Finally, a special note to our readers: We have always thought of *The Walrus* as belonging to you, and meeting your high expectations - for great writing, elevated art, and for Canada - is what drives the magazine. Thank you."

"Ken has done a marvelous job as editor of *The Walrus* – Canada's Magazine of the Year in 2007," says Shelley Ambrose, executive director of The Walrus Foundation and publisher of *The Walrus*. "Ken has put his heart, soul, passion, and resources behind *The Walrus* and the charitable, non-profit Walrus Foundation, the internship program and the public events that help to continue the conversations with Canadians that begin in the pages of the award-winning magazine.
