It appears the disease -Bosine Spongiform Encepha-lopathy - was passed in from ground-up carcasses used for Cattle foodstuff.

Shadou Agriculture Minister David Clarke today said: "This is an unknown world. We simply do not know what effects this can have if passed on to hunans."

He sald that ministers should immediately ban the sale of brains and other such products including offal and tripe until cattle were prohounced completely clear of the disease.

But Agriculture Secretary John MacGregor said that there was no cause for alarm.

And Chief Medical Officer Sir Donzid Aitchison sald that there was no evidence that catthe offal or tripe were used in baby food and the letest mores are simply a precaution.
