Solo drivers get turn on HOV lanes

Metro plans to revamp 83 miles of freeway to allow them access, with a fee

Metro officials are moving forward with plans to convert 83 miles of HOV lanes to high-occupancy toll lanes that solo drivers could pay to use.

At its monthly meeting Thursday, the Metropolitan Transit Authority's board of directors will consider converting 83 miles of high-occupancy vehicle lanes along the North, Northwest, Southwest, Eastex and Gulf freeways into so-called HOT lanes.

and two days after his Treasury secretary was informed that the payments were going forward.

Obama aides defended Timothy Geithner's handling of the situation Tuesday, with White House press secretary Robert Gibbs saying the president has "complete confidence" in the Treasury chief.

In a letter to congressional leaders Tuesday night, Geithner said that in addition to pressing the company on compensation issues, the Treasury Department will deduct an amount equal to the total bonuses paid from a pledged \$30 billion commitment to the troubled insurance company.

As Geithner and other Obama aides continued to scramble to pull back the bonuses and calm the public furor they sparked, Congress was preparing its own remedies. In what they acknowledged would be an extraordinary move, leading Demo-Please see AIG, Page A6
