

performances (including three world premieres), 8 posters, and 2 special sessions on music and In Spring 2010, the Graduate Seminar in World Music (MUS 5263) made in-depth explorations of three world cultures. Led by Dr. Mark Brill, the seminar first investigated Native American

music, which included participation in the United San Antonio Powwow in February, a guest lecture by Apache shaman Sonny Molina, and the performance of several Native American drum songs. The focus of the seminar then moved to Indonesia, and the students explored gamelan music from both Java and Bali. The class held a workshop with Dr. Gordon Jones, an ethnomusicologist at Texas State University at San Marcos and an expert in Indonesian gamelan. The third culture the seminar explored was that of West Africa, and this endeavor was greatly enhanced by the presence of Ghanaian master drummer Jerry Kwashie Dzokoto, who did several performances, workshops and lectures during a week long residence at UTSA. The culmination of the seminar was the world music recital on Tuesday, April 13, which featured performances of the Native American
