DARREN LOWE -Head Coach

Now in his 14th season behind the Blues bench, Darren Lowe first joined the U of T coaching staff in 1992-93 as an assistant. That year, the Blues won the Ontario championship and were national finalists.

At the conclusion of the 2002-2003 season. Lowe was honoured as the OUA East division coach of the

year for the second time in three years (00-01). He has led the Blues to seven out of eight first place finishes in the OUA's Mid-East division.

Lowe has also been involved with the Toronto Maple Leafs organization, serving as a guest coach in 1998, and spent time in the summer of 2001 working with some of the Leaf prospects. In 1999-2000, Lowe was a guest coach with Canada's national



PAUL FISHER -Assistant Coach

'Fish', as he is affectionately known by the players and coaching staff, is in his 15th season as a member of the Varsity Blues coaching staff. Fisher has coached at various levels and does a tremendous job with the Blues goaltenders. During the 2000-01 season, he worked with the Canadian national women's team's goaltenders prior to their World Championship. Fisher has worked

at hockey camps in both Canada and the United States and is considered one of North America's top goaltending instructors. He was one of the Blues great goaltenders of the 1980s and helped backstop U of T to an undefeated season in 1981-82. Fisher is also involved in coaching soccer at the rep level. He is a high school teacher who lives in Mississauga with his wife, Veronica, and children Jennifer, Shannon, Ellen and Tim.



MICHAEL HUTCHISON -Assistant Coach

Hutchison is in his third season behind the bench after spending a year as the team's strength and conditioning coordinator. After a five-year playing career, the former Varsity Blue earned nominations for the George M. Biggs trophy and Randy Gregg award, honouring his commitment to hockey and to his community. Away from the rink, Hutchison is the research coordinator of the

Men's Hockey A Tradition of Excellence

As part of the Varsity Blues family, men's hockey is one of 44 men's and women's teams in 26 sports offered by U of T. The breadth of the Varsity Blues experience and legacy are unmatched at a Canadian university.

Tradition, success and excellence are three words that are synonymous with Varsity Blues hockey. The hockey Blues, one of the University of Toronto's oldest and most successful teams, was formed on January 15, 1891. In 1902-03, Toronto joined Queen's and McGill to form Canada's first intercollegiate hockey league.

The late Conn Smythe, founder of the Toronto Maple Leafs, was a Blues coach from 1923 to 1926, the first in a line of well-known personalities to stand behind the Varsity bench. Smythe was also a player and Blues captain while studying engineering in 1915. When Smythe founded the Maple Leafs, he 'borrowed' the familiar Varsity Blues sweater design for his new team. Other well-known Blues coaches include former Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson (1926-28), Ace Bailey (1935-40 and 1945-49), Justice Joseph Kane (1962-65) and Mike Keenan (1983-84).

Tom Watt, a major influence in Canadian hockey, led the Blues to nine of their 10 national titles during his coaching career at U of T, which spanned from 1965 to 1979, and again in 1984-85. Watt was a member of the Canadian Olympic team coaching staff in 1980 and 1988 and has been head coach of the NHL's Winnipeg Jets, Vancouver Canucks and Toronto Maple Leafs.

The Blues have played a prominent role on the international hockey scene. The Varsity Grads, a team of former Blues players, captured the gold medal at the 1928 Olympic Games in St. Moritz, Switzerland.

In 1968, the Blues earned the bronze medal for Canada at the World University Games. In February 1972, the


Blues thrilled a capacity crowd at Varsity Arena with a dramatic 5-1 victory over the USSR student national team.

The Varsity presence in Olympic hockey continued during the 1980s. At Lake Placid in 1980, Tom Watt was a co-coach of Team Canada with a roster that included no fewer than six Blues players: Warren Anderson, Dan D'Alvise, Cary Farelli, Joe Grant, Shane Pearsall and Stelio Zupancich. Anderson and current head coach Darren Lowe were Olympians in 1984 at Sarajevo.

In 1992-93, after capturing the Queen's Cup, the Blues lost to Acadia in the national final. U of T's most recent national title was won in 1983-84, when coach

Mike Keenan led the Blues to a 9-1 victory over the Concordia Stingers. The Blues have won 10 national, 21 Ontario league and 10 additional titles for a total of 41 championships in the team's history.

Team captain Brendan Sherrard and fifth-year Kyle Martiniuk will lead the Blues defensively this season. At 6-foot-4, Martiniuk can be a physical force and is a strong penalty killer. Sherrard is an extremely versatile player, splitting last season between offence and defence. Alongside Sherrard and Martiniuk, 2007-08 OUA second team all-star Ed Snetsinger returns for a third season. Snetsinger, who led the Blues with 28 assists last season, is a highly-skilled player with excellent skating and passing abilities. Steve Duffy, Andrew Kizito and

Sean Kliewer complete the core group of returning defencemen, while first-year skater Mark Delost looks to contribute further after seeing limited action last season.

Duffy and Kliewer both provide size and strength on the blueline. Duffy developed into a reliable, stay-at-home defenceman last season and is expected to provide more offence this year. Kliewer, who improved throughout the season, possesses a hard shot and can deliver hard, open-ice hits. Kizito shared top rookie honours in 2007-08 and has excellent defensive and offensive abilities. He will be counted on to log a lot of ice time this year.

Leading the Blues offensively will be fourth-year assistant captain loe Rand. The 6-foot-3 centre provides size and experience down the middle and will be a key part of the team's offence. Second-year veteran Craig McDonald showed some flair last season and with improved strength will be an offensive threat for the Blues. First-year players Claudio Cowdrey, Robert Kay, Bryden Teich and transfer-student loel Lenius will step in and challenge for a spot in the line-up. Cowdrey, a member of the OPJHL's southern division champions,

On the right side, Dan Brewer in his second season will battle with several recruits for ice time. Newcomers on the right side include Paul Dupont and Kyle Ventura.

On the left wing, fifth-year veteran Alex Nagribianko brings hustle and enthusiasm to the table and will also chip in on offence. Second-year forward Sean Fontyn plays with a lot of grit and tenacity and will be counted on to provide more offensive punch this year. Rookies Byron Elliott and David Mooney will push these veterans for ice time. One of the Blues top recruits, Elliott has size and ability to score and check.

In goal, Andrew Martin and Russ Brownell return for their second season with Toronto. Martin shared top rookie honors with Kizito in 2007-08 based on a very good first year of OUA competition. Brownell is a competitor with quick reflexes and played well as his freshman season progressed.
