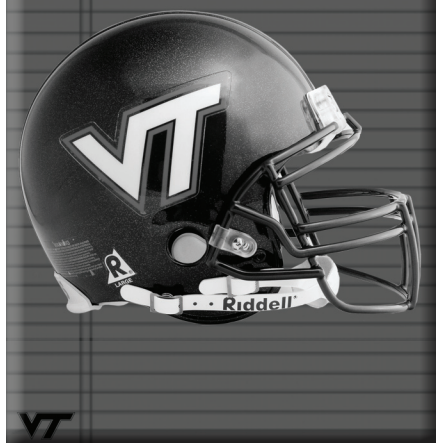


Game Notes

2009 Hokie Football



THE SERIES

♦ Virginia Tech and Nebraska have met just twice on the gridiron. The first meeting came at the end of the 1996 season when the sixth-ranked Huskers beat the 10th-ranked Hokies 41-21 in the Orange Bowl.

♦ Last year, the Hokies went to Lincoln and held on for a 35-30 win in the Hokies' first trip to Nebraska. Quarterback Tyrod Taylor ran for 87 yards and passed for 171 yards as Tech won the tight ballgame.

BIG 12 TIES

♦ Tech is 6-7 against teams currently in the Big 12 Conference, including 4-3 under head coach Frank Beamer.

♦ Tech has played seven of the current Big 12 football schools in the program's history:

season, including a 16-3 mark over the past four-plus seasons (2005-present).

TOP 25 ACTION

♦ Saturday's game will mark just the 19th matchup of two top-25 teams in Lane Stadium with the Hokies holding a 12-6 record in such contests.

♦ Only five of the 18 previous such games featured out-of-conference opponents and three of those were Virginia (1994, 1996 and 1998) before the Hokies joined the ACC.

♦ The other two were LSU and Marshall University, both in 2002, and both wins for the Hokies.

♦ Tech has lost the past three of these matchups (#8 BC 14, #2 VT 10 - 2007; #24 GT 38, #11 VT 27 - 2006; and #5 Miami 27, #3 VT 7 - 2005).

♦ Prior to those three losses, Tech had won the previous six games featuring two top-25 teams at Lane Stadium.

FRESHMEN STEAL THE SHOW

♦ True freshman **David Wilson** and redshirt freshman **Ryan Williams** became the first running back combo in Tech football history to each eclipse 160 yards rushing in the same game when they did it last week against Marshall. Wilson had 12 carries for 165 yards and a touchdown, and Williams added 16 carries for 164 yards and three touchdowns.

♦ The closest any duo had come to both going over 160 yards came in 1985, when Maurice Williams had 165 and Eddie Hunter had 159 against William & Mary.

THE CHECKLIST

- ✓ Virginia Tech and Nebraska have met just twice in football and this will be NU's first trip to Blacksburg for a game.
- ✓ The Hokies won the last meeting, holding on for a 35-30 win in Lincoln.
- ✓ Tech's Marcus Davis and Randall Dunn and Nebraska's Tyrone Fahie both attended Ocean Lakes High School in Virginia Beach but graduated eight years apart.
- ✓ The Hokies have won 31-straight home games against non-conference opponents.

- 10 Ten Virginia Tech players saw their first collegiate action during the Marshall game.
- 9 The Hokies have averaged 28.3 yards on their nine kickoff returns through two games.
- 8 Tech forced eight punts during the first half of its game with Marshall.
- 7 Virginia Tech has faced seven members of the current Big 12 Conference – Kansas, Kansas State, Nebraska, Oklahoma, Oklahoma State, Texas and Texas A&M.
- 6 Freshmen accounted for six of Virginia Tech's seven touchdowns against Marshall.
- 5 Tailback Ryan Williams has rushed for five touchdowns during Virginia Tech's first two games.

COACH FRANK BEAMER

• **Frank Beamer** (Virginia Tech '69), whose Virginia Tech teams have posted a 154-51 record over the past 16-plus seasons and appeared in bowl games each year in that span, is in his 23rd year as the head football coach at Tech. Beamer has guided the Hokies to a 178-90-2 record.

He became Tech's winningest football coach in 1997 when Tech defeated Arkansas State and became the 47th coach in NCAA history (all divisions) to record 200 victories when Tech beat Ohio on Sept. 15, 2007.

Under Beamer, Tech football has enjoyed unprecedented success with 16 consecutive bowl appearances, three ACC titles, three ACC Coastal Division crowns, three BIG EAST Conference titles, two "major" bowl victories and a trip to the national championship game.

Tech won the BIG EAST title in 1995 and 1999 and shared it in '96. Beamer was voted BIG EAST Coach of the Year by the league's coaches each of those seasons and was tabbed the ACC Coach of the Year in both 2004 and 2005.

In 1997, he was inducted into the Virginia Tech Sports Hall of Fame and following the 1999 season, he earned eight national coach of the year honors.

Last year may be his finest effort, as he took one of the youngest teams in his tenure, played one of the toughest schedules and, despite several setbacks and disappointing losses, he led the Hokies to an ACC title, as well as a FedEx Orange Bowl title, winning 10 or more games for the fifth-consecutive season.

In 2007, Tech won 11 games, an ACC title and was ranked as high as third in the country in the BCS. In 2005, Tech won the ACC's Coastal Division and earned a spot in the league's inaugural championship game. The Hokies won a school-record tying 11 games, including the Toyota Gator Bowl, finishing the season ranked seventh in the country. For his

efforts, he was awarded the league's coach of the year award for the second time in as many years. In 2004, Tech went a surprising 10-3 in a season highlighted by an eight-game winning streak that led to Tech's ACC championship and a trip to the Nokia Sugar Bowl.

During the 2000 season, the Hokies posted an 11-1 record that included a 41-20 win over Clemson in the Gator Bowl.

In 1999, Tech marched to an 11-0 regular-season mark before losing a hard-fought 46-29 game to Florida State for the national title in the Sugar Bowl. The Hokies ended the '99 season ranked No. 2 by AP.

Another highlight came when Tech beat Texas, 28-10, in the 1995 Sugar Bowl and finished 10-2. The bowl streak started in '93 when Tech beat Indiana in the Independence Bowl to cap a 9-3 season.

Beamer returned to his alma mater in December of 1986 after a six-year stint as the head coach at Murray State University, where he compiled a 42-23-2 mark.

During his undergraduate days at Tech, Beamer started three years as a cornerback and played on the Hokies' 1966 and 1968 Liberty Bowl teams.

The 62-year-old Hillsville, Va., native began his collegiate coaching career as a graduate assistant at Maryland in 1972. He held assistant coaching positions at The Citadel and Murray State before being named MSU's head coach in 1981.

Beamer is married to the former Cheryl Oakley of Richmond, Va. They have two children, Shane, a former member of his dad's football team at Tech and now an assistant coach at the University of South Carolina; and daughter Casey, a 2003 graduate of Tech who now works for the Carolina Panthers.

Beamer was born in Mt. Airy, N.C., and grew up in Hillsville, Va. At Hillsville High, he earned 11 varsity letters as a three-sport athlete in football, basketball and baseball. Beamer, who is the third-winningest active coach in the Football Bowl Subdivision (FBS) with 220 victories, had his No. 25 jersey retired by Tech in a pregame ceremony before the Marshall game in 2002.

STABILITY AT THE TOP

• **Frank Beamer**, the first Tech alumnus to guide Virginia Tech's football program since the 1940s, has coached and won more football games at Tech than any other head coach.

• Only two of the 120 active Division I-A head football coaches have been at their current school longer than Beamer. Those coaches are: Joe Paterno (44th yr., Penn State) and Bobby Bowden (34th yr., Florida State).

• Prior to Beamer, no other grid coach in Tech history had served more than 10 seasons as head coach.

• He first worked at Nebraska starting in 2003 as the defensive coordinator. He then went to Oklahoma University for a year as the defensive coordinator before going to LSU.

• He served as the Huskers' interim head coach for the 2007 Alamo Bowl, a 17-3 win over Michigan State.

Rushing = Outcome?

• Under head coach **Frank Beamer** (270 games), the Hokies are 157-30-2 when outrushing their opponents, 20-60 when being outrushed and 1-0 when the rushing total is even.

• In Tech's current 16-year bowl run (since 1993), Tech is 137-15 when outrushing its opponents, 16-35 when being outrushed and 1-0 when the rushing total is even.

• In its current 16-year bowl run (since 1993), Tech is 89-6 when rushing for 200 yards or more, including 7-0 in 2005.

• Since the start of the 1999 season, the Hokies are 92-10 when outrushing their opponent and 9-21 when being outrushed.

Assistant Coach Nuggets

During Billy Hite's 373-game tenure at Tech ...

• the Hokies have rushed for 72,625 net yards – an average of 194.7 ypg.
 • the Hokies have outrushed their opponents 70 percent of the time (190 of 270 games) in the Frank Beamer era.
 • the Hokies have had an average of 145.3 yards rushing per game from the tailback position.

During Bud Foster's 180-game tenure as defensive/co-defensive coordinator, Tech has ...

• had 43 different defensive players score touchdowns.
 • held opponents to an average of 102.2 yards rushing and 16.1 points per game.
 • become the only defense in the country to finish in the top 10 in total defense each of the past five years (4th in 2004; 1st in 2005 and 2006; 4th in 2007 and 7th in 2008).

During Bryan Stinespring's 96-game tenure as offensive coordinator, Tech has ...

• won 71 games.
 • averaged 353.3 yards of total offense.
 • averaged 29.9 points per game (26.0 ppg when subtracting defensive and special teams scores).
 • finished with five of its top eight all-time teams in both total offense and total points.

What's a Hokie?

That's the most often-asked question regarding Virginia Tech athletics. The answer leads all the way back to 1896 when Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute.

With the change came the necessity for writing a new cheer and a contest for such a purpose was held by the student body. Senior O.M. Stull won first prize for his "Old Hokie" yell which still is used today.

Later, when asked if "Hokie" had any special meaning, Stull explained the words he used had no hidden or symbolic meaning, but had been thought up in an effort to get attention. Hokie soon became a nickname for all Tech teams and for those people loyal to Tech athletics.

Following is the "Old Hokie" yell in its original form:

Hoki, Hoki, Hoki Hy!
Tech! Tech! V.P.I.!
Sola-Rex Sola-Rah
Polytech-Vir-gin-i-a!!
Rae, Ri, V.P.I.

Just Virginia Tech, Please

While the full name of the school is Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University, the school is commonly referred to as "Virginia Tech."

Founded in 1872, as Virginia Agricultural and Mechanical College, the university changed its name to Virginia Polytechnic Institute in 1896.

Fans of the athletic department, as well as media covering the Hokies, shortened the name to VPI, but it eventually became Virginia Tech.

The "State University" was added in 1970 to bring the official title to what it is today.

Those covering Hokie athletics are asked to refer to the university as simply "Virginia Tech."

Virginia Tech University, VPI and SU, VPI&SU, VT or VA Tech are not recognized names and should not be used.

THE STORIED LUNCH PAIL

♦ Taken with the Hokies wherever they go is the storied lunch pail. The Pail served as the inspiration for Tech's record-setting 1995 defense, symbolizing Tech's blue collar approach to defensive football. Every year since, a member of the defense has been responsible for totting a new Pail to everything football-related.

♦ Coach Rod Sharpless, then the co-defensive coordinator along with Bud Foster, brought a lunch pail back from New Jersey and they decided that it would become the symbol of the 1995 defense. Sharpless' mother-in-law found the now famous original lunch pail in Mercerville, N.J., where it had belonged to a coal miner.

♦ The original Pail, along with an oversized replica, sits in Tech's Hall of Legends in the Merryman Center.

♦ That year, the players put their season and individual goals in the Pail and turf from road victories into the Pail as well. Now, the

players put the unit goals, weekly goals, the keys to success for the week and sign a mission statement before the season ... plus the turf from road wins.

♦ A new Pail is put into service about every two years since it goes through so much each season. Senior free safety **Kam Chancellor** was given the Pail in the preseason by Foster.

Last Meeting: Hokies Hold on For Wild Win Over Huskers**Virginia Tech****35****Nebraska****30**

LINCOLN, Neb. — A blocked punt and an interception helped Virginia Tech to a 9-0 lead in the first quarter and the Hokies never trailed on the way to a hard fought 35-30 non-conference victory over previously unbeaten Nebraska before a record crowd at Memorial Stadium.

The turnout of 85,831 fans got their money's worth as the home standing Cornhuskers breathed down the Hokies' neck all evening long. After Tech grabbed a 28-10 advantage late in the third quarter, Nebraska used a 75-yard drive and a stunning 88-yard punt return to pull within five points with just under eight minutes to go.

Tech quarterback Tyrod Taylor responded by marching the Hokies 80 yards in 11 plays for a 35-23 lead at the 2:28 mark, but it took Nebraska just four plays and 56 seconds to answer once again on quarterback Joe Ganz, second TD pass of the game. Nebraska got one last chance with 25 seconds left, but the Hokie defense forced a fumble and took over at the NU 48.

Tech ran for 206 yards, picking up two rushing touchdowns from tailback Darren Evans, and got a strong performance from kicker Dustin Keys who booted four field goals.

Game Notes

• The Memorial Stadium crowd of 85,831, was the largest in the stadium's history and marked the third-largest crowd that Virginia Tech had ever played football in front of, trailing only LSU last season (92,739) and USC at FedEx Field in 2004 (91,665).

• The Hokies scored in the first quarter for the first time in their last seven games, dating back to last year.

• Senior Victor Harris recorded the 11th pass interception of his Tech career (second of 2008) in the first quarter, setting up a 1-yard touchdown run for Darren Evans. Harris' pick ties him for eighth place in career interceptions at Tech. Evans, meanwhile, has now scored at least one touchdown in each of the first five games of his Tech career.

Game 1: Tide Wears Down Hokies Late En Route to Big Win**Alabama****34****Virginia Tech****24**

ATLANTA, Ga. - Fifth-ranked Alabama scored 18 fourth-quarter points to pound out a 34-24 season opening victory against the No. 7 Virginia Tech Hokies in the Chick-fil-A Kickoff Game at the Georgia Dome.

A vocal crowd of 74,954 looked on as Tech clung to a 17-16 lead heading into the fourth quarter despite being outgained 318-105 yards over the first three periods. After a costly holding penalty stalled a promising Tech drive, UA moved quickly to capture the lead. It took just two plays for Alabama to move 54 yards for a touchdown, and when the Hokies fumbled the ensuing kickoff, the tide had truly turned.

The Hokies continued to battle, cutting the lead to 27-24 on redshirt freshman Ryan Williams' second rushing touchdown of the game. In the end, however, it was Tide tailback Mark Ingram who proved to be the biggest difference maker with two fourth-quarter TDs and a final total of 150 yards on the ground and 35 more on receptions.

Game Notes

• Dyrrell Roberts' 98-yard kickoff return for a touchdown was the fifth-longest in school history and was the sixth kickoff return for a TD during Coach Frank Beamer's tenure. Roberts became the 31st different player under Beamer to score on special teams. His 195 yards on four kickoff returns was the second-highest single game total under Beamer, following only Marcus Mickel's 214 yards against Clemson in 1989.

• Freshman Antoine Hopkins became the eighth defensive tackle to intercept a pass during Coach Beamer's time at Tech. He returned a second-quarter pick 6 yards to set up the Hokies' first touchdown of the game.

BLACKSBURG, Va. – Youth served Virginia Tech well as a group of underclassmen fueled the No. 14 Hokies' 52-10 victory over Marshall University at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field.

Freshmen tailbacks Ryan Williams and David Wilson combined for 329 yards rushing and four touchdowns, freshman return man Jayron Hosley weaved 64 yards for a TD on a punt and young receivers Dyrell Roberts and Xavier Boyce hauled in their first collegiate TD passes as the Hokies exploded for 605 yards of offense.

Williams ran for three touchdowns in the first half to help Tech to a 35-7 halftime lead. The redshirt freshman carried 16 times for 164 yards. Wilson, a true freshman, topped him by a yard when he picked up 165 yards on just 12 carries.

Tech's defense posted a solid overall performance, limiting Marshall to 126 yards on the ground and 126 yards through the airways. The Thundering Herd managed just 34 yards in the first quarter and 16 yards during the fourth quarter.

• Starters Greg Boone (TE) and Stephan Virgil (CB) did not dress for the game due to injuries.

• True freshman Jayron Hosley scored the 122nd non-offensive touchdown for Tech since Frank Beamer took over as the head coach. Hosley's 64-yard punt return for a TD was the 17th punt return for a score under Beamer. The last player to return a punt for a score for Tech was Justin Harper during the 2008 FedEx Orange Bowl against Kansas.

• The last time two Tech players rushed for over 100 yards in the same game was 2005 when Cedric Humes (134) and Branden Ore (104) did it against UNC.

UPON FURTHER REVIEW

• Last week in Tech's 52-10 win over Marshall, several records were broken and other high marks were set. Here's a look at those marks:

• Tailbacks **David Wilson** (165) and **Ryan Williams** (164) became the first running back combo in Tech football history to each eclipse 160 yards rushing in the same game when they did it last week against Marshall.

• The 605 yards of total offense was the highest output under offensive coordinator **Bryan Stinespring** and tied for the sixth-highest output in school history. The Hokies also had 605 yards against Houston in 1972. Tech would have had more, but took four kneeldowns in the game for a loss of 8 yards (one at the end of the first half, three at the end of the game).

• The 444 yards of rushing offense was the third-most under head coach **Frank Beamer** and tied for the sixth-highest output in school history. Tech also had 444 yards rushing against Appalachian State in 1979.

• **Jayron Hosley** became the first freshman (true or redshirt) to return a punt for a touchdown since freshmen became eligible to play in 1972. The true freshman took a punt back 64 yards in the second quarter for a score.

• Quarterback **Tyrod Taylor** tied his career high with two touchdown passes (Florida State, 2007).

• Tech scored 35 first-half points for the eighth time under Beamer and 28 points in a quarter for the eighth time under Beamer.

HOKIE STORY LINES

TYROD'S TIME

♦ **Tyrod Taylor** is the man under center once again for the Hokies this year. The junior has started 17 games and holds a 14-3 record as a starter. That record includes a loss at Florida State last year when he was injured on the first offensive play of the game and didn't return to the contest.

♦ Taylor is the latest in a growing line of standout signal callers from the Peninsula area of Virginia. The Hampton product joins Allen Iverson and Ronald Curry from the same city, Bryan Randall from Williamsburg and both Michael and Marcus Vick from Newport News to go on to success from that area.

♦ In last year's ACC Championship game, he rushed for two scores, earning MVP honors.

♦ He finished second on the team last year with 738 yards rushing and seven scores. He was also 99-for-173 on the year passing for 1,036 yards and two touchdowns.

♦ This past summer, he spent four days as a counselor at the Manning Passing Academy in Louisiana, an offensive skills camp for high school athletes. He was joined by several other college quarterbacks, including Duke's Thaddeus Lewis and North Carolina's T.J. Yates.

♦ Taylor already has four career 100-yard rushing games as just a junior. The school

record for 100-yard rushing games by a quarterback is six (Bob Schweickert) with Michael Vick also sitting in second with four.

♦ Taylor recorded a 38.5" vertical leap in July max testing, set a quarterbacks record with a 400-pound front squat and is also a nominee for the Allstate/AFC Good Works Team.

FILLING IN FOR THE WORKHORSE

♦ Last year's starting tailback, **Kenny Lewis, Jr.**, went down with a torn Achilles against Western Kentucky and a young redshirt freshman named **Darren Evans** took over and made a quick impact on the Tech offense, rushing for a Tech freshman record 1,265 yards and 11 scores and went on to earn MVP honors at the Orange Bowl.

♦ Another new face is having to fill in after Evans tore the ACL in his left knee on Aug. 11 and was lost for the season. Those duties have fallen on a trio of backs who entered the season with a combined 38 carries for 88 yards - and those were all from **Josh Oglesby**. Oglesby, redshirt freshman **Ryan Williams** and true freshman **David Wilson** will now team up to help fill the void created by the loss of Evans.

MR. ELECTRIC

♦ A lot of buzz surrounding spring practice had to do with electrifying tailback **Ryan Williams**, who did little to quash the hype surrounding him by taking the first handoff in the first scrimmage 80 yards for a touchdown.

♦ The speedy and shifty 5-9 player wanted to play last year as a true freshman, but running backs coach **Billy Hite** decided to redshirt him, citing Williams' blitz protection problems and not knowing all his assignments as the main reasons.

♦ Williams, who played for former Tech star Loren Johnson at Stonewall Jackson High, is a self-described fashionisto, owning nearly 100 different pairs of Nike shoes, including old-school Air Jordans and Air Force Ones.

♦ In his first game, which came against No. 5 Alabama, he rushed for 71 yards and two scores and also caught two passes for 42 yards, earning ACC Rookie of the Week honors. He became the first freshman to score two touchdowns in his collegiate debut since Shyrone Stith did it in 1996 at Akron. He followed that up with a 164-yard, three-touchdown performance against Marshall. He has 235 yards and five touchdowns in two games.

OGLESBY ALSO LOOKING TO CONTRIBUTE

♦ With Evans' injury, redshirt sophomore **Josh Oglesby** becomes the most experienced tailback in Billy Hite's stable. Oglesby and his family have a long-time connection with Hite as Josh's father, Ike, was a running back for North Carolina in the early 1970s, when he was a teammate of former UNC head coach

John Bunting and also played with Hite while at UNC. Ike Oglesby ranks 14th on UNC's all-time rushing list with 1,773 yards.

♦ The younger Oglesby had a great offseason in the weight room, earning Super Iron Hokie honors. He led all tailbacks with a 385-pound bench press in July max testing and also has posted a 395-pound front squat, 300-pound power clean and a 341-pound push jerk as personal bests.

WILSON ALSO IN THE MIX

♦ Also looking for a chance to play is true freshman **David Wilson**, from nearby Danville, Va. Wilson was clocked at a blistering 4.33 in the 40-yard dash in freshman testing in July and on media day he entertained the masses with eight consecutive standing back flips. He told reporters he taught himself the flips when he was just 4 years old after watching gymnastics on television. Wilson wore a shirt and tie to school every day his senior year of high school and plans on dressing up for classes at Tech.

♦ He burst loose for a game-high 165 yards and his first score against Marshall.

The House of Horrors

- ♦ Lane Stadium has always been a difficult place for opponents to play and has been dubbed one of the best game-day environments in college football. Tech has a 46-7-1 record versus non-conference teams at home since 1991, winning 31 straight.
- ♦ Virginia Tech has posted a 181-66-6 overall record in its 44-plus seasons at Lane Stadium/Worsham Field. Tech is 107-29-1 at home under the direction of Frank Beamer.
- ♦ Tech football teams are 341-97-13 all-time in Blacksburg, including a 37-5 record since the start of the 2003 season.
- ♦ A large part of that impressive record is the home-field environment created by the fans as Lane Stadium has been sold out for 69 consecutive games, starting with the final home game of the 1998 season against Virginia.
- ♦ The Hokies went unbeaten and untied in 2008 (6-0), 2000 (6-0), 1999 (6-0), 1996 (7-0), 1993 (6-0) 1980 (6-0), 1975 (5-0) and 1965 (3-0) at Lane Stadium. They went 4-0-1 in 1972 and 2-0-1 in 1966.
- ♦ Consistent sell-outs and a rabid fan base provide an atmosphere second-to-none as evidenced by the number of false starts and delay of games taken by opponents in the past 43 games:

Booooooooooooo

♦ Tight end **Greg Boone** - at 283 pounds - is a former high school quarterback and safety who passed for 1,285 yards, rushed for 949 yards and accounted for 35 touchdowns his senior year. He has shown his arm many times, uncorking 70-yard passes at the team's walk-through and can throw a ball from one knee 55 yards on the fly.

♦ Last year, he caught a 27-yard touchdown pass against WKU, his first scoring reception since 2006. He also caught a touchdown pass against Maryland and has rushed several times out of the "Wild Turkey" shotgun formation, scoring a touchdown against Virginia.

♦ A versatile player, he has lined up at tight end, fullback, quarterback and even out wide in his career. He missed the Marshall game with a sprained SC joint but is expected back this week.

MAKIN' THE MOVE

♦ It's worked for his predecessors, so **Stephan Virgil** is hoping it'll work for him. Virgil will make the move to boundary corner, just like Brandon Flowers and Macho Harris did for their final season. Both went on to first-team All-America honors. Last year, while at field corner, Virgil and Harris combined for 12 interceptions.

♦ Tech's last four boundary corners — DeAngelo Hall, Jimmy Williams, Flowers and Harris — all earned first-team All-America honors their final season. Virginia Tech has produced four straight All-American cornerbacks and five in the past six years. The backfield (corners & safeties) has also had eight All-Americans in the past 10 seasons.

♦ Virgil had 43 tackles, including two for loss, and six interceptions last season.

♦ He returned a fumble for a touchdown against East Carolina, made a game-sealing interception at North Carolina, blocked a punt for a safety at Nebraska and intercepted a pass in the end zone against Cincinnati in the Orange Bowl. He added two interceptions against Duke.

♦ In this year's opener, he had nine tackles, including a career-high three tackles for loss. He missed the Marshall game with a sprained knee but is expected back this week.

IMPRESSIVE GENES

♦ Offensive tackle **Ed Wang** and freshman defensive tackle **David Wang** come from athletic parents, both of whom were members of the Chinese Olympic team.

♦ Ed, who came to Tech as a tight end and played several games there in 2006, has started 26 games in his career. Four years ago, when he arrived as a freshman tight end, he weighed 262. He checked in for camp this year at 309 pounds. David had surgery on his shoulder during preseason and will redshirt this year. The pair will be featured on NFL China later this fall as a crew came over from Beijing to do a story on American football.

THE OUTDOORSMAN

♦ Offensive guard **Sergio Render**, who earned preseason All-America honors from several publications, is quite the outdoorsman. The senior likes to hunt and fish in the New River Valley during his spare time and at 6-foot-3, 310-pounds, he isn't afraid to climb into a tree stand and put it to the test. He also participates in fishing tournaments on the New River when he has time.

♦ Render has started 42 games at guard in his career, the most among current ACC offensive linemen.

SURFS UP

♦ Defensive coordinator **Bud Foster** has the reputation of a fierce and fiery competitor on game days, but in his spare time, he likes to relax at his lake house on Claytor Lake. This past summer, he took up wakesurfing and video of it has surfaced on YouTube.

♦ According to Wikipedia, wakesurfing is "a water sport in which a surfer trails behind an inboard ski boat, surfing the boat's wake without being directly attached to the boat. The wake from the boat mimics the look and feel of an actual ocean wave. After getting up on the wave by use of a tow rope, wakesurfers drop the rope and ride the steep face below the wave's peak in a fashion reminiscent of ocean surfing."

PLANTING ROOTS

♦ **Kam Chancellor** is back for his senior year and back at the same position for the first time in four years. The former high school basketball star and lightly recruited football product came into the 2006 camp as an unknown — but physically impressive — quarterback prospect. He made the move to cornerback just a few practices into his career and played mostly on special teams as a true freshman. In 2007, he started all 14 games at the rover position, recording 79 tackles. Last year, he took over at free safety, replacing honorable mention All-ACC pick D.J. Parker as the quarterback of the defense and started all 14 games.

♦ Last summer, he worked back home for Pepsi as a stocker so he could earn money for his single mother, Karen Lambert. This past summer, he returned to his hometown to intern with Lakewood Parks & Rec.

♦ Since the start of the 1999 season (Tech's national championship game season), the Hokies have a nation-leading 73 touchdown returns, three ahead of Kansas State.

• He had 52 tackles, two fumble recoveries, a forced fumble, five pass break ups and two interceptions last year.

REDSKINS TIES

• **Cody Grimm** and **Beau Warren** (along with former Hokie Brett Warren) have known each other since infancy as their fathers played for the Washington Redskins for several years. Grimm (along with former Hokie Chad Grimm) is the son of NFL Pro Bowler Russ Grimm, while Warren is the son of Don Warren. Also on the team is **Jeron Gouveia-Winslow**, who plays behind Grimm. He is the son of another former Redskin, Kurt Gouveia.

• Don Warren was a tight end who played for the 'Skins from 1979-92, winning three Super Bowls. He is now a scout for the team. Grimm started just a few spots down from Warren at offensive guard. He was an original member of "The Hogs" who played with the 'Skins from 1981-91 and also won three Super Bowl titles (1982, 1987 and 1992). He played all 140 games of his career in Washington, earning first-team all-decade honors from the NFL for the 1980s and was a four-time Pro Bowl selection. He is in his third season as the Arizona Cardinals assistant head coach and offensive line coach after spending six years with the Steelers. He helped lead the Cardinals to the Super Bowl, a game Cody went down to watch in Tampa. Gouveia played 13 seasons in the NFL, overlapping with Warren and Grimm as they won two Super Bowls together.

• Cody is a former walk-on who has earned playing time on special teams, but finished third on the team last year in tackles with

71 despite starting only one game. He will continue to rotate with **Cam Martin** at the whip linebacker spot.

He also had 14 tackles for loss, 7.5 sacks, two forced fumbles and two interceptions. This year, he is off to another fine start as he has 13 tackles, including 1.5 for loss, and two forced fumbles. He ran down Alabama's Roy Upchurch from behind and forced a fumble that stopped a Crimson Tide drive.

• Beau is the starter at center this year after serving as the top backup the past two years. In 2007, he got the start in wins over Georgia Tech and Florida State. Gouveia-Winslow is a back-up redshirt freshman behind Grimm.

ALL-WORILDS

• **Jason Worilds** has gone through several changes in his time at Tech. His first year, he went by Jason Adjepong, but legally changed his last named to Worilds for the 2007 season to honor his mother Sandra Worilds. Last season, he switched from his No. 43 jersey to No. 6 and took over one of the starting defensive end spots.

• The New Jersey native loves jazz music, especially that of Herbie Hancock, and was once an accomplished saxophone player. He started playing the instrument in the third grade, but eventually gave it up once he got to high school to focus on football.

♦ He was fourth on the team with 62 tackles last year, including 18.5 for loss, which was second in the ACC.

• He also had eight sacks (fourth in the ACC), 21 quarterback hurries and two forced fumbles. He blocked a field goal at Boston College, the first of his career. Worlds was named second-team All-ACC at end with his running mate Orion Martin. The two teamed up in the ACC Championship Game when Worlds sacked BC quarterback Dominique Davis, stripping the ball which Martin scooped up and returned 17 yards for a touchdown.

THE GRAVE DIGGER

• **John Graves** made an immediate impact on special teams last year, blocking a PAT against ECU, a field goal against Furman and a PAT against Georgia Tech.

• He became the first Tech player to block a kick in three consecutive games under **Frank Beamer**. The Richmond native also had 26 tackles, two fumble recoveries, a forced fumble and two pass break ups last season from his defensive tackle spot.

• He made the move to defensive end for the spring and is capable of playing both spots, but will be back starting in the middle. He has three stops and six quarterback hurries this year.

The only other Tech player (any class) to score five or more TDs in the first two games during that span was sophomore tailback Branden Ore, who had five in 2005.

0 ... turnovers for Virginia Tech in its game last season at Nebraska.

BUSTIN' LOOSE

• Defensive end **Nekos Brown** is the son of Chuck Brown, who is known as the godfather of Go-Go music, and is a famous songwriter and performer. The elder Brown had the No. 1 national R&B hit in "Bustin' Loose" in 1978. The hook from that song was used by Nelly in the 2002 No. 1 hit "Hot in Herre."

• The elder Brown turned 73 in August, and to honor him, the city designated the portion of Seventh Street NW from T Street to Florida Avenue as Chuck Brown Way.

• The younger Brown served as the main backup at both defensive end spots last year, but started in the Orange Bowl. He had 22 tackles, including two sacks, last year.

• Brown makes the move to the starting spot this year in his final season.

LEARNING ON THE FLY

• For defensive end **Chris Drager**, he's learning his new position on the fly this fall. The redshirt sophomore, who tore his ACL in 2007, moved to defensive end after spring practice ended and didn't get a chance to take a snap there before the first day of practice in August. The Pennsylvania native was a standout defensive end in high school, but played his first two years in college at tight end.

JOHNSON TRANSFORMS INTO A STARTER

• Sophomore linebacker **Jake Johnson**, who has taken over for Purnell Sturdivant, was quite a wrestling fan growing up. By his own account, he was out of shape and getting picked on in elementary school so he began working out while watching television, particularly professional wrestling and used that motivation to transform his body to what it is today at 6-1, 231 pounds.

• Johnson didn't disappoint in his collegiate debut, racking up a game high 13 tackles, including one for a loss, to go along with a pass break up against No. 5 Alabama.

THOMPSON AND TAYLOR IMPRESSIVE

• Two of Tech's defensive tackles pulled off impressive feats this summer, one in the weight room and one off the field. Senior **Cordarrow Thompson**, who lost over 30 pounds before last season, continued his transformation this summer and checked into camp at 301 pounds, 40 pounds lighter than when he arrived in 2005 at 341 pounds.

• Senior **Demetrius Taylor**, who at 6-0, 273 pounds isn't a prototypical defensive tackle, broke the program's all-time push jerk record in summer maxing with a 410-pound lift. He also power cleaned a team-best 380 pounds (sixth best in program history), front squatted 465 pounds (a new defensive tackle record) and bench pressed a team-high 475 pounds (seventh best in program history).

ATHLETICS RUNS IN THE FAMILY

• **Danny Coale** comes from quite the athletic family. His brother, Kevin, played midfield for the University of Virginia men's lacrosse team.

• Their father, Jimmy, is the head strength and conditioning coach at VMI. Danny led the team with 36 receptions for 408 yards last year, with a long of 35 yards. He set the school's freshman reception record with 36 and has caught at least two passes in 13 of 16 career games played.

BIG-PLAY BOYKIN

• Sophomore **Jarrett Boykin** became a big-play receiver for the Hokies last year and uses his big hands to help with snagging passes. Boykin's hands are so large that he has to wear size-3X receiver's gloves. His thick fingers bust the seams of the gloves, sending him back to equipment manager Lester Karlin often for a replacement pair.

• He had 30 grabs for a team-leading 441 yards and the lone touchdown catches (two) by a receiver last year.

DUAL-THREAT DYRELL

• Another sophomore receiver, **Dyrell Roberts**, contributes on both offense and special teams. The former high school tailback had 17 catches for 227 yards last year, but found a niche as a kickoff return man. He averaged 24.8 yards per return with returns of 55 and 54 yards.

Against Alabama in the season opener, he returned a kickoff 98 yards for a touchdown - the fifth longest return in school history - and finished with 195 total yards on kickoff returns. He caught his first collegiate touchdown pass against Marshall.

BOYCE BREAKS INTO STARTING LINEUP

• Redshirt freshman **Xavier Boyce** used a big spring and good fall to snatch the starting

split end spot this season. He was ready to contribute last season before hurting his knee early in the season, which led to surgery and a medical hardship.

♦ The Virginia Beach product is from the same high school as Percy Harvin (University of Florida; Minnesota Vikings) and caught his first collegiate touchdown pass against Marshall.

A REWARD FOR GOOD GRADES

♦ The Tech football team eats its meals in order of grade point average. Those players who have graduated, as well as those players who maintain the highest grade point average, eat all team meals first. Coach Beamer invites each player to eat, calling out his name and his grade point average, starting with the highest.

ATHLETIC OFFENSIVE LINEMEN

♦ This year's offensive line is one of Tech's most athletic in recent years as five players in the two-deep started their collegiate careers at tight end. Starters **Ed Wang** (left tackle) and **Beau Warren** (center), along with back-ups **Greg Nosal** (left guard), **Richard Graham** (right guard) and **Andrew Lanier** (right tackle) all came to Blacksburg as tight ends before making the move to the interior line.

♦ Duane Brown made the same move early in his career and was a first-round draft pick

of the Houston Texans in 2008 year and is in his second year as a starter.

EXCELLING ON THE DIAMOND

♦ Rover **Dorian Porch** was eyed by the Arizona Diamondbacks as a potential early round choice, but Porch elected to turn down a sizable offer and come to Tech. Last year, Porch started the last nine games and had 48 tackles, including four for loss. He has started both games this year and has eight tackles.

♦ The senior was again one of the top leapers on the team in July max testing, posting a 41" vertical jump, second only to wide receiver **Marcus Davis'** 42.5" jump.

A FAMILY ATMOSPHERE

♦ **Cody Grimm** is just one of several Hokies on the roster to have family ties to the Tech football program. Cody is the brother of Chad Grimm, who lettered four times as a linebacker and special teams standout in 2006.

♦ Starting center **Beau Warren** is following two brothers who played for the Hokies. Blake played linebacker for Tech earlier this decade and Brett was a starting linebacker last year.

♦ **Cam Martin** played with his brother, Orion, as starters on Tech's defense the last two years. The pair's uncle, Bobby, played for Tech in the late '80s.

♦ Redshirt freshmen **Vinston Painter** and **Randall Dunn** are cousins.

♦ **Nekos Brown** is joined on the team this year by his brother, **Wiley**, who is a transfer from Duquesne and is sitting out this year due to transfer rules. The Browns are one of four sets of brothers on this year's squad.

♦ **Jerrodd Williams** is a true freshman for the Hokies this year, while his brother, **Jerome**, is a walk-on transfer who attended Clemson last year but didn't play football.

♦ Punter **Brent Bowden** has a younger brother, **Grant**, who is a walk-on punter on this year's team.

♦ Brothers **Ed** and **David Wang** are on the same squad together for one year as Ed is a redshirt senior and David is a true freshman.

ROCKIN' OUT WITH BOWDEN

♦ Punter **Brent Bowden** is the brother of former Florida State punter Chris Hall and was the best man this past summer in Hall's wedding. He is also Tech's first regular starting punter not to kick left-footed — Jimmy Kibble (1996-1999), Robert Peaslee (2000), Vinnie Burns (2001-2004) and finally Nic Schmitt (2005-2006) — since the 1995 season.

♦ He also serves as the holder on the PATs and field goals. Through two games, he is averaging 45.8 yards on 11 punts with a long of 57 yards and four kicks downed inside the 20-yard line.

♦ Bowden is an avid guitar player who records his own music, mostly rock. He says his dream is to play "Enter Sandman" on his guitar for the whole stadium as the team runs on the field for a home game.

ANOTHER ONE-YEAR KICKER

♦ For the third year in a row, Tech is relying on a senior walk-on for the kicking duties. In 2007, it was Jud Dunlevy, who went 21-for-26 on the season. Last year, Dustin Keys set a school record with 23 field goals. This year, it's **Matt Waldron's** turn. The transfer from Penn State hasn't kicked in a game since high school,

but has been to three straight Orange Bowls (one with PSU, two with VT).

♦ He is 10-for-10 on extra points and 2-for-2 on field goals this year.

♦ This past spring, Waldron would ride his mountain bike up a hill near his apartment every other day. He would put it in the highest gear and pedal up the hill and back down it, several times and then run the hill several times to help build up strength in his kicking leg. His outstanding preseason earned him a scholarship just two days before fall classes began.

HOSLEY TO THE HOUSE

♦ True freshman Jayron Hosley was the last player to verbal to Tech before signing day last year after getting a late offer from the Hokies. He's quickly making a name for himself on the college level, mainly as a punt returner. He is averaging 24.8 yards on four returns and had a 64-yard return for a score against Marshall, becoming the first freshman under head coach Frank Beamer to return a punt for a score.

♦ The speedy Hosley is from Delray Beach, Fla., where he attended Atlantic High School, the same high school as two former Hokies who are now in the NFL - Brandon Flowers (Chiefs) and David Clowney (Jets).

TAKING CARE OF WALK-ONS

♦ Former walk-on John Engelberger was a starter for the San Francisco 49ers and Denver Broncos, and John Burke played in the Super Bowl with the New England Patriots in 1987. Current Tech walk-ons who have earned scholarships include **Matt Waldron**, **Cody Grimm**, **Matt Reidy**, **Justin Myer** and **Brandon Dillard**.

HONORED BY THE AFCA

♦ Tech was one of six ACC schools, and one of just 46 around the country, honored in 2008 by the AFCA for graduation rates. It marks the sixth time in the past eight years Tech has

♦ Of the 22 seniors on this year's squad, 10 have graduated and eight others are on track to graduate in December and two more by the end of the school year.

♦ Three players are in grad school, including Martin, who will earn his Master's in business management this December. Lewis and Muncey are also in grad school.

CONSTANTS ON THE SIDELINES

♦ **Billy Hite**, who has helped develop 24 running backs who have gone on to sign with NFL teams, and equipment manager **Lester Karlin** are both in their 32nd season on the Tech staff.

♦ Hite came to Blacksburg as a member of Bill Dooley's football staff in 1978 and remained at Tech when **Frank Beamer** took over in 1987 and was elevated to the position of assistant head coach by Beamer the following year. He was promoted to the new position of associate head coach in December 2000.

♦ In 1989, Hite filled in as the acting head coach when Beamer was sidelined following coronary angioplasty surgery and had to miss a home game versus Tulane. Hite didn't let the

Tech faithful down as he led the Hokies to an emotional 30-13 victory.

♦ Both Hite and Karlin have been on the sideline for 373 consecutive Tech games.

♦ Long snapper **Collin Carroll** is the first player under **Frank Beamer** from Minnesota. His father, Jay, played tight end for the University of Minnesota in the early '80s and played in the NFL for the Minnesota Vikings and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

♦ Carroll handles the punt, PAT and extra point snaps for the Hokies.

A UNIQUE SUMMER EXPERIENCE

♦ Freshmen **Tariq Edwards** and **David Wilson** played for USA Football's 2009 Junior National Team this past summer, which competed in the sport's first junior world championship. National football teams from Canada, France, Germany, Japan, Mexico, New Zealand and Sweden qualified to join the United States.

♦ Wilson was voted by his teammates as one of four team captains for the tournament and was the USA Team's Opening Ceremony Flag Bearer. Wilson has an older brother, Ronald presently serving the U.S. Navy in San Diego aboard the USS Ronald Reagan.

♦ Wilson, who rushed for eight touchdowns and 425 yards on 33 carries in three games, earned tournament MVP honors in helping lead the USA to the gold medal. Edwards recorded 10 tackles in three games, including three sacks for a total loss of 49 yards.

IN ELITE COMPANY

♦ Since 1980, Tech is one of just six schools to produce the No. 1 pick in the NFL Draft twice. The other schools are Miami, Ohio State, Auburn, Southern Cal and Penn State. Tech was second to USC with eight draft picks in 2008.

KING OF THE COURT

♦ Long snapper **Matt Tuttle** was named the school's Homecoming King at halftime of the Western Kentucky University game last year, accepting the sash and scepter in full football uniform at midfield.

BEAMERBALL

♦ During the **Frank Beamer** era at Tech, putting points on the scoreboard has always been a team effort — the offense, the defense and the special teams. It's called BeamerBall, and what sets it apart are the contributions of the defense and special teams.

♦ Seven of Tech's last 10 teams are ranked among the school's top 10 highest scoring teams. During that time, a player at every position on the defensive unit has produced at least one touchdown, and 32 different players have scored touchdowns while playing on Tech's special teams. Altogether, the defense and special teams have combined for 122 TDs since Beamer arrived in 1987, including 105 in Tech's past 193 games.

♦ Under Beamer, Tech's defense has scored 79 TDs, with 51 coming on pass interceptions, 26 on fumble returns and two on fumble recoveries. The special teams have added 43 TDs, including 15 on blocked punts, 17 on punt returns, six on kickoff returns, four on blocked field goals and one on a fumble recovery.

♦ Fittingly, the trend started in Beamer's first game as Tech's head coach when true freshman Jon Jeffries returned a kickoff 92 yards for a touchdown against Clemson. It was the Hokies' first TD under Beamer, and it was the first of many scored by the special teams.

♦ Under Beamer, 76 different players on defense and special teams have scored TDs. Twenty of those players — Don Stokes, Jock Jones, Roger Brown, Lawrence Lewis, Antonio Banks, Jim Baron, Keion Carpenter, Pierson Prioleau, Anthony Midget, Cory Bird, Kevin McCadam, Willie Pile, Jimmy Williams, Roland Minor, Vince Hall, D.J. Parker, Brandon Flowers, Chris Ellis, Vincent Fuller and Eric Green — scored twice.

♦ Eddie Royal, Xavier Adibi, Jason Lallis, Ike Charlton and Ricky Hall each had three scores, André Davis had four, Victor Harris had five and DeAngelo Hall had seven.

♦ Since the start of the 1993 season, Tech is 67-13 in games it scores at least one TD on defense or special teams. Tech is 71-23 under Beamer when scoring a non-offensive touchdown.

BEAMERBALL II

♦ Tech's tradition for blocking kicks is another part of BeamerBall. It was carried to new heights in 1998 with 10 blocks during the regular season and two more in the Hokies' Music City Bowl game against Alabama.

♦ Tech now has 122 blocks in **Frank Beamer's** 270 games as the head coach. The Hokies have blocked 60 punts (15 for TDs), 38 field goals and 24 extra points.

♦ The most prolific kick blockers under Beamer have been defensive lineman Bernard Basham and safety Keion Carpenter, who each posted six blocks during their Tech careers. Basham blocked three field goals and three PATs, while Carpenter blocked six punts.

♦ Tech blocked more kicks in the 1990s than any other Division I-A team. The Hokies blocked 63 kicks during the decade — 31 punts, 18 PATs and 14 FGs. Tech has 46 blocks in this decade.

♦ During the Beamer era, Tech has blocked two kicks in a game 21 times, winning 16 of those games. Tech blocked two kicks against four different teams in 1998.

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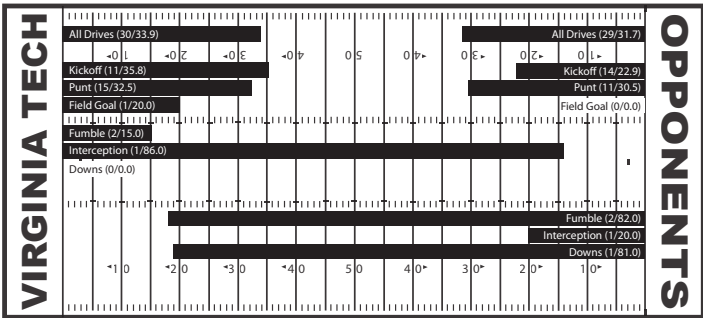
