McCain, Graham lead in South Carolina

Raleigh, N.C. – Barack Obama's candidacy may make South Carolina more competitive than it has been in recent years, but John McCain still has a solid lead in the state, according to the newest survey from Public Policy Polling.

McCain leads Obama 45-39. An additional 5% say they plan to support Libertarian Bob Barr.

Obama is doing well with the groups that fueled his blowout win in the South Carolina Democratic primary. He leads 77-10 with black voters, and 54-32 with voters between the ages of 18 and 29. McCain leads pretty much every other demographic group.

"It would take an exceptional turnout from young voters and black voters, as well as a lot of disaffected conservatives voting for Bob Barr, to make a win in South Carolina possible for Barack Obama," said Dean Debnam, President of Public Policy Polling. "He does seem likely to outperform John Kerry, but a victory in the Palmetto State is still a long shot."

Lindsey Graham appears primed for an easy reelection. If former Myrtle Beach Mayor Mark McBride makes the ballot Graham gets 52% to 21% for Democrat Bob Conley and 10% for McBride. If it's just Graham and Conley, Graham has a 54-32 advantage.

PPP also took a look ahead to the 2010 race for Governor, and found the contest wide open. Henry McMaster ties Democrats Jim Rex and Inez Tenenbaum in possible matches, while Gresham Barrett trails Rex but has a small lead over Tenenbaum.

PPP surveyed 542 likely voters from July 9th-11th. The survey's margin of error is +/-4.2%. Other factors, such as refusal to be interviewed and weighting, may introduce additional error that is more difficult to quantify.
