Bates numbers

All pages of every document retrieved during the litigation "discovery process" has been assigned a unique number, usually numerical, however, in some cases it is an alphanumeric sequence. This number is referred to as the Bates number, named after the Bates automatic numbering machine. The Bates number is the document identifier and the format and length of the number varies across the tobacco company document websites. The following table illustrates some of the key differences.
