Rasul v. Bush and Hamdi v. Rumsfeld

The Ruling: Guantanamo detainees may challenge their detentions in federal court

The Response: Pentagon set up secret military panels to review cases, decide if they were enemy combatants; Congress passed law to formalize process, strip federal district courts of authority to hear new detainee cases

Hamden v. Rumsfeld

The Ruling: Bush administration military commissions violated Geneva Conventions; detainees could pursue cases in civilian courts The Response: White House asked Congress for new law; the Military Commissions Act said federal courts could not hear any detainee challenges, detainees would be tired before commissions that could consider hearsay evidence and evidence obtained through coercion

June 2008



The Ruling: Foreign detainees have the right to challenge their detention in civilian courts

The Response: Resurrected nearly 200 detainee cases that had been on hold in the Washington federal courthouse
