NC Races Tighten

Raleigh, N.C. – The races for President and Senate in North Carolina have tightened over the last week, although the Democratic candidates maintain the lead for both.

Barack Obama leads John McCain 49-48. The movement over the last week has come pretty much exclusively with white voters, as McCain has increased his lead with them from 55-39 to 60-36. McCain may now be pulling in the votes of more conservative Democrats in the state. He's earning 19% of the Democratic vote now compared to 14% a week ago.

Obama is still clinging to the lead by virtue of his continued advantage with independents. He has a 51-39 lead with them. Obama also has a lot of votes banked. He is up 63-36 with those who reported already voting.

"It was inevitable that North Carolina would tighten up as the McCain campaign invested more time and monetary resources here," said Dean Debnam, President of Public Policy Polling. "The Republicans may be able to pull it out here, but the questions becomes whether that's a Pyrrhic victory if the effort necessary to win here makes it impossible for McCain to win Virginia or Colorado."

In the US Senate race, Kay Hagan leads Elizabeth Dole for the eighth consecutive PPP poll. This week the margin is 48-45, with Libertarian Christopher Cole continuing to pull a respectable 4% of the vote. Hagan is up 50-32 with independents.


PPP will have new numbers for Governor, select Council of State races, the 8th Congressional District, and Wake County tomorrow.

PPP surveyed 1,038 likely voters on October 25th and 26th. The survey's margin of error is +/-2.8%. Other factors, such as refusal to be interviewed and weighting, may introduce additional error that is more difficult to quantify.
