# Long-Term Implications of Early Substance Abuse

- Tobacco use among adolescents is a powerful predictor of other drug use.
- For adolescent males, alcohol use is a strong predictor of progression into the use of other drugs.
- The age when adolescents first start using alcohol, tobacco, and illicit drugs is also a reliable predictor of later alcohol and drug problems.

# Intervention Diverts Kids from Court System

- Intervention occurs when a child has become a law violator or whose improper behavior has become a public concern
  - Status Offender Programs
  - Youth Court
- Requires Judicial, Juvenile Justice system and community involvement

#### **Youth Courts**

- Youth Court allows first time underage tobacco and alcohol offenders and teen volunteers to participate in a jury trial process to determine the penalties for the referred offenders using teen volunteers as attorneys and jury members.
- Teen volunteers and offenders grow in many aspects of life by gaining perspective about substance abuse, Idaho's judicial system and gain respect for themselves and their community.
- Upon completion of Youth Court no Court record is maintained of the offense.

  - 2. Programs should address all forms of drug abuse, alone or in combination.


#### Youth Courts Prevents Substance Abuse

  - Positive Peer Influence
- Reduce risk factors
  - Drug resistance skills
  - Reinforce anti-drug attitudes


#### Status Offender Program

- Intervene with youth who have committed a status offense; an act illegal due to the status as a minor
- Work with the family to identify issues and areas of risk including tobacco and substance abuse concerns
- Provide resources to the offender and family to enhance relationships and enhance skills of the youth

# Status Offender Services Prevents Substance Abuse

- Enhance protective factors
  - Encourage Family Bonding
  - Support proper school behavior
- Reduce risk factors
  - Smoking cessation classes
  - Substance abuse testing (Including nicotine testing)
