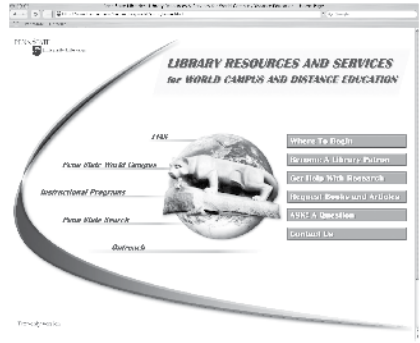

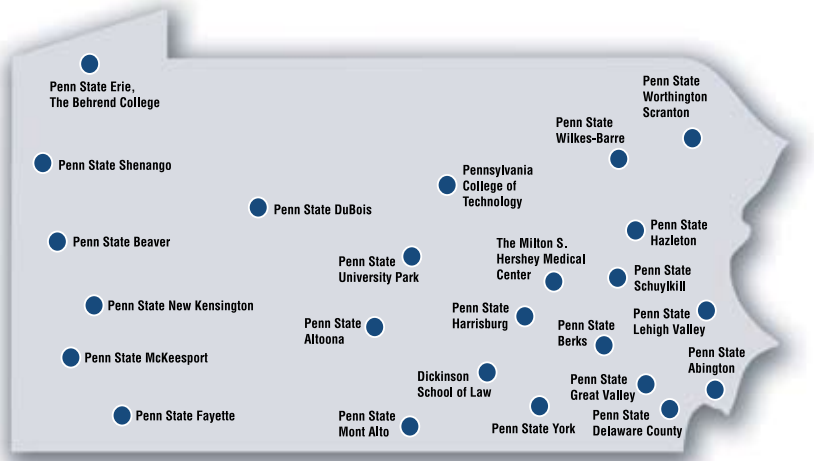

Penn State University Libraries 1859–Present

Penn State's first library collection consisted of about 1,500 volumes in agriculture and the sciences and was housed in Old Main, along with most other college facilities. The nineteenth-century library was considered an auxiliary to study and by 1888 was open six hours a day. By the turn of the century, the library had grown to nearly 20,000 volumes. The overcrowding finally was relieved by construction of the Carnegie Library, a gift of steel magnate and college trustee Andrew Carnegie.

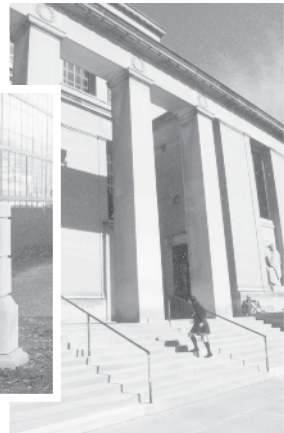
The library moved to what is now the Carnegie Building in 1904. The 50,000-volume-capacity building had the beginnings of some special collections, including government documents and the Penn State University Archives. Departmental libraries in a number of the sciences also had been established by this time, and some continue today as our branch libraries. The collection eventually outgrew the building, which by 1940 contained three times as many volumes as the number for which the building was designed.

A new main building, now Pattee Library, was constructed as part of a multibuilding Public Works Administration-General State Authority project in the 1937–40 period. Over the next three decades, three major additions were added to Pattee—the 1953 Stack Building, the 1966 West Pattee, and the 1972 East Pattee.

Construction began on the Paterno Library in spring 1997 and was completed September 2000. Combined with Pattee Library, it provides more than 490,000 square feet of library space at University Park for the University Libraries' growing collection of more than 5 million volumes serving more than 80,000 students across the state.

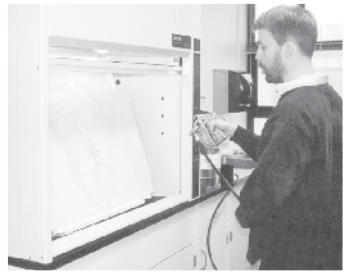

You Can Help Protect Libraries Resources

Each year in the University Libraries, the loss of books and periodicals from theft and mutilation seriously undermines free access to library materials. Damaged and stolen materials are expensive to replace and ultimately cost us all. Loss of irreplaceable items results in permanent collection damage, and users experience extreme frustration when needed materials are lost or damaged. Despite the availability of photocopiers throughout the Libraries, a generous loan period, and punishment for violators, loss and damage persist. You can help protect library materials by reporting to Libraries staff any actions that could threaten our collections.



Preservation is important to collection maintenance.

You Can Help Preserve Books

The University Libraries' resources belong to all users, present and future, and it is up to everyone to use the collections with care. You can help the Libraries' preservation efforts by observing the following:

- Handle books gently, especially if the paper is yellow and brittle or if the binding is weak.
- **Do not write or underline in library books.**
- Do not cut or remove pages or portions of pages from library materials.
- Do not fold pages, use paper clips, or insert bulky materials inside books.
- Gently remove all self-stick removable notes before returning.
- Do not eat or drink while using library materials—spills can stain or damage items; crumbs attract insects that eat book paper, covers, and glue.
- Do not attempt to repair library materials yourself. Bring the damaged material to any service desk.
- Carefully remove books from shelves by grasping the volume at the middle of the spine. Avoid pulling a book from the shelf by the top edge of the spine.
- When photocopying, avoid forcing the volume flat—pressing too strenuously on the spine of the book can break the binding.
- At home, keep library materials safe. Avoid placing books in sunlight—do not leave them on radiators or windowsills. Protect books from rain and snow. Refrain from using library materials while eating or bathing. Keep books out of reach of pets.

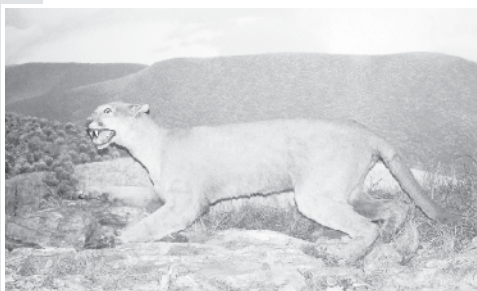

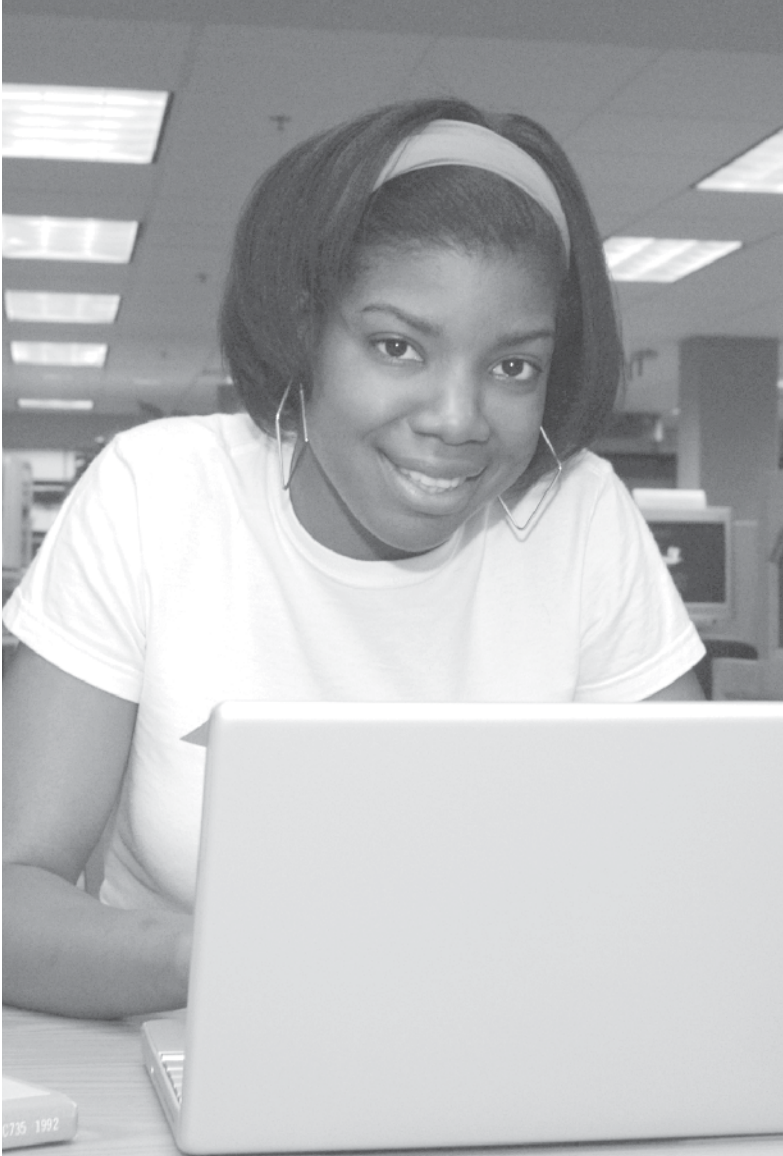

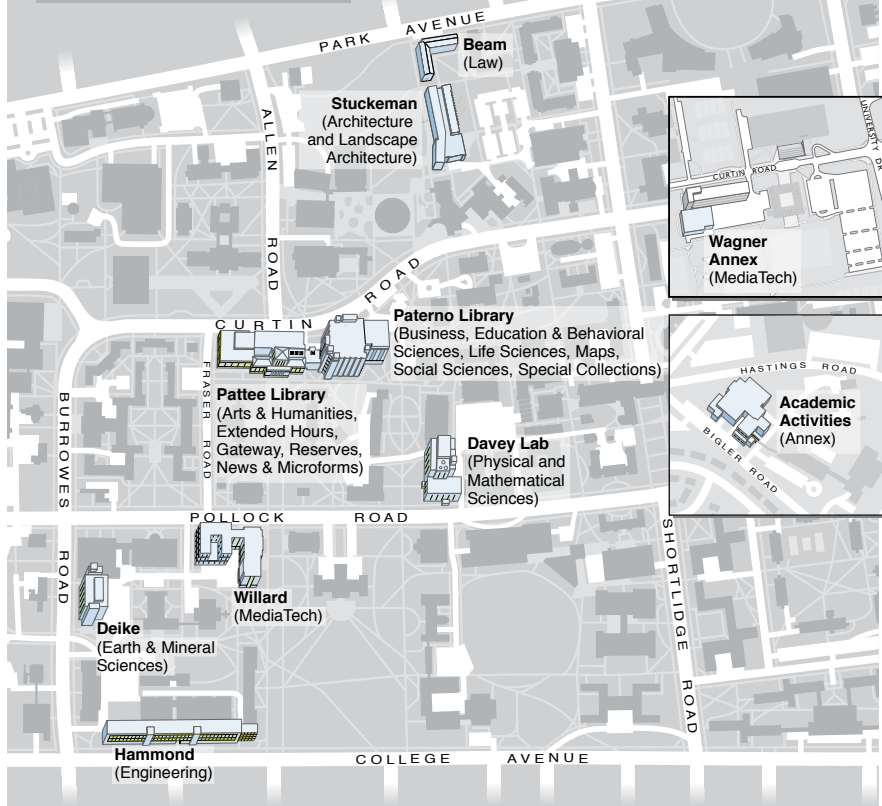
