- 1946: Steamboat Inspection Service (1838) added
- 1967: CG transferred to Department of Transportation
- 2003: CG transferred to Department of Homeland Security

Key Messages

FY 07 Budget

President Bush requested \$8.42B for the Coast Guard to:

- **Strengthen Preparedness:** The budget provides the tools, training and technology that the men and women of the Coast Guard need to be ready to carry out their missions on a daily basis, as well as the capabilities to respond to national incidents.
- Maximize Awareness: Greater awareness of people, vessels and cargo in the maritime domain will help identify threats before they reach our vital ports, waterways and coastline, and aid in risk-based decision making.
- Enhanced Capabilities: Enhancing Coast Guard capabilities is vital to controlling our maritime border and preserving our multimission responsiveness. The budget addresses this need for enhancing responsiveness through the Deepwater, Rescue 21, and Response Boat-Medium programs.

Maritime Homeland Security Strategy

As the principal federal agency for maritime border security, the Coast Guard has continued in its role to guarantee a safe and secure maritime domain. Guided by the President's *National Strategy for Maritime Security* and the Department of Homeland Security's Six-Point Agenda, the Coast Guard incorporates the strategies of international cooperation, domain awareness, security-focused commercial practices, deployment of layered security, and ensuring the continuity of the Marine Transportation System. The Coast Guard fulfills its responsibilities by providing personnel with the necessary tools and training for missions assigned, and ensuring the effective and sustained presence of its fleets of Coast Guard cutters, aircraft and boats.

The Integrated Deepwater System

The Integrated Deepwater System program remains at the forefront of a more ready, aware and responsive 21st century Coast Guard. The 2007 Budget provides for the construction of a third National Security Cutter and an additional Maritime Patrol Aircraft. Also included are equipment to outfit a second CASA CN-235 Air Station, the development of manned and unmanned aircraft programs and Deepwater's systems for integrated logistics and support, and command, control, communications, computers, intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance (C4ISR).

The Deepwater Program is beginning to make a difference now. During Hurricane Katrina, C4ISR improvements to high and medium endurance cutters enabled more on-scene communication and coordination of rescue operations along the Gulf. Three more-powerful HH-65C helicopters rescued 305 people combined.

Rescue 21

Rescue 21 is an advanced command, control, and communications system that will improve the ability of the Coast Guard to assist mariners in distress and save lives. Harnessing global positioning and cutting-edge communications technology, Rescue 21 enables the Coast Guard to respond faster to calls from mariners in distress and improve coordination with federal, state, and local agencies.

National Fleet Policy

In March 2006, the Navy and Coast Guard jointly approved a revised Navy-Coast Guard National Fleet policy statement. The statement is aimed at strengthening Navy-Coast Guard cooperation and integrating each command's multimission platforms, infrastructure and personnel, in direct support of the President's *National Strategy for Maritime Security*. While each remains a separate service, the Coast Guard and Navy will continue to plan, acquire and maintain forces that support and complement each service's roles and missions, making each more capable of supporting the broad spectrum of U.S. national security requirements.
