How do you believe that, as a teacher at Newington, you have discovered what's possible?

The development of the Wind Band and Jazz programs has been an exciting journey over the last three years. Since starting at Newington, the number of boys involved has more than doubled and the standard has advanced significantly. An international tour had been at the end of my five-year plan so to realise this goal with the recent Music tour to the USA was testament to the hard work of many staff and students!

I am very proud of the team of tutoring staff which has grown to include some of Sydney's best musicians regularly working with our boys.

I have also been lucky to continually develop my skills through participation in conducting courses. Over the last two years I have earned scholarships to conduct the Adelaide Symphony Orchestra, the Auckland Philharmonic Orchestra and to participate in a course at the University of Texas, Austin. However the job is not done; I want to see our ensembles grow in standard to be amongst the world's best!

How do you work with our boys to help them achieve their personal best?

Promoting a safe environment where boys can challenge themselves without fear of failure is my primary focus. Assisting boys with goal-setting, both individually and as part of an ensemble, gives me the opportunity to open their minds to possibilities previously inconceivable.

I try to be an example of positivity and hard work. I encourage the boys, as people in the past have encouraged me, to 'bite off more than you can chew and chew like crazy'

What do you like the most about working at Newington?

Newington has a fantastic culture of support. It impressed me from day one that boys are encouraged to try their hand at so many different activities. The recent push by our Year 12 boys to 'Strive and Support' is the epitome of this attitude where successes are celebrated equally. While Newington's ethos is for all our boys to 'discover what's possible', one of the things I truly enjoy about Newington is the willingness to then take the next step, asking 'how do we make it happen?'

What do you do to relax?

I am happy to admit that I am a huge nerd! Settling into study to learn some music or practising the trombone are my favoured leisure time activities. I am mad about cricket in summer and a tragic Wests Tigers fan come the colder months, but I can't go past the enjoyment of good food and great wine, preferably in my wife's company. Blissful!

A little known fact about me is...

If I wasn't a musician I'd probably be a horticulturalist. I worked in a garden centre for a few years and loved it!

It was also disappointing to lose the services of the Rev David Russell who, after a number of years on Council, has found it necessary to retire. We thank them both and wish them well for the future.




Who is Roy Zimmerman?

Roy Zimmerman was Master of the Wyvern House Preparatory School from 1966 to 1996. He had a strong educational philosophy, believing that primary school boys should have a happy, rich learning environment in which each student felt highly valued, regardless of his background or ability, and where boys' latent abilities and creativity would be stimulated to the full.

Committed to resource-based learning, he established an excellent library and Visual Arts centre, staffed by specialist teachers; a video station linked to all classrooms; a computer

lab; and computer facilities within classrooms. Mr Zimmerman broadened the curriculum, with specialist teaching for a range of subjects, and launched a developmental music program and an annual Art Show. He encouraged parental involvement and oversaw the establishment of the Wyvern Mothers' Club. During his time, enrolments at Wyvern House grew from 166 to 358 boys. Active at the professional level, he served as NSW Chairman and Federal Secretary and Chairman of the Junior School Headmasters' Association of Australia. He died in 2002.

called 'Information to Knowledge' by new staff member Paul Huebl. In Information to Knowledge (I2K) lessons, students are taught the explicit skills required to successfully participate in enhanced educational programs containing independent and guided inquiry learning experiences. The skills gained are intended to equip Newington boys with the appropriate habits of learning that will lead to lifelong success in academic pursuits.

The skills delivered to students fall under three broad, interlocking categories: ICT Skills, Research Skills and Thinking Skills.

The teaching of ICT Skills is split into understanding technology and using technology. Students who are taught to understand the role of technology in our modern society are more likely to embrace its use in independent practice, as well as make appropriate decisions about its use in a variety of situations. Similarly, students who have strong skills based on confidence and experience will see the use of technology as a natural part of their learning practices, leading to successful experiences that further enhance their learning.

The Research Skills Program being delivered to all our boys follows a six-step process: Define, Locate, Select, Organise, Present and Select. The rationale behind the use of this model is that it is explicitly

CATCH IT IF YOU CAN!

Wyvern continues to strive to keep abreast of current research and to lead the way in boys' education. The NSW Schools Physical Activity and Nutrition Survey (SPANS) 2010 was an initiative by the New South Wales Government to identify key trends for children in physical activity, obesity, diet and fundamental movement skills. The report identified that less than half of Kindergarten. Year 2 and Year 4 students meet the Australian physical activity guidelines and indicated a decline in skill mastery over a range of areas.

In light of this research, staff members at Wyvern have designed a Gross Motor Program for K-2 students to promote the development of key fundamental movement skills in a fun and cooperative learning environment. Each K-2 class participates in two half-hourly sessions each week where the boys rotate through a number of activities. Each activity targets specific gross motor skills to enable boys to become stronger, more fluid, and more coordinated. The games are designed to promote inclusivity, maximum participation, and a sense of enjoyment of physical pursuits. We also believe that this will have a flow-on effect to the fine motor skill development required in the classroom.

The Gross Motor Program complements

the well-established PDHPE program and is run by the K-2 staff. The program aims to further prepare boys for participation in competitive sport and to promote a life-long love of physical activity.



The 2011 Academic Excellence Assembly was held on 23 February. This Annual Assembly paid homage to the Class of 2010, saluting the highest achievers in the Higher School Certificate and International Baccalaureate Diploma Programme.

Over the Christmas holidays 12 students, myself and three other staff members had the opportunity to take part in Newington College's Nepal

trek. We spent 24 days hiking, rafting, elephant-riding and ambling our way through the incredible mountains and vibrant communities of Nepal. While the boys enjoyed the adventure side of the trip, the experiences which they have most frequently identified as being the highlight of the trip were those which were the most 'everyday', as well as the opportunity to spend time at the SOS International Hermann Gmeiner schools and Children's villages.

Many boys commented that the opportunity given to them to explore the cities of Pokara and Bhaktapur gave them a real feel for the 'welcoming, warm and patient nature of the Nepalese people'. Most of our students engaged in long conversations with store holders, and in some cases felt compelled to return to their shops and farewell them formally before our departure. One of our younger students commented that his experiences

in the cities 'opened my mind to other, poorer people's situations and made me a lot more grateful for my life', while another commented that because of the his experiences on the trip he felt that he had a 'more realistic understanding of the lives of others' and that getting to know the real situation of the people of Nepal 'personalised the compassion I already felt'. Even small things, like the unreliable supply of power resulted in many students realising just how much they take for granted at home, and how much they can

As a teacher, seeing the interest in the faces of the students as they looked out over the mountain ridges they were to climb, learnt a new game of cards from the Sherpa guides, or were shown around

the facilities of the Herman Gmeiner schools made the trip most valuable. Seeing students engage with others on a person-to-person level and wanting only to learn and understand the exchange was inspiring. Many of the students were impressed by not only the 'overall kindness', knowledge and guidance shown to us by our guide Ang, but also by his humanitarian deeds. Ang assists in the organising and funding of a medical centre for his village, which boys found 'inspiring and selfless'.

I believe that by travelling through Nepal, our students were able to better understand their place in the world, their ability to engage independently with that world, and to do so with kindness. Mr Marcel Hennes - Head of Co-curricular

STAGE BAND AND WIND ENSEMBLE TOUR USA

The College's Stage Band and Wind Ensemble toured to the USA in December 2010. The trip included a variety of musical experiences such as performances, workshops

with leading US conductors and exchange events with US schools. The eagerly anticipated culmination of the tour was our attendance at the Midwest International Band and Orchestra Directors' Conference in Chicago. This is the largest music conference of its type in the world.

One of the first stops was Disneyland where the Stage Band performed and the Wind Ensemble recorded music for several Disney animations in a professional studio. These two events were well-received by the boys and rewarded by free time spent in Disneyland.

We enjoyed time on campus at the University of Southern California, Los Angeles and the University of California, Berkeley. Visiting the music faculties at both universities, the Directors of Bands workshopped the Wind Ensemble and offered great insight into the music prepared by the group.

In San Francisco both ensembles performed for the public. One of these performances was at a Jazz festival where the Stage Band impressed many of the locals with their energy and polish. An exhilarating walk across the Golden Gate Bridge and an eerie night-time tour of Alcatraz balanced the musical experiences.

Once in Chicago, Newington's musicians were treated to worldclass ensemble performances by the Chicago Symphony Brass, the President's Own Marine Band and the Navy Commodores to name only a few. We linked with these performers both formally and informally. The Chicago Symphony Orchestra's Principal Horn Player, Mr Dale Clevenger, gave a particularly notable masterclass.

More concerts, performances, workshops and a little shopping rounded out the time spent in 'the windy city'. Walking to breakfast each morning at -10° C (not including the wind chill) certainly helped us enjoy our hot food.

Above all, musical experience was the priority of our first overseas tour in a decade. The ensembles did themselves proud at every event and were enriched



YEAR 12 VISUAL ARTS CAMP

Every year, for the past 11 years, the Visual Arts department has taken Senior art students to the Arthur and Yvonne Boyd Education Centre located in Riversdale near Nowra in New South Wales.

Arthur and Yvonne Boyd's Bundanon property and art collection is a unique Australian cultural and environmental asset. The gift was born out of Arthur Boyd's often stated belief that 'you can't own a landscape' and he deeply felt that others might also draw inspiration from Bundanon.

The building in which the boys worked and slept has been independently recognised for architectural excellence. Designed by Australian architect Glen Murcutt and opened in 1999, Newington College has been the longest attending school using the site to develop and enhance the artmaking skills of HSC Visual Arts students.

During the four days at Bundanon, boys engaged in a series of workshops exploring and experimenting with a range of artmaking materials. They also worked alongside teaching staff to develop a major painting of the Shoalhaven River and a series of charcoal, pencil and watercolour works. Time was spent independently developing ideas for HSC major artworks as well as participating in a series of art history lessons and a tour of the artist's studio and home and museum.

This enriching experience provided the boys with an invaluable source of reference in devising their own ideas for artmaking and enabled them to connect with the lives of significant Australian artists.


1ST XI WINS **CHAPLAIN'S TROPHY**

NEWINGTON COLLEGE CENTRE FOR ETHICS

The first event of 2011 was a lecture by Professor Jake Lynch, Director of the Centre for Peace and Conflict Studies at the University of Sydney. He also showed extracts from his new alternative news program, *News Goo*.

Peace Journalism is a field of journalism practice and theory, pioneered by Jake Lynch, as a response to traditional War Journalism. It asks editors and reporters to consciously make choices about what to report and how to report, being careful to do justice to the complexity of conflict situations and avoid unhelpful stereotypes. The

lecture highlighted the ways in which the international media can influence, for better or worse, events in war-torn areas of the world.

The lecture was held in the College's new gallery and was timed to coincide with an exhibition of paintings by the Australian war artist George Gittoes AM. The lecture drew a large and enthusiastic audience of students, teachers, parents and guests.

We will soon release details of our upcoming 'Tools for Tupou' drive: a unique opportunity to sponsor specific tools for Tupou College.



Newington Medal Mr Barry Collins (ON '52) OAM



Kevin Barry Collins commenced his education at Newington in February 1949, leaving in December 1952 after an interesting school life which included sporting achievements in Athletics, Cricket and Rugby. At the same time, he was an enthusiastic and talented Tennis player and his lifelong passion for Basketball also began at Newington, in 1952.

While serving as a Cadet at Newington, Barry was Drum Major in the College Bugle and Drum Band. He continued his military interest by joining the Citizens Military Force (1953–1963). During this time Barry joined the NSW Police Force in 1958. He was stationed in Darlinghurst where he crossed paths with some of Sydney's more infamous characters until his retirement in 1980.

Barry is the founding member of the Australasian Native Orchid Society and is a life member of the Eastern Suburbs Orchid Society, and the Orchid Society of NSW. He is also a member of the City of Sydney Basketball Association, which he joined 54 years ago as a player, later becoming a coach, then Vice President. Barry received his Order of Australia Medal (OAM) in 2000 for service to the community.

Barry has been an active member of the ONU since leaving school, which led him to become an ONU Council member. He is the current Chairman of the 70 Club. In 2010, Barry became one of two patrons of Newington's Founders Society and became one of the 25 founding members of the Society.


TWO ONU CENTENNIAL TRUST **RECIPIENTS IN 2010!**

Two endowments to worthy and deserving applicants: Lyndon Arden-Wong (ON '97) and Mark Longhurst (ON '04) shared a \$16,500 endowment to help fund their respective fields of study.



Lyndon Arden-Wong (ON '97)

Lyndon Arden-Wong is an historical archaeologist with interests in the 'Silk Road' and Inner Asian culture. Lyndon will be using his endowment to assist with his research, travel and study abroad this year and in 2012. He will also take part in an archaeological excavation in Mongolia with the German Archaeological Institute and in Tajikistan with Moscow State University.

RECOGNITION OF CONTRIBUTION TO MEDICINE

ROBERT LYNE-SANDS (ON '60)



Dr Robert Lyne-Sands (ON '60) was recently honoured at a prestigious medical symposium in the United States. Robert was awarded the Richard A Neubauer Research Institute Award in recognition of his significant contribution to Hyperbaric Medicine, which is the medical use of oxygen at a level higher than atmospheric pressure. It can be used for military applications such as diving and aviation accidents, as well as bio-welfare casualties. Civilian applications include treating many pathogenic infections such as the MRSA bug, which is a common 'staph' bacterium, found in hospitals.

Robert has established a number of outpatient Hyperbaric Oxygen Treatment centres across the United States, Mexico and Southeast Asia. His San Diego facility currently uses cutting edge technology for the treatment of malignant cancers and head injuries.

OLD BOY ESTABLISHES WORLD RENOWNED 'CELIAC DISEASE CENTER' IN THE USA



Dr Peter Green, (ON '64) attended Newington at Killara, then Stanmore from 1958 to 1964. He then attended Medical School at the University of Sydney, graduating with First Class Honours. After an internship and residency at the Royal North Shore Hospital, Sydney, his training in Gastroenterology was completed at Royal North Shore Hospital, Harvard Medical School and at the Beth Israel Hospital in Boston, Massachusetts.

Dr Peter Green is now the director of the Celiac Disease Center at Columbia University, the mission of which is to redefine the future of celiac disease and treatment on an ongoing basis, through continuing advances in research and patient care as well as physician and public education. Celiac Disease has been Dr Green's focus for almost 20

years, with equal concentration on patient care and research. He is one of the few recognised experts in the United States with intense clinical and academic expertise in Celiac Disease.

The Celiac Disease Center is world-renowned for its services and programs. It is also one of the first medical school-supported centres in the United States dedicated to the treatment and study of Celiac Disease.

Peter's father moved him to Killara Prep (now Lindfield) after the local school he had been attending told him his son wasn't academic. Peter recently said to another Old Boy that he forgot about school once he commenced his career, but one day realised that without the foundation he received at Newington College he never would have achieved his success.

PROFESSOR CHRIS RODGER (ON '73)

PASSION FOR TEACHING MATHEMATICS

Mathematics: a tough subject to learn, a tough subject to teach, but Professor Chris Rodger (ON '73), an internationally recognised scholar based at Auburn University Alabama, has a passion for teaching maths to children. His contribution to classroom teaching has been recognised many times, with Chris being awarded numerous government and foundation grants. Chris has received four *No Child Left Behind* grants for a series of multipleday 'Critical Thinking and Problem Solving' workshops for K–12 teachers.

The innovative methods used by Chris address K–12 Mathematics teaching effectiveness, making the subject fun for both teachers and students. Many of the schools Chris helps are in rural locations, with limited resources and a great need to improve their mathematics instruction against the state's accountability measures.

Chris recently spent 12 days in central Australia organising and running two maths camps for Year 5 to Year 9

students, with lan Roberts of Charles Darwin University. Chris also ran a professional development session for teachers in Alice Springs and taught a Year 9 class in Darwin with the assistance of three of his PhD students who travelled with him from the US. Of the experience, Chris said: "The camps were built around three 'worlds' that we created and allowed the students

to explore Mathematics in an informal learning situation; the students spent an hour and a half in each world. Our aim is to provide a fertile setting where heading in different directions is possible, each providing rich mathematical experiences. We are there to facilitate the sessions with





probing questions at appropriate times to keep them looking deeper into the problems. At the end of the camp we tie all the maths together".

In 1918 he rose to the 1st XI and the 2nd XV. In 1919 he was Senior Prefect, a member of the 1st XI and again represented the school in Athletics. After leaving the College and studying the entire Latin course over the December 1919 Christmas break, he studied Law at Sydney University.

Archibald married Kathleen Burns who lived in England Street behind the school and who had attended MLC Burwood. They had five children: Patricia, Judith, Brian, Margaret and John. Brian Law (ON '51) entered Newington in 1945. He was a keen Rugby player and was in the 1st XV in 1949 and 1951. He was Captain of the Swimming Team in 1951 and was Senior House Prefect. John Law (ON '62) entered Wyvern House in 1954 and left in 1962. He played in the 2nd XV in 1960 and the 1st XV GPS Premiershipwinning team in 1961. In 1962, John was a member of the 1st XV and was a Prefect.

The members of the third generation are: The children of Patricia Treloar (nee Law): John (ON' 70), Philip (ON '72) and Geoffrey (ON '76). The son of Judith Whiteman (nee Law): Fred (ON '76). The sons of Brian Law: Tim (ON '79) and David (ON '85). And the sons of Margaret Waters (nee Law): Stuart (ON '79) and Ian (ON '81).

In this group were members of the Rugby 1st XV, the Senior Swimming team, the Senior Rowing VIII, Basketball 1sts, Prefects, as well as recipients of Excellence in Academic Pursuits Awards. One of the standouts is Tim Law, Captain of the 1979 GPS Rugby Premiership-winning team.

Some of the fourth generation members are still at Newington almost 100 years later. Archie's great grandson Edward will leave Newington as a Year 12 student in 2015, nearly 100 years after Archie caught the coastal steamer from the far north coast of NSW to attend the school.

The fourth generation consists of: John Treloar's sons Thomas (ON '05) and Edward, a current student; Philip Treloar's sons Ben (ON '02), Michael (ON '05) and Alex (ON '08); Fred Whiteman's son Edwin (ON '07) and Kathy Clarke's (daughter of Margaret Waters - nee Law and one of our current Senior School receptionists) son Christian Clarke who will complete his studies at the end of this year.

A total of 17 young men, direct descendants of Archibald Law, have attended Newington College.

COMMANDER JOHN FOSTER OAM RAN RETIRED

25/11/1935 - 10/10/2010

John Foster, who passed away on 10 October 2010, served for 30 years in the Australian Navy and spent his retirement searching for answers to one of this nation's great maritime mysteries: the fate of the submarine AE1, which disappeared near Rabaul in 1914. John attended Newington College from 1944 –1952 and was encouraged by his parents to become a lawyer. Instead, at 16, John joined the Navy as a cadet midshipman and trained for two years on the HMAS Cerberus near Melbourne. After further training he became a specialist in torpedo and anti-submarine warfare.

In 2003, John led a search expedition to look for the AE1, armed with a side scan sonar system and a magnetometer. It was the first serious attempt to find the AE1 since 1914. After the expedition in 2003 John formed a group of like-minded individuals, mostly former military officers, under the banner of 'PROJECT AE1' which has continued to lobby for support to achieve its aims of locating the lost submarine.

In April 2009, acting on further information received, John and some AE1 project team members made another privately funded expedition to Rabaul, without success. The mystery remains.

yke was appointed to succeed Mervyn Austin, who had started as Headmaster in 1950 but had resigned at the end of 1951.

Pyke remained until the end of the decade, bringing welcome stability and direction. He worked profitably with the College Council, particularly on a succession of building projects.

Physically, the school had changed little since the imposing Wyvern House had transformed the western side of the Stanmore site in 1938. Continued growth in enrolments meant that new facilities were desperately needed. In 1952 work started on the War Memorial Block, the first of a series of permanent, modern buildings to be built along the southern boundary over the next few years. Intended as a practical way to honour Old Newingtonians who had died in the Second World War, this project was the subject of a sustained campaign of fundraising in which the students had taken an active part. The building incorporated a number of classrooms built in 1920 and was opened in June 1953.

Pyke had a science background—he was only the second scientist headmaster at Newington; most had been classical scholars—and was keen to improve facilities for teaching Chemistry and Physics. Further fundraising efforts were undertaken, and the new Science Block was opened in July 1955. The building included Junior and Senior Chemistry laboratories, a Physics laboratory and a lecture theatre.

The Science Block was followed by a Manual Arts Block, including a new tuckshop, which was opened as the Prescott Block in 1957. Planning then began for an ambitious project to complete the vision for the Founders



Another important development under Pyke's leadership was the establishment of a preparatory school on the North Shore. A number of regions of Sydney were investigated in 1956 for opportunities to meet local demand for quality education and to increase the flow of primary students to the Senior School at Stanmore. The Newington College Preparatory School at Killara opened at the beginning of 1957 and had 100 pupils by the end of the year.


The school remained there until the move to the present site at Lindfield in 1967.

The expansion of the College's facilities reflected the growth in enrolments. There were some 600 boys in 1952; this had risen to 970 by 1960. In the same eight years, teaching staff in the Senior School grew from 23 to 42 staff members.

Pyke was a progressive educator.
While he gave particular attention to improving the teaching of Science, the overall standard of education improved, with many more boys staying on after the Intermediate Certificate and measurable improvements in Leaving Certificate results. This legacy, as much as the physical transformation of the school, makes the Pyke era at Newington one of great confidence and achievement.




