


Demoishing Pero Penguin's

Basic Rule of Sentence Structure


■ Japanese grammar places less emphasis on word order than other languages. Although it is up to you to decide how to arrange your words, it will be much easier to communicate in Japanese if you start each sentence with the most important idea, then work down through the less important things and finish with the verb. However, each particle must stay with the word it modifies



Word order is up to you!

e.g., I'll see my friends in Hawaii next week. You can say, either 1), 2) or 3).

In general, Japanese people do not use "I (watashi)" much in everyday speech. If you use "watashi" too much, it starts to sound arrogant. Avoid using it unless you want to emphasize yourself.

The particle "wa" is used in many different ways, but I'm going to explain two main ways of using the particle for this lesson. They are "Explanation" and "Comparison."

■ Explanation (Objectively)

B is the explanation of A the details

When you finish saving "wa," the listeners will think that you are going to explain the details next.

It's stressed

e.g., この魚 は kono sakana wa (this fish)

the explanation chīsai of this fish

This fish is small. この魚 は 小さい です。 kono sakana wa chisai desu Mr. Kida left.

■ "Comparison"

• To pronounce "wa" with emphasis.

A this part will be emphasized or compared

explanation of A

e.g., (comparing with other fish) This fish is smaller.

この魚 は 小さい です。 kono sakana wa chisai desu

e.g., (comparing with other people) I am not beautiful. 私 は きれいじゃないです。

watashi wa kire janai desu

★Caution★ It is not a common practice to say "wa" directly after words that relate to dates, such as "tomorrow," "the day after tomorrow," "Sunday," "next week," etc.


I'm going to see a friend tomorrow.

は 友達 に会います。 e.g., 明日 ashita wa tomodachi ni aimasu

▼ If you put "wa" right after 'tomorrow,' it will be compared with other days.

(comparing with other days) It is tomorrow that I'm going to see a friend. 明日 は 友達 に会います。
