HELLO TO OUR HEROES

GOAL POWER

Adewale Ogunleye teamed up with Chicago Urban league to form the community outreach program "Goal Power: Alternative Careers in Sports." The second installment of this program took place on Saturday, September 24 with 40 kids from the Chicago Urban League. As part of this program, one Saturday each month during the football season, executives from various Chicago sports teams will serve on a panel and talk about the different job opportunities that exist in professional sports. The most recent panel consisted of sports executives who work in law and medicine and included Chicago Bears Director of Player Contracts and Legal Affairs Cliff

Stein. The next Goal Power event will take place on Saturday, October 15 and will feature executives who work in finance and management, including Bears Senior Director of Finance & Treasurer, **Karen Murphy.**

PLAY FOOTBALL DAY

Thursday, September 1 was "Play Football Day" at Soldier Field. The Chicago Bears provided over 3,200 complimentary tickets to 37 different youth football leagues throughout Chicagoland as the Bears battled the Cleveland Browns. 55 youth football players from Chicagoland Pop Warner and Sheriff Sheahan's Neighborhood Football League joined Bears players on the sideline before the game for the National Anthem, and players from the Chicago Park District's Inner City Flag and Junior Bear Tackle leagues scrimmaged during halftime. These activities kicked off Play Football Month,

HURRICANE KATRINA RELIEF

The Bears have initiated a number of different outreach activities in an effort to help residents of the Gulf Coast areas that were devastated by Hurricane Katrina. On Sunday, September 18 the team hosted a monetary collection drive, "Orange and Blue...Supporting the Bayou," outside of Soldier Field prior to the Bears/Lions game. Any person who made a donation of \$5 or more

received a set of blue and orange beads. The Bears will match all contributions dollar for dollar, up to \$250,000, made by Bears players, coaches, and staff, including all donations collected at Soldier Field on September 18. To date, our donation to the hurricane relief efforts exceeds \$138,000! The Bears organization thanks all volunteers and fans who donated...you truly helped make a difference!

On Tuesday, September 20 Bears fullback **Jason McKie** and quarterback **Jeff Blake** joined volunteers at the Northern Illinois Food Bank to help sort and package various cleaning supplies to be sent to the Gulf Coast region. Boxes will be distributed to residents who are able to return to their homes as they begin the long process of repairing and cleaning their houses. THANKS COACH!

The Chicago Bears "Coach of the Week" program honors outstanding Illinois high school coaches who develop players' football skills and knowledge, character, leadership, discipline, and teamwork abilities. Other criteria considered include graduation rates, coaching technique, school and community support, volunteerism, and, most importantly, contributions to players'

long-term success on and off the field. This program runs for nine weeks from August 29 through October 24. Coaches are nominated by a panel of local prep authorities and Bears staff, and the winning "Coach of the Week" is selected every Monday.

The 2005 Bears "Coach of the Week" winners include **Bill Mitz** of Stevenson High School, **Rob Zvonar** of Lincoln-Way East High School, **Trevor Lehnen** of Rantoul High School, **Ron Muhitch** of Wheaton-Warrenville High School, **Scott Alberssen** of Taylorville High School, and **Don Dobrino** of Mount Olive High School. The Bears will donate \$1,500 to the football program at each winning



coach's school. In addition, each coach will be invited to the Bears-Panthers game on November 20, 2005 and will be recognized in an on-field ceremony that day. All "Coach of the Week" honorees will also receive a framed certificate and will attend a Bears' practice and "chalk-talk" with Bears Head Coach Lovie Smith.
