History Student Headlines Bethel College maintains chokehold on state competition

Senior Miriam Friesen continued Bethel's dominance of the annual Kansas Association of Historians student paper competition. Friesen, a history major from Filley, Neb., won the competition with her paper "Becoming Better Men," an examination of race and gender in two Kansas Civilian Conservation Corps camps during the 1930s. Friesen was the 22nd Bethel student to win this award.

History nerds win Undergraduate Research Awards...again

Once again, Bethel College history majors won Undergraduate Research Awards to fund summer research, snapping up two of the five awards given out in 2009. Victoria Janzen, a senior from Wichita, will use the funds to continue her research on Kansas citizens' participation in the national Peace Ribbon Project, a peace initiative used to call attention to the issue of nuclear disarmament in the 1980s. Meredith Lehman, a senior from Bluffton, Ohio, will use the funds to examine the historical importance of the 9th Mennonite World Conference in Curitiba, Brazil, the first such conference to be held

Professional Activities Associate Professor Mark Jantzen

Mark published "Wealth and Power in the Vistula River Mennonite Community, 1772-1914" in the Journal of Mennonite Studies 27 (2009): 93-107. This article was based on the presentation with the same title he gave at a conference in October on "Mennonites and Money: Wealth and Poverty in the Past and Present" at the University of Winnipeg. He also presented a summary of ongoing research as part of Bethel's Faculty Seminar series in April in a talk entitled "Mennonite German Soldiers: Intersections of Nation, Religion, and Family in the Prussian East, 1772-1880."

Associate Professor Penelope Adams Moon

Penny spent her sabbatical traveling, researching and playing with her daughter. In February, she traveled to South Africa and visited sites of historical importance, including the Apartheid Museum in Johannesburg, the District Six Museum in Cape Town and the Robben Island Prison Museum. July found Penny at the

Mennonite Church USA conference in Columbus, Ohio, where she gave a seminar entitled "Welcomed as I was: A Catholic at home in the Mennonite Church." She spent most of her sabbatical, however, researching and writing about the public uproar surrounding the American government's use of napalm in the 1960s and 1970s. She was especially thankful that her sabbatical allowed her to pull her daughter out of day care and keep her home during the spring semester.

Professor Emeritus Keith Sprunger

Various historical projects are on Keith's agenda. He is on the Newton/North Newton Historic Preservation Commission and, further afield, on the board of the Germantown Mennonite Historic Trust (which maintains the 1770 Mennonite meetinghouse in Philadelphia – the oldest Mennonite church building in America). Then there is always the ongoing work of writing the new 125th anniversary history of Bethel (to be out by 2012).

Professor Emeritus Jim Juhnke

Jim has been working on two self-published family history books. One, published earlier this year, was Speaking for Herself, The Autobiographical Writings of Anna K. Juhnke. Another will be off the press shortly: So Much to be Thankful For, The Story of Bill and Meta Goering Juhnke, 1912-1996. Both books are currently online at www.juhnke.com. Jim still receives invitations to talk about his book The Missing Peace, The Search for Alternatives to Violence in American History (2001, 2004).
