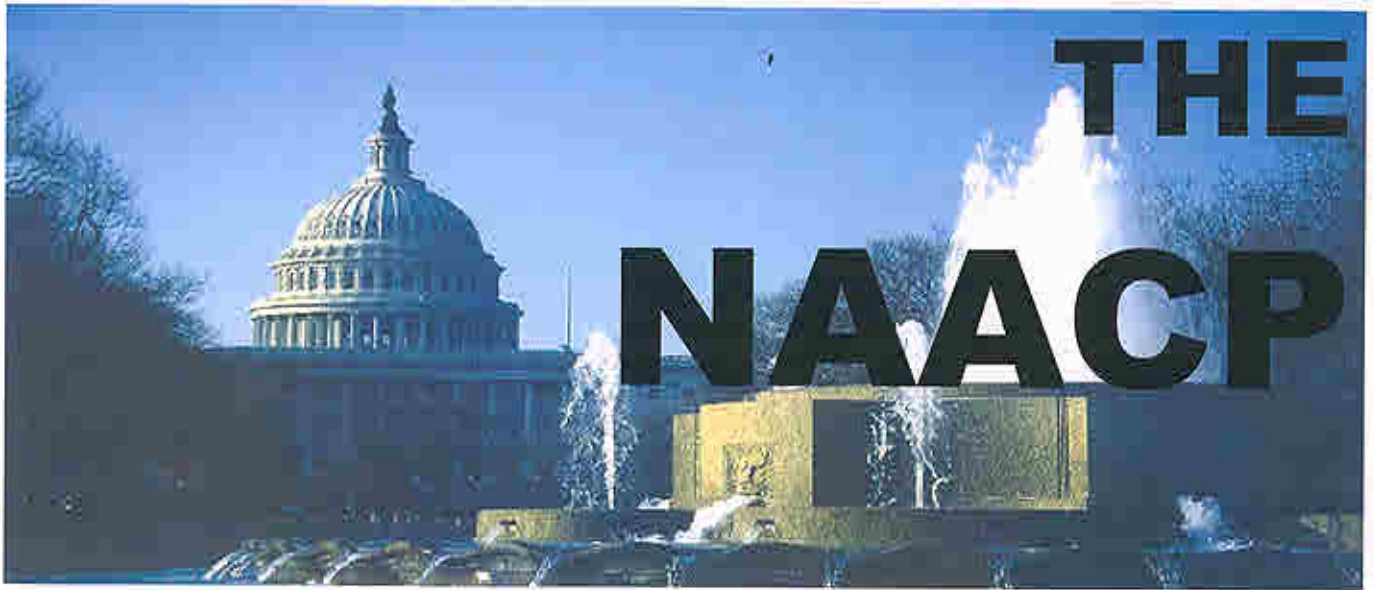




HOW CONGRESS VOTED



THE FEDERAL CIVIL RIGHTS LEGISLATIVE REPORT CARD for THE 110TH CONGRESS (2007 – 2008)

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P R E F A C E

Since 1914, the NAACP Legislative Report Card has served as a presentation of key civil rights votes taken in the United States Senate and the United States House of Representatives. The edition that follows contains votes taken during the 110th Congress, which began January 4, 2007 and ended on January 3, 2009. This Report Card is designed to provide NAACP members with insight into the general voting patterns of their congressional representatives and state delegations over the course of the 110th Congress.

The votes selected for inclusion in the NAACP Report Card are those that have been considered by the full U.S. House of Representatives and U.S. Senate. Legislation that did not progress beyond the committee level is not included. The Report Card is updated and distributed to NAACP members twice each Congress. A Congress is two years long; the NAACP Legislative Report Card is issued at the end of the first year or session as a mid-term assessment, and then at the end of the second year and may be used as a final guide or assessment of the full two-year Congress.

We hope that you will find the enclosed information to be useful in your efforts to educate yourself and other NAACP members about the votes of our elected representatives on legislation of critical importance to the African American community and other friends of civil rights.

VOTE DESCRIPTION

1. MINIMUM WAGE INCREASE

H.R. 2 Fair Minimum Wage Act of 2007 / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #42

Final passage of the bill to increase the federal minimum wage by \$2.10 an hour over two years to \$7.25 an hour.

The legislation passed on February 1, 2007, 94 yeas to 3 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

2. SUPPORT COMMUNITY ORIENTED POLICING

S. Con. Res. 21 Fiscal 2008 Budget Resolution / Biden Amendment / Roll Call Vote #110

Biden (DE) amendment to the budget resolution for fiscal year 2008 which would increase funding for the Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) program by \$1.2 billion.

The Biden amendment passed on March 23, 2007, 65 yeas to 33 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE BIDEN AMENDMENT.

3. REQUIRING A GOVERNMENT-ISSUED PHOTO ID TO VOTE

S. 1348 Comprehensive Immigration Reform Act of 2007 / McConnell Amendment / Roll Call Vote #184

Amendment offered by Senator McConnell (KY) to legislation overhauling the nation's immigration laws that would require voters to present a government-issued photo identification before casting a ballot in any federal election.

The amendment failed on June 5, 2007, 41 yeas to 52 nays.

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE AMENDMENT.

4. MAKING IT EASIER TO FORM A UNION

H.R. 800 Employee Free Choice Act of 2007 / Cloture / Roll Call Vote #227

Motion to invoke cloture (and thus end debate and move forward with consideration of the legislation), on legislation making sure workers have a fair chance to exercise their right to choose a union by making it easier for a union to act as a mediator for workers if the majority of workers have provided authorized signatures indicating that they want the union to act as their representative, and increasing penalties for violations against employees who are trying to organize a union.

Three-fifths of the total Senate, or 60 Senators, are required to support cloture for a bill to move forward: cloture failed (and thus further consideration of the bill was suspended) on June 26, 2007, 51 yeas to 48 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED CLOTURE.

5. INCREASING FEDERAL STUDENT AID FOR NEEDIEST STUDENTS

H.R. 2669 College Cost Reduction Act of 2007 / Kennedy Amendment / Roll Call Vote #255

Amendment offered by Senator Edward Kennedy (MA) to increase the amount authorized for the new "Promise Grant" program, which is intended to provide grants to the neediest Pell Grant recipients, from \$3.2 billion to \$3.7 billion in 2014, \$3.9 billion in 2015, and \$4.2 billion in 2016 and 2017.

The amendment passed on July 19, 2007, 52 yeas to 45 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE AMENDMENT.

6. STUDENT LOAN FORGIVENESS FOR PUBLIC SECTOR WORKERS

H.R. 2669 College Cost Reduction Act of 2007 / Sessions Amendment / Roll Call Vote #257

Amendment offered by Senator Sessions (AL) to strike the language in the bill that would create a new student loan forgiveness program for public sector workers.

The Sessions amendment failed on July 19, 2007, 42 yeas to 55 nays.

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE SESSIONS AMENDMENT.

7. MAKING COLLEGE MORE AFFORDABLE

H.R. 2669 College Cost Reduction Act of 2007 / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #272

Final passage of legislation to cut the government subsidies to student lenders by more than \$18 billion and redirect most of the money to aid for students and college graduates. The bill would raise the maximum Pell grant by \$700 to \$5,100 next year and \$5,400 by 2011, establish new "Promise Grants" for the neediest Pell recipients. It would also provide debt forgiveness for public sector workers and cap student loan repayments at 15% of discretionary income.

The bill passed on July 20, 2007, 78 yeas to 18 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED PASSAGE OF THE LEGISLATION.

8. EXPANDING FAMILY INCOME ELIGIBILITY FOR CHILDRENS HEALTH INSURANCE

H.R. 976 Children's Health Insurance Program Reauthorization Act of 2007 / Bunning Amendment / Roll Call Vote #290

Motion to kill the Bunning (KY) amendment to eliminate an exception in the underlying bill that would allow states to extend coverage under the State Children's Health Insurance Program (S-CHIP) to children whose family incomes exceed 300% of the federal poverty level.

The Bunning amendment failed on August 1, 2007, 53 yeas to 43 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE MOTION TO KILL THE BUNNING AMENDMENT.

9. REAUTHORIZE AND EXPAND THE STATE CHILDREN'S HEALTH INSURANCE PROGRAM (S-CHIP)

H.R. 976 Children's Health Insurance Program Reauthorization Act of 2007 / Final Passage / Roll Call vote #307

Final passage of legislation to reauthorize and expand the State Children's Health Insurance Program (S-CHIP) at \$602 billion for 5 years, expanding it by \$35.2 billion.

The legislation passed on August 2, 2007, 68 yeas to 31 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

10. VOTING RIGHTS FOR THE RESIDENTS OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

S. 1257 District of Columbia House Voting Rights Act of 2007 / Cloture / Roll Call Vote #339

Motion to invoke cloture (and thus end debate and move forward with consideration of the legislation) on legislation giving full voting rights in the US House of Representatives to the people of the District of Columbia. 3/5 (or 60) of the Senate membership is necessary to support cloture for a vote to be successful.

The motion for cloture failed on September 18, 2006, 57 yeas to 42 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE MOTION TO INVOKE CLOTURE.

11. HATE CRIMES PREVENTION

H.R. 1585 Department of Defense Authorization for fiscal year 2008 / Kennedy Amendment / Roll Call Vote #350

Motion to invoke cloture (and thus end debate and move forward with consideration of the amendment), on the Kennedy (MA) amendment which would expand existing hate crime prevention laws and allow the federal government to assist the local authorities in the investigation and prosecution of crimes motivated by hate, regardless of what the victim was doing at the time the crime occurred. It would also expand the definition of a hate crime to include those motivated by the victim's disability, gender or sexual orientation and it would provide money to states to develop hate crime prevention programs.

The motion to invoke cloture was approved on September 27, 2007, 60 yeas to 39 nays, and the Kennedy amendment was subsequently adopted by voice vote.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE MOTION TO INVOKE CLOTURE.

12. SUPPORT FOR THE UNDERGROUND RAILROAD EDUCATIONAL AND CULTURAL PROGRAM

H.R. 3042 Making Appropriations of the Departments of Labor, Health and Human Services and Education for the fiscal year 2008 / Brown Amendment / Roll Call Vote #376

Amendment offered by Senator Brown (OH) to provide \$2 million for the Underground Railroad Educational and Cultural Program. *The Brown Amendment was adopted on October 18, 2007, 81 yeas to 12 nays.*

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE BROWN AMENDMENT.

13. CONFIRMATION OF LESLIE SOUTHWICK TO THE 5TH CIRCUIT COURT OF APPEALS

Leslie Southwick / Confirmation / Roll Call Vote #393

Confirmation of President Bush's nomination of extremist Leslie Southwick of Mississippi to serve as a Judge on the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals, which covers Mississippi, Texas and Louisiana, which has the highest concentration of racial and ethnic minorities in the country.

Leslie Southwick was confirmed on October 24, 2007, 59 yeas to 38 nays.

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE CONFIRMATION.

14. SPENDING BILL FOR THE DEPARTMENTS OF LABOR, HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES AND EDUCATION

H.R. 3043 Making Appropriations for the Departments of Labor, Health and Human Services and Education for Fiscal Year 2008 / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #391

Final passage of legislation to provide funding for the Departments of Labor, Health and Human Service and Education. The Senate version of the bill would have provided \$9.6 billion more than was requested for these agencies by President Bush in his 2008 budget proposal, and \$5.4 billion more than was spent on these programs in 2007.

The legislation passed on October 23, 2007, 75 yeas to 19 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED PASSAGE OF THE LEGISLATION.

15. CONFIRMATION OF MICHAEL B. MUKASEY TO SERVE AS ATTORNEY GENERAL OF THE UNITED STATES

Michael Mukasey / Confirmation / Roll Call Vote #407

Confirmation of President Bush's nomination of Judge Michael B. Mukasey to serve as Attorney General of the United States.

Judge Mukasey was confirmed on November 8, 2007, 53 yeas to 40 nays.

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE CONFIRMATION.

16. FEDERAL BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 2009 / FUNDING FOR THE EEOC

S. Con. Res. 70 / Concurrent Budget Resolution for Fiscal Year 2009 / Alexander amendment / Roll call vote #58

Amendment offered by Senator Alexander (TN) to the budget resolution for fiscal year 2009 which would make a cut of \$670,000 from the overall budget of the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC).

The amendment was agreed to on March 13, 2008, 54 yeas to 44 nays.

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE AMENDMENT.

17. FEDERAL BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 2009 / PUTTING CHILDREN AHEAD OF MILLIONAIRES AND BILLIONAIRES

S. Con. Res. 70 / Concurrent Budget Resolution for Fiscal Year 2009 / Sanders amendment / Roll call vote #64

Amendment to the federal budget for fiscal year 2009 offered by Senator Sanders (VT) to restoring the pre-2001 top income tax rate for people earning over \$1 million and using this revenue for increases in low income energy assistance, special education, Head Start, child care, nutrition, school construction and deficit reduction.

The Sanders amendment was defeated on March 13, 2008, 43 yeas to 55 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE SANDERS AMENDMENT.

18. FEDERAL BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 2009 / PROVIDING HEALTH INSURANCE TO PREGNANT WOMEN

S. Con. Res. 70 / Concurrent Budget Resolution for Fiscal Year 2009 / Boxer amendment / Roll call vote #80

Amendment to the federal budget resolution for fiscal year 2009 offered by Senator Boxer (CA) to allow pregnant women to be eligible for coverage under the State Children's Health Insurance Program (S-CHIP).

The Boxer amendment was agreed to on March 13, 2008, 70 yeas to 27 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE BOXER AMENDMENT.

19. FEDERAL BUDGET FOR FISCAL YEAR 2009 / INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS SPENDING

S. Con. Res. 70 / Concurrent Budget Resolution for Fiscal Year 2009 / Biden amendment / Roll call vote #83

Amendment to the federal budget resolution for fiscal year 2009 offered by Senator Biden (DE) to increase spending on international affairs programs including those that provide lifesaving AIDS medications, basic education, access to clean water, and many more programs helping people work their way out of poverty.

The Biden amendment was agreed to on March 14, 2008, 73 yeas to 23 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE BIDEN AMENDMENT.

20. RESTORING THE RIGHTS OF WORKERS TO PURSUE ANTI-WAGE DISCRIMINATION REMEDIES

H.R. 2831 Lily Ledbetter Fair Pay Act of 2007 / Cloture / Roll Call Vote #110

Motion to invoke cloture (and thus end debate and move forward with consideration of the legislation) on legislation reasserting Congress' original intent in the 1964 Civil Rights Act and allowing employees to file charges of pay discrimination within 180 days of the last received pay check affected by the discrimination. *The motion to invoke cloture failed on April 23, 2008 (and thus the bill could not be brought up for a final vote), 56 yeas to 42 nays (three-fifths of the total Senate, or 60 votes, is need to invoke cloture).*

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE BILL AND THUS SUPPORTED CLOTURE.

21. FUNDING FOR THE AFFORDABLE HOUSING TRUST FUND

H.R. 3221 / Housing and Economic Recovery Act of 2008 / Bond Amendment / Roll Call Vote #152

Amendment offered by Senator Bond (MO) to de-fund the Affordable Housing Trust Fund, which is created by the legislation and which is intended to rehabilitate, produce and preserve millions of units of affordable housing for low- and moderate-income Americans. *The Bond amendment failed on June 19, 2008, by a vote of 11 yeas to 77 nays.*

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE BOND AMENDMENT.

22. DECREASE FUNDING FOR GLOBAL HIV / AIDS PROGRAMS

S. 2731 / Tom Lantos and Henry J. Hyde United States Global Leadership Against HIV/AIDS, Tuberculosis, and Malaria Reauthorization Act of 2008 / Bunning Amendment / Roll Call Vote #176

Amendment offered by Senator Bunning (KY) to decrease the amount of funding for the Global HIV / AIDS programs reauthorized in the legislation from \$50 billion over 5 years to \$15 Billion over the next five years. *The Bunning Amendment failed on July 15, 2008, by a margin of 16 yeas to 80 nays.*

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE BUNNING AMENDMENT.

23. REAUTHORIZATION OF GLOBAL HIV / AIDS PROGRAMS

S. 2731 / Tom Lantos and Henry J. Hyde United States Global Leadership Against HIV/AIDS, Tuberculosis, and Malaria Reauthorization Act of 2008 / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #182

Final passage of legislation to reauthorize, expand and improve the Global HIV / AIDS program. The legislation will reauthorize the programs at \$50 billion over the next five years (from a previously authorized level of \$15 billion); the bill also lifts the ban on HIV-positive visitors to the United States and eliminated the provision that one-third of all HIV prevention program money be spent on abstinence programs.

The legislation was agreed to on July 16, 2008, 80 yeas to 16 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

24. MORTGAGE RELIEF / HELP TO STATES WITH HIGH FORECLOSURES / ESTABLISHMENT OF THE NATIONAL AFFORDABLE HOUSING TRUST FUND

H.R. 3221 / Housing and Economic Recovery Act of 2008 / Motion to concur / Roll Call Vote #186

Motion to agree with the House (final) version of the omnibus housing bill, which extends new federal credit to Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac; provides \$4 billion to states and municipalities with high foreclosure rates to deal with foreclosed properties; and establishes the National Affordable Housing Trust Fund.

The legislation was agreed to on July 26, 2008, 72 yeas to 13 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

25. INCREASED FUNDING FOR LOW-INCOME ENERGY ASSISTANCE

S. 3186 / Warm in Winter and Cool in Summer Act / Motion to invoke Cloture / Roll Call Vote #187

Motion to invoke cloture (and thus end debate and move forward with consideration of the legislation) on a bill to provide \$2.5 billion in emergency funds for the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program.

The motion to invoke cloture failed on July 26, 2008 (and thus the bill could not be brought up for a final vote), 50 yeas to 35 nays (three-fifths of the total Senate, or 60 votes, is need to invoke cloture).

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE MOTION TO INVOKE CLOTURE.

26. MAKING COLLEGE MORE AFFORDABLE

H.R. 4137 / Higher Education Opportunity Act / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #194

Final passage of a bill to reauthorize the Higher Education Act for 5 years; raise the maximum Pell Grant to \$8,000 by the 2014 – 2015 Academic School Year and provide a new loan forgiveness program for graduates who enter into the fields of nurses and early childhood educators.

The bill passed July 31, 2008, 83 yeas to 8 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

27. EXTEND UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

H.R. 6867 / Unemployment Compensation Extension Act of 2008 / Motion to Invoke Cloture / Roll Call Vote #214

Motion to invoke cloture (and thus end debate and move forward with consideration of the legislation) on a bill to extend federal unemployment benefits for an additional 13 weeks in all states, plus another 13 weeks in states with high unemployment rates.

Cloture was invoked on November 20, 2008, 89 yeas to 6 nays; the legislation was then approved by voice vote

VOTE DESCRIPTION

1. MINIMUM WAGE INCREASE

H.R. 2 Fair Minimum Wage Act of 2007 / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #18

Final passage of the bill to increase the federal minimum wage by \$2.10 an hour over two years to \$7.25 an hour.

The legislation passed on January 10, 2007, 315 yeas to 116 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

2. MAKING COLLEGE MORE AFFORDABLE

H.R. 5 College Student Relief Act of 2007 / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #32

Final passage of a bill to cut interest rates for undergraduates with subsidized federal student loans in half over the next 5 years.

The legislation passed on January 17, 2007, 356 yeas to 71 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

3. RECOGNIZING THE BENEFITS OF THE AFRICAN AMERICAN SPIRITUAL

H. Res. 120 Recognizing the African American spiritual as a national treasure / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #79

Final passage of a resolution that recognizes the African American spiritual as a "poignant and powerful genre of music" that has become one of the most significant segments of American music.

The resolution passed on February 7, 2007, 426 yeas to 0 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE RESOLUTION.

4. MAKING IT EASIER TO FORM A UNION

H.R. 800 Employee Free Choice Act of 2007 / Final Passage / Roll Call #118

Final passage of legislation making sure workers have a fair chance to exercise their right to choose a union by making it easier for a union to act as a mediator for workers if the majority of workers have provided authorized signatures indicating that they want the union to act as their representative, and increasing penalties for violations against employees who are trying to organize a union.

The legislation passed on March 1, 2007, 241 yeas to 185 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

5. POST-KATRINA PUBLIC HOUSING

H.R. 1227 Gulf Coast Hurricane Housing Recovery Act of 2007 / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #172

Final passage of legislation that would block the demolition of damaged New Orleans public housing units until a plan is developed to replace them and grant public housing tenants an absolute right of return. It would reauthorize the reimbursement of communities and landlords for providing assistance to displaced individuals, and extend FEMA housing assistance for hurricane evacuees to Dec. 31, 2007, after which evacuees would receive temporary Section 8 vouchers.

The legislation passed on March 21, 2007, 305 yeas to 125 nays.

6. CONGRESSIONAL BLACK CAUCUS ALTERNATIVE FEDERAL BUDGET PROPOSAL

H. Con. Res. 99 Concurrent Resolution for the Federal Budget for Fiscal Year 2008 / Congressional Black Caucus Substitute / Roll Call Vote #209

Alternative federal budget for fiscal year 2008 offered by Congresswoman Kilpatrick (MI) on behalf of the Congressional Black Caucus (CBC). The CBC budget would balance the budget and achieve a surplus in fiscal year 2012 by assuming, in part, a repeal of recent tax breaks for the top two wealthiest brackets. The CBC alternative budget also invests \$112 billion more than the budget under consideration in education, training, employment and social services; \$9 billion more in veterans' benefits and services; \$8 billion more in homeland security; and over a 5-year period it spends more than \$101 billion on health care.

The CBC alternative budget failed on March 29, 2007, 115 yeas to 312 nays.
THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE CBC FEDERAL BUDGET ALTERNATIVE.

7. CONGRESSIONAL VOTING RIGHTS FOR THE RESIDENTS OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

H.R. 1905 District of Columbia House Voting Rights Act of 2007 / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #231

Final passage of a bill to allow the residents of the District of Columbia one voting representative in the U.S. House of Representatives.

H.R. 1905 passed on April 19, 2007, 241 yeas to 177 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED PASSAGE OF THE BILL.

8. EXPANDING SMALL BUSINESS LOANS

H.R. 1332 Small Business Lending Improvements Act of 2007 / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #263

Final passage of a bill to expand the number of loan programs available to small businesses and reduce the cost of the loans to borrowers and lenders. The new loans, of up to \$250,000 apiece, would be made to small businesses owned by women, veterans and other individuals considered to be socially or economically disadvantaged.

H.R. 1332 passed on April 25, 2007, 380 yeas to 45 nays.

9. RELIGIOUS DISCRIMINATION USING FEDERAL DOLLARS

H.R. 1429 Improving Head Start Act of 2007 / Motion to recommit with instructions / Roll Call Vote #284

Motion offered by Congressman McKeon to send the Head Start reauthorization bill back to the House Education Committee with instructions that language be inserted allowing faith based organizations participating in the federal Head Start program to take religion into account when hiring or firing employees.

The motion to recommit was defeated on May 2, 2007, 222 nays to 195 yeas.

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE MOTION TO RECOMMIT.

10. HEAD START REAUTHORIZATION

H.R. 1429 Improving Head Start Act of 2007 / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #285
Final passage of a bill that would authorize \$7.4 billion in 2008 for the Head Start program. The bill also made improvements to the program, and would allow Head Start programs to increase eligibility to 130% of the poverty level.

The bill passed on May 2, 2007, 365 yeas to 48 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED FINAL PASSAGE OF THE BILL.

11. HATE CRIMES PREVENTION

H.R. 1592 Local Law Enforcement Hate Crimes Prevention Act / Final Passage / Roll call Vote #299

Final passage of a bill to expand existing hate crime prevention laws and allow the federal government to assist the local authorities in the investigation and prosecution of crimes motivated by hate, regardless of what the victim was doing at the time the crime occurred. It would also expand the definition of a hate crime to include those motivated by the victim's disability, gender or sexual orientation and it would provide money to states to develop hate crime prevention programs.

The bill passed on May 3, 2007, 237 yeas to 180 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED FINAL PASSAGE OF THE BILL.

12. SUPPORT COMMUNITY ORIENTED POLICING

H.R. 1700 COPS Improvements Act of 2007 / Final Passage / Roll Call vote #348
Final passage of the bill to authorize \$6.9 billion in fiscal year 2008 through 2013 for the Community Oriented Policing Services program. The bill also adds a number of new activities which may be eligible for COPS grants, including programs to reduce the distribution and abuse of illegal drugs.

The bill passed on May 15, 2007, 381 yeas to 34 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED FINAL PASSAGE OF THE BILL.

13. FEDERAL ASSISTANCE TO SOLVE UNSOLVED CIVIL RIGHTS CRIMES

H.R. 923 Emmett Till Unsolved Civil Rights Crime Act / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote # 512

Final passage of a bill to put additional federal resources into solving many of the heinous murders that occurred in the early days of the civil rights struggle that remain unsolved and bringing those who perpetrated the crimes to justice.

The bill passed on June 20, 2007, 422 yeas to 2 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE BILL.

14. SUPPORT THE NEEDLE EXCHANGE PROGRAM IN WASHINGTON, DC

H.R. 2829 Fiscal Year 2008 D.C. Appropriations / Souder Amendment / Roll Call Vote #589

Amendment offered by Congressman Souder (IN) to bar the use of funds in the bill by Washington, D.C. for any needle exchange program.

The Souder amendment failed on June 28, 2007, 208 yeas to 216 nays.

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE SOUDER AMENDMENT.

15. MAKING COLLEGE MORE AFFORDABLE

H.R. 2669 College Cost Reduction Act of 2007 / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #613

Final passage of legislation to cut the government subsidies to student lenders by almost \$19 billion and redirect most of the money to aid for students, colleges and universities. The bill would raise the maximum Pell grant to \$5,200 in five years, cut interest rates on subsidized student loans and raise the aggregate limit for federally backed loans to \$30,500 for undergraduates and \$65,000 for graduate students.

The bill passed on July 11, 2007, 273 yeas to 149 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED PASSAGE OF THE LEGISLATION.

16. SUPPORTING DARFUR THROUGH DIVESTMENT IN SUDAN

H.R. 180 Darfur Accountability and Divestment Act of 2007 / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #764

Final passage of legislation to require companies, states or persons with direct investments in Sudan to disclose these investment activities to the federal government. This list of companies would then be regularly updated and published in a forum available to the general public.

The legislation passed on July 31, 2007, 418 yeas to 1 nay.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED PASSAGE OF THE LEGISLATION.

17. RESTORING THE RIGHTS OF WORKERS TO PURSUE ANTI-WAGE DISCRIMINATION REMEDIES

H.R. 2831 Lily Ledbetter Fair Pay Act of 2007 / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #768

Final passage of legislation reasserting Congress' original intent in the 1964 Civil Rights Act and allowing employees to file charges of pay discrimination within 180 days of the last received pay check affected by the discrimination. *The legislation passed on July 31, 2007, 225 yeas to 199 nays.*

THE NAACP SUPPORTED PASSAGE OF THE LEGISLATION.

18. REAUTHORIZING AND EXPANDING THE STATE CHILDREN'S HEALTH INSURANCE PROGRAM (S-CHIP)

H.R. 3162 Children's Health and Medicare Protection Act of 2007 / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #787

Final passage of a bill to expand the State Children's Health Insurance Program (S-CHIP) so that every American child may be assured of high-quality health care coverage. The bill also made improvements to Medicare's preventive benefits and mental health services, and made it more likely that seniors can see their own doctors.

The legislation passed on August 1, 2007, 225 yeas to 204 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

19. GOVERNMENT-ISSUED IDENTIFICATION REQUIREMENT

H.R. 1852 Expanding Home Ownership in America Act of 2007/ Price Motion to Recommit / Roll Call Vote #875

Motion offered by Congressman Price (GA) to require that any individual or household receiving money from the Affordable Housing Trust Fund present verification of legal residency by a government-issued identification document. *The Price motion failed on September 18, 2007, 209 yeas to 216 nays.*

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE PRICE MOTION.

20. ECONOMIC AND INFRASTRUCTURE DEVELOPMENT

H.R. 3246 Regional Economic and Infrastructure Development Act of 2007 / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #946

Final passage of a bill that would authorize \$1.25 billion through 2012 to provide assistance to economically distressed and underdeveloped areas, with programs aimed at developing transportation and infrastructure, job skills training and business growth.

The bill passed on October 4, 2007, 264 yeas to 154 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

21. INCREASING LOW-INCOME AFFORDABLE HOUSING

H.R. 2895 National Affordable Housing Trust Fund Act of 2007 / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #958

Final passage of legislation to establish an affordable housing trust fund to provide assistance for the construction, rehabilitation and preservation of affordable housing for low-income families.

The legislation passed on October 10, 2007, 264 yeas to 148 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

**22. OVERRIDING THE PRESIDENT'S VETO OF LEGISLATION
REAUTHORIZING AND EXPANDING THE STATE CHILDREN'S HEALTH
INSURANCE PROGRAM (S-CHIP)**

H.R. 976 Children's Health Insurance Program Reauthorization Act of 2007 / Veto override / Roll Call Vote #982

Vote on whether or not to override President Bush's veto of legislation to reauthorize and expand the State Children's Health Insurance Program (S-CHIP) to cover an additional 6 million American children, offer dental coverage to children, and cover pregnant women.

The veto override failed on October 18, 2007, 273 yeas to 156 nays (two-thirds of those voting, or 286 in this case, are needed to override the President's veto).

THE NAACP SUPPORTED OVERRIDING THE PRESIDENT'S VETO.

23. REDUCING RECIDIVISM THROUGH EX-OFFENDER REENTRY PROGRAMS

H.R. 1593 Second Chance Act of 2007 / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #1083

Final passage of legislation to allow states and local communities to receive federal assistance to establish ex-offender reentry projects, with enhanced focus on job training, housing, substance abuse and mental health treatment, as well as programs to work with the children and families of ex-offenders.

The legislation passed on November 13, 2007, 347 yeas to 62 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

24. EFFECTIVELY DETERRING PREDATORY LENDING

H.R. 3915 The Mortgage Reform and Anti-Predatory Lending Act of 2007 / Watt Amendment / Roll Call Vote #1112

Amendment offered by Congressman Watt (NC) to make lenders liable for actual damages under the bill's liability provisions, thus allowing victims of "steering" to obtain the greater of actual damages or three times broker compensation. This would, in turn, provide a much greater deterrent to stop predatory lending.

The Watt amendment failed on November 15, 2007, 169 yeas to 250 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE WATT AMENDMENT.

25. VETO OVERRIDE OF SPENDING BILL FOR THE DEPARTMENTS OF LABOR, HEALTH AND HUMAN SERVICES AND EDUCATION

H.R. 3043 Making Appropriations for the Departments of Labor, Health and Human Services and Education for Fiscal Year 2008 / Veto override / Roll Call Vote #1122

Vote on whether or not to override President Bush's veto of a bill that would increase federal spending in 2008 for the Department of Education by \$3.2 billion (\$4.5 billion more than President Bush proposed in his budget); \$4.4 billion for Health and Human Service programs (\$5.3 billion more than Bush proposed); \$296 million more for the Department of Labor (about \$1 billion above the Bush request); and \$1.1 billion more for the National Institutes of Health over 2007 levels.

The veto override failed on November 15, 2007, 277 yeas to 141 nays (two-thirds of those voting, or 279 in this case, are needed to override the President's veto).

THE NAACP SUPPORTED AN OVERRIDE OF PRESIDENT BUSH'S VETO.

26. HOPE VI HOUSING REAUTHORIZATION

H.R. 3524 / HOPE VI Improvement and Reauthorization Act of 2007 / Final Passage / Roll call vote #18

Final passage of legislation to fund the public housing program HOPE VI at \$800 million per year through fiscal year 2015, and require one-for-one replacement of housing units demolished under the program. The legislation would also require mixed-income housing on sites of demolished low-income housing.

The legislation passed on January 17, 2008, 271 yeas to 130 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

27. DEBT RELIEF FOR THE WORLD'S POOREST NATIONS

H.R. 2634 / Jubilee Act for Responsible Lending and Expanded Debt Cancellation of 2008 / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #199

Final passage of legislation to require the US Department of Treasury to negotiate with the World Bank, the International Monetary Fund and other global lending institutions to forgive debt owed by the world's poorest nations.

The bill passed on April 16, 2008, 285 yeas to 132 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

28. PENALIZING FORMER FELONS WHO HAVE BEEN RELEASED FROM PRISON

H.R. 5818 / Neighborhood Stabilization Act of 2008 / Motion to Recommit / Roll Call Vote #298

Motion to send the bill under consideration back to the committee with instructions to bring it up again with language that would bar anyone convicted of a drug-dealing offense, a sex offense or mortgage fraud from buying homes made available through the bill's funds.

The motion to recommit was rejected on May 8, 2008, 210 yeas to 216 nays.

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE MOTION TO RECOMMIT.

29. GRANTS TO STATES AND LOCAL MUNICIPALITIES TO DEAL WITH FORECLOSED PROPERTIES

H.R. 5818 / Neighborhood Stabilization Act of 2008 / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #299

Final passage of legislation to provide \$7.5 billion for zero-interest loans and \$7.5 billion for grants to states and local municipalities to enable them to purchase, rehabilitate and sell or rent foreclosed properties (renters had to be at or below the area's median income).

The bill passed on May 8, 2008, 239 yeas to 188 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

30. SUPPORT FOR COMMUNITY HEALTH CENTERS

H.R. 1343 / Health Centers Renewal Act of 2008 / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #372

Final passage of a bill to authorize \$14.1 billion for the next 5 years for the community health centers program. The bill also authorized an additional \$25 million to improve access to health care in underserved areas.

The bill passed on June 4, 2008, 393 yeas to 24 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

31. MORTGAGE RELIEF / HELP TO STATES WITH HIGH FORECLOSURES / ESTABLISHMENT OF THE NATIONAL AFFORDABLE HOUSING TRUST FUND

H.R. 3221 / Housing and Economic Recovery Act of 2008 / Motion to concur / Roll Call Vote #519

Motion to agree with the Senate (final) version of the omnibus housing bill, which extends new federal credit to Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac; provides \$4 billion to states and municipalities with high foreclosure rates to deal with foreclosed properties; and establishes the National Affordable Housing Trust Fund.

The legislation was agreed to on July 23, 2008, 272 yeas to 152 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

32. REAUTHORIZE & EXPAND GLOBAL HIV / AIDS PROGRAMS

H.R. 5501, Tom Lantos and Henry J. Hyde United States Global Leadership Against HIV/AIDS, Tuberculosis, and Malaria Reauthorization Act of 2008/ Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #531

Final passage of legislation to authorize \$50 billion over 5 years for programs to fight the global AIDS/HIV pandemic, tuberculosis and malaria. The legislation eliminates the requirement that one-third of all HIV prevention funding go toward abstinence programs and lifts the ban on HIV positive visitors from entering the United States.

The bill passed on April 2, 2008, 308 yeas to 116 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED PASSAGE OF THE BILL.

33. MAKING COLLEGE MORE AFFORDABLE

H.R. 4137 / Higher Education Opportunity Act / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #544

Final passage of a bill to reauthorize the Higher Education Act for 5 years; raise the maximum Pell Grant to \$8,000 by the 2014 – 2015 Academic School Year and provide a new loan forgiveness program for graduates who enter into the fields of nurses and early childhood educators.

The bill passed July 31, 2008, 380 yeas to 49 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

34. PAYCHECK EQUALITY

H.R. 1338 / Paycheck Fairness Act / Final Passage / Roll Call vote #556

Final passage of legislation to make it easier for women who are paid less than their male counterparts to bring suits against their employers. Employers seeking to justify unequal pay would have to prove that disparities are job-related and required by business necessity. Workers who win wage discrimination cases could collect compensatory and punitive damages.

The legislation passed on July 31, 2008, 247 yeas to 178 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

35. REQUIRING THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT CONTRACTORS TO PAY PREVAILING EMPLOYEE WAGES

H.R. 6599 / Military Construction and Veterans Affairs Appropriations Act, 2009 / King (IA) amendment / Roll Call Vote #561

Amendment offered by Congressman King (IA) to bar the use of funds in the bill to enforce the Davis-Bacon Act, which requires government contractors to pay employees the prevailing wage.

The amendment failed on August 1, 2009, 143 yeas to 275 nays.

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE AMENDMENT.

36. LEGALIZING ALL FIREARMS IN THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA

H.R. 6842 / National Capital Security and Safety Act / Childers substitute Amendment / Roll Call vote #600

Substitute amendment offered by Congressman Childers (MS) that would repeal all of the District of Columbia's laws prohibiting the possession of assault weapons and handguns; remove criminal penalties for possessing firearms in the home and allow District residents to purchase firearms in Maryland and Virginia. The amendment would also supersede all efforts by the locally elected City Council of the District of Columbia to draft and enact firearm laws to comply with the Supreme Court decision in *District of Columbia v. Heller*.

The Childers amendment passed September 17, 2008, 260 yeas to 160 nays.

THE NAACP OPPOSED THE CHILDERS AMENDMENT.

37. PROHIBITING ABUSIVE CREDIT CARD PRACTICES

H. R. 5244 / Credit Cardholders' Bill of Rights Act of 2008 / Final passage / Roll Call Vote #623

Final passage of legislation to outlaw several predatory lending style credit card practices, and would require that credit card holders be given at least 45 days' notice of any interest rate increase on an account; bar "double-cycle billing," in which charges are computed on outstanding balances for more than one cycle; and would prohibit the practice of "universal default" in which a credit card's interest rate is raised, oftentimes significantly, because of behavior related to other creditors – even if the cardholder is and has always been in good standing with the card in question.

The legislation passed the House September 23, 2008, 312 yeas to 112 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

38. MENTAL HEALTH PARITY

H.R. 6983 / Paul Wellstone and Pete Domenici Mental Health Parity and Addiction Equity Act of 2008 / Final Passage

Final passage of legislation to require health insurers that cover mental illness to do so on par with physical illness, including equal standards on co-payments, deductibles, number of doctor visits, days in the hospital and financial limits on coverage. The standards would not have to be upheld if they increase coverage costs by more than 2% during the first year of enactment of more than 1% in subsequent years.

The legislation passed September 23, 2008, 376 yeas to 47 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

39. EXTEND UNEMPLOYMENT BENEFITS

H.R. 6867 / Unemployment Compensation Extension Act of 2008 / Final passage / Roll Call Vote #683

Final passage of legislation to extend federal unemployment benefits for an additional 13 weeks in all states, plus another 13 weeks in states with high unemployment rates.

The bill passed on October 3, 2008, 368 yeas to 28 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.

40. AMERICAN AUTOMOBILE INDUSTRY LOAN PROGRAM

H.R. 7321 / Auto Industry Financing and Restructuring Act / Final Passage / Roll Call Vote #690

Final passage of legislation to allow up to \$14 billion in loans to be made eligible to domestic automakers. The proposal also calls for President Bush to name a "car czar" to manage a vast restructuring of the firms and restore them to profitability. Under the legislation, the companies would be required to submit a detailed plan for restructuring by March 31, 2009. Finally, under the legislation, bonuses would be prohibited for the 25 most highly paid employees of each company.

The legislation passed on December 10, 2008, 237 yeas to 170 nays.

THE NAACP SUPPORTED THE LEGISLATION.
