125th Anniversary ~ Adrian Dominican Sisters

"The initials 'OP' after an Adrian Dominican Sister's name stand for the 'Order of Preachers' of which they and all Dominican religious women and men are a part, and the fact that the Congregation has been engaged in ministry throughout the world for 125 years now says something about the passion of our sisters to preach the Gospel.

"The Dominican Order itself

was founded in the early 13th century to engage the culture of that time in a search for truth and to combat the heresies that had arisen. Today, in the 21st century, that translates into promoting justice and peace in all its forms. The Adrian Dominicans have a strong commitment to social justice: working to end war, violence, destruction of life, destruction of the environment, materialism, sexism, the 'isms' of society that go against the Gospel."

The Adrian Dominican Sisters serve in many capacities in inner cities, rural areas and in many counties across the U.S., and in many other nations. They serve native peoples in Alaska and Canada; AIDS orphans in Swaziland; children in the Dominican Republic who otherwise might not get an education; and residents of New Orleans with great needs in the wake of Hurricane Katrina.

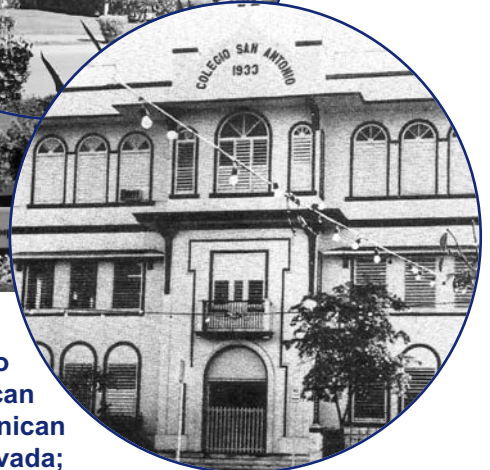

Each Heritage Society member greatly honors the Congregation by including the Sisters in their estate plans. We warmly hold that trust, friendship and charity with appreciation and gratitude.

The Congregation built secondary schools for young women in Detroit, Chicago, and Cleveland; established a new college for women in Miami, Florida; expanded to overseas ministry in Puerto Rico, the Bahamas, and the Dominican Republic; ventured into the unknown with two hospitals in the West; and responded to the call to engage in social work. After the Second Vatican Council, a return to the original inspiration of the Order led to more universal commitment to mission. Mission encompasses more than a single ministry. It is broader in scope and includes various ministries, formation of community and preaching, unique to Dominicans.
