

Great Cities Need Great Libraries



We link people in the city and beyond with the transforming power of knowledge.

In her 1933 annual report, Minneapolis Public Library (MPL) Director Gratia Countryman wrote with discouragement about the "toboggan slide downward" taken by the Library:

"(w)ith shorter hours just when people needed longer hours, with few new books when people wanted to study and needed up-to-date books and periodicals, with fewer assistants when new patrons, unaccustomed to books, were crowding our reading rooms and needed personal assistance...."

Seventy-one years later, the Minneapolis Public Library faced its worst budget challenges since the Great Depression. Minneapolis residents started 2004 with fewer open library hours per capita than residents anywhere else in the metropolitan area. Patrons and coworkers said goodbye to Library staff who were laid off in numbers similar to the layoffs in the 1930s. The percentage of the budget for books, computers, and electronic and print materials hit an unacceptable low in a city named two years in a row, *America's Most Literate City*.¹

The financial challenge comes at a time when, like libraries everywhere, MPL faces transformation as the digital age changes everything about how we do what we do, yet only underscores our essential purpose and role in building a learning community.

In order to guide the Library through challenges both painful and exciting, the Library Trustees adopted, in early 2004, a new strategic

direction focused on achieving four key results: responsive public service of the highest quality; libraries as vital centers in neighborhoods and community; improved literacy among all patrons; and sound stewardship of resources. Library staff worked hard to find more efficient ways to operate in order to devote as much attention as possible to public service. While library services were hit hard by the substantial cut in hours, our libraries were busier than ever.

Our libraries continued to be centers of activity for patrons, local clubs, area business meetings, and neighborhood activities, thanks in part to the active support of community organizations like the Friends of Franklin and the Bancroft and Nokomis East neighborhood associations. We found different ways to strengthen our commitment to promoting literacy, including early literacy, along with our partners: the public schools, Head Start, Hennepin County Library, health clinics, and others.

Great Libraries for Minneapolis, our ten-year, \$166 million dollar capital improvement program for all

Minneapolis Public Libraries, continued as the new Central Library rose up in downtown Minneapolis, Sumner and Franklin Libraries prepared to reopen, and community members participated in the design for the renovation of East Lake and North Regional. The Friends of the Minneapolis Public Library

made impressive gains in the capital campaign for the new Central Library in addition to raising funds to continue important Library programs that would otherwise have been cut.

In 1933, Gratia Countryman was concerned that the library had been "nearly wrecked." But as we know, the Minneapolis Public Library survived and flourished in subsequent decades. Just as 70 years ago, the Library Board and staff, with the committed support of the Friends, are dedicated to delivering a great library to a great city.



The Language of the People

Our unique *Library Links!* program serves to "translate the library into the language of the people." The program maintained excellent service to immigrant families and expanded its role within the library and the community. Our bilingual outreach liaisons are leading advocates and experts in Somali, Spanish, and Hmong languages and cultures.

Articles in the *Star Tribune*, *Christian Science Monitor*, *Hmong Times*, *Insight News*, *North News*, and *La Prensa* and a segment on Somali TV, helped get the word out about the library and *Library Links!* We collaborated with PICA Head Start to inform parents about using the library and presented bilingual storytimes. We reached out to public schools on Family Literacy Nights and at other parents' meetings at 17 different schools. *Library Links!* was featured at a national meeting organized by the federal Department of Citizenship on innovative library programs across the country.

Our Valued Service To Youth

Libraries Plus YOU! allows truant students to complete their court-ordered community service at the library. A collaborative effort between MPL, Hennepin County Library, and Hennepin County Courts, the program successfully connects

truant students with their community and introduces them to the library as a safe place to explore their interests.

Books for Babies, a nationwide literacy initiative of Friends of Libraries U.S.A. and Verizon, allowed MPL to distribute 4,000 care packages to new mothers at Hennepin County Medical Center with books, reading tips, and library card applications.

Read to Me trains and dispatches volunteers to reach children in crisis with the positive value of books. MPL staff also provided *Read to Me* training to more than 100 parents and child care providers to educate and inspire them to provide crucial early literacy experiences for children.

MPL's annual *Summer Reading Program* is vital in helping city children to increase their literacy skills, develop a habit of library use, and discover the joy of reading.

During the 2004 Summer Reading Program, funded through

The Friends of MPL, nearly 100,000 books were read by (or read to) the nearly 10,000 children who participated and 68% of the participants reached their self-set reading goal for the summer.

MPL's exemplary Homework Helper program was awarded a federal grant to assess and set goals for the program, which annually receives more than 10,000 student visits.



Open houses for teachers at each library in October introduced school staff to the many ways MPL supports student success.



Technology Enhances Efficiency & Service

Technology that improves service and facilitates self-help is key to our strategic effort to streamline processes and redirect staff to other critical aspects of library operations. For example, the addition of self-service checkout units encourages patron self-service without sacrificing the quality. Staff evaluated self-check systems in 2004, proceeded with installations at Central, Washburn, East Lake, Northeast, and Nokomis, and planned for expansion to all libraries in 2005. We also implemented patron pick-up of holds and greatly streamlined the internal process for identifying and labeling books for patron pickup.

Our new pay-per-print system went into effect in March, providing an efficient way for library users to print from public computers and helping the library recover the cost of printer supplies. After careful consideration by staff and the Library Board, we installed Internet filters on public computers and put in place mechanisms for adult patrons to obtain unfiltered access and to request blocking or unblocking of specific sites.

We also introduced several enhancements to the online catalog, making it easier to use and adding new features such as book covers, summaries, reviews, and more. Another enhancement to our automated system allowed us to begin sending courtesy reminders of upcoming materials due dates to patrons via email.

"Ask a Librarian" web-based reference service became available to MPL cardholders mid-year. Staffed jointly by MPL, Hennepin County Library, and Tutor.com, the service provides 24/7 online access to reference librarians.

InfoLine, our quick telephone reference service, celebrated its tenth anniversary of providing answers to well over a thousand questions a week. The Internet has not diminished the demand for this service; in fact, the sheer volume of information and the varied quality of websites often lead people to seek quick info from the library over the phone.



INFORM, MPL's fee-based research service, set a record for providing custom research and document delivery to

businesses, organizations, and individuals in Minnesota and around the country. This service extends the library's scope and reach and enhances its reputation as a provider of high-quality, sophisticated information services.

Exciting New Venture: Community Partnerships & Development

In our continuing efforts to build strong community partnerships, ensure quality improvements are made to all 14 community libraries, and communicate effectively the extensive information and services offered

by MPL, the Community Partnerships and Development Division was formed in June, 2004. Working to build strong, vibrant, strategic partnerships to offer programs and services that address community needs, the community partnerships team focuses on three key areas: Neighborhood Initiatives, Arts and Business Initiatives, and Youth and Family Initiatives.

In conjunction with the Friends of MPL, partnership staff secured in excess of \$70,000 in programming funds in 2004, and new partnerships and collaborations were formed with other public sector organizations; business and arts organizations; and the private sector.

Our Community Libraries Capital Projects staff continued work to improve all community libraries with referendum dollars, private funds, and other grants by 2010. In 2004 construction was completed at historic Sumner Library, readied for a January 8, 2005 grand opening. Work proceeded at historic Franklin, planned to open in spring 2005. To date, all community library projects have been completed on time and within budget.

The Community Partnerships and Development Division also includes a new Communications Department

charged with designing and directing a communications and marketing program to enhance awareness of, and access to, MPL resources. A major redesign of the MPL website was a top priority, planned for a March 2005 launch (www.mplib.org).
