AND THE WINNER IS...



Bears fans and polar bear fans have spoken! After a three-week polar bear naming contest and over 6,500 entries from all 50 states, a name for Brookfield Zoo's newest bundle of joy has been selected. Ladies and gentlemen...meet "Payton" the polar bear!

Brookfield Zoo and the Chicago Bears teamed up to sponsor the contest to help find a name for the 80-pound male polar bear born to the zoo last November. The winner of the naming contest, Angie Buratto of Mokena, I Ilinois, selected "Payton" to honor Chicago Bears legend Walter Payton. Of the 6,500 suggestions received, over 500

of them made reference to Walter Payton. But it was Angie's reason for selecting the name that made her a winner: "Naming the bear cub for Walter Payton would be an honor on many levels.

'Payton' signifies strength, determination and cherished memories. What better name for a 'Chicago Bear'?"

What better name, indeed. Walter Payton played for the Chicago Bears from 1975-1987. During his 13 seasons with the Bears, he missed only one game while setting 10 NFL records including career rushing yards (16,726) and single-game rushing yards (275). He was selected to nine Pro Bowls and inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 31, 1993. And Walter showed just as much dedication off-the-field by providing unwavering support to numerous charities and worthy causes. He was a true hero to millions of fans





throughout the world.

Chicago Bears defensive end Michael Haynes and mascot Staley had the honor of making the grand announcement and introducing "Payton's" name to the public. Hundreds of fans gathered in front of Brookfield Zoo's Bear Grottos on Saturday, May 22 to hear the winning name and cheer for little "Payton." After the naming announcement, Michael signed autographs for the fans who had gathered to see both bears!

Angie, a lifelong Bears fan, will receive four tickets to a Chicago Bears game and the opportunity to be on the field during pre-game warm-ups. She will also receive an exclusive

behind-the-scenes tour of the zoo for four people, including lunch with the bear keepers and zoo director Dr. Stuart Strahl, and a Share the Care package for "Payton."

TALES TO TACKLE

Although the Bears players were tired and sore from a tough practice, their faces noticeably brightened as they saw Rocky and Rob waiting for them.

More than 25 players stopped by to visit with the young men and talk football. Honorary scouts Rocky and Rob said that the guys looked great out on the field, and they are very optimistic about the

2004 season. The Bears have continually supported Rocky and Rob over the years through monetary donations, player appearances, ticket donations and fundraising efforts.


Airlines flies; and \$5000 cash!
