A Letter from the President

The Muslim Association of Canada (MAC) was established in 1997. From the outset, we were blessed to have a mix of experienced activists and enthusiastic and dedicated younger members. MAC is devoted to a vision of Canada in which the prevalent understanding of Islam is a balanced one. We see a future in which the community is constructively engaged in the broader issues of our country and is integrated into its social and cultural fabric. We strive to meet these goals while retaining the distinctiveness associated with our faith.

Our chief asset in bringing about this vision is people. We strive to develop ourselves and our fellow Muslims to understand, appreciate and cherish the challenges that lie before us.

As a result of the generosity of the community and with the help of a Grant from the Government of Ontario, we have recruited an Executive Director for the Centre who can effectively manage the day-to-day needs of running the facilities and looking after its tenants. Having purchased the building with our Capital Campaign, we have a responsibility to our tenants to keep the building in good order.

We have been blessed with incredible volunteers. One of our goals is to further develop the volunteer program by recruiting and training more volunteers. This will allow us to continue to expand our programs and services in order to reach as many young people as possible. Nurturing our volunteers sets a




wonderful example for our youth, encouraging them to be involved in the future.

Our responsibility to the youth we serve is to ensure we maintain a positive, supportive and responsive environment with all the programs and services to meet their needs. This requires continuous evaluation of our services and programs in order to serve the needs of young people.

We have been humbled by the great response to the Centre and its activities and programs. By the grace of Allah, the Centre has achieved several successes. We know that however much we accomplish, much remains to be done. Our responsibility to our youth and to our donors is to be transparent with both our needs and reporting of how we steward the funds we receive. The first installments towards the purchase of the Centre were made possible by the generosity of many individuals, families and indeed young people over the last two years. In order to continue to serve our youth, we must plan for the future. To secure funding for the Centre and future activities and programs, we are actively seeking grant funding from a variety of sources. Our current grant from the Trillium Foundation of the Government of Ontario provides funding for salary support to facilitate managing, enhancing and developing programs for the Centre. Revenue from our tenants covers a portion of our operational, maintenance and some program costs.

In order to support our ongoing work, we have two major requirements: ongoing payments towards the capital cost of the building; and the programs and services so necessary for our young people.
