

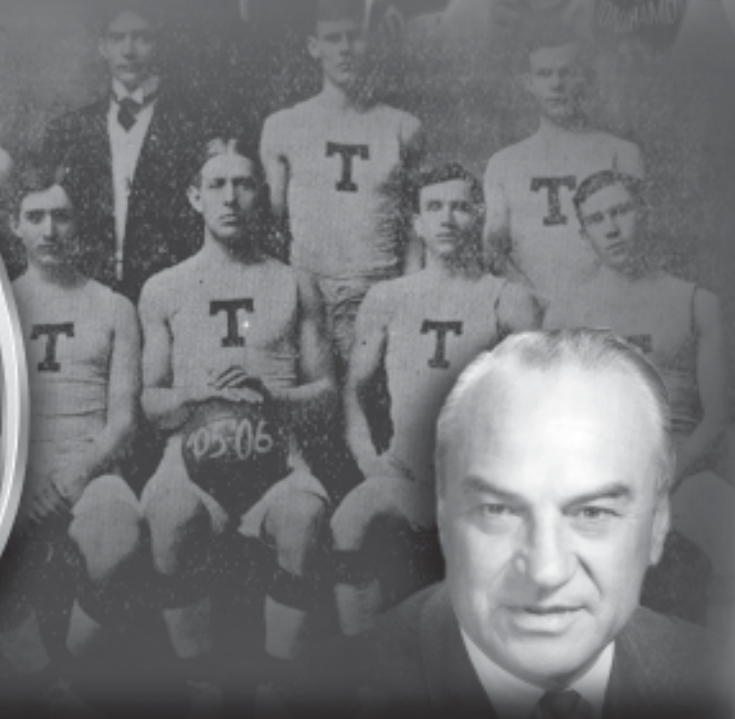

► Duke has won **THREE** national championships — 1991, 1992 & 2001

► Duke ranks **FOURTH** on the NCAA all-time victory list with 1,796 wins

► Duke has been ranked No. 1 in the nation a total of **110** weeks, second in college basketball history

► Duke enters 2006-07 with a streak of **185** consecutive weeks ranked in the top 25, a figure that ranks **SECOND** all-time

► Head coach Mike Krzyzewski has been named the National Coach of the Year **12** times

► Duke has produced **NINE** National Players of the Year including **SEVEN** since 1986. Two of those players — Jason Williams (2001, 2002) and J.J. Redick (2005, 2006) — were repeat winners

► In 2000-01, Shane Battier and Jason Williams became the **FIRST TEAMMATES** to share National Player of the Year honors by the major outlets

► Duke is the **ONLY** school to produce more than one National Defensive Player of the Year honoree, and **SIX** Blue Devils have captured the honor — Tommy Amaker, Billy King, Grant Hill, Steve Wojciechowski, Shane Battier and Shelden Williams

► Battier is one of just three players to win the NABC's National Defensive Player of the Year Award **THREE** times

► Duke has produced **31** All-America selections including two consensus first teamers — J.J. Redick and Shelden Williams — in 2006

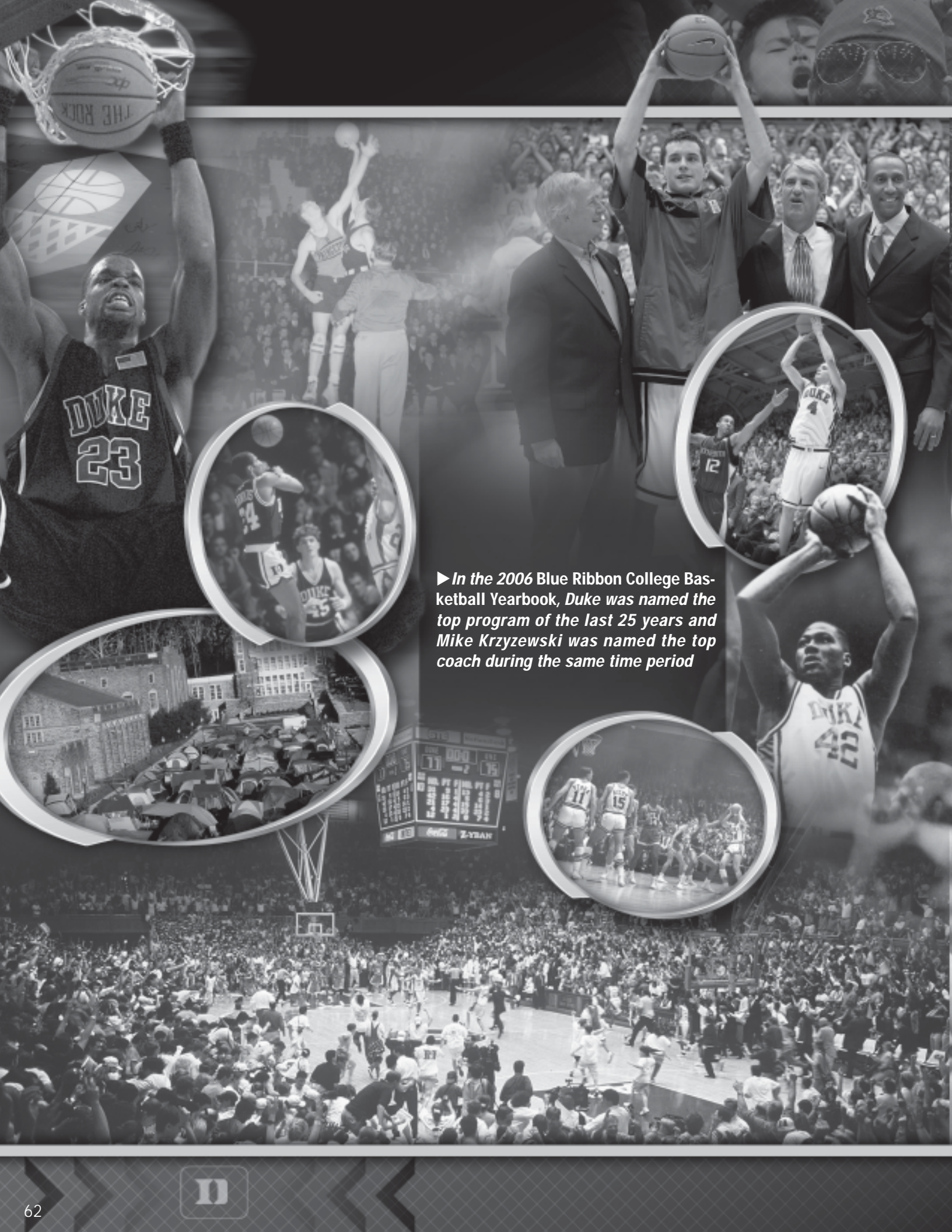
► Since 1990, Duke has recorded more consensus All-Americans — **11** — than any other school

► Duke has won **16** ACC Championships, the most in league history

► Duke won a league record **FIVE** consecutive ACC Championships from 1999-2003 and captured **SEVEN** of the last **EIGHT** league titles

► Duke has played in **NINE** consecutive ACC Championship Games

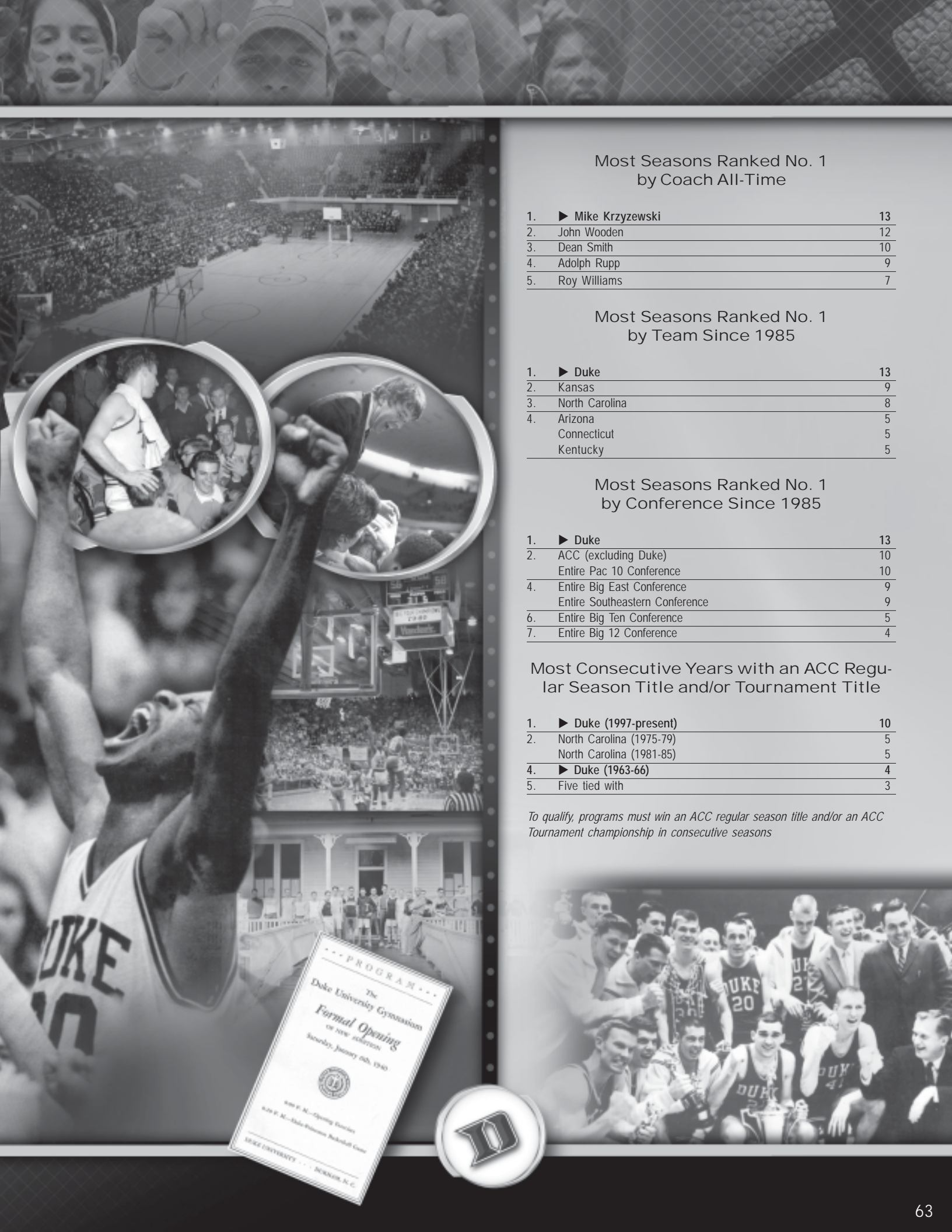

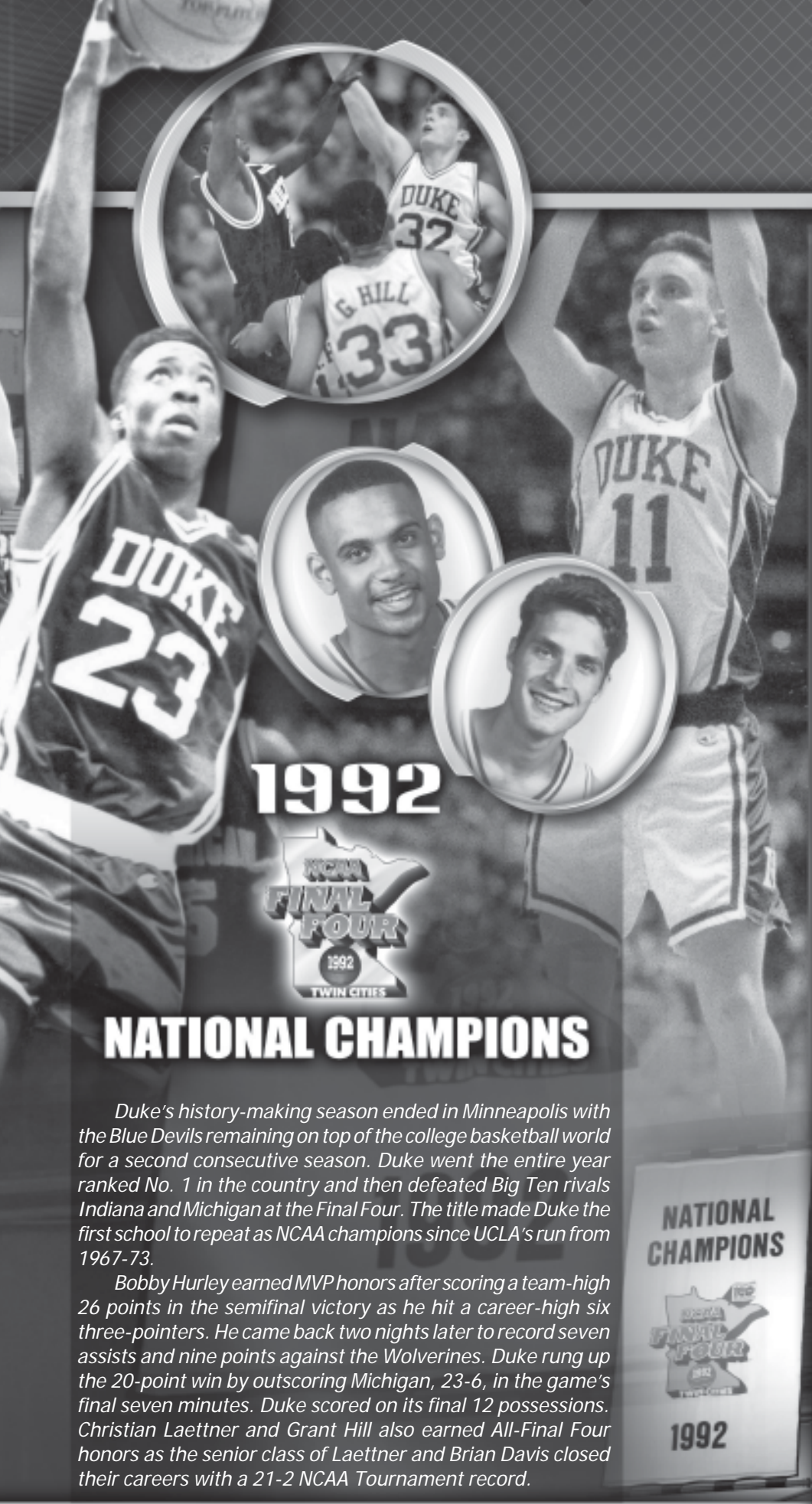


## NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

Mike Krzyzewski joined UCLA's John Wooden as the only coach to lead a school to four consecutive Final Fours. This time it proved to be the magical trip as Duke captured its first national championship. The Blue Devils recorded a stirring upset of undefeated and seemingly invincible UNLV in the semifinals and a hard-fought victory over Kansas in the title contest.

Christian Laettner took MVP honors with 28 points against the Runnin' Rebels and shot a perfect 12-for-12 from the free throw line against the Jayhawks. Point guard Bobby Hurley played nearly flawless basketball. He was on the floor the entire 80 minutes with 16 assists and just six turnovers in directing the offense. Reserve guard Billy McCaffrey joined Hurley and Laettner on the All-Final Four team with 16 points in the title game.

**NATIONAL CHAMPIONS**

Duke's history-making season ended in Minneapolis with the Blue Devils remaining on top of the college basketball world for a second consecutive season. Duke went the entire year ranked No. 1 in the country and then defeated Big Ten rivals Indiana and Michigan at the Final Four. The title made Duke the first school to repeat as NCAA champions since UCLA's run from 1967-73.

Bobby Hurley earned MVP honors after scoring a team-high 26 points in the semifinal victory as he hit a career-high six three-pointers. He came back two nights later to record seven assists and nine points against the Wolverines. Duke rung up the 20-point win by outscoring Michigan, 23-6, in the game's final seven minutes. Duke scored on its final 12 possessions. Christian Laettner and Grant Hill also earned All-Final Four honors as the senior class of Laettner and Brian Davis closed their careers with a 21-2 NCAA Tournament record.

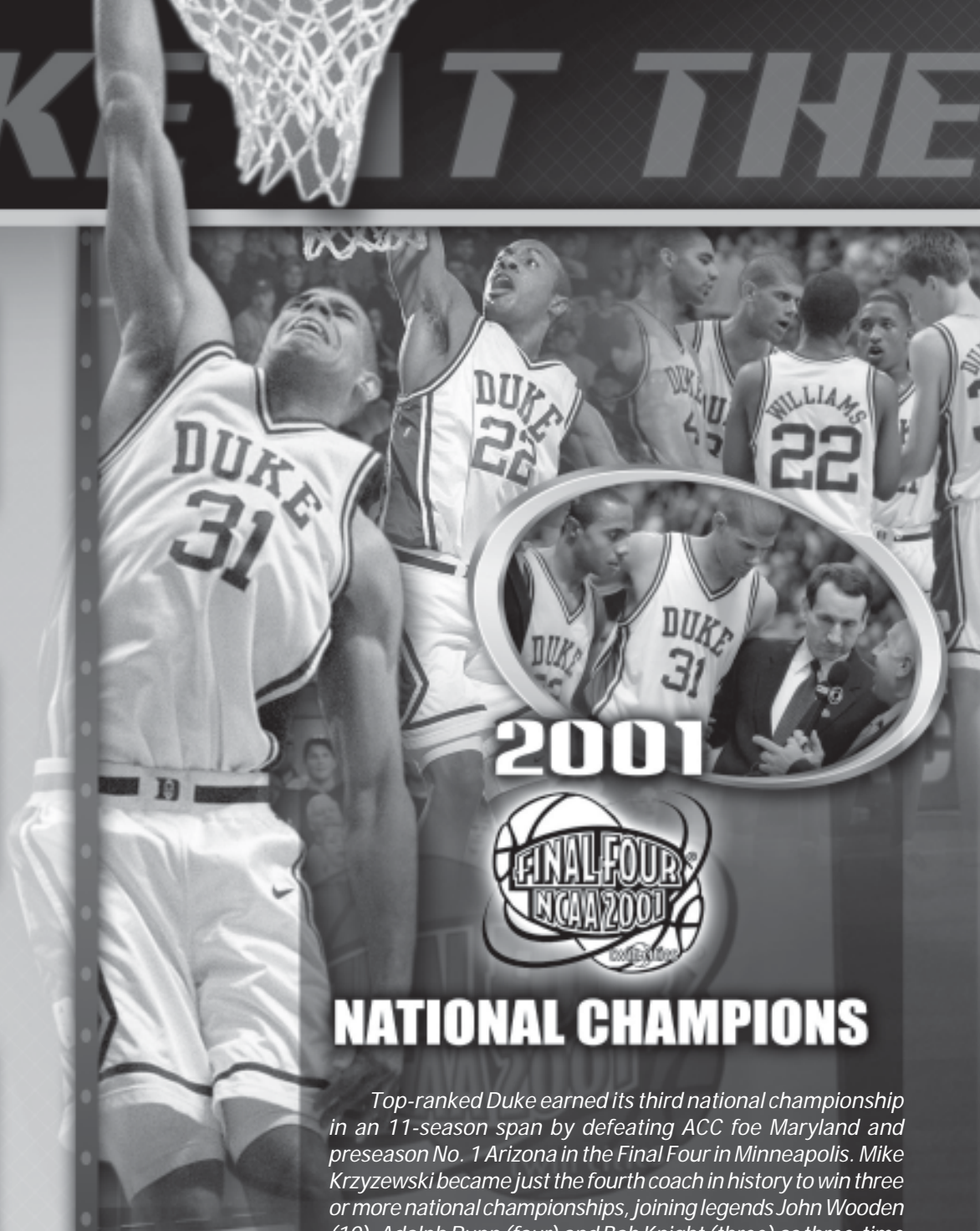

## NATIONAL CHAMPIONS

*Top-ranked Duke earned its third national championship in an 11-season span by defeating ACC foe Maryland and preseason No. 1 Arizona in the Final Four in Minneapolis. Mike Krzyzewski became just the fourth coach in history to win three or more national championships, joining legends John Wooden (10), Adolph Rupp (four) and Bob Knight (three) as three-time NCAA title coaches.*

*Led by the Final Four Most Outstanding Player and National Player of the Year Shane Battier, the Blue Devils rolled through the NCAA Tournament, becoming only the second team since the field was expanded to 64 or 65 teams to win every tournament game by 10 or more points. Mike Dunleavy exploded for 21 points in the championship game and Jason Williams averaged more than 25 points in Duke's six NCAA games. Along the way, the team set the tournament records for three-point field goals made (60) and attempted (175).*

Duke has made 14 appearances in the Final Four, the third-highest total in NCAA history. Beginning with its 1963 team that featured National Player of the Year Art Heyman through the 2004 team led by Chris Duhon, the Blue Devils have been amazingly consistent, having advanced to a Final Four at least once in each of the last five decades. Duke's 10 Final Fours since 1986 are the most by any school in the country (the next-closest school has seven). The Blue Devils' string of five consecutive Final Four appearances from 1988-92 ranks second all-time.

Since Mike Krzyzewski arrived in Durham in 1980, Duke has performed on basketball's largest stage 10 times in 26 seasons. Coach K's 10 Final Four appearances rank third all-time behind only John Wooden (12) and Dean Smith (11).
