

Backgrounder

Release of 2006 Census results Age and sex population counts

Key Points

- According to the Census, the population of the City of Toronto is 2,503,281, an increase of 1% since 2001. This count does not include the Census undercount, which is discussed below.
- Change varies by age. Some age groups grew, especially 15-24 year olds, 40-64 year olds and those over 75. Others declined, including children under 10, 25-39 year olds and younger seniors, ages 65-74. (See Table 3 and Figure 2)
- The two fastest growing five year age groups were 80-84 and 55-59 year olds. They grew by 30% and 25%, respectively.
- Age cohorts that showed the greatest decline from 2001-2006 include 5-9, 30-35, and 35-39 year olds, all of which fell by about 10%.
- Toronto's population is 48% male and 52% female (1,205,370 men and 1,297,900 women). There are 93 men for every 100 women.
- Women continue to outlive men. Women account for 58% of all persons ages 65 and over and 61% of those aged 75+. At the same, there are more males under 20 than females.

Age Highlights

- Seniors as a percentage of the total city population increased from 13.6% in 2001 to 14.1% in 2006. According to projections by City Planning, between now and 2031, the number of seniors is expected to grow by 38%.
- As a percent of the total population, pre-school children (0-4) decreased from 5.8% in 2001 to 5.4% in 2006.
- School age population (5-14) decreased slightly from 11.7% in 2001 to 10.9% in 2006.
- Youth (15-24) increased slightly from 12.4% to 12.7%.
- Young working-age population (25-44) fell from 33.9% in 2001 to 32% in 2006.
- Older working-age population (45-64) increased from 22.5% in 2001 to 24.7% in 2006.
- In 2006, the median* age of Toronto residents was 38.4. This reflects an increase of 1.5 since 2001. The median age for Toronto is higher than the rest of the GTA and lower than Canada as a whole (39.5).
- Of Canada's larger cities, the one with the oldest population is Quebec City, with median age of 42.7. Other cities with populations older than Toronto are Montreal (38.8), Halifax (39), Victoria (41.7) and Vancouver (38.6 years). Edmonton and Calgary both have somewhat younger populations, with median ages of 36.1 years and 35.7 years, respectively.

*Median age is the mid-point in the age distribution where exactly one-half of the population is above and one-half below.

Toronto in the GTA

- In 2006, Toronto accounted for 45% of the GTA population, a decrease from 49% in 2001. Toronto has 39% of all GTA children, 43% of GTA youth, 46% of GTA working age population, 53% of GTA seniors and 56% of GTA seniors ages 75 and over.
- Toronto has a higher proportion of seniors and a lower proportion of younger children than our GTA neighbours.
- 14% of Toronto's population is over 65 years of age compared with 10% throughout the rest of the GTA.
- Toronto has the highest proportion in the GTA of the 25-44 age group at 32%.
- 13% of Toronto's population is between the ages of 15 and 24 a comparable share to the rest of the GTA.
- 16% of Toronto's population are children under the age of 15, compared to 21% across the rest of the GTA.
- 45-64 years account for around 25% of the population in both Toronto and the rest of the GTA.

Maps of Age Groups in Toronto

- Four maps showing the distribution of children, youth, working age adults and seniors are attached.
- Note how areas around the downtown have higher concentrations of working age adults. The older suburbs of Etobicoke, North York and Scarborough have higher concentrations of seniors.

Census Undercount

Although Statistics Canada makes a great effort to count every person some people are missed in each Census. For example, people may be traveling, some dwellings are hard to find and some people simply refuse to participate. Statistics Canada takes this into account and estimates an 'undercount' rate for the urban region (CMA) every Census, but not for the City.

Statistics Canada has reported a 2006 population for the City of Toronto of 2,503,281. When the undercount is taken into account, however, the population could be between about 2,630,000 and 2,705,000.

The 2006 Census counted an unexpectedly high number of unoccupied dwelling units. This leads City staff to suspect that the Census may have missed more households than usual. The discussion of age and sex should be seen in that light, particularly since the undercount is greatest for 20-35 year olds.

Census Population by Age Group













By Census Tract












By Census Tract












By Census Tract










