2011-12 RECENT GAME RECAPS

CHICAGO BULLS 106, MIAMI HEAT 102 (3/14/12): The Miami HEAT lost the second night of their back-to-back road set to the Chicago Bulls 106-102, ending a five game winning streak against the Bulls that started in last year's playoffs. The HEAT defense started out strong holding the Bulls to 19 first quarter points on 8-21 shooting, on their way to a 23-19 advantage going into the second quarter. The Bulls opened the second quarter on a 31-11 run to take a 16-point lead with 2:21 remaining in the half, before the HEAT cut the deficit to 53-42 going into halftime. LeBron James led the HEAT with 20 first half points on 9-15 shooting as Dwyane Wade poured in 13 points. John Lucas had 11 points on 4-4 shooting for the Bulls. The Bulls increased their lead to as many as 17 points in the third quarter, but the HEAT cut the lead to 11, 81-70, heading into the final period. Miami went on a run in the final quarter and cut the deficit to as little as two points, 104-102, with 6.8 seconds remaining, but the Bulls hit their final free throws to take the 106-102 victory. James and Wade combined for 71 points on 30-51 (58.8 percent) shooting in defeat, while Lucas had 24 points on 9-12 (75.0 percent) shooting off the bench for the Bulls.

ORLANDO MAGIC 104, MIAMI HEAT 98 [OT] (3/13/12): The Miami HEAT lost for the second time this season in Orlando, falling to the Magic 104-98 in overtime. The Magic came out and put up 30 first quarter points on 70.6 percent shooting, compared to the HEAT's 27 points on 52.6 percent shooting. The Magic took a 41-35 lead with 6:55 left in the half, but the HEAT went on a 20-0 run to take a 55-41 lead and a 56-45 advantage into the break. Chris Bosh led the HEAT with 15 first half points while LeBron James and Dwyane Wade had 14 points each. Dwight Howard had 12 points and nine rebounds for the Magic. After the HEAT opened up a 13-point lead, the Magic finished the third quarter on a 20-8 run and took a one point deficit into the final quarter. With six ties and six lead changes in the final quarter, the game was tied with a few seconds left when Wade's step back jumper went in-and-out to end regulation tied at 94 apiece. The HEAT was only able to muster four points on 2-11 (18.2 percent) shooting in the overtime period on their way to the 104-98 defeat. Wade finished with 28 points and Bosh had 24 of his own for the HEAT. Howard had 24 points and 25 rebounds for the Magic as Jameer Nelson finished with 25 points on 10-16 shooting.

QUICK HITS:

- Dwyane Wade's 36 points and LeBron James' 35 points at CHI on 3/14 marked as the first time in HEAT franchise history two teammates (Miami or opponent) each scored at least 35 points in the same game.
- Dwyane Wade scored 23 of his 36 points in the second half on 3/14 at CHI, his new season-high for points in a half.
- 11 of the HEAT's last 13 wins (and 21 of 31 wins this season) have been by double-figures.
- James and Wade each shot 10+ free throws on 3/1 at POR. Miami is a perfect 3-0 this season when they each record double-figure free throw attempts in the same game and are 13-4 over the last two seasons when accomplishing the feat.
- Miami has scored at least 50 points in the paint in 10 games already, while hitting that mark 11 times all of last season.
- The HEAT has currently blocked a shot in a franchise-best 334 consecutive games dating back to 1/16/08.
- Miami out-rebounded IND by 10 (50-40) on 3/10. The HEAT is now 9-0 this season when out-rebounding their opponents by double-figures. Additionally, Miami has won their last 29-straight games when holding a double-figure rebound advantage and are 41-2 over the last four seasons in which they have accomplished the feat.

A WIN TONIGHT: A win tonight would give Miami a 32-11 record, marking their best 43-game start in franchise history. The previous best was a 31-12 record, recorded during the 1996-97 season. A win tonight would also give the HEAT a perfect 9-0 record vs. the Atlantic Division this season.

BROTHERLY LOVE: The HEAT has currently won nine consecutive regular season games against the Philadelphia 76ers, including four-straight in Philadelphia. The overall nine-game winning streak ties Miami's current longest winning streak against any opponent with the New Jersey Nets. Additionally, the current nine-game winning streak ties for the longest winning streak against Philadelphia in franchise history. Miami previously recorded nine consecutive wins against the 76ers from 12/11/96 – 3/8/99. Below are the current top HEAT winning streaks.

FOURTH QUARTER: Dwyane Wade posted a 19-point fourth quarter in route to a 36-point night at CHI on 3/14. The 19 fourth quarter points tied as the fifth-highest scoring fourth quarter in HEAT franchise history. Wade owns all top five fourth quarter scoring records. Below is each occurrence.

STARTING FIVE: Three members of the HEAT's normal starting five are shooting at least 50 percent from the floor this season. LeBron James is leading the way shooting a career-high 54.7 percent. James is joined by Joel Anthony at 52.6 percent and Dwyane Wade at a career-high 51.1 percent. The members of the normal starting five not shooting at least 50 percent from the floor is Chris Bosh who is converting on 48.6 percent and Mario Chalmers who is shooting a career-best 47.6 percent. For the season, the HEAT's starting five has combined to shoot 51.3 percent (1,183-2,308) from the floor.

LBJ CAREER SEASON: LeBron James is on pace to set new career-highs in different statistical categories including field goal percentage and three-point field goal percentage. Also, despite averaging a career-low 37.6 minutes (37.7 in 2008-09), he is close to eclipsing some other career-high averages as well. Below are categories in which James is on pace to set new career-highs in, as well as other categories he is closing in on.

30-10-5-0: LeBron James tallied 35 points, 10 rebounds and six assists without committing a single turnover on 3/2 at UTA. The night before on 3/1 at POR, James posted 38 points, 11 rebounds and six assists without recording a turnover. James became the only player in the last 35 years, since the NBA starting keep turnovers as a stat during the 1977-78 season, to post back-to-back 30-10-5 games without turning the ball over at least once. In addition to posting 38 points, 11 rebounds and six assists without a turnover on 3/1 at POR, he also recorded five steals and a block, becoming the first HEAT player in franchise history to hit those marks during a single game. James has now posted seven 30-10-5 games this season.

ON THE BOARDS: Udonis Haslem moved into second place on the HEAT's all-time rebounding list on 2/21 vs. SAC. He also only needs 36 more defensive rebounds to tie Alonzo Mourning for first place. Below are the top five rebounders in HEAT history:

FROM DOWNTOWN: The HEAT are currently shooting 39.4 percent (250-634) from three-point range as a team, Miami's best single-season team shooting percentage from three-point range in franchise history, surpassing their 37.9 percent from downtown during the 1995-96 campaign. The HEAT currently has four players who have attempted at least 50 treys this season and are shooting at least 40 percent from behind the arc, including Mike Miller (33-67, .493), James Jones (25-56, .446), Mario Chalmers (79-183, .432) and LeBron James (36-87, .414). On 3/2 at UTA, Shane Battier became the third different member of the HEAT to hit at least six treys in a game this season joining Miller (six vs. SA on 1/17) and Chalmers (six vs. SAC on 2/21).

FRANCHISE PACE: The HEAT is averaging 102.5 points per game, tied for second in the NBA, while holding opponents to 94.3 points per game. Their +8.2 point differential is the second highest in the NBA. Among league leaders, they rank first in field goal percentage (.483) and second in three-point field goal percentage (.394). Defensively, Miami ranks third in forced turnovers per game (16.8), fourth in steals per game (8.88) and seventh in opponent field goal percentage (.426). Below you will find the franchise's best seasons in each category compared to this season's team.

CONSECUTIVE DOUBLE-FIGURE WINS: The HEAT won nine consecutive games by 10+ points from 2/10 – 3/1; tying for the longest streak in franchise history. They beat WAS on 2/10 by 17 points, ATL on 2/12 by 20 points, MIL on 2/13 by 18 points, IND on 2/14 by 15 points, CLE on 2/17 by 24 points, ORL on 2/19 by 12 points, SAC on 2/21 by 12 points, NY on 2/23 by 14 points and POR on 3/1 by 14. Additionally, the nine-straight wins by double-digits tied for the second longest streak in NBA history. Below are the top HEAT and NBA double-figure winning streaks.

BACK-TO-BACK: The HEAT swept all three games of a back-to-back for the first time since accomplishing the feat 2/15-2/17/99. In that set of three games in three nights, the HEAT found victories vs. NJ (95-72) on 2/15, at IND (89-78) on 2/16 and at DET (91-80) on 2/17. The last time a team did this on the road before the HEAT was the Phoenix Suns, accomplishing the feat on 12/21, 22 and 23 of 1979. Additionally, the HEAT won each game by double-digits, something that hasn't occurred in the NBA since the Milwaukee Bucks did it on 11/20, 21 and 22 of 1970.

PLAYER OF THE MONTH: LeBron James was named the Eastern Conference Player of the Month for February. It marked the 15th time a Miami player has earned the honor in franchise history, James' fifth as a member of the HEAT and his second Player of the Month honor this season. He posted four double-doubles while leading the team in scoring and rebounds six times each, in assists and minutes nine times each, in steals on five occasions and in blocks twice. He scored his 18,000th career point at PHI on 2/3, becoming the youngest player in NBA history to reach that milestone and shot 16-of-21 (.762) from the field on 2/13 at MIL, tying his career-best single-game shooting percentage (with a minimum 20 FGAs).

PLAYER OF THE WEEK: LeBron James was named the Eastern Conference Player of the Week for games played February 13-19; for the fourth time this season and extending his lead for the most Player of the Week honors in league history to 35. He led the HEAT to a 3-1 week after averaging 27.8 points, 10.0 rebounds, 5.8 assists and 1.00 steals, while shooting 58.0 percent from the field. COACH OF THE MONTH: HEAT Head Coach Erik Spoelstra was named the NBA's Eastern Conference Coach of the Month for February. Spoelstra earned the accolades after guiding the HEAT to a Eastern Conference best 11-2 record, winning 10 of those 11 games by double-figures. His defensive game plan helped hold opponents to under 90 points in seven of the 13 games and to under 40 percent shooting from the field in eight games. This marks as Spoelstra's third Coach of the Month honor after previously winning the award in December and March of 2010, tying with former HEAT Head Coach Stan Van Gundy for the second-most monthly honors in team history. HEAT President Pat Riley holds the most with five.

ALL-STAR WEEKEND: The HEAT had six players participating in the 2012 All-Star Weekend, more than any other team in the league. Dwyane Wade, LeBron James and Chris Bosh made the Eastern Conference All-Star team while James Jones and Mario Chalmers participated in the Foot Locker Three-Point Contest and Norris Cole represented the HEAT in the BBVA Rising Stars Challenge. Wade finished with 24 points, 10 rebounds and 10 assists for the third ever All-Star Game triple-double. James had 36 points, six rebounds and six assists; 23 of those points coming during a comeback attempt in the second half. Bosh scored seven points and grabbed two rebounds in 20 minutes of play. Jones led all shooters with 22 points in the first round of the Three-Point Contest, but ended up finishing third. Chalmers led off the competition with 18 points, tying the eventual champion Kevin Love, before Love outscored him in a tiebreak shootout. Norris Cole represented the HEAT in the Rising Stars Challenge by scoring 18 points and dishing six assists off the bench to be his team's third highest scorer.

2011-12 COMMUNITY NOTES

FAMILY FESTIVAL: On March 11, the HEAT transformed Parcel B by the Bay into a "Fire and Ice" playground during the 15th Annual Miami HEAT Family Festival presented by Carnival Cruise Lines, an interactive celebration benefiting SafeSpace, the Jackson Memorial Foundation's Guardian Angels, the Miami Coalition for a Safe & Drug-Free Community, and the Miami HEAT Charitable Fund. The Miami HEAT Family Festival, which is the Miami HEAT Charitable Fund's largest annual fundraiser, is a themed, interactive, carnival-like celebration in which HEAT players, coaches, celebrities and families come together for a day of fun, family and feasting. The Festival features a dining extravaganza drawing the top restaurants and chefs from all over South Florida. Families enjoy countless interactive activities with HEAT players, coaches and their families, providing a memorable experience for guests of all ages. This year's Fire and Ice themed event featured the first ever "snow day" at AmericanAirlines Arena complete with a special snow play area for children, ice fishing, and a sno cone station. The entire Miami HEAT team and coaching staff participated in the festivities.

PLAYER TICKET PROGRAM: One of the most generous and trend-setting programs in the NBA, the Miami HEAT's Community Player Ticket Outreach Program will spend the entire 2011-12 regular season reaching out to children and youth less fortunate who typically would only dream of watching a HEAT game live. HEAT players Joel Anthony, Shane Battier, Chris Bosh, Mario Chalmers, Udonis Haslem, Juwan Howard, LeBron James, Dwyane Wade along with Head Coach Erik Spoelstra and Alonzo Mourning, Vice President of Player Programs, joined forces to donate tickets for every single home game to local charitable organizations that would otherwise not have the means to attend HEAT games. Each player, based upon availability, graciously provides several private "Meet & Greet" opportunities for the groups prior to each HEAT home game, where the players give inspiring talks to the children, sign autographs and take pictures with the group. The participating organizations also attend a private viewing of the team warm-ups. Over the course of the season, the children, many for the first time, will have the opportunity to enjoy a HEAT game, courtesy of their favorite HEAT players and role models.

2011-12 COACHING STAFF

ERIK SPOELSTRA (Portland), Head Coach

Regular Season Coaching Record: 179-109, Currently in 4th Season

Erik Spoelstra enters his fourth season as head coach of the HEAT and his 17th as a member of the organization. Since being elevated to his current position on April 28, 2008, Spoelstra has led Miami to a 148-98 regular season record and an 18-15 mark in the postseason. He currently ranks second in franchise history in victories and winning percentage in both regular season and postseason play. In each of his three seasons the HEAT has increased its victory total and earned a postseason berth, including an Eastern Conference championship in 2010-11 and Miami's second NBA Finals appearance.

Spoelstra led Miami to a 58-24 regular season record, a Southeast Division title and an Eastern Conference championship in 2010-11. The 58 wins mark the third best total in franchise history and Miami's 28 road wins tied for the most in the NBA in 2010-11 and rank second in HEAT history. Spoelstra earned NBA Eastern Conference Coach of the Month honors in December after guiding the HEAT to a 15-1 record, including a perfect 10-0 mark on the road. The 15 total wins and 10 road victories in December each set a franchise record for any month and the HEAT established an NBA record for most consecutive road wins in a calendar month. Defense was once again the stalwart of the HEAT's success as Miami led the NBA in point differential, finished second in defensive field goal percentage and sixth in scoring defense.

After an impressive rookie campaign, Spoelstra guided Miami to a 47-35 record in 2009-10. Under his leadership the HEAT closed the season by winning 18 of its final 22 games, including a 12-3 record in March which earned him NBA Eastern Conference Coach of the Month honors. The 2009-10 season was one of its best defensive seasons for Miami as the HEAT allowed the fewest field goals in the NBA and finishing second in both points allowed and defensive field goal percentage.

During his rookie season, Spoelstra led Miami to its greatest single-season improvement. He inherited a 15-win team and directed it to a 28-win improvement, marking the greatest improvement by a rookie head coach in NBA history, bettering the previous record of a 20-win improvement by Chicago's Ed Badger during the 1976-77 season. It also marked the seventh-best single-season improvement in NBA history by any coach. As a result of a 43-win season, the most by a head coach in his first year guiding the HEAT, Spoelstra led Miami to the 2009 NBA Playoffs. The 2009 postseason appearance made Miami just the second team in NBA history to win 15-or-fewer games one year and make the postseason the next, joining the 1968-69 San Diego Rockets.

Before taking over the reigns as the sixth head coach in HEAT history, Spoelstra had served Miami in a number of roles in his first 13 years. He was originally hired as video coordinator and over the years was promoted to assistant coach/video coordinator, assistant coach/advance scout and assistant coach/director of scouting before ascending to head coach. In his seven seasons as the HEAT's assistant coach/director of scouting, he had the primary role of developing game plans for upcoming opponents. To that end, he coordinated the video staff and advance scouts while overseeing the development of scouting reports and videos.

Spoelstra has earned the respect of players throughout the league with a strong reputation as a teacher over the years by heading the HEAT's Individual Player Development Program. As an assistant coach, where he also served for three seasons (2005-07) as the head coach of the HEAT's summer league team, and as the HEAT's head man now, he has worked tirelessly with many of Miami's young players in areas of fundamentals, skill development and shooting. This consistent emphasis of fundamentals contributed to the HEAT setting a franchise-record in 2008-09 for fewest turnovers in a season.

Additionally, Spoelstra helped design and integrate a proprietary statistical database and scouting software for the HEAT. Under Spoelstra, the HEAT continues to embrace the use of technology and continues to use the state-of-the-art statistical software to evaluate team productivity, individual player productivity and trends for both the HEAT and the team's opponents. That use of technology as a teaching tool also included putting the team's video playbook on iPads for his players.

In 1992, he graduated from the University of Portland with a degree in communications. While attending Portland, Spoelstra was the starting point guard for four years and was named the West Coast Conference Freshman of the Year in 1989. Upon graduating he spent two years as a player/coach for Tus Herten, a team in the professional sports league of Germany.

He has returned to his native Philippines in each of the last three offseasons to host clinics and promote education, health and wellness to thousands of at-risk youth through grassroots programs and events. The 9-day program in Manila this past summer was the largest NBA FIT event ever hosted in Southeast Asia under the NBA Cares umbrella.

Raised in Portland, OR, Spoelstra, who was inducted into the Jesuit High School Athletic Hall of Fame in September 2009, is the first Asian/Filipino-American head coach in any of the major North American sports leagues.

Spoelstra is the son of Jon Spoelstra, a long-time NBA executive who has guided the Portland Trail Blazers, Denver Nuggets, Buffalo Braves and New Jersey Nets. His grandfather, Watson, was a Detroit Tigers beat writer for many years.
