In the past eight years, the Bears Care Galas have raised over \$4 million to support breast cancer research and treatment. This year alone approximately 205,000 new cases of breast cancer and 24,000 new cases of ovarian cancer will be

to achieving those goals, and commitment to excellence. Angelo and Bears linebacker Bryan Knight visited A.J. Katzenmaier Middle School on



May 28 where they addressed a crowd of 250 4^{th} – 6^{th} graders. Defensive end Joe Tafoya joined Angelo on May 29 at Wauconda Middle School where they spoke to 600 7^{th} and 8^{th} grade students.

These school visits are an extension of the Bears School Outreach program, where Bears players and staff visit Chicago Public Schools every Tuesday during the off-season to speak to, motivate, and interact with students. Bears School Outreach is sponsored by Boeing, and over 7,000 students benefit from this program on an annual basis.

Founded in 1988, Rockford Area Habitat for Humanity is a nonprofit ecumenical Christian group that builds decent housing for families in need. The group has built 38 homes in the Rockford area and has plans for 12 more this year, providing affordable housing to 45 adults and 116 children. Habitat offers a hand-up, not a handout. Habitat acquires the home sites and the necessary materials, tools, and labor for construction - much of which is donated. Families are selected on the basis of need, and they must invest their own "sweat equity" by helping volunteers build the home. Once the home is completed, the family purchases it from Habitat under an interest-free mortgage. Mortgage payments are then utilized to help build Habitat homes for other families.

accommodate a sell-out crowd on September 29, 2003. - ∨ 2,915 tons of rebar
- ∨ 310,000 square feet of precast
- ∨ 575,000 square feet of metal decking
- ✓ 590,000 square feet of masonry
- ✓ 190,000 square feet of glass curtain wall
- ✓ 2,250 linear feet of custom stone countertops
- ∨ 1,600 doors
- ∨ 30,000 square feet of carpeting
- ✓ 2,500 plumbing fixtures
- ∨ 36 miles of piping
- ✓ 335 tons of sheet metal
- ∨ 14,000 light fixtures
- ✓ 1,250,000 watts of sports lighting
- ∨ 20,000 circuit breakers
