## HOLIDAY GIVING

Chicago Bears tight end **Gabe Reid** visited A Safe Place/Lake County Crisis Center on Monday, December 18 to deliver toys and gifts as part of the Bears 2006 holiday giving initiative. These items, donated by Bears players, coaches, and staff members, helped fill the shelves in the holiday store located in the agency's new transitional living facility. The holiday store offers clients of A Safe Place the opportunity to shop for complimentary gifts for their family members including apparel, games, sporting equipment, and department store gift cards that have been donated by the

community. For the past several years, the Chicago Bears Football Club has selected a local agency to support with a monetary gift during the holiday season. The Club's donation is matched by Bears Care, its charitable beneficiary. Prior to the Bears vs. Packers game on December 31, representatives from A Safe Place were presented with this year's gift, a check for \$20,000 for support of their programs and facilities. A Safe Place/Lake County Crisis Center provides shelter, transitional housing, court advocacy, referrals and comprehensive counseling programs for victims of domestic violence - women and children who have been physically and/or emotionally abused.

## BRIGGS 4 KIDZ

Bears linebacker **Lance Briggs** joined 50 children from Chicago Housing Authority developments on Tuesday, December 12 at the South Loop Target store for an exciting evening of holiday shopping. The kids, ages 8-12, were selected to participate in the shopping spree based on perfect school attendance and/or honor roll achievement. Each child received a \$200 Target gift card from Bears Care, the charitable beneficiary of the Chicago Bears, using funds raised by Lance's "Briggs 4 Kidz Jock-n-Bowl" charity bowling tournament. Thanks to Target's donation of an additional \$32.<sup>50</sup> per gift card, each child received a total of \$232.<sup>50</sup>. Each of the 50 children also received a Bears "Santa" hat, a "Briggs 4 Kidz" backpack, and a two-piece sweat suit, courtesy of Lance Briggs, the Chicago Bears, and Nike.



# WHAT MOVES U

Bears linebacker **Brendon Ayanbadejo** and safety **Danieal Manning** appeared at Chute Middle School in Evanston on Tuesday, December 5 to help the Chicago Bears and American Heart Association kickoff the *What Moves U* fitness program at an assembly for more than 600 middle school students. The players led students in various fitness exercises, emphasizing the importance of stretching, strength and endurance. They also assisted with a trivia game to help educate the kids about the importance of nutrition and being physically active.

*What Moves U* is a national program that was created by the NFL and the American Heart Association in response

to the ever increasing rate of childhood obesity and the continuing decline of physical education programs in many of America's schools. The unique aspect of the *What Moves U* program is that it was developed for teachers of various academic disciplines to help them find ways to integrate physical activity into their daily lesson plans. This initiative incorporates several key elements: an in-school activity kit created for teachers, by teachers, which includes curriculum-based activity sheets, program-specific learning materials and school promotional materials; and an interactive fitness-focused website for children. ## A FRIEND IN NEED

Fullback J.D. Runnels visited the Rehabilitation Institute of Chicago on Tuesday, December 26 to help lift the spirits of Travis Hearn, a Rock Island teenager who was recently paralyzed while playing high school football. J.D. also joined Rocky Clark and Rob Komosa, two other former high school football players who suffered catastrophic spinal cord injuries while playing high school football, in presenting a check for \$10,000 to Hearn to be put toward the purchase of a wheelchair-accessible van. The \$10,000 donation was generated through sales of the book, *Great Moments in Football Halftime*. This book is a compilation of stories, anecdotes and interviews from nearly 50 accomplished football coaches from NFL and college teams, including Bears head coach Lovie Smith. Proceeds from the book will benefit Rocky, Rob and Travis.
