Open Sunday 2:00-4:00 p.m. June through September. It is also open at various times during the Sugar Festival. Group tours can be arranged.



Years ago grindstones weighing 3 lbs. To 6 tons were exported from here and shipped to Egypt, Russia, and other countries worldwide. Some streets in Detroit such as Jefferson and Woodward, were made from the first stones produced in Grindstone City. The city is located on M-25 about 5 miles East of Port Austin. Many grindstones can still be seen throughout the area
