

Diefenbaker Elementary School JK - Grade 5

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School Address

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OUR SCHOOL

Built on the site of the original Plains Road School (circa 1891) and named for Canada's 13th Prime Minister who attended from 1900 to 1903, Diefenbaker Elementary School is a Junior Kindergarten to Grade 5 school in a quiet residential neighbourhood of primarily single family dwellings. Our population is currently approaching 400 students. This September we added the grade 5 component to our Extended French program, which begins at grade 4. The extended French program is comprised of a blend of students from Diefenbaker and several nearby schools. We continue to have one JK/SK class located at the Centennial Child Care Centre at Mortimer and Coxwell.

School Focus For This School Year

The teachers at Diefenbaker implement all aspects of The Ontario Curriculum, with a particular focus on the new Curriculum for Language, Social Studies and Mathematics. Teachers are working to implement programs that address the expectations of the curriculum and the needs of each individual child. Staff attend many curriculum implementation workshops and in-services at all grade levels.

In late October, the Computer Migration Technolgy Initiative was implemented. We have acquired a total of 42 new computers connected to the TDSB's Wide Area Network. There are 14 computers in the library and each class has at least 2 networked computers. These computers enable our students to make full use of Information Technology to enhance their learning.

We have significantly expanded the range of activities offered through our Physical Education and co-curricular programs over the past year. With the support of our Home and School, much new gym equipment has been purchased and our teachers use this equipment during Daily Physical Activities.

Other programming components that meet the needs of our students include:

- ongoing interaction with community resources such as our local public library, Science Centre, Toronto Urban Studies Centre and community parks and recreation facilities
- International Languages and After Four programs
- programs to build self-esteem, social skills, anti-bullying and conflict resolution strategies such as Second Step, Roots of Empathy, Intergenerational Teaching-Learning Community and Peace by Peace
- Interschool Athletics, Houseleague Games and Activities, Adopt-an-Athlete, Folkfest, Winter and Spring concerts, Primary and Junior choirs, Orff and recorder
- Diefenbaker primary students sharing activities with E.Y.C.I. and Cosburn students as partners, i.e. dramatic arts and literacy activities and school visits

anc rograms Information about the success of our programs comes from a wide variety of student assessments. These assessments are based on clear expectations for all learners, consistent with those described in *The Ontario Curriculum*. The primary purpose of student assessment is to improve learning. Assessment has the greatest potential to improve learning when it is an integral part of classroom activities. Teachers assess student progress towards achieving the expectations on an ongoing basis by using strategies such as projects, class presentations, homework assignments, classroom observations, portfolios of student work, and tests.

Schools use assessment information and information from other sources to make informed decisions for school improvement planning. Schools identify areas of strength as well as areas that require improvement. Input is obtained from a variety of sources such as student assessments, teacher feedback, parent feedback, and community surveys. In this way, schools monitor, celebrate and improve their efforts in providing a supportive and challenging learning environment for all their students.

WHAT OUR SCHOOL IS PLANNING FOR THIS YEAR

At Diefenbaker School we are continuing to extend our school-wide initiatives in language and mathematics and to enhance our resources. We are also continuing to build resources to support the Ontario Social Studies curriculum, the Science and Technology curriculum, Visual Arts, Music and Physical Education.

Literacy

The pursuit of excellence in reading and writing remains an ongoing focus at our school. We are continuing to implement the following in support of our literacy program:

- continuing to use First Steps Program: reading and writing
- involving parents in the language program by sharing student work at parent-teacher conferences
- providing external supports to reading and writing through Reading Buddies, pen pals and other authentic written language experiences
- expanding the scope of the library program to include use of the multi-media computers
- encouraging parents to read at home with their children, as part of our Borrow a Book program in the primary division
- developing computer literacy in the classroom and in the computer lab for word processing and developing research and communication skills
- implementing Developmental Reading Assessment program (Gr. 1-3) & CASI Reading Assessment(Gr. 4 - 5)
- building sets of novel studies at each grade
- building literacy skills based on author/illustrator workshops (JK-Gr.5)
- beginning to set up a Literacy Resource section in the Library for classroom teachers to use
- building a collection of media literacy resources
- expanding our Literacy Place collection to support Primary Literacy
- participating in an Action Research Program for Primary writing

Mathematics

Our staff is developing the following strategies to augment our students' learning opportunities in mathematics:

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- ensuring that students are learning each of the strands of the revised Ontario Mathematics Curriculum with a focus on problem solving throughout the strands
- collaborating with the School Council in the development of a bank of ideas on linking mathematics learned at school with home activities
- building and refining our instructional strategies in the teaching of mathematics by participating in staff development workshops and in-services
- upgrading the mathematics texts from grades 1 to 5 and manipulatives for use in all classrooms
- establishing a mathematics resource room

Science and Technology and Social Studies

We continue to focus on Science and Technology and Social Studies by upgrading our resources to support the new curriculum and by professional development.

Highlights include:

- enhancing kits to support the Ontario Science and Technology and Social Studies curriculum
- working with community volunteers on hands-on technology projects, Scientists in the School and University of Toronto Science Outreach Program
- hosting special assemblies (Remembrance Day, Heritage Day) which focus on curriculum areas including media literacy
- focusing on professional development and upgrading our resource materials to support The Ontario Curriculum
