Her early career moved from serving students as an advisor, mentor, and teacher to include more administrative responsibilities, initially at the University of Texas at Austin.

Holding B.A. and Ph.D. degrees in Microbiology from the University of Texas at Austin, Reinarz has utilized her disciplinary training and science teaching background in situations that involve the construction or revitalization of effective academic advising units. Her work with undergraduates, inside and outside the classroom, has included varied teaching and mentoring experiences. Alice was a recipient of the 1990 Carski Foundation Outstanding Teaching Award from the American Society for Microbiology.
