Kicking off young adult ministry may seem like a daunting task, but it all starts with determining what you are called to do with the specific young adults already present in your specific context. The following tools were collected to help start that conversation as well a help establish a basic framework for young adult ministry. While these tools are by no means comprehensive, the hope is that they will provide a starting point for ministry to a very important population of the Episcopal Church.

A Brief Scriptural and Personal Reflection, p1
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Receive:

Ephesians 4: 1-6, 11-16

..lead a life worthy of the calling to which you have been called, with all lowliness and meekness, with patience, forbearing one another in love, eager to maintain the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. There is one body and one Spirit, just as you were called to the one hope that belongs to your call, one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of us all, who is above all and through all and in all.

It was he who gave some to be apostles, some to be prophets, some to be evangelists, and some to be pastors and teachers, to prepare God's people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of the Son of God and become mature, attaining to the whole measure of the fullness of Christ.

Then we will no longer be infants, tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching and by the cunning and craftiness of men in their deceitful scheming. Instead, speaking the truth in love, we will in all things grow up into him who is the Head, that is, Christ. From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work.

How can this passage guide a conversation about young adults in the Church?


How are we to minister with and to young adults?

Prayer is an acknowledgement of the presence of God in our lives as well as in the life of our ministry. We desire

to cover young adults in prayer and realize that young adult ministry is the fulfillment of a call. (silence)

- 2. What are the phases of life that can be identified in your young adult population? (married, married with children, professionals, working class, single, etc.)
- 2. What Christian formation opportunities already exist in the parish/diocese?

 (If there is a successful, established Bible study then there is less need to create one exclusively for young adults)
- 3. Are there 20s/30s in other nearby churches?
- 4. What social/societal issues are important to your church/diocese?

 (If you live in Texas or California, the issue of immigration is an everyday experience.

 Other examples: Columbine, CO and teen violence; NYC-terrorism; Gulf Coast-natural disasters; etc.)
- 5. What personnel resources are available in your parish/diocese?


Do you have some interesting, creative, educated people around who might be able to speak from experience on certain issues? (i.e. hospice worker, nutritionist, park ranger, criminal defense/prosecutor, actor/performer, etc).

- 6. What are the economics of your constituency? That is, what can your people afford? (For example, in NYC young professionals tend to have very little expendable income.)
- 7. What are the local resources (i.e. parks, coffee/pastry shops, movie theaters, pubs) that are convenient to the church/diocese?


